Dear Fellow Carvers, Members and Friends of the Ward Foundation:

The 1979 World Championship Wildfowl Carving Contest is history but the excitement still lingers. Competition was at its highest form. I think I make this statement every year - there are no losers; everyone who attends and competes broadens his education by seeing new techniques, viewing new work from every corner of the United States and Canada and has the thrill of seeing his carvings sitting with the best in the world. Besides, you can't beat the price of admission!

What can I say about Champion Lynn Forehand's "Philippine Fighting Cocks" that hasn't already been said by everyone who saw them win "Best in World". "A magnificent sculpture of art!", to steal one of the overheard exclamations. Besides that, he is a great guy and one of the Ward Foundation's most ardent supporters. That may not win any ribbons but sure gets a few "brownie points" from me! I must congratulate Larry Barth; the technique he used on his "owls" was most dramatic. "Best in World Decoy Pairs" gave us a new champion in Randy Tull who has made his mark in the carving world by taking "Best in Show" in decoys here two years in a row, and now the BIG ONE this year - too much! To World Champion Ernie Muehlmatt in the new decorative miniature class for his woodcocks, I say, "Ernie, you've truly earned it as I know how hard you have worked to get there. Congratulations!"

The judges were top-notch again this year. The response from the novice, amateur and professional ranks was all praise. I'm most appreciative of the judges' participation, as I know how much pressure they are under. If some of the judges look familiar each year, it's because I have decided to keep them for their superior abilities and dedication to this art form. Naturally I'm always open to receive new applications from qualified persons.

In planning our First Carvers Workshop with Ken Basile, our Museum Director, the top number of participants expected was 100. Needless to say, no one was quite prepared for over 400! Already we have big plans for next year's classes, all geared to handle all you eager students.

New records were established this year with 1533 carving entries from 468 carvers and an increased show attendance. However, a couple of disappointments are overriding these accomplishments. The contest was hit by a lack of participation in our "Shootin' Stool" contest and the painting contest. For you who do not realize it, these two events are our "lifeblood" for raising money to keep our heads above water financially and your Museum thriving. It's easy to excuse yourself with the explanation that you didn't have time to carve us a decoy. Are a few hours' time and a block of wood too much to donate to this cause? If you are under the impression the Ward Foundation is "fat in cash" forget it. Each year we plow all receipts right back into prize money, show expenses and operating capital for our Museum. We of the Ward Foundation kept our pledge of 1968 to perpetuate this art form by giving you, the carvers, the largest and most prestigious exhibition in the world each Fall and the World Championship each Spring. We have taken carving out of the workshops and presented it to the world. What have you done for this art form lately? Support your organization - support the Ward Foundation.

Next year's decoy pairs are black ducks. I go down my list in the application by specie and jump from diver to puddler each year, so if you don't like this year's you can start the following year's birds. Speaking of the decorative decoy pairs, the judges tried to pick the most decorative; however, it seems like the most decorative had the most obvious flaws. The judges said this over and over again - "More research before carving and painting" - good advice for all to follow as some made the mistake of carving the hen as large as the drake - "not so" stated the judges. Some scaled the feathers where they are not, some bills too long, some too short. The name is "<u>Research</u>" the average length, the average width "not the peculiarity of one mount". When the carvings are placed in the tank together small flaws light up like neon lights.

But lest everyone forget, I would like to remind you of the inspiration behind the Ward Foundation and its accomplishments. We have had the privilege of personally knowing and loving Lem and Steve Ward. Steve passed on two years ago and now Lem Ward at the age of 82 is recuperating from a leg amputation caused by poor circulation. Mail him a card today to: L. T.
