LSTA Virtual Reality Access & Exposure Grant

This spring the Utah State Library (USL) provided the VR Access and Exposure Grant through Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds. It focuses on getting virtual and augmented reality technologies into rural communities.

This means you can now hold the solar system in the palm of your hand using the AR Merge Cube. Or use the Oculus Go to visit a coral reef. You can inspect the workings of a cell or experience how plants undergo photosynthesis.



By Gary Paulsen



Utah Government Digital Library

The USL is the central depository of all official state digital and print publications. This means that if a state agency creates reports, videos, posters, fact sheets, manuals, etc.- the USL is required to house those publications for accessibility for Utah citizens.

The USL is responsible for the permanent access, distribution and exchange of printed state agency publications as part of the larger <u>State Publications</u> <u>Depository System</u>. The collection of State Publications is built from regular submissions from contributory agencies under the Utah Code Annotated 9-7-201 to 9-7-209.



The <u>Utah Government Digital Library</u> (UGDL) was created to provide the public permanent access to Utah government publications that exist in digital formats. Digitization is also performed in-house to increase access to this unique collection.

The UGDL branches out a bit beyond the USL State Publication Collection and also collects some publications created by counties and cities for improved and wider-spread access. The digital collection contains things from city water reports to newsletters to local tax information.


So, if there is a question a patron asks about a particular state government agency or function, come check out the UGDL!



The Radium Girls

Discovered in 1898 by Marie and Pierre Curie,
Radium is quickly heralded as the latest wonder
element, used in everything from health supplies
to beauty supplies. The popular new element shines
bright in the darkest of circumstances, the First
World War. Hundreds of girls are hired to paint with
the glowing dust to create glowing radium-dials for
watches, clocks and other instruments used during the
First World War. The "Shining Girls" were

considered the luckiest girls alive for their health and positions, until suddenly they weren't.



With the factories disclaiming involvement in all of the gruesome side effects and the women dying, the Shining Girls find themselves embroiled in one of the biggest scandals of America's early 20th century, fighting a groundbreaking battle for workers' rights that echo today.
