#### 2017 DOUBLE EAGLE AWARD RECIPIENTS February 20, 2017

The Double Eagle Award was started by the Great Falls Valley in 1989. It is presented annually by the incoming and outgoing Venerable Masters to not more than two individuals for outstanding service to Masonry and the Scottish Rite. All members who are Thirty-second Degree Masons, the black hat degree, are eligible to be recipients. It is given to men who have through the years supported Masonry in the community, promoted Scottish Rite and its ideals and have not been recognized with other distinctions. The plaque with all recipients' names is located by the elevator door on the first floor of the building.

VM Charles Stein started the night by saying we are honoring an individual who has made his living by entertaining people with his stories and keeping them cut down to size. He is deeply involved in Blue Lodge activities, having served as master of three different lodges for a total of five different times; he has also served as instructor of his lodge. This total has only been exceeded by his ascending to the top leadership position in Eastern Star, where he has served as Worthy Patron a total of six times for two different chapters. To say that his mind is sharp and his ability to separate Masonic and Star ritual is stellar is an understatement. This thirty year Mason moves with ease in all stations of the lodge and chapter where he willing to take

moves with ease in all stations of the lodge and chapter where he willing to take part in degree work and assists in a variety of other ways. His willingness to assist has been graciously accorded to the organizations he belongs to as well as those he visits. At the same time he has played an integral role in the operation of the Great Falls Scottish Rite where he has gone through the chairs of the Council of Kadosh and was its Commander. He has served as the Master of Rose Croix and the Master of the Consistory. Typical of his work ethic and willingness to repeat, he is currently working his way through the Council of Kadosh for the second time. When we have reunions he has parts in the 30<sup>th</sup> and 32<sup>nd</sup> degrees. He joined the Scottish Rite in 1990. This man is Jon Stalcup.

Another individual who deserves recognition for his work in Masonry joined the fraternity in 2007 and joined the Scottish Rite just two years later. Almost as soon as he joined the Masonic fraternity, he was put to work in his blue lodge. He went through the chairs and is presently one of the Past Masters. As soon as he finished being Master he moved to the Secretary's desk. He, like most others who assume that position, is still there. In the blue lodge setting he has produced power point presentations for the three degrees. There is now an elaborate series of slides to accompany the lectures. These additions have enhanced the experience for the candidates a well as for the



sideliners. For the Scottish Rite this brother has become an integral part of the stage crew for our reunions. Besides working to see that the stage is properly set, he has assumed the responsibility of seeing that the sound effects for the degrees come in at the proper time. Instead of working his magic with a tape recorder, he performs the tasks with his computer which is definitely modernizing degree operations. He also worked his way through the line for the Lodge of Perfection. While Venerable Master he brought our diner presentations into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century with his power points. He also made telephone calls to members on their birthday; this made their day for many brothers. At our dinners he has caused our servers a certain amount of trepidation as he coerced the Jobbies to give a brief talk about themselves and their order. This was very good training for the girls. Last year he joined Eastern Star and is serving as Chaplain for his chapter. This man is David Montgomery.

# After the Double Eagle Awards Earl Nielsen gave the following presentation honoring POW's & MIA's

Those who have served, and those currently serving in the uniformed services of the United States, are ever mindful that the sweetness of enduring peace has always been tainted by the bitterness of personal sacrifice. We are compelled to never forget that while we enjoy our daily pleasures, there are others who have endured and may still be enduring the agonies of pain, deprivation and imprisonment.

Before we depart this evening, let us pause to recognize our POWs and MIAs.

We call your attention to the small this small table that occupies a place of dignity and honor. It is set for one symbolizing the fact that members of our armed forces are missing from our ranks. They are referred to as POWs and MIAs.

We call them comrades. They are unable to be with their loved ones and family, so we join together to pay humble tribute to them, and to bear witness to their continued absence.

The table is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner, alone against his or her suppressers.

The tablecloth is white, symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to their Country's call to arms.

The single rose in the vase signifies the blood they have shed in sacrifice to ensure the freedom of our beloved United States of America. This rose also reminds us of the family and friends of our missing comrades who keep faith while awaiting their return.

The red ribbon on the vase represents the red ribbons worn on the lapels of the thousands who demand, with unyielding determination, a proper account of our comrades who are not among us.

A Slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of their bitter fate.

The salt sprinkled on the plate reminds us of the countless fallen tears of families as they wait.

The glass is inverted, they cannot toast with us at this time.

The chair is empty. They are NOT here.

#### Down to the cafeteria for the Mystic feast.

Maundy Thursday is for many only a commemoration of events which took place at the Last Supper. However, the principles, emotions and philosophy dominating Maundy Thursday, antedate by centuries this historic meal. The life of Him, who was The Light of the World, was about to be extinguished temporarily by the forces of evil. Jesus left the supper table to suffer the betrayer's kiss and to be nailed to the cross by ruffians who were seeking to pull the pillars of reason, religion, and government from under the temple of civilization.

The Last Supper, in a sense, was a re-enactment of an age-old drama of suffering, typifying those periods in history when the lights of reason culture and wisdom were dimmed or extinguished by the hands of darkness. The sorrowing of the Craft over the death of Hiram, the grief of the Jew over the persecution and loss of

#### IN MEMORIAM



**Edwin "Ted" Byers** was one individual among who labored for a number of years for the betterment of Masonry in general and this Scottish Rite Valley in particular. This man played an integral role in the operations of the Valley almost since the day he joined. He worked his way up the line for the Lodge of Perfection and served as Venerable Master in 1969; this distinguished gentleman served as Venerable Master during the Great Falls Valley's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

He worked in the dramatics department as a vice-chairman and chairman. He joined the Scottish Rite in 1956. That made him a member of the Lodge for 61 years. He served on the banquet room committee in the 1960's. He worked under Walter Breuning's guidance as a member of the dramatics committee starting in 1962 and became one of his vice-chairmen in 1966. In

1969 he became Director of Work when Breuning moved to Minneapolis for a short stint. In 1970, when Breuning returned, this brother gladly went back being a vice-chairman.

From 1959 to the fall of 2015, he served as Captain of the Honor Guard for the opening ceremony of each reunion. Starting in 1961 this long serving Mason began to share the Masters position of the 32<sup>nd</sup> Degree; in 1968 he became the sole proprietor of that degree. When the degree was changed a couple of years ago, he retired from that position.

One of the later jobs that he acquired is that of Almoner for the Valley. This position probably more than any other, fit this man's personality. The job is done in a quiet and unassuming way. No recognition, either on the part of the recipient of the funds or on the part of the person dispensing them, is given. This man quietly sat outside of the meeting room door and performed his role as Tyler and waited for the lodge to close; he then came in with his blue money bag and took the donations from the alter and deposited them for the use of a needy brother.

In addition to his Scottish Rite activities, Ted was active in the Elks and the Shrine. In both of these organizations he was Drum Major in their marching units—the Drum and Bugle Corps of the Elks and Shrine Pipe Band. He rose through the chairs in the Elks, serving as the Exalted Rule four times. His community involvement was wide spread and his influence will be felt for many years to come.

**Richard Aspinwall** joined the Scottish Rite October 1996. He received his KCCH in 2007. He served as Venerable Master in 2006 and agreed to fill the position of Junior Warden for the 2012 year. This was done by request of the secretary to fill a vacancy left due to the resignation of two people who had to travel great distances to attend meetings.

The year after he joined he worked in the kitchen as part of the Super Chefs; this involvement lasted for about ten years. At the same time (2007) he began working in the prop room during the reunions and until last year was almost solely responsible for getting the props that are necessary for the actors.

Beginning in 1997 he began filling the position of Junior Warden in the 14<sup>th</sup> Degree. In 2000 he assumed the position of King Solomon in the 4<sup>th</sup> Degree. He held these positions until about six years ago, when he relinquished them



to much younger members. When the 4<sup>th</sup> Degree was changed, he stepped back into the degree. He served as Marshal of Ceremonies for the Council of Kadosh in 2001 and assumed the Chaplain's position in the 27<sup>th</sup> Degree in 2007. He became the chairman of the Visitation committee in 2007.

For years Dick was been the money taker and greeter for the lodge dinners. He just recently developed a telephone calling tree to try to increase involvement by the members of the lodge; this freed the secretary from doing all of the calling.

He was a constant and positive participant at lodge meetings and the Advisory meetings. His thought processes were clear and could be counted on to provide a challenge to the prevailing ideas that were

brought up by other lodge members; he was a welcome devil's advocate to ideas that were presented; his years of experience and insight those years provided were appreciated by those who were looking to improve the lodge. He by no means stood against progress and new ideas—he provided thoughtful questions, insight, and a much needed break on those who lacked his experience and knowledge. He was an anchor of stability that was needed to bring to full light some ideas that were presented that were not necessarily beneficial the lodge in general.

Dick was responsible for getting the gift certificates for the Scottish Rite Christmas dinner give-a-ways. In the past year or so, even if he couldn't eat the dinner items being served because of his dietary restrictions, he was always willing to be the money taker/greeter for the dinners; he never turned down the secretary when asked to do something.

He was active in Delta Lodge; Dick was a Past Master and served as its instructor as well. He served a term as Worthy Patron of HC Roberts OES in the 2003-04 year with Louise Surmi as Worthy Matron—one thing that stands out about his term was how people marveled at his expertise and precision in his actions as Worthy Patron. The ladies were amazed that he was always correct and always proper even though it was his first time through the line. Dick was one of the originators of the Fifth Friday dinners; these have just recently been reinstituted.

Both of these gentlemen leave a very large set of shoes to fill. Their presence and immense knowledge of lodge functions and proper ordering of things will definitely be missed. One thing that stands out about both of these gentlemen is that in no way did either of them work for recognition and honors—honors followed them, they did not chase honors. We all need to look to the heritage they have left behind and try to emulate their actions and thoughts. May they and all of the brothers we have lost this year rest in peace and always serve as a reminder of the good of this order.
