2. Integrated Screening for Co-Occurring Disorders

Nationally, as is identified within the principles of CCISC and ROSC, there is a recognition that Co-occurring disorders are an "expectation and not an exception", and that there is a high prevalence rate for individuals with a combination of mental health and substance use problems. Studies of our health populations consistently tell us that too many Americans go without treatment, due in large part because their disorders go undiagnosed. Regular, integrative screening processes, such as Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) and other innovative screening in behavioral health and primary care processes (e.g.- "No wrong Door Integrative Screener" by Carlo DiClemente, PhD) enables earlier identification of mental health and substance use disorders, which translates to earlier care. Screenings should be provided to people of all ages, even the young and the elderly (SAMHSA/HRSA). Screening must also focus on health and psychosocial i99ssues prevalent in the co-occurring population to determine the need for further evaluation and follow up.
