

2 Alumni Killed In Iraq

The Livingston College Alumni Association mourns the passing of Frank Carvil and Seth Dvorin, two alumni who lost their lives serving in the United States armed forces in Iraq.

Sgt. Frank Carvill '75 of Carlstadt, NJ, 51, a member of the New Jersey National Guard serving in Iraq, was killed June 4 when his convoy was ambushed by a roadside explosive device in the Shiite district of Sadr City in Baghdad. He was one of five soldiers killed in that attack and was serving with the 112th Field Artillery unit based in Lawrenceville, Mercer County. Carvill was part of Task Force Baghdad, made up primarily of elements of the Texas-based 1st Cavalry Division, said division spokesman Lt. Col. James Hutton. Two other NJ National Guardsmen were killed in a similar ambush the following day.

According to his sister, Peggy Ligouri, Carvill had survived both terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in 1993 and 2001. He was working in the North Tower as a paralegal for the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey on Sept. 11, 2001. He was helping a co-worker with a disability get into a van to go to a court appearance in Brooklyn when he saw the first plane hit the building.

Army First Lt. Seth Jeremy Dvorin, a 2002 graduate of Livingston College, was tragically killed in Iraq on February 3rd. He was in a platoon that was disarming an explosive device. Dvorin, a resident of East Brunswick, graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Administration of Justice. The 1998 graduate of South Brunswick High School was killed when a remote-controlled device exploded while he and other soldiers cleared a supply road near Iskandariyah, Iraq. Dvorin, a platoon leader, discovered the bomb and warned his unit away from the danger, according to his family. Dvorin was the only casualty in the incident, which is being investigated by the U.S. Department of

"He told me he saw some pretty tough going in Iraq," said the soldier's father, Richard Dvorin of East Brunswick. "Whatever missions he was assigned to, he did. He served his country, and he gave the ultimate." Dvorin, 24, died five months after he had married fellow Rutgers University graduate Kelly Harris Dvorin, 25.

Endowed Scholarships for Emerging Leaders

Historically, Livingston College has been committed to developing its students as agents of positive change in society. Today at Livingston College, we are dedicated to preparing our students to understand the local, national and global components of our modern social order. The staff and faculty fellows of Livingston are committed to providing a learning environment that helps students confront the key issues of globalization and leadership. We believe that each student is a potential leader. Therefore, our efforts focus on providing an environment in which students learn to assume significant roles in their collegiate community, as well as, to prepare them for leadership positions after graduation. Whether it is through internships, mentoring fellow students, serving as resident advisors and tutors, or leading campus organizations, students are encouraged to participate actively in the life of the College and to develop their leadership skills. Livingston College has enhanced these traditional opportunities by now offering our students the option to minor in Organizational Leadership. Ten scholarships will be awarded to first-year students who have demonstrated leadership potential in their schools or communities prior to admission to the College. These scholarships would be for four years at \$5,000 per year as long as the student participates in the leadership minor. Ten scholarships would also be given to existing students who have declared the leadership minor and have demonstrated leadership potential throughout their activities during the first two years of college. 
LSC Expansion

After fifteen years of pleading, prodding, and petitioning, this past spring, the Rutgers University administration finally agreed to fund a feasibility study for the expansion of the Livingston Student Center. Bringing together students, alumni, staff, and administration representatives, the Student Center Expansion Feasibility Committee met throughout the spring semester to examine current and future needs of the center. Working closely with Kevin Hom of Hom and

Goldman Architects, PC, the committee developed plans for what will become a truly synergetic student center for the Livingston Campus.

For years, the student center has suffered from a lack of space and highly ineffective design. Square foot and usage studies have consistently proven that Livingston's center ranks last on all normal measures at Rutgers



The highlights of the proposed expansion include integrating the new dining hall for the campus in the student center. From a student and user perspective, they will be able to come to the center and have many of their needs taken care of in one location. The center will also house the new Asian-American Cultural Center, providing the center with the ability to use many of the center's resources. Locating these service providers in the student center would represent a major change at Rutgers. In the past dining halls and cultural centers have been linked to the student centers (often sharing common walls), but not enclosed within.

Additionally, the expansion plans call for more meeting rooms, student organization offices, retail spaces, lounges, and a new multi-purpose

room, and "black box" performance space. Phased plans also include the building of a theater/auditorium. All considered, the expanded Livingston Student Center will go along way to creating the types of physical and programming resources the Livingston Campus needs to maintain a healthy and vital campus for future generations.

Livingston College College Town



In the last issue of Livingston Alumni News, we reported that the Office of University Planning and Development was seriously considering expanding the Livingston College Campus. The project, entitled "College Town," would encompass the addition of new and much-needed housing, other buildings, retail areas and aesthetic improvements.

Recently, a Planning Committee was convened to discuss College Town. The Committee consisted of members of Rutgers University administration, the Dean's Office of Livingston College, current Livingston College students, representatives from the Livingston Alumni Association, the Township of Piscataway, and the Middlesex County Improvement Authority ("MCIA").

The MCIA also retained a design team to create a Master Plan for College Town. The team is led by Einhorn Yaffee Prescott, Architects and Engineers, and also includes EDAW New York as Urban Designers and Landscape Architects. The team will conduct a study which will consider a variety of improvements for College Town including housing for undergraduate and graduate students, market-rate housing and other affordable housing. Also under proposal are areas for university buildings and retail establishments such as grocery stores, small goods and convenience shops, cafes and restaurants. The design team will review various design ideas which will combine these uses with open space and adequate parking. Ultimately, the team will arrive at a new plan which will benefit the Livingston Campus, the entire Rutgers community and the Township of Piscataway.

The College Town site is north of the Livingston academic campus and consists presently of parking lots and undeveloped land. This study is expected to be completed by the end of 2004.

> This is the most ambitious project undertaken by Rutgers for Livingston College, and the LAA is very hopeful and excited that it will come to fruition. The development of College Town will reinvent and reinvigorate Livingston Campus. Along with its focus on leadership and diversity, College Town will help solidify Livingston as the College of choice at Rutgers.

The LAA, as your liaison to the University, values your input and suggestions on this historic project. All alumni are encouraged to provide comments as soon as possible so that they can be given meaningful consideration while

About Livingston College Inductees



Dr. Clifton R. Lacy

An active and widely-published researcher and educator, Dr. Lacy, recipient of numerous teaching awards, is regarded as one of the best teachers at UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. He has been listed as one of the Best Doctors in America. Earning his M.D. degree from the UMDNJ Rutgers Medical School (now the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School),

he is board certified in internal medicine and cardiovascular diseases. Dr. Lacy is currently the Commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services, a position to which Governor James E. McGreevey appointed him. He was previously Senior Vice President for Medical Affairs and Chief of Staff at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital. In September 2000, he was named a Distinguished Livingston Alumnus by the LAA.



Eddie Jordan

Named head coach of the Washington Wizards on June 19, 2003, Mr. Jordan spent the previous four seasons as the lead assistant coach of the New Jersey Nets, whom he helped guide to consecutive Eastern Conference championships in 2002 and 2003. Mr. Jordan was the point guard and catalyst of the great Rutgers University basketball teams of the mid-1970's. "Fast

Eddie" was the on-court general for the undefeated 1975-76 Scarlet Knights, who reached the NCAA's Final Four. He holds the Rutgers records for all-time assists with 585 and steals with 220. Drafted by the Cleveland Cavaliers in the third round of the 1977 NBA draft, Jordan was later a member of the 1980 Los Angeles Lakers' NBA championship team. In a career which included stints with the New Jersey Nets and Portland Trailblazers, he played in 420 NBA games, scoring 3,414 career points. Jordan also served four seasons as an assistant coach at Rutgers.

Distinguished Alumni

The Young Alumni Award was created in 2004 and named after Lt. Seth Dvorin, a 2002 graduate of Livingston who was

Dvorin's courageous actions, the results could have been even more severe and catastrophic. The LAA is honored to remember Lt. Dvorin and his service to and sacrifice for our country.

The five recipients of the Distinguished Alumni Award for 2004 are Frank T. Carvill, '75, Gina Collins Cummings '84, Edward E. Johnson, Jr., '79, Michael C. Laracy, '74, and Harry V. Swayne III, '90. Karen Rogers, '92 will receive the Seth Dvorin '02 Distinguished Young Alumni Award.

FRANK CARVILL, a 1975 graduate of Livingston College, was a member of the New Jersey National Guard serving in Iraq. He was sadly killed on June 4 when his convoy was ambushed by a roadside explosive device in Baghdad.

GINA COLLINS CUMMINGS graduated from Livingston
College in 1984. She is the founder of Green Corps, an organization whose goal is to train aspiring young activists to become grassroots environmental organizers. After ten years with Green Corps, she became Director of Constituency Outreach for Physicians for Human Rights where she developed and implemented the strategic plans for Health Action AIDS, the US Campaign to Ban Landmines, the Campaign to Eliminate Conflict Diamonds and the Campaign for Women's Health in Afghanistan. Her current activities focus on an international effort to fight AIDS and an effort to abolish the death penalty for juveniles in the US.

EDWARD E. JOHNSON, JR graduated from Livingston College in 1979. Edward took an unusual route to Wall Street. Specifically, he went via Fifth Avenue, as in Saks Fifth Avenue, where he was one of its youngest managers. During a summer internship at Salomon Brothers, he was captivated by sales and trading. His skills landed him a full-time job at Salomon and, in 1989, at Merrill Lynch & Co. He was a first vice president





of Merrill Lynch's Managed Solutions Group. He is currently the Chief Operating Officer of Advent Capital Management, LLC. Black Enterprise Magazine named him to its list of "The Top 50 African Americans on Wall Street" in 2002. He assists his alma mater by serving on the Livingston College Dean's Advisory Council.

MICHAEL C. LARACY, a 1974 graduate of Livingston College,

successfully transferred his bachelor's degree in urban planning and policy analysis into 25-year career of leadership in human services reform in state government and in national philanthropy. His work focuses on income security for low-income children and families. Currently, he is a Senior Associate at the Annie E. Casey Foundation in Baltimore, where he is responsible for the Foundation's initiatives and grant-making agenda in income security. Prior to joining the Foundation in 1994, Laracy was Assistant Commissioner for Policy, Planning and Program Evaluation in the New Jersey Department of Human Services, where he served for 17 years.

HARRY V. SWAYNE III received his degree from Livingston College in 1990. Swayne enjoyed a brilliant career as a defensive tackle for the Scarlet Knights from 1983-1986. He was also a valuable member of three Super Bowl winning teams, the Denver Broncos (twice) and the Baltimore Ravens. He also played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the San Diego Chargers (AFC Conference Champions) and the Miami Dolphins. Last year, Swayne was inducted into the Rutgers Football Hall of Fame. He is currently the Team Chaplain for the Chicago Bears.

KAREN ROGERS was an honors graduate of Livingston College's Class of 1992. Rogers was a 1992-93 Rotary International Scholar and studied at the Graduate Centre for Journalism Studies at the University of Wales. Since 1996, Rogers has been a news reporter with 6ABC Action News in Philadelphia. Prior to joining 6ABC, she hosted and

produced a weekly public affairs program and the monthly show "Congressional Reports" in Vineland, NJ. Rogers was a first runner-up to Miss New Jersey in 1994. She has also been active in the fight against child abuse, and has taught elementary school students empowerment skills for reporting and preventing abuse.

Howard McGary, a Livinaston College Fellow and member of the department of Philosophy, has been named Scholar-in-Residence for the 2004-2005 academic year, in which capacity he will work closely with the college's Honors Program. In an agreement entered into between the college and the department of Philosophy, the department will provide the college with its Scholars-in-Residence over the next four years.





On May 20, 2004, Livingston College held its annual Commencement Convocation ceremony in the Louis Brown Athletic Center. The Class of 2004 represented the largest graduating class in the history of Livingston College with over 800 undergraduate degrees bestowed.

The Commencement speaker was also a Livingston alumnus — the Honorable Thomas F. Daley. Judge Daley is an Appellate Judge for the 5th Circuit Court of Appeal in Louisiana. In his keynote address, Judge Daley reiterated to the graduating class the value of an education from Livingston College, not only based on academics, but the College's commitment to diversity and leadership development. LC's Radio Station

Reaches for New Heights

Some of us might remember WRLC as the little station tucked away in the back of Yorba Lounge in Tillett Hall. Perhaps we recall it as the station that we heard on the PA in the dining hall, or once checked out on a very staticy AM frequency in our dorm room. These are the memories that dominate the more than 30-year history of the station.

Since 1998, however, the newly named "RLC Radio: 90.3 The Core," reaches over 750,000 residents of Central Jersey thanks to a partnership with neighbor Piscataway High School and their station, WVPH. Over the last six years the two entities have combined their forces, the result of which can now be heard on 90.3 FM.

While the "new" FM frequency has helped RLC reach more people than it ever had before, the location of the WVPH transmitter leaves much to be desired.

Located at the top of two-story PHS, which sits in a shallow valley, the antenna is a mere



seven feet above "average terrain" for the area, which results in a signal with many holes in it and a fair amount of static.

Both LC and PHS have recognized these issues, and are currently working to locate the transmitter to a much taller structure on the LC campus, at a price tag of over \$60,000. The station is planning a 30-hour marathon for Spring 2005, with the goal of raising more than enough to move the transmitter. Each participant in the marathon is collecting pledges toward his or her involvement in the 30-hour broadcast, and the station is seeking out alumni who might be interested in working with the event as well — on or off the air.
