September-30-11; Piano - Emanuel Ax

Class Times: 2:00PM - 4:00PM

Born in Lvov, Poland, Emanuel Ax moved to Winnipeg, Canada, with his family when he was a young boy. He studied at The Juilliard School and Columbia University capturing public attention in 1974 when he won the first Arthur Rubinstein International Piano Competition in Tel Aviv. In 1975 he won the Michaels Award of Young Concert Artists, followed four years later by the coveted Avery Fisher Prize. Highlights of the current season include return visits to the orchestras of Cleveland, Chicago, New York, Los Angeles, St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Atlanta and Toronto as well as a number of recitals culminating in a series of three at Lincoln Center focused on the music of Schubert. In recognition of the bicentenaries of Chopin and Schumann in 2010 and in partnership with London's Barbican, Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, Carnegie Hall, the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the San Francisco Symphony, Mr. Ax commissioned new works from composers Thomas Adés, Peter Lieberson and Stephen Prutsman for three recital programs presented in each of those cities with colleagues Yo-Yo Ma and Dawn Upshaw. His collaboration with Mark Morris Dance Group continued during summer 2009 partnered with Yo-Yo Ma in a dance work jointly commissioned by the Tanglewood and Mostly Mozart festivals.

October-03-11; French Horn - Bernhard Scully

Bernhard Scully is the professor of horn at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana and Principal Horn of The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, where he has been featured as a soloist on many occasions. Previous to the SPCO, Bernhard was the horn player of the Canadian Brass, performing in the world's finest concert halls, sharing the stage, and soloing with some of the world's greatest symphony orchestras. He is a founding member of the Contrapunctus Brass, a group made up of musicians holding major university and performing positions across the United States. Bernhard has appeared as a guest artist at many workshops and conventions, where he has given lectures, master classes, and solo performances. In 2008, he was featured with the Colorado Symphony in Lee Actor's Concerto for Horn and Orchestra, and has since performed the work across the US. In 2009 Bernhard became the first classical brass player to win the prestigious McKnight Foundation Artist Fellowship. He also received the Distinguished Music Alumni Award from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 2010 for outstanding artistry.

October-07-11; Voice – John Mac Master

Since his astonishing portrayal of Canio in Pagliacci at Glimmerglass Opera, John Mac Master has been in demand at the highest international level for the dramatic tenor repertoire. Recent performances and recording projects include Florestan in Fidelio with Sir Colin Davis in London, Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with Sir Bernard Haitink (both with the London Symphony Orchestra) and his debut at Dresden's Semper Oper as Calaf in Turandot conducted by Fabio Luisi. Mr. Mac Master's acclaimed



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Metropolitan Opera debut came as Canio in Pagliacci, in performances including the Saturday Afternoon 'Live from the Met' radio broadcast. Of particular note was his assumption of the role of Tristan in Tristan und Isolde for Welsh National Opera conducted by Mark Wigglesworth and subsequently at the Met, with Levine in the pit. His recent schedule also included performances of Verdi's Requiem at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa with Zukerman, Aegisth in Elektra for the Canadian Opera Company, Janacek's Glagolitic Mass with William Eddins and the Edmonton Symphony plus Pagliacci and Ariadne auf Naxos (both for Vancouver Opera).

October-07-11: Flute - Thomas Robertello

Internationally acclaimed for his musical imagination and virtuosity, flutist Thomas Robertello enjoys a multifaceted career as a soloist with orchestra, recitalist, chamber musician, orchestral player and teacher. As one of the leading flute professors in the world, Mr. Robertello is currently on the faculty of Indiana University School of Music. He is a former member of the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Cleveland Orchestra, and the National Symphony, and has performed as guest principal flutist with the Chicago Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic, and Houston Grand Opera. He has toured with the San Francisco Symphony and was guest soloist with that orchestra in the recent release of Jerod Tate's "Iholba," for solo flute, chorus, and orchestra. Other recent recordings include the Telemann solo flute fantasies on the Delos label. Professor Robertello has taught master classes and performed as a soloist throughout the United States, Japan, South Korea, China, and South America. His many festival performances include the Pacific Music Festival, Sarasota, Grand Teton, Nara, Kirishima, Londrina, and Brevard Music Center.

October-07-11; Bassoon – Benjamin Kamins

Benjamin Kamins has enjoyed a distinguished career as an orchestral musician, chamber and solo performer, and educator. Currently a Professor at Rice University's Shepherd School, Kamins maintains the commitment to young musicians and classical music performance that he began at St. Olaf and Macalester Colleges, while serving as Associate Principal Basson with the Minnesota Orchestra, and continued at Houston University, while Principal Bassoon of the Houston Symphony and founding member of the Houston Symphony Chamber Players. Kamins also holds faculty positions at the Music Academy of the West and the International Festival Institute at Round. Additionally, he is Principal Bassoon of the Sun Valley Summer Symphony in Sun Valley, Idaho. He has also served as a Guest Principal Bassoonist with the Pittsburg Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic, New York Philharmonic and the Boston Symphony. Kamins is in demand for master classes, recitals and chamber performances throughout North America. An interest in new music has led to a recent series of commissions and tours that serve to enrich the repertoire for his chosen instrument.

October-07-11; Piano – Margaret Hair

Pianist Margaret Hair began her studies in Melbourne, and later studied in the United Kingdom with pianist David Wilde at London's Guildhall School of Music on an Australian Arts Council Overseas Fellowship. After many years teaching during her student years, she resumed this passion on returning to Australia, becoming an examiner for the AMEB in her mid 20's and later joining the staff of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music from 1986 until 1994. Margaret then became Head of keyboard



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at the Australian Institute of Music for six years. Margaret has given Master Classes at many festivals, conferences and universities world-wide, including The Australasian Piano Pedagogy Conferences, The World Piano Pedagogy Conferences in the USA, and the Colburn School of Music Los Angeles. Also in demand as an adjudicator, Margaret has been on the panel for many competitions, and has taught at the University of New South Wales Australia, The Australian Catholic University of Melbourne, The Australian Institute of Music, the University of Western Australian and The Melbourne University Conservatorium.

October-14-11: Piano – Louis Lortie

French-Canadian pianist Louis Lortie has attracted critical acclaim throughout Europe, Asia, and the United States, not least for extending his interpretative voice across a broad repertoire range rather than choosing to specialise in one particular style. The London Times, describing his playing as "ever immaculate, ever imaginative", has identified the artist's "combination of total spontaneity and meditated ripeness that only great planists have". Louis Lortie has performed with, among other conductors, Riccardo Chailly, Lorin Maazel, Kurt Masur, Seiji Ozawa, Charles Dutoit, Kurt Sanderling, Neeme Järvi, Sir Andrew Davis, Wolfgang Sawallisch, Sir Mark Elder and Osmo Vänskä. He has also been involved in many chamber music projects, with musicians such as Frank Peter Zimmermann, Leonidas Kavakos, Renaud and Gautier Capuçon, Jan Vogler, Augustin Dumay, the Takacs Quartet and Gidon Kremer. His regular piano-duo partner is fellow Canadian Hélène Mercier, with whom he has made successful recordings on the Chandos label. Louis Lortie has made over 30 recordings for Chandos, covering repertoire from Mozart to Stravinsky.

October-15-11; Harp – Alice Giles

Acclaimed as one of the world's leading harp soloists, Australian-born Alice Giles first attracted international notice when she won First Prize in the 8th Israel International Harp Contest at the age of 21. Since then she has performed extensively both in recital and with orchestras around the globe. Concert highlights include solo recitals in London's Wigmore Hall; New York's 92nd Street Y; Frankfurt Alte Oper; Gulbenkian Foundation venues world-wide; and concertos with Collegium Musicum Zürich, Badische Staatskapelle Karlsruhe, the English Symphony Orchestra, Danish Radio Concert Orchestra, and Hamburg Mozart Orchestra. She was regarded by Luciano Berio as the foremost interpreter of his Sequenza II, and has given many other premiere performances--including a recent commission of new works for the electro-acoustic harp. Alice Giles has an international reputation as a teacher, having given master classes in the Salzburg Mozarteum, the Conservatorium in The Hague, Royal Academy London, Cleveland Institute, the Juilliard School, Curtis Institute, and at the International Youth Festival in Bayreuth. She has recently been appointed to the School of Music, ANU in Australia.

October-16-11; Harp - Alice Giles

Acclaimed as one of the world's leading harp soloists, Australian-born Alice Giles first attracted international notice when she won First Prize in the 8th Israel International Harp Contest at the age of 21. Since then she has performed extensively both in recital and with orchestras around the globe. Concert highlights include solo recitals in London's Wigmore Hall; New York's 92nd Street Y; Frankfurt Alte Oper; Gulbenkian Foundation venues world-wide; and concertos with Collegium Musicum Zürich, Badische Staatskapelle Karlsruhe, the English Symphony Orchestra, Danish Radio Concert Orchestra, and Hamburg Mozart Orchestra. She was regarded by Luciano Berio as the foremost interpreter of his Sequenza II, and has given many other premiere performances--including a recent commission of new works for the



electro-acoustic harp. Alice Giles has an international reputation as a teacher, having given master classes in the Salzburg Mozarteum, the Conservatorium in The Hague, Royal Academy London, Cleveland Institute, the Juilliard School, Curtis Institute, and at the International Youth Festival in Bayreuth. She has recently been appointed to the School of Music, ANU in Australia.

October-21-11; Violin – Victor Danchenko

An internationally-renowned artist and pedagogue, Victor Danchenko graduated from the Moscow Conservatory where he studied with David Oistrakh. His numerous awards include the gold medal in the Soviet National Competition and the Ysaye Gold Medal. Prior to his emigration to the West, he enjoyed a distinguished solo career appearing with orchestras and in recitals throughout the U.S.S.R. and abroad. Since then, he has performed as a soloist in the United States, Canada, Europe, and South America to high critical acclaim while developing an immensely successful teaching career. His students have won major awards and competitions and appeared with concerts and recitals on all continents. Among his many successful students are concert masters of various orchestras, first violinists of major string quartets, members of major orchestras, and various conservatories. He is currently on faculty at the Curtis Institute of Music and the Peabody Conservatory of Music. In addition to these duties, he participates as a jury member of major international competitions. Mr. Danchenko also continues to conduct masterclasses in around the world, where he remains in great demand.

October-21-11; Trombone – Norman Bolter

Trombonist Norman Bolter joined the Boston Symphony Orchestra in 1975 at age 20, becoming the youngest member of the orchestra at that time. He played with the BSO for 32 years and maintains an active playing and conducting schedule. He was also principal trombonist of the Boston Pops Orchestra and a founding member of the Empire Brass Quintet. A renowned teacher, Bolter serves on the faculty of New England Conservatory and additional area institutions. He founded both the brass repertoire class at NEC and the trombone choir in the NEC Preparatory School. Bolter also has served on the faculties of Mannes School of Music and Boston University as a member of quintet-in-residence Empire Brass Quintet; the University of South Florida and the University of Massachusetts-Amherst, where he also taught composition; Boston University Tanglewood Institute; and the Tanglewood Music Center. Bolter's students have included not only trombonists, but hornists, trumpeters, and tubists, many of whom hold positions in major symphony orchestras, chamber music groups, and universities around the world.

October-21-11; Voice - Wendy Nielsen

New Brunswick soprano Wendy Nielsen enjoys an international career on the operatic and concert stage. She made her Metropolitan Opera debut as Fiordiligi in Mozart's Cosi fan tutte in 1996 and has performed numerous roles there in the ensuing seasons. She has also performed with many companies across North America including the Canadian Opera Company, where she was an apprentice artist; New York City Opera; Opera Company of Philadelphia; Boston Lyric Opera; L'Opera de Montreal; Calgary Opera; Minnesota Opera; and Florida Grand Opera. With orchestra she has performed world-wide in a variety of repertoire from Mozart to Penderecki with such acclaimed conductors as James Conlon, Kurt Masur, Ivan Fischer, Long Yu, Eiji Oue, Charles Dutoit, and Mario Bernardi. As a voice teacher, she works with the Canadian Opera Company's Ensemble, Calgary Opera's Young Artist program, University of Toronto's COSI summer program in Italy and the St. Andrews



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Opera Workshop (of which she is Artistic Director).

October-28-11; Piano – Dr. Blair Lamb

Dr. G. Blair Lamb is a pain and rehabilitation specialist practicing in Oakville, Ontario, Canada. He began his career in the rehabilitation field when he suffered a series of accidents causing profound pain and loss of function of his spine and limbs. Current medical management was unsuccessful in remedying his pain and impairment. Fortunately, Dr. Lamb began his study of muscle dysfunction and scarring, studying "high-tech acupuncture" and soft tissue laser therapy. Perhaps best known as a founding member of the internationally renowned Empire Brass Quintet, Sam Pilafian has also recorded and performed with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, the Orchestra of St. Luke's, the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, the Duke Ellington Orchestra, Lionel Hampton, and Pink Floyd. He is also a member of the large brass ensemble Summit Brass. Solo recital and concerto performances during recent seasons have taken him to Canada, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Japan, Italy, Austria, Germany and England. As an arranger, composer and recording producer, Sam has recently produced and written for Joseph Alessi (New York Philharmonic), the Boston Brass, the Brass Band of Battle Creek, the Academy (of Drum Corp International), and the United States Air Force Band. Pilafian is the coauthor of the best selling pedagogy texts "Breathing Gym" and "Brass Gym". He is currently professor of music in the ASU Herberger College School of Music, having previously served for 20 years on the faculties of Boston University and their summer Tanglewood Institute.

November-04-11; Cello – Denis Brott

Founder and Artistic Director of the prize-winning Montreal Chamber Music Festival and Professor at the Conservatoire de musique du Québec à Montréal, cellist Denis Brott is recognized internationally as one of Canada's finest performing musicians. He has appeared as soloist with every major Canadian orchestra and performed under the batons of such distinguished conductors as Zubin Mehta, Franz-Paul Decker, Mario Bernardi, Yoav Talmi and Ronald Zollman. A devoted chamber musician, Brott was a member of the Orford String Quartet, with whom he recorded 25 chamber music discs, including the string quartets of Beethoven, which won the Grand Prix du Disque Award and two Juno Awards for Best Chamber Ensemble Classical Recording. He has appeared as guest with ensembles including the Emerson and Tokyo String Quartets. Brott is also a passionate pedagogue, serving as professor of cello and chamber music at the North Carolina School of the Arts, the Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan, the University of Toronto School of Music, and the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, California, in addition to his current appointment.



November-04-11; Percussion – Frank Epstein

Since 1968, Frank Epstein has been a percussionist with the world-renowned Boston Symphony Orchestra. He is currently a member of the Tanglewood Music Center, as well as the chairman of the Percussion and Brass departments at the New England Conservatory and director of the NEC Percussion Ensemble. Frank has made recordings with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Boston Symphony, and the Boston Pops, as well as with Collage New Music, which he founded in 1972, and of which he served as music director for its first twenty years. A two-CD set of ten works commissioned, premiered and recorded by Frank and the NEC Percussion Ensemble will be released on the Naxos label in April and May 2011. The ten composers of these works are Elliot Carter, Peter Child, Ed Cohen, John Harbison, Jennifer Higdon, Fred Lerdahl, Robert Rodriguez, Felicia Sandler, Gunther Schuller, and Joan Tower. An entrepreneur, Frank has developed a number of percussion instruments, including the Symphonic Castanet (now used worldwide), and has recently authored the book Cymbalisms, a complete guide for the Orchestral Cymbal Player.

November-09-11; Piano – Lise de la Salle

Born in Cherbourg, France, in 1988, pianist Lise de la Salle was surrounded by music from her earliest childhood. After receiving special permission to enter the Paris Conservatoire Supérieur de Musique, studying with Pierre Réach, at the age of eleven, de la Salle graduated in 2001 and subsequently enrolled in the postgraduate cycle with Bruno Rigutto. She has worked closely with Pascal Nemirovski since 1997 and also studied with Genevieve Joy-Dutilleux. Lise de la Salle's 2009-10 season included her debut with the Boston Symphony led by Fabio Luisi; her first subscription concerts with the Los Angeles Philharmonic with James Conlon, with whom she also appeared to enthusiastic audiences at the Aspen and Ravinia Festivals; as well as her debut in the fabled Musikverein with the Vienna Symphony. In this and recent seasons, de la Salle's appearances include recitals in Paris, London (Wigmore Hall), Lucerne Festival Piano Series, Stuttgart, Copenhagen, Luxemburg, Salzburg and the Verbier Festival. Other engagements include the Philharmonia Orchestra in London, the Dresden Staatskapelle, the Stuttgart Radio Orchestra and the Munich Philharmonic Orchestra.

Canadian pianist Marc Durand enjoys a versatile career as a soloist, accompanist, chamber musician, and pedagogue. He is professor of piano at the Faculty of Music of the University of Montreal and a visiting artist and program advisor at The Glenn Gould School of The Royal Conservatory. Marc has become one of Canada's most sought-after performers and pedagogues. As a soloist, Marc has appeared with a number of orchestras and has been heard regularly on Canadian radio and television, and has toured North America, Europe, Asia and has also given concerts in Egypt, Indonesia, and Australia.

Renowned pianist and conductor Leon Fleisher became a student of the legendary Artur Schnabel at the age of 9, and made his debut with the New York Philharmonic under Pierre Monteux at the age of 16. Holder of the Andrew W. Mellon Chair at the Peabody Conservatory of Music since 1959, Mr. Fleisher also serves on the faculties of the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia and The Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, as well as the Aspen, Lucerne, Ravinia and Verbier festivals.

November-18-11; Oboe – Werner Herbers

Born in 1940 in Bilthoven (The Netherlands) to German emigrants, Werner Herbers studied oboe, piano and conducting at the Muzieklyceum Amsterdam. He has been principal oboist of the Dutch Radio Orchestra, Rotterdam Philharmonic Orchestra and, from 1970, the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra Amsterdam. As soloist he played under the conductors Berio, Harnoncourt, Vonk, Leitner, Haitink, de Waart, van Otterloo, among others. Between 1962-1988 he was member and artistic director of the Dutch Wind Ensemble. In 1990 he founded the Ebony Band, consisting of members of the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra Amsterdam, devoted to performance of unknown and forgotten composers active between the two World Wars. He also features as conductor in the following recordings: Erwin Schulhoff, volume 1 & 2 (Channel Classics), Music from the Spanish Civil War (BVHAAST), Robert Graettinger volume 1 & 2 (Channel Classics), Stefan Wolpe Zeus und Elida and Schöne Geschichten (Decca), Silvestre Revueltas (Channel Classics).

James Boyd is one of Britain's finest chamber musicians. He has been a member of some of the country's foremost ensembles and is in demand as a guest artist with many others. Mr. Boyd has appeared regularly with many ensembles including the Endellion and Wihan Quartets, the Barbican and Florestan Piano Trios, and mixed ensembles such as the Nash Ensemble and the London Sinfonietta. He's appeared recently as soloist and conductor of the Irish Chamber Orchestra, in concerts of Beethoven string trios with Peter Cropper and Paul Watkins, and can be heard playing solos on the film, 'Cheri'.

Baritone Timothy Noble has enjoyed an international career spanning 44 years, performing leading roles at major opera houses, including the Metropolitan Opera, San Francisco Opera, Chicago Lyric Opera, Canadian Opera Company, La Fenice in Venice, Netherlands Opera Santa Fe Opera, and the Glyndebourne Festival. He has performed in concert with the London Philharmonic, Concertgebouw Orchestra, Chicago Symphony, Cleveland Orchestra, and Cincinnati Symphony and has appeared at Carnegie Hall, the Hollywood Bowl, and the Ravinia Festival, to name a few. Noble is now beginning his eleventh year at the Jacobs School of Music and was elevated to Distinguished Professor in 2004. He serves as vocal trainer/coach for the Canadian Opera Company Ensemble program and is the founder and director of the Charley



Creek Vocal Workshop held each June in Wabash, Ind. He is also in demand as an adjudicator and clinician throughout North America.

Recently invested as a Member of the Order of Canada, John Fanning's schedule of engagements is evidence of his pre-eminent position among today's baritones. A veteran of nine seasons at the Metropolitan Opera, he has also appeared at the San Francisco Opera and other opera houses around the world, toured the USA as soloist in Mozart's Requiem with Bernard Labadie and Les Violons du Roy, and sang Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with Zukerman in Ottawa with the National Arts Centre Orchestra. Fanning also has considerable experience in musical theatre. He was a member of the Canadian touring production of Andrew Lloyd Webber's Phantom of the Opera 1991-2, and in 2004 he played the title role in Sondheim's Sweeney Todd with the Calgary Opera. He also appeared in the feature film Moonstruck in 1987.

Andrés Díaz's numerous orchestral appearances have included return engagements with the Atlanta Symphony under the late conductor Robert Shaw; performances with the American Symphony at Carnegie Hall, the symphony orchestras of Milwaukee, Seattle, Rochester under Christopher Seaman, the Boston Pops and Esplanade Orchestras, the Chicago Symphony at the Ravinia Festival with Edo de Waart conducting, and the National Symphony Orchestra. Presently, he is Associate Professor at Southern Methodist University.

The Tokyo String Quartet has captivated audiences and critics alike since it was founded 42 years ago. Regarded as one of the supreme chamber ensembles of the world, the Tokyo Quartet-Martin Beaver and Kikuei Ikeda (violins), Kazuhide Isomura (viola) and Clive Greensmith (cello)-has collaborated with a remarkable array of artists and composers, built a comprehensive catalogue of critically acclaimed recordings and established a distinguished teaching record. Performing over a hundred concerts worldwide each season, the quartet has a devoted international following across the globe. Officially formed in 1969 at the Juilliard School of Music, the quartet traces its origins to the Toho School of Music in Tokyo, where the founding members were profoundly influenced by Professor Hideo Saito. Soon after its formation, the quartet won First Prize at the Coleman Competition, the Munich Competition and the Young Concert Artists International Auditions. An exclusive contract with Deutsche Grammophon firmly established it as one of the world's leading quartets, and it has since released more than 40 landmark recordings. The ensemble now records on the Harmonia Mundi label.

Jake Heggie is the composer of the operas Moby-Dick, Dead Man Walking, Three Decembers, The End of the Affair and To Hell and Back, as well as the stage works For a Look or a Touch and At the Statue of Venus. His songs, song cycles, and operas are championed internationally by many of the most celebrated singers of our time, including GGS graduate Isabel Bayrakdarian, Joyce DiDonato, Susan Graham, Ben Heppner, Kristine Jepson, Patti LuPone, Audra McDonald, Robert Orth, Kiri Te Kanawa, Frederica von Stade, and Bryn Terfel, among others. His operas have been produced on five continents and Moby-Dick, which recently received its 2010 world premiere in Dallas, was jointly commissioned by The Dallas Opera with San Francisco Opera, San Diego Opera, State Opera of South Australia and Calgary Opera. Upcoming projects include songs commissioned by Carnegie Hall, The Dallas Opera, Houston Grand Opera, and San Francisco Performances, as well as the "Ahab" Symphony, commissioned by University of North Texas at Denton, where Heggie will be guest artist-in-residence during the 2010/11 academic year.

Linda Strommen is professor of oboe at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and has been a regular visiting oboe instructor at the Juilliard School of Music for more than 10 years. In addition to being a former member of the Timm and Lieurance Woodwind Quintets, she has been a regular participant in summer festivals such as the Marlboro, Bellingham, Bard, and Masterworks Festivals. Strommen is also a champion of new works, and premiered two concerti by Eric Ewazen. A devoted teacher and clinician, Strommen is a former professor of oboe at Louisiana State University and Wichita State University, and also held positions at Mannes College of Music, the Juilliard Pre-College, State University of New York at Purchase, University of Hawaii, and as adjunct faculty at Yale University.

She made her debut under Young Concert Artists with the pianist Peter Serkin. She resides with her husband, violist Steven Tenenbom, in Philadelphia and Connecticut, where they breed and train prizewinning Hungarian vizsla show dogs.
