



## Use and Care

To care for your Motorola phone, please keep it away from:



### liquids of any kind

Don't expose your phone to water, rain, extreme humidity, sweat, or other moisture. If it does get wet, don't try to accelerate drying with the use of an oven or dryer, as this may damage the phone.



#### dust and dirt

Don't expose your phone to dust, dirt, sand, food, or other inappropriate materials.



#### extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below  $0^{\circ}\text{C}/32^{\circ}\text{F}$  or above  $45^{\circ}\text{C}/113^{\circ}\text{F}$ .



#### cleaning solutions

To clean your phone, use only a dry soft cloth. Don't use alcohol or other cleaning solutions.



#### microwaves

Don't try to dry your phone in a microwave oven.



#### the ground

Don't drop your phone.

Press the navigation key • to scroll to Received, and press the center key • to select it.

# battery

## Battery Use & Battery Safety

- Motorola recommends you always use
   Motorola-branded batteries and chargers.
   The warranty does not cover damage caused
   by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
   Caution: Use of an unqualified battery or
   charger may present a risk of fire, explosion,
   leakage, or other hazard. Improper battery
   use, or use of a damaged battery, may result
   in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Important: Motorola mobile devices are designed to work best with qualified batteries.
   If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge, take the following steps:

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it bears a Motorola "Original Equipment" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a qualified battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Charging precautions: When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging. Always take your mobile device with you when you leave your vehicle

- When storing your battery, keep it in a cool. dry place.
- It is normal over time for battery life to decrease, and for the battery to exhibit shorter runtime between charges or require more frequent or longer charging times.
- Avoid damage to battery and mobile device. Do not disassemble, open, crush. bend, deform, puncture, shred, or submerge the battery or mobile device. Avoid dropping the battery or mobile device, especially on a hard surface. If your battery or mobile device has been subjected to such damage, take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center before using. Do **not** attempt to dry it with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
- Use care when handling a charged **battery**—particularly when placing it inside a

pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. Contact with metal objects (such as iewelry, keys, beaded chains) could complete an electrical circuit (short circuit), causing the battery to become very hot, which could cause damage or injury.

Promptly dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.



Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

## battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged.

Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet.



Note: Make sure to

move the charging port door out of the way to fully attach the charger to your phone.

Your phone might take several seconds to start charging the battery. When the battery is fully charged, the charging light turns off, and the phone displays

**Tip:** Motorola batteries have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

You can also charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's Micro USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your phone and the



computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. Cables and software drivers are available in Motorola Original data kits, sold separately.

## conserve battery charge

Using certain features of your phone can quickly deplete your battery's charge. The features can include transferring and listening to music, using the camera, replaying video clips, and using Bluetooth® wireless connections.

#### To save battery life:

 Don't block the light sensor on the keypad of your phone. The light sensor helps conserve battery by sensing when to dim the backlight.

- Adjust the backlight to turn off quickly (see page 33).
- Turn off Bluetooth power when you are not using it (see page 53).

## turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold ① until the display turns on.

If prompted, enter your four-digit unlock code. Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or the last four digits of your phone number.

To turn off your phone, press and hold for two seconds.



## answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, open the phone or press to answer.

To "hang up," close the phone or press ①.

## make a call

With the flip open, enter a phone number and press to make a call.

With the flip closed, press the recent calls (5) touch-sensitive button. Press or to scroll to an entry. Press the center key to make the call using the speakerphone or Bluetooth headset, if you have one connected. To end the call, press and hold the smart key (see page 3 for key location).

To "hang up," close the phone or press ①.

# adjust volume

Press and hold the volume keys (see page 3) up or down to:

- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting from the home screen
- turn off an incoming call alert

With the flip closed, press and hold the volume keys to change the ring style. When the ring style menu appears on the screen, press the smart key to toggle the ring style (see page 3 for key location).

With the flip open, press the volume keys (see page 3 for key location) to adjust the volume.

# change ring volume

With the phone open, **press and hold** the down volume key (see page 3) to switch to lower call alert volume, then vibrate, and finally silent alert. Press and hold the up volume key to cycle back from silent alert to vibrate and then to the lowest alert volume setting.

# store a phone number

You can store a phone number in Contacts:

- Open the phone, enter a phone number in the home screen, and press Store.
- 2 Select whether to create a new contact or modify an existing one.
- 3 Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item, press •
- 4 Press Done to store the number.

To store an email address, press • • • • Contacts • [New Entry]. Enter the new entry's name and email address information.

# call a stored phone number

Find it: •• > Contacts

- Scroll to the Contacts entry.
- 2 Press to call the entry.

Shortcut: In Contacts, enter the first letters of an entry to get to it quickly. You can also press

and ## to see entry categories.

# view your phone number

Find it: ♠ > ♣ Phone Info > My Tel. Number

Tip: Want to see your phone number while you're on a call? Press Options > My Tel. Number.

## touch-sensitive buttons

With the flip closed, you can press the touch-sensitive buttons to go to recent calls, music player, or messaging. For more details, see the *Quick Start Guide*.



## home screen

When you turn on your phone, it displays the *home* screen. To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and ②.

Note: Your home screen might look different.



Soft key labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 2.

Status indicators can appear across the top of the home screen:

## enter text

Some screens require you to use the keypad to enter text, such as when you compose a message, as this example shows:



## set entry modes

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. In a text entry screen, press 🔀 to switch to any of these entry modes:

entry mode	
Primary	Enter text using the method you set.
Numeric	Enter numbers only (see page 25).
Symbol	Enter symbols only (see page 25).
Secondary	Enter text using the method you set.

#### To set Primary or Secondary entry mode:

- 1 In any text entry screen, press **Options**.
- 2 Scroll to Text Setup and press .
- 3 Scroll to Primary Setup or Secondary Setup and press .

4 Scroll to one of these methods and press •:

entry method	
iTAP English	Let the phone predict each English word as you press keys.
iTAP Français	Let the phone predict each French word as you press keys.
Tap English	Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key one or more times.
Tap Extended	Enter letters, numbers, and symbols by pressing a key one or more times.

**Note:** Your phone may not contain all of these languages.

#### To select a text entry mode:

Press Options in a text entry screen, scroll to and select Text Setup. Then, scroll to and select the desired entry mode.

#### capitalization

Press in any text entry screen to change text case. The following indicators show capitalization status:

## tap method

This is the standard method for entering text on your phone.

Regular **Tap** method cycles through the letters and numbers of the key you press. The **Tap Extended** method cycles through letters, numbers, **and** symbols.

- 1 Press a key one or more times to select a letter, number, or symbol.
- Repeat the step above to enter all characters.

Tip: Press •�• right or ## to insert a space.

In a text entry screen you can press  $\times$  to switch entry modes. If **Tap** or **Tap Extended** is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 21.

When you enter three or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter prog, you might see:



If you want a different word, continue pressing keys to enter the remaining characters.

- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press • left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.

- The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press •Ô• down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you don't want to save your text or text edits, press to exit without saving.

### iTAP® method

The iTAP software combines your single key presses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it. This can be faster than Tan method.

- Press down to show possible letter combinations
- Scroll right to highlight the combination you want.
- Press to lock a highlighted combination.


You can press keys to add more letters to the end of the combination

or

Press \* to enter the highlighted combination when it spells a word.

A space is inserted after the word.

For example, if you press 7764, your phone displays the corresponding letter combinations:



If you enter a word your phone does not recognize, your phone stores the word to use as a future word option. When your phone runs out of phone memory for new words, it deletes the oldest words to add new words.

basics

#### numeric method

In a text entry screen, press \* to switch entry methods until your phone displays the **123** (numeric) indicator.

Press keypad keys to enter numbers. When finished, press 🔀 to switch entry modes.

## symbol method

In a text entry screen, press 🔀 to switch entry methods until your phone displays the @% (symbol) indicator. Scroll to highlight a symbol and press 💠 to enter it.

### delete letters & words

Move the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete and then:


- Press CLR to delete one letter at a time.
- Press and hold CLR to delete the entire word.

# handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear. The flip can be open or closed.

**Note:** The handsfree speaker won't work with a handsfree car kit or headset.

To activate the speakerphone, open the flip and press and hold the smart/speakerphone key. You will hear an alert.



To end the call, press ①.

To turn off the speakerphone, press and hold the smart/speakerphone key or turn off the phone.

**Note:** Closing the phone while using the speakerphone does not end the call. If you are making a call **with the flip closed** using the touch-sensitive buttons, the call automatically uses the speakerphone

or Bluetooth headset, if you have one connected. Press and hold the smart key to end the call.

You can set your phone to turn off the speakerphone automatically after 20 seconds of inactivity:

## Find it: •• > ## Settings > Initial Setup

- Scroll to SpeakerPhone and press Change.
- 2 Scroll to 20 sec timeout and press Select.

#### To use the speakerphone with flip closed:

- Open the phone.
- Press and hold the smart/speakerphone key to turn on the speakerphone.
- Enter the phone number and press . 3
- 4 When the call connects, close the phone and continue your conversation.
- To end the call, press and hold the smart/speakerphone key.

# codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234 or to the last four digits of your phone number. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **236197**.

Your service provider may reset these codes. If not. you should change them to protect your personal information. The unlock code must contain four digits. The security code must contain six digits.

#### To change a code or password:

Find it: •• > \ Settings > Security > New Passwords

Note: If you forget your security code, contact your service provider.

# lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone with a four-digit code to keep others from using it. (For more types of locks, see page 71.)

**Note:** You can make emergency calls on a locked phone. Also, a locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

#### To lock your phone:

Find it: • Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now or Automatic Lock

Enter the four-digit unlock code and press **Ok**. Your phone displays **Phone Locked**, and then **Enter Unlock Code** until you unlock your phone.

**To unlock your phone**, enter your four-digit code and press **O**k.

# airplane mode

Airplane mode turns off your phone's calling features when wireless phone use is prohibited. You can use other non-calling features when Airplane Mode is turned on.

Find it: • Tools > Airplane Mode > On or Off

**Note:** Consult airline staff about the use of **Airplane Mode** during flight. Turn off your phone whenever instructed to do so by airline staff.

Your phone can prompt you to activate or deactivate airplane mode each time you turn on the phone:

Find it: • Tools > Airplane Mode > Prompt At Startup > On or Off

# memory card

You can store multimedia content, such as songs and photos, on your phone's internal memory or on a removable microSD memory card.

#### Notes:

 Your phone supports microSD memory cards with up to 2 GB capacity. (SanDisk is the

- recommended manufacturer for cards over 1 GB.)
- If you don't have a memory card, you can copy files from your computer to your phone via Bluetooth (page 53) or using Motorola Phone Tools (see the Quick Start Guide).

## install memory card

 With your phone off, remove the battery door.



2 Remove the battery by pulling the white plastic tab upward.



3 With the gold contacts down, slide the memory card into the slot and press the card in until it clicks



4 Replace the battery and battery door.

**Caution:** Do not remove your memory card while your phone is writing files to it.

To remove the memory card, remove the battery door, pull the white tab up to remove the battery, lightly press the memory card once to release it from the slot, and slide it out.

## format memory card

You must format a memory card before using it for the first time. This critical procedure creates required "Mobile" and "Motorola" directories. If you do not format a memory card before using it for the first time,

your phone may not be able to read the contents of the card.

**Caution:** Formatting the memory card erases all content currently stored on the card.

Find it: ♠ > ➡ Phone Info > Storage Devices

- Scroll to Memory Card microSD and press Options.
- 2 Scroll to Format and press Select.
- 3 When prompted, press Yes to continue formatting.

## view memory card contents

Find it: • Media Gallery


- Scroll to and select a multimedia type (Pictures, Sounds. or Videos).
- 2 Press Options to open the menu.
- 3 Scroll to View Storage Devices and press Select.

Scroll to All (to view contents of the memory card and phone memory), Phone Memory, or Memory Card, and press .

# personalize

## shortcuts & main menu

Your home screen looks like this example.



Press  ${}^{\bullet}$  left, right, up, or down to open the menu for the corresponding icon.

## change home screen shortcuts

**Note:** This option might be unavailable if your service provider shows scrolling headlines.

Find it: • > \$ Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Home Keys

options	
Icons	Show or hide the home screen shortcut icons.
Up, Down, Left, Right	Choose the features that open when you press the navigation key $\dot{\Phi}$ up, down, left, or right in the home screen.
Right/Left Soft Key	Choose the feature that opens when you press the <i>right</i> or <i>left soft key</i> .

## change main menu appearance

To show or hide your **main menu icons**, press  $\diamondsuit$  >  $\lozenge$  Settings > Personalize > Home Screen > Home Keys > Icons.

To make your **main menu appearance** either icons or a text-based list, press ♠ > ₩ Settings > Personalize > Main Menu > View

For even more ways to personalize your home screen, see page 63.

## select by number

If you set your phone to display the menu as a numbered list (see page 31), you can press the number of the item to select it.

### use shortcuts for lists

To go quickly to an item in a list (such as a list of contacts, songs, albums, or playlists), **press the first letter** of the item. For example, in a list of songs, to go to a song called **Paradigm**, press **P** (or **7**).

# ring styles & alerts

Your phone rings and/or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or to signal certain other events. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

## set a style

Find it: ♠ > ₩ Settings > Ring Styles

- 1 Scroll to Style and press .
- 2 Scroll to the desired ring style and press .

## set alerts

Set alerts for Calls, Inbox, Voicemail, Alarms, Data Calls, File Transfer, Fax Calls, Ringer IDs, Key Volume, and Reminders.

Find it: 🍁 > 🖫 Settings > Ring Styles

- 1 Scroll to Style Detail and press ••.
- 2 Scroll to an alert type and press .

3 Scroll to the desired detail setting and press .

**Note:** Your phone plays a sample of each highlighted setting. Ringtones usually play through the speakerphone even if you're using a headset.

# wallpaper

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Find it: •• > ## Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

#### To select a wallpaper image:

# backlight

# AGPS & your location

**Note:** This Motorola mobile phone incorporates Assisted Global Positioning System (AGPS) technology that can be used by emergency services to help determine a user's location. This functionality is required by law and cannot be deactivated. However, AGPS technology also can be used with certain location-based software applications—for example, to provide driving directions—which may track and monitor a user's location. Users who prefer not to permit such tracking and monitoring should avoid using such applications.

Your phone uses the *Automatic Location Information* (ALI) feature, along with AGPS satellite signals, to tell the network where you are physically located.

**Note:** ALI may not work in all locations and may not be available due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

When ALI is set to **Location On**, your phone shows the (ALI on) indicator. Services may use your known location to provide useful information (for example, driving directions, or the location of the nearest bank). Your phone prompts you when the network or a service asks for your location. You can refuse at this point.

When ALI is set to **0ff**, your phone displays the \* (ALI off) indicator, and the phone does not send location information unless you call the emergency phone number (such as 911).

To view or change the location transmission status of your phone during a call, press  $\stackrel{\bullet}{•}$  > Location. Then choose 0n or 0ff.

# **AGPS limitations & tips**

Your phone uses Assisted Global Positioning
System (AGPS) satellite signals to estimate
your location. If your phone cannot find strong satellite
signals, your AGPS might be slower, less accurate, or
it might not work at all. AGPS provides only an
approximate location, often within 150 feet

(45 meters) but sometimes much farther from your actual location.

### To improve AGPS accuracy:

- Go outside and away from underground locations, covered vehicles, structures with metal or concrete roofs, tall buildings, and foliage. Indoor performance might improve if you move closer to windows, but some window sun shielding films can block satellite signals.
- Move away from radios, entertainment equipment, and other electronic devices that might interfere with or block AGPS satellite signals.
- Hold your phone away from your body, and point the phone antenna toward the sky. Do not cover the antenna area with your fingers.

AGPS uses satellites controlled by the U.S. government and subject to changes implemented in accordance with the Department of Defense AGPS user policy and the Federal Radio Navigation Plan. These changes might affect AGPS performance.





# recent calls

# emergency calls

Your service provider programs emergency phone numbers, such as 911, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked.

Note: Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

# use AGPS during an emergency call

When you make an emergency call, your phone can use Assisted Global Positioning System



(AGPS) satellite signals to tell the emergency response center your approximate location.

The AGPS feature has limitations, so always tell the emergency response center your best knowledge of your location. Remain on the phone for as long as the emergency response center instructs you.

### AGPS might not work for emergency calls:

- Your phone's AGPS feature must be turned on (see page 33).
- Your local emergency response center might not process AGPS location information. For details, contact your local authorities.

#### For best results:

 Go outside and away from underground locations, covered vehicles, structures with metal or concrete roofs, tall buildings, and foliage. Indoor performance might improve if you move closer to windows, but some

- window sun shielding films can block satellite signals.
- Move away from radios, entertainment equipment, and other electronic devices that might interfere with or block AGPS satellite signals.

If your phone cannot find strong AGPS satellite signals, the location of the nearest cell tower in contact with your phone is automatically provided to the emergency response center.

# speed dial

You can assign a *speed dial* number to each entry in your Contacts.

**Note:** Your service provider may have already assigned speed dial 1 to voice mail.

### To set a speed dial number:

**Note:** If the speakerphone is not turned on and you want to activate it, press the smart/speakerphone key.

2 Say one of the following commands: Call <Name or #>, Send Msg <Name or #>, Lookup <Name>, Go to <Application>, or Check <Item>.

**Tip:** Speak numbers at a normal speed and volume, pronouncing each digit distinctly. Avoid pausing between digits.

Your phone opens the corresponding menu or performs the corresponding action.

# adapt advanced speech recognition to your voice

For most people, Advanced Speech Recognition works well for voice dialing without any initial setup. However, if the phone is frequently unable to recognize numbers correctly when you use voice dialing, you may be able to improve your results by adapting it to your voice.

**Note:** If the phone is used by several people, reset voice dialing to the original setting before proceeding. This ensures that you are not saving your settings over someone else's.

# Find it: ♠ > ₩ Settings > Personalize > Voice Dial Setup > Digit Dialing

- 1 Select Adapt Digits or Reset Digits and press .
- When you see the prompt for how long the process will take, press ••.
- When the phone prompts you to say the first digit sequence, wait for the beep, then repeat the digits in a normal tone of voice.
- 4 If the recording sounds acceptable (no mistakes or background noises), say "Yes" or press YES.

# This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. <sup>1</sup> Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.71 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.13 W/kg. The SAR value for this product in its data transmission mode (body-worn use) is 0.38 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).<sup>2</sup>

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.
