I bring you the greetings from your charity - the Adopt American Network, from our board members and our hard-working staff and our volunteer adoption specialist, and of course, most importantly, from all the children and families that together we have helped.

It was just a few short years ago when we started our journey together and it is a journey motivated by the best of Masonic ideals - to help the least fortunate children of American society. It is a journey to give aid and assistance; to help these children find adoptive parents and real homes. When I came to you with a call from Adopt America Network for your help, it was a plea to heed the thousands desperate and forgotten

children in foster care today and you did not hesitate, you did not falter. The Royal Arch Masons joined in a journey that is literally a miracle for each child. A miracle begins when we help that child make the transition from a frightened, uncertain life in foster care into the life of a beloved child within a loving home with adoptive parents. I wish you could see the miracle unfold as a child who's scared, insecure, and untrusting comes to his or her new home and grows into a happy and loving, well-adjusted boy or girl.

I would very much like to share with you one of these stories today. This is a story of Heather. Heather is a little girl who was born and was spending her childhood in Ohio and then was adopted by a family here in Ohio. You know, today it's not easy to grow up. There are so many things that confront a child in American society – peerpressure, drugs, gangs. Our society is troubled in many ways, and when you are a child on your own; a child drifting in foster care, I imagine how difficult it is to grow up without the guidance of parents, of a church, of a community. A community that has to expect nations for you, that sets a structure, that teaches you values. So many children today in the foster care system are lacking the very things that have made Masons the kind of man they are and that have developed our society into the strong country that we have.

Heather is a child who was drifting through foster care. She was a child who had suffered a great deal of abuse and neglect at the hands of her biological family, and she had been moving through a series of foster care homes so that some of her precious years of childhood had been ones of movement; of moving from one home to yet another home. But she had a dream. She really wanted her own permanent family and she hadn't given up hope yet, although she was ten years old and her time was running out. Karen and Eric, husband and wife who live in Perrysburg Ohio already had three biological children. But they also knew that they could provide the stability and the love that a child like Heather so sorely needed. After coming to Adopt America, Karen and Eric attended parent training courses that were offered to them free during the winter of 2001 and they completed the home study that spring. Then they were ready to start looking for their child and they eagerly met with our adoption specialists. While sometimes it takes a long time, Karen and Eric reach their goal very quickly, and in August 2001, with the help of Adopt America, they were chosen as the family for Heather by a children's service unit of the in the eastern side of the state. Karen and Eric were excited about bringing Heather into their home and with us helping them negotiate in the paperwork and all the arrangements we were able to bring together home in simply a month. She arrived in her new home in about September of the year, and finally in eight months passing, she was finalized. On May 13, 2002, Heather joined the family of Karen and Eric and went to the finalization at the local courthouse.

When I asked Karen about the adoption process and she replied that after all the time it took them to make up their minds and get started with the process, she was so surprised how fast the placement occurred and how quickly they were chosen for Heather. Everything worked pretty smoothly and during the eight months placement when they went through that kind of family changes and adjustments that occur when you introduce a new child into the home, Heather learned to adjust to her new brother and two sisters, and she learned the rules of the house. She learned that living with a family required

some things from her and her brothers and sisters also learned that it took some understanding and excepting of their new sister and the siblings began to work well together. Now, three years after her adoption, Heather has really settled into the family and every body belongs to each other and it is truly a successful adoption.

I asked the adoptive mom Karen about Heather's change because Heather had been a very, very insecure child and she had been through so many bad things I was wondering if she was truly happy. She said that Heather is looking forward to a well-adjusted teenage year; she is doing so well in school; she has so many friends because Heather knows she is now a part of a real family. Now she knows that she is ours forever.

I chose this is a story to share with you, out of all the stories that have happened since we have been working together, because Heather's story coincides with the period of time the Royal Arch Masons were starting the partnership with Adopt America. In fact, at the first of Adopt America Christmas party 2002, after we were working together and the first red-jacketed Royal Arch Masons showed up to become the Christmas elves that year, Heather was there with her mother and father and her new brother and sisters. In fact, it was two red-jacketed Royal Arch Mason companions that presented Heather her first Christmas gift as an adopted daughter in this family.

Heather is one child, but every child that we have helped together has been part of this Masonic miracle. I stand here before you so very proud of what you have accomplished for the children of America. What you have committed to do for these children together, what we have already done, and what all you are going to do in the years to come.

Royal Arch Masons are becoming some of our very best spokesperson. Like your Masonic Brother Dave Thomas of Wendy's International who knew the importance of homes and family for American children, you are effectively becoming ambassadors and are telling the story of adoption and the need for parents who will adopt these waiting children throughout each of your own communities. Some of you have already planned and participated in adoption recruitment events at your Lodges, and some of you have shared adoption awareness information within Masonic, church, and civic events in your communities. Many of you have spent hours helping with your Chapter and district fundraising activities, and that's generated dollars to help defray adoption related expenses and moving these children out of foster care and into permanent homes with new adoptive parents. Some of you have even come to visit your charity headquarters in Toledo, and others of you have taken a day and shared a day with our families and children at our adoption recruitment event in the summertime. Perhaps your district has arranged for a speaker form Adopt America or maybe you hosted a family at one of your events. You may be one of the Companions who sent a check to the Royal Arch Foundation, or maybe you mailed in a bag recycled aluminum tabs to help us with our fundraising or maybe you were one who donated an item for the Adopt America dinner auctions. Or perhaps you were the Mason told someone at your church about adoption then had them call Adopt America or to look at our www.adoptamericanetwork.org. Whatever you did, every Royal Arch Mason is a partner with Adopt America and every companion's help is needed to help the children who are waiting, to go home.

Adopt America Network is recognized across the nation as an outstanding non-profit adoption organization and, of the few, it is Adopt America that successfully works across state boundaries to find homes for waiting children across the United States. We are also acknowledged as the experts in finding homes for the hardest to place children - the children who are the oldest, and the most severely abused, and the most mentally, physically and emotionally challenged. We also are noted for dealing with very large sibling groups and not separating them; in finding families who can adopt 4, 5, 6, and even ten children at a time. And the good news grows as Royal arch Masons and Adopt America continue to work together.

Since you became involved with Adopt America, we have placed more than 200 children every year in adoptive homes and each year that number gets bigger and bigger. With your support, we've been able to interest more families in adopting children, not only here in Ohio but across the whole United States. We will get calls that say my Masonic brother told me about your organization. Can you help me, I live in Arizona? Or my wife and I thought about adopting and now that the Royal Arch Masons are supporting your organization, would you send me a packet of information and help us get into classes?

With your help we've been able to raise our placement goal every year for the last three years. This year our placement goal was set at 235 placements. By this time last month, we were well on our way to surpassing it. We are 44% ahead of projections so it looks like we will easily surpass our annual goal this year and I promise you, this will be the largest number of children ever going home, ever placed by Adopt America in one year, and it's because of your help. What you have done, please don't underestimate. It has been incredibly helpful and vitally important in sending home, probably fifty more children than we would have been able to do on our own.

We have taken the first very important steps together on our journey, but this is just the first small part of our journey together. For now we share a mission, founded in love and duty and with a genuine concern for the future of all of America's children and their families. We have both made a commitment to give these children a good life and I am so honored to share this commitment with the Royal Arch Masons. Thank you so much you and God bless each of you."

Edieann's comments were received with a standing ovation. She was thanked by Most Excellent Companion Justus for her presentation and retired from the Chapter room escorted by Foundation President Robert Crabbs. Weakened by treatments for cancer, she returned to her hotel room to rest in order to be able to attend the Grand Banquet that evening. Her attendance at our Grand Chapter was extremely difficult and a testimony to her commitment to both the Adopt America Network and to Royal Arch Masonry.

Grand Chapter called from Recess to Labor

Most Excellent Companion Justus directed the Grand Scribe to call the 189th Grand Convocation from recess to Labor. Once back in session, he called upon Deputy Grand Master Michael Himes for comments.

REPORT OF THE OHIO MASONIC HOME Dale G. Ray, President of the Board of Trustees

"Most Excellent Grand High Priest, I now bring you the report of the Ohio Masonic Home committee. The Ohio Masonic home is our oldest and largest Masonic charity and now consists of four operating subsidiaries that provide nursing care, assisted living and retirement living communities and additionally, a benevolent endowment foundation that provides money management and hopefully, financial growth services for our endowment fund. We are presently located on three campuses. Our newest service is called Masonic Senior Services, which provides services to the Mason in his home. This reflects the growing trend in senior health services to provide stay-at-home services as long as possible.

My most pleasant duty today is to introduce our chief executive officer who's going to speak to us for the first time. He has been with us for a year now and actually hit the ground running. It is my pleasure to introduce David Bannerman, our new Chief Executive Officer of the Ohio Masonic Home. He was born in Avon Lake, Ohio; received an undergraduate degree in social work from Ohio State University and a master's degree in healthcare management administration from Central Michigan University. He has worked in child welfare; started the Epilepsy Association of Western Ohio; he has been in a long-term care since 1984 where he was administrator of the Brethren Home. He was Vice-President of the Brethren Retirement Community, and he has worked for Ohio PRS, where he ran their Swan Creek facility in Toledo. He is married to Anita and are the parent of two children. In fact it was his father-in-law that got him into Masonry.

The search committee was very proud to have someone of this capability recommend as our chief executive officer and is also a Mason! What more could you ask for?

I ask you all to mark your calendar for November 10, because Dave will be installed as Master of Huber Heights Lodge. His outstanding attribute is his dedication to his profession and to the service of others. Our motto is Care, Concern, and Compassion and Dave is certainly leading us in that path.

Most Excellent, it is my pleasure to introduce David Bannerman, CEO of the Ohio Masonic Home who is present at your altar."

Companion David Bannerman was conducted to the East, greeted by Grand High Priest Justus and gave the following comments:

COMMENTS FROM DAVID BANNERMAN C.E.O. of the Ohio Masonic Home

"Right Worshipful Brother Himes, Most Excellent Grand High Priest Justus, Past Grand High Priests, Right Excellent Companions, Excellent Companions, and Companions, Brethren and friends - I'm a lucky guy. I have a job I love, working for one of the oldest retirement communities in Ohio; working to give great service to my fellow Companions and brethren. How many of you think that you're my age or older? Would you please rise? Certainly there are some of you who think you're older than I, so if you are, please rise. Now I know there's a few more!

My wife Anita is glad that I'm old enough that we can share the benefits of living in one of the Ohio Masonic Home communities. Her age alone, would not qualify for her to participate in the Ohio Masonic Home lifestyle. She likes the feeling that she is living in a safe environment, surrounded by beautiful grounds. We enjoy the wonderful relationships with our neighbors and we join in all the activities of our choosing. I want to invite you to join us. That's right. I want you to come to live in my neighborhood.

Now, you pay your way as you go. You don't have to sell the farm to live in our Masonic community. We stopped the practice of asset surrender ten years ago. I want to repeat that - we stopped the process of asset surrender ten years ago. You now pay as you go. Now we did keep on doing two things - we make great friends and we give service with care, concern and compassion. For 112 years, we've never asked anyone to leave because they cannot pay. If you are a Mason in good standing for five years, you are eligible for financial assistance if you run out of funds.

Every morning when I walk into my office building and I climb the grand staircase, I am reminded, by the donation of the Grand Chapter of Ohio, of the work of the good Samaritan. Its a beautiful stained glass depiction of the work that we do.

Did you know that you can add at least two years to your life if you moved our retirement communities? It's proven that a supportive and years to your life expectancy, We have a variety of living choices - Browning Masonic Community in Waterville, Ohio, which is just a few miles from Toledo on the banks of the Maumee River. We are across the river from some of the best walleye fishing in the state of Ohio. Our Western Reserve Masonic Community is in Medina at the intersections of Interstate 71 and State Route 18. We also invite you to our original home in Springfield.

In my first year I have learned that we operate one of the most financially strong retirement communities in Ohio. Our strength is built upon the wise investment of the donations that we have gathered over the years. We borrowed money a few years ago to modernize our campuses and just recently reaffirmed our bond rating from Standard & Poor's. Our bond is rated AA-. That means we are a better investment than General Motors or most of the airlines. I want to repeat that's an AA- rating. There are thousands of retirement communities across the country. There is only one - the Ohio Masonic Home, which is the only retirement community in America with a bond rating that high that is not supported by a hospital. We are supported by Brothers, and Companions and Masons all. The strongest in America!

Our foundation, created with gifts, legacies and bequests gathered over the years, is obligated to take care of those who can live on our campuses now. To continue our ability to care for those whose funds become exhausted, we need your support to carry out the mission. The Masonic Home serves Masons, their wives, widows, and members of related Masonic bodies and non-Masons. Periodically, we reach out in other ways. Currently we have three nurses who just returned from providing mass shelter care on behalf of the Red Cross in the Gulf States. We will continue to send work teams throughout the next year to help rebuild lives, homes, and families in the South. Our residents and employees are donating funds to the relief effort. As directed by the Grand Lodge, those funds are being given to the Masonic Service Association for relief. Our board has decided, that because so many residents and employees want to support, that we will match those funds going to this relief effort in the south

Beyond responding to current needs, on of my direct responsibilities is to develop a map for the future. You know that we served children at one time, including training them in an industrial school. We also had a hospital when we needed it, but we converted it to a nursing home when the needs of our companions and brothers changed. As we look to the future we expect to meet our needs in different ways. Many of our Companions did not do not want to move to Springfield so we now have our homes in Waterville and Medina. What you may want in retirement may be different from our retirement choices offered in the past. One example of how we are changing is by adding additional services, but not with bricks and sticks, but with Masonic Senior Services. As Dale mentioned, this is a new program, enabling companions and their wives or widows to stay in their homes longer. Our Masonic Senior Services staff is now located in Cincinnati. in the Dayton-Springfield area, and in Akron-Medina- Cleveland areas and in Toledo. And they work with families to take advantages of existing community-based services and resources. We can serve more Brethren, in more locations, at a lower cost. Often we help a family during a crisis and that assistance allows everyone time to make more reasonable decisions. If you know of someone in the Masonic Senior Services locations that can benefit from our help, you can look in the Beacon for contact information or you can call my office at 937-525-3009, or you can see me after this meeting.

You may know that Most Excellent Companion Bill Berry completed his work in December as a longtime trustee and Chairman of our board of trustees. His leadership is reflected in the outstanding reputation we have within the long-term care industry.

I don't know if you know that two of your most precious friends, Most Excellent Companion Earl Gifford, longtime secretary, and his wife Sally moved to the Masonic Home in Springfield last year. With Earls passing earlier this year into the Celestial Lodge above, we lost a friend, a resident, and former Chairman of our Board. Sally is here and continues to enjoy living with us and is keeping herself busy on campus. Grand Guard Emeritus, Dewey A. McClure, is also with us as is Most Excellent Companion Charles Karth and his wife Marjorie. I am glad that we are neighbors.

As is true in most Masonic families, everyone gets in on the act. Toni Duncan, wife of a junior Past Grand High Priest Steve Duncan, is a Masonic Healthcare board member.

I am pleased that the Grand Chapter is so ably represented on the Ohio Masonic Home board of trustees by our Companions Richard Barchent was also serves on the board of our endowment foundation; Most Excellent Companion Wayne Dill is on our parent board as well as on the board at the Browning Masonic Community. And, of course, the new chairman of the board of the Ohio Masonic Home is Most Excellent Companion Dale G. Ray, Jr., Their service is a hallmark of how well our board, made up of representatives from the Grand Lodge, Grand Chapter, Grand Council, Grand Commandery, and Ohio Council of Deliberation of the Scottish Rite, come together, in what I understand to be the only body in Ohio where all the bodies work together for a common cause, and they fulfill the Masonic values of "who best can work and best agree."

You can be confident that the work of the Ohio Masonic Home, serving Masons and those who benefit from our Masonic values throughout Ohio, will continue well into the future.

Most Excellent Companion Justus, I want to thank you for the courtesies extended to me and wish to you a successful and enjoyable 189th Grand Convocation.

D. Michael, Jr. and their Ladies, thank you for your friendship. I know when Sharon and I have the time to stop and reflect, we will look back on those moments together with fondness of our time spent together as Friends, Brothers, and Companions. Welcome!

Before I give you an accounting of the activities as your Grand High Priest, we must pause and reflect on those who have gone on before us; filled with the memories of those special people who have touched our lives. We will now have the Necrology report from Right Excellent Companion, F. Ray Sharritts, Grand Chaplain and Necrologist.

REPORT OF NECROLOGIST Rt. Ex. Comp. Raymond Sharritts, Grand Chaplain

"When the Psalmists of old came to those experiences of life that overwhelmed them, often they looked for symbols and most often they looked to the hills; and as they looked to the hills, they raised their arms up as we do in our Blue Lodge. And as they looked to the hills, they realized that here was a symbol of the presence of God and the faithfulness of God. And the Psalmist said to us, 'I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help'.

As we come to this time of remembering those great giants of our fraternity who have died this past year. This is a most important and significant time (audio lost). He has blessed us and that he has touched us. We have experienced the deaths of some who have journeyed with us and touched us in very unique and special ways. We have learned from them the importance of life and that life is a gift and that we cannot control or number the days that we have. We must take the gift that God gives us and we must use it, and we must somehow anchor our faith as the hills about us. It's good to remember that as we are here in Wilmington in the southwestern part of the state because we are constantly surrounded by the rolling hills. The great glaciers stopped. If you travel between Wilmington and Washington Courthouse, you'll see where the glacier stopped as it moved its way into this part of the state and you'll see the beautiful rolling hill and that constant reminder as the Psalmist spoke to us. That powerful image of God's presence and the realization of the gift that God gives us.

It seems for me now, almost a lifetime ago, I remember the student church where I served in the Catskills. It was a very small congregation, so small that they could not afford a full-time pastor. I was placed there as a student. Every Sunday I would travel from New Jersey up into the lower part of New York State. Travel into the beautiful hills and into this small community. All around this little church was the most beautiful garden that I've ever seen in my life. There was an eighty-year-old gentleman who lived about a block away from the church. He tended this flower garden. Every day he would come and he would work. And I marveled at the commitment at the commitment that he' made to this. And I wonder why he did this. We didn't have the money to pay him. No one really appreciated most of the time what he was doing but the flowers simply made this little, simple white church come alive.

One afternoon in early autumn I sit down with him and I asked him, 'Why do you do this?' 'Why do you spend your days working in the soil and working with these flowers? No one really pays too much attention to the beautiful work that you do and why do you

do this?' He simply smiled and said, 'I must keep my life full of the right things.' Now at twenty-five, I didn't really understand what he was saying to me. But at my present age I now understand what he was saying. I must keep my life full of the right things. As long as God gave him health and gave him life, he needed to be doing things to enrich other people's lives. He needed to do that little extra thing in which he found the secrets of holy living. Isn't that what our life as Master Masons is all about? To learn to be upright and just men; to learn to sow; to control the passions of our lives; that we make a difference in other person's lives. As we too fill our lives with the right things, they have an affect on fashioning the life within us and the lives of those about us.

The other evening as we gathered as a grand family and we read the names of the Past Grand High Priest who had died and the companions who had died this past year and we celebrated the uniqueness of their careers and what they have done for us. It's like my eighty-year-old friend - a life filled with righteousness, and with good things. As we come to this time of remembering each year, we must always re-focus ourselves and realize the gift and the opportunities that God gives us.

What are you doing with your life? What does it mean to be a Royal arch Mason? What difference are you making? What happens to you that makes you different from everybody else that you need and that you know? We learn in these everyday experiences of giving, of living and dying, that as our inner life develops, as our own personal temple is erected in our Masonic terminology, that the square is there forming who we are; that the plumb line is measuring us; that the rule is affecting us; and the foundation is laid. A fabric is there that cannot crumble and cannot be destroyed. Our lives are filled with the right things. And when we shall die and go to that eternal life and fill our appropriate stations, our companions shall again find their places and assume their stations of labor, and as they speak of us, they shall speak of our greatness. They shall speak of us as people who filled their lives with the right things of life. They shall speak with fond memories and cherish the gifts that we bring.

This is the precious gift that God brings to us - this is the blessedness of being a child of God and of being a Master Mason.

Let us pray:

'Great Architect of the Universe, we humbly lift up each of our friends, our brothers, our Companions from each of our Chapters, our Lodges, who have died this past year. We reluctantly offer them again into your hands. We pray that you will receive them; that they will hear your blessing of - 'Well done good and faithful servant.' And within our hearts and within our memories, we will find there, that blessing. That our lives have been enriched because they have labored with us; they have given us that witness of what it means to be a Master Mason; a Companion; one who has committed his life to being just and upright and truly a child of God'.

This Chapter (0) would be a holding and information chapter only.

COMMENTS FROM ILLUSTRIOUS BROTHER NEIL M. SMALLEY Deputy for Ohio, Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite

"Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Right Worshipful Senior Grand Warden, Grand Chapter Officers, distinguished guests and Companions.

It is my personal pleasure to bring you warm fraternal greetings from the Council of Deliberation and the thirty-second degree Masons from the state of Ohio as a member of the family of Freemasonry. Any family needs to know its ancestry and the family of Freemasonry is no exception. I would urge you, for example, to read Mark A. Tabberts recent history of our fraternal family - 'American of Freemasons, Three Centuries of Building Communities. It was published in conjunction with the National Heritage Museum in Lexington, Massachusetts. Of special importance in such research is examination of the myths and misunderstandings that cast shadows on our family's life. Like any family, we have had our rebels, but they are hardly representative of what we are. I won't spoil this story with any more details partly because my time is limited and we need to explore what it means to be a fraternal family. There are strong parallels with our own personal family experiences. Our parents and grandparents were the leaders and we were asked to respect their experience and wisdom - not that was always perfect. We have chosen leaders, putting on their shoulders the responsibility to make decisions. In turn, they asked us to respect those decisions and, just as in our own families, to bring any disagreements to the table for study and negotiation. But once the matter has been considered and democratically discussed, then it is our part to follow cheerfully and

wholeheartedly in the chosen path. Well, at least I hope that's how your families handle matters most of the time.

One valuable insight into family and fraternal life was offered by the poet Robert Frost. 'The greatest thing in family", he said, "was to take a hint when a hint was intended.' I suspect that there is a hint or two here about for me to get off my soapbox and shut up and I will take that hint.

Note: This is an increase of \$40,783.51 from 2003-2004. This is the result of the increase in per capita and a slight improvement in interest rates. While expenses also increased, this is the first time in four years that the Grand Chapter ended the year with a net gain rather than a net loss. We can begin to regain the losses of the last few years.

Ohio Masonic Home

Your Grand Chapter contributed twenty-five cents per member to the operating funds of our Ohio Masonic Home as specified by our Code, amounting to \$5361.75. In addition, as in each of the last 25 years, your Grand Chapter donated \$1500.00 over and above its legal requirement to the operating funds of the Home. Your Grand Chapter

continues to strongly endorse and support our Masonic Home, encouraging our individual members to do the same.

Royal Arch Research Assistance

Contributions to Royal Arch Research Assistance in Ohio from Aug. 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005 totaled \$6,178.35. Money forwarded since that time will be reported next year. Total money contributed from Ohio since the inception of the philanthropy according to our figures is \$455,671. We are pleased to note that 22 Chapters earned 100% Certificates by contributing at least \$1.00 per member during the year, and we warmly congratulate these Chapters. They are listed in the report of the RARA Chairman.

We strongly urge continued support to this very worthwhile endeavor, and ask that chapters continue to send their contributions through the Grand Secretary's office (checks made out to Royal Arch Research Assistance) so that we can assist in seeing proper credit is given to our Chapters and Companions for their efforts.

Audit

The report of the review of our financial records by Tenney, Bailey & Associates, Certified Public Accountants, of Marietta, Ohio is at the desk of the Grand Secretary for viewing by anyone who may wish to examine it in detail. This review includes the records of both the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Secretary for the year 2004-2005.

50, 60 and 65 Year Pins

One hundred thirty-four 50-year pins were reported presented during the 2004-2005 year. As of Sept. 1 another 261 pins have been sent out over the last 2-3 years for which no report of presentation has been received. 401 other Companions are shown by our records to now be eligible, including the ones during the 2005-2006 year. We urge our Secretaries and our District Deputies to follow up on this and try to get these awards to the Companions deserving them.

Twenty-four 60-year pins were reported presented during the year. As of Sept. another fifty-five are out, not yet reported. 138 more companions are eligible.

Five 65-year pins were reported presented during the year.

The procedure for requesting presentation of any of these pins is as follows: **The local Secretary must initiate the request**, since he has the best chance of knowing the location and status of the Companion. Just a note or call to the Grand Secretary's office giving us the name and location of the Companion is all that is needed. If our records confirm his eligibility, and he lives in the local area of his Chapter, we send the pin promptly to the District Deputy, along with the report sheet to be completed and returned to the Grand Secretary's office. A presentation card signed by the Grand High Priest accompanies the pins.

If the Companion lives out of the state or area, and assistance is needed in arranging a presentation, we must have the Companion's address so that we can send it to him or make arrangements with Royal Arch Masons in that area. Up-to-date address is very important.

REPORT of the YORK RITE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Officers and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio:

Our Grand High Priest, Most Excellent Companion Jean W. Justus, Jr., created this committee for the purpose of planning for the future of not only our Grand Chapter but also Grand Council and Grand Commandery. This committee has held several meetings

this past year and has come up with some ideas that we believe would be helpful to all of the bodies in the future. The two main issues that were discussed were finances and membership. I will not list all of the ideas presented, but will furnish the ones that we think are the most significant.

FINANCES

- Money could be saved by having Grand Chapter and Grand Council go to a One-day session. Due to their drill competition, this would not work for Commandery.
- 2. Having one Grand Banquet for all bodies could save money.
- Having the Grand Sessions for all bodies in one city, preferably near the center of the state, would save money for the Grand Bodies and also the Companions and Sir Knights who attend these sessions.
- Along with this, we would only need one roster to list the offices of each Grand Body. In fact, putting the Roster and Annual reports on a CD could save more money.
- The elimination of the Grand High Priest's Banquet was discussed, but the current Grand Officers were not in favor of this. It may be in the future that some change may be needed to continue this banquet.

MEMBERSHIP

- 1. At the meeting that was held immediately following the Grand Family meeting of August 13, 2005, we were advised that there would be another Grand Master's One Day Class some time in 2007. The good news is that we think we will be allowed to put on a York Rite Degree following the three Blue Lodge Degrees. This is wonderful news and will be a great opportunity for us to present the York Rite Story and get them started in the York Rite. How well we follow up on this will determine our future.
- One-Day York Rite Festivals will have to be set up shortly following the One Day Class, so we can do the rest of the York Rite Degrees. This will have to be well coordinated by all three bodies.
- 3. We certainly support any other festivals that are being held at various times and places during the year.
- 4. We encourage the use of Degree Teams to confer the degrees when the bodies do not have enough qualified members to confer a degree properly.
- 5. We encourage personal contact as the best way to get a delinquent member to pay his dues. We think that personal contact is the best way to encourage a suspended member to be reinstated, and maybe become active again.

The committee believes that for this to be a "true" York Rite Long Range Planning Committee, we must have the cooperation of Council and Commandery. We will invite the incoming presiding officers of Council and Commandery to ask their Long Range committees to work with us to achieve the goals that will keep our York Rite moving forward in the future.

REPORT of the MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Officers, and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio:

Your committee on Membership Development officially submits the following report for 2005. Our membership numbers continue to drop even though there was another Grand Master's Class. The Grand Chapter membership declined from 21,447 to 20,387. This is a loss of 1,061 or – 4.94%. Last year, it was thought that the number of losses was inflated because of Chapters purging their members of non-paying Companions to help lower the increased per capita paid to Grand Chapter. This does not appear to be the case as the percentage of loss increased this past year. Yet as discouraging as this number is, it is even more discouraging that we only exalted 370, or 28 less than in 2004. One District reported only 3 exaltations with several reporting less than 5 District wide. Rather than go into a detailed account of the statistical details, we refer you to the Red Roster. A detailed breakdown by District and individual Chapter is contained there for review.

Companions, the members of this Committee have been reappointed for the next Capitular year and, hopefully, will continue to learn from the mistakes of the past years.

There are over 100,000 Symbolic Lodge members that are not Royal Arch Masons including over 2400 from the last Grand Master's class. We must continue to look at All Master Masons as potential Royal Arch Masons. We must have personal contact with these Master Masons by attending Symbolic Lodge and speaking on behalf of Royal Arch Masonry and by visiting Brothers that do not regularly attend their Symbolic Lodge.

Over the next year, this Committee will be working with Committees from Grand Council and Grand Commandery in an attempt to educate Master Masons in the blessings of being a York Rite Mason.

Finally, we must all remember that the exalting of a candidate is only the beginning of the journey. Getting the new Companion involved with the activities of the Chapter and District is the only way that he will understand and appreciate Royal Arch Masonry. Only in this way will the new Companion understand why we are Royal Arch Masons. Respectfully submitted,

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Officers and Companions of the Grand Chapter R.A.M. of Ohio:

Dr. Joan Burleigh, the director of R.A.R.A., reports that Royal Arch Research Assistance has a new home. With administrative changes having taken place at Colorado State University during the last several years, and them insisting that 45% of the funds contributed to R.A.R.A. go to their Research Department for administrative cost, the university was looking at R.A.R.A. in a different light. Also, the Board of Directors of R.A.R.A. had been reviewing their status with the university.

As a result of the above mentioned actions, Dr. Joan Burleigh retired as the Director of R.A.R.A. at Colorado State University. The Board of Directors of R.A.R.A. decided to move the Research Center from Colorado State University to Able Kids Foundation, which is also located in Fort Collins, Colorado. Dr. Joan Burleigh will continue as the Director of R.A.R.A. at Able Kids Foundation.

The purpose of Able Planet is to design, develop and propagate new technologies that address the functional limitations of auditory challenges and disabilities. By addressing these limitations, we will alter the course of everyday living and enhance the quality of human life.

The Able Kids Foundation, through working with a variety of local international organizations is bringing Able Planet headphones and telephones to schools and programs for children with all levels of hearing loss around the world. The children are then afforded the opportunity for increased participation in computer labs, listening centers and music programs.

Several individuals and chapters have made contributions in memory of Past Grand High Priests, for which this committee is very grateful. This committee is also thankful for the very fine contributions made by this Grand Chapter and also by the 3rd Capitular District Association.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Officers and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio:

Another Capitular year is now history. It has been an excellent year in the relationship between the Masonic Jurisprudence Committee, the officers, District Deputies and the Companions. It is of interest to those who consume the substance of this Report to know that the year was filled with cooperation and dedication by those who had any dealings with the Jurisprudence Committee. It is the observation of the Chair of the Committee that all who have come into contact with the Committee with questions, suggestions, or other matters, did it with an attitude of understanding. It is also interesting to note that all had a good grasp of the importance of the Constitution and the Code.

As always, the Committee became involved in approving, among other things, dispensations, review of By-Laws, etc. of Capitular Masonic Jurisprudence.

Among many of the activities undertaken by the Committee are the following:

DISPENSATIONS

The Committee became involved in approving a number of dispensation requests. The Grand High Priest will make his final report as it would relate to the number of the Dispensation Requests that were approved. Needless to say, there were a great number of dispensation requests that were approved. Those requesting dispensations did it in a timely manner that in and of itself assisted the Grand High Priest in communicating approval for that dispensation request.

BY-LAWS

Over the number of years that the Jurisprudence Committee has been active, By-Laws changes have been requested for review. There were a number of those in this Chapter Capitular year. They were reviewed, advices were offered and correspondence transmitted so that the rewritten and amended By-Laws of the particular Chapter would be consistent with the Uniform Code of By-Laws.

CONSOLIDATIONS

Consolidations are matters that are somewhat sensitive. Chapters find it necessary for one reason or another that it seeks to consolidate with another Chapter. That necessarily requires strict adherence to the Code that provides those Chapters seeking consolidation to ascertain that all is done properly and in compliance with either the Constitution or the Code. It is only natural that those of us who become involved in these matters always hope and seek to avoid consolidation. Once it is determined that a consolidation will benefit several Chapters, there is no reason to believe that the consolidation should not be approved.

AMENDMENTS

There were no requests for this Committee to review any propose amendments to the Constitution or the Code of Capitular Masonic Jurisprudence. The Committee reminded all District Deputies when the deadline would be for submitting any amendment to the Constitution and Code. The deadline came and no amendments were provided to the Committee.

This report is presented and approved by members of the Jurisprudence Committee. We urge all Companions, District Deputies and members of the Grand Family to present to the Committee questions that may be important and of interest to Capitular Masonry. We once again remind everyone that the Committee is here for all Companions in order to improve an understanding of Caitular Masonry..

As always, this Committee will continue to work with Chapters, the District Deputies, and the Grand Officers in promoting the objectives of Capitular Masonry.

COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Officers and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio:

Your committee on Masonic Education is pleased to submit the following report for the Capitular year 2004 -2005.

Committee meetings:

The number of required committee meetings this past year dropped significantly from those needed in 2003-04. That Capitular year, the committee needed to update, in its entirety, the Grand Chapter's education program. Following the death of former chairman Lawrence Johnson, a large portion of the committee's files and programs had to be re-generated; documents and guidelines re-written; and the direction of the education committee re-established. All that being completed in 2004, the focus this year was primarily on maintaining and improving what had already been accomplished.

Committee meetings this past year included:

 $\underline{\text{October 16, 2004}}$ - A general committee meeting was in conjunction with the Grand Officers meeting in Chillicothe. The committee reviewed previous activities and began the planning for the Education Program for 2004 –2005.

November 13, 2004 - Moore Masonic Temple, Delaware, Ohio. The 13th annual District Education Officers School of Instruction was held with twenty of the twenty-six D.E.O.'s in attendance. The usual mileage allocation was allowed by Grand High Priest Justus. Attendance overall was very good with an additional number of District Deputies, Grand Officers and interested Companions joining in the session. This school is held to instruct the District Education Officers on their duties; to provide them the necessary tools to be successful; and to review the policies and programs of the Grand Chapter's Education Committee. Unfortunately, I, as chairman of the committee, was unable to attend. A Companion Royal Arch Mason and close personal friend died earlier that week. His funeral was the same day as the DEO school. I am very grateful to Right Excellent Companion Kermit Zimmerman, not only for presenting a portion of the program, but especially for stepping in at the last minute and acting as facilitator.

In addition to Companion Zimmerman, presenters at the school included: Companions Henry Dodson, Thomas Tupper, Norman Lincoln, Glen Opp, James Barnes, and Marvin Rader. All are members of the Education Committee. Thanks are extended to Moore Masonic Temple for again allowing us the use of their facility and to Right Excellent Companion Bill Williams for the beans and cornbread lunch. As good as always!

<u>February 12, 2005</u> - A general committee meeting held in conjunction with the spring meeting of the Grand Officers and District Deputes.

Officer's School of Instruction:

Each year the District Deputies Grand High Priest are to organize an Officers School of Instruction. Held during the months of June through September, they may be conducted as a district school, or as is more often the case, as a regional school. The Grand King generally attends that day to present his program for the upcoming year. As was reported in the 2004 report, there continues to be a decline in both school attendance and in the course content. Deputy's reports show that, on average, only 2/3rds of their Chapters attend the school. I attribute this poor attendance to many of our Past High Priests being pressed back into the officer line – the attitude is "already been there and done it!" The perception that only the new officers need to attend is unfortunate. There is always opportunity to gain knowledge and to become a better officer, no matter your status in Chapter.

When reviewing the required course content, if the minimum Education committee guidelines, outlined in the Chapter Management Manual, were followed, instruction sessions would take a minimum of 4 hours. If each recommended topic were covered, the time required would be closer to 8 hours. Unfortunately, the sessions this past year were, on average, only 3 hours15 minutes with about one hour of that time being dedicated to the Grand Kings program. Topics being covered were at a minimum. Once again, we seem to have changed the focus of this Officers School of Instruction from that of providing the tools and information our constituent officers need to be successful to more of that of hosting the Grand King.

Unfortunately, not all deputies submitted their reports. This was addressed at the Deputies School of Instruction held in August. We trust that all reports will be received this next year. Thanks are extended to those Deputies for submitting their reports in a timely manner.

Resource Course:

The resource course is a series of questions on Capitular Code, protocol, bylaws, procedures, and other related Capitular topics. Answers are gleaned from the Grand Chapter code, Chapter Management Manual, Officer manual and other reference books.

As the code and other sources of information are updates or modified, the resource course must be modified as well to reflect current information. This was accomplished last year. Each District Deputy (the administrator of the course) was then provided complete new course material for use within their districts.

Each year we encourage our Chapter officers (and any interested Companion) to complete the course. The committee was very pleased to provide certificates to the following Companions for efforts in having successfully completed Series I and / or Series II:

Seminar of Masonic Instruction:

After a lapse of one year, the Seminar of Masonic Instruction was re-instituted in 2004 with 18 students participating in this in-depth series of instructional presentations. In reviewing the results of these two sessions, it appears that the format of the seminar needs to be amended to better serve the needs of our Masonic scholars. In polling the seminar instructors, I found that very few students submitted homework assignments, and several of those who did, did not complete all sessions. I believe this is due primarily to the structure of the seminar, rather than the qualifications of the student.

The format, structure, and, ultimately the overall goal of the seminar needs to be redefined to allow more achievable results. We will not, however, sacrifice the quality of the curriculum or the goal of providing quality education programs to quality students. Upcoming meetings of the Education Committee will address these concerns. We hope to provide the Companions of Ohio a re-structured seminar in the near future.

Unfortunately, while we re-evaluate the program, we had to cancel the seminars that would have been held in 2005. The original twenty-dollar seminar fee was refunded to the seminar participants. Once a new format is finalized and dates set, new seminar announcements will be provided and those students who completed the first 8 sessions will be credited accordingly.

Royal Arch Schools:

Each Capitular year our District Education Officers (DEO's) are to conduct a series of Royal Arch Schools. The format for the schools is detailed in the Chapter Management Manual. In short, the schools may be eight sessions conducted within one year or four sessions over a two-year period. The topics to be covered for the school are established by the education committee; however, deviations to the recommended curriculum are allowed to enable qualified speakers to take part. Companions who attend all 8 sessions are awarded a pocket card acknowledging their participation. It has been suggested that an additional form of recognition be given to those Companions who have completed a second complete series of schools. This new award will be available this next year.

Inspection Reports:

A total of 153 (of the 161 possible) Chapter Education Officer reports were submitted by the District Education Officers. Almost a perfect 100% response – the best response ever. The DEO's are to be commended in this achievement!

These reports detail the educational activities of the constituent Chapters and are to be completed at the annual inspection convocation. Information gleaned from the 153 reports is as follows:

- Most Chapters use one candidate counselor. Several report 3 or 4 counselors.
 In many cases, the Chapter Education Officer (CEO) serves in both capacities.
 It goes without saying that there must be candidates in order to have counseling!
- Candidate counselors have the necessary handbook (although we recommend using the flip charts).
- Candidates are usually counseled prior to degrees with a slight increase in the number reported being counseled following the degree conferrals.

- Almost every Chapter presents Bible markers. (This has been a very worthwhile program put into place some 15 years ago. More than two thousand sets have been printed and distributed.)
- Our CEO's give short talks at most stated convocations; very few are given at special convocations. The new CEO short talk booklet, distributed this past year is hoped will assist our DEO's in meeting this important requirement in their Chapters. High Priests are encouraged to allow 2 -3 minutes for education at each of convocations.
- Education nights are reported as being planned; fewer report actually holding the education night.
- Almost every Chapter reports that "Candidate Counseling Flip-charts" are being used. Again, there must be candidates to counsel. One deficiency on the DEO report is we do not require him to see the flipcharts at the inspection convocation. This requirement will be added with the next update to RAE3 report form.

Each District Education Officer is to be commended for his hard work and efforts on behalf of the Education Committee; for conducting the Royal Arch Schools; attending inspections; and for visiting the Chapters and providing our members with additional "Light and Knowledge." You are the backbone of the education program in Ohio.

In concluding this report, I offer comments that were included in a report to me from Companion Jeffery Shaw, DEO of the 3rd District. A portion of which reads:

"....reports speak for the weaknesses and strengths of each Chapter. I would, however, point out some general observations. In general, the chapters are attempting to fulfill the education requirements and provide education for the chapters. Those helping with the program are well qualified and dedicated. The main issue seems to be that the meetings are not well attended, thus the CEO is doing a lot of work with few receiving the benefit of his work..... I'm not sure what the answer is but the Chapter meetings (and unfortunately I can easily see the education programs falling in this category as well) are becoming so routine (and attended by only the same few), that unless there are big changes.....we will probably continue to see a decrease in Chapter participation."

REPORT OF APOLLO DRAMATIC CHAPTER, TABERNACLE #1

Greetings Companions: This past year we had several new members join our ranks and our membership now stands at 121. There are many chartered Chapters in the state with far fewer members. Last year we reported the Companions in the Mansfield - Akron -Canton areas had formed their own Tabernacle. Tabernacle No 3 (that covers the entire Northeastern part of the state) is up and running and doing well. We hope to hold some joint meetings between the three Tabernacles (Tabernacle No 2 is located in the Southwest part of the state) and establish some collaborative projects this next year.

In anticipation of the Grand Master's one-day class, our King, Jim Sutherin, produced 10 York Rite Displays. They are professionally done and give a great visual image for York Rite Masonry. Although this project was not directly related to the mission of Apollo Dramatic Chapter, it merited our full support. Tabernacles No 2 and 3, after hearing of the project have agreed to pay a 1/3 share of the expense – approximately \$150 per Tabernacle -money that's well spent. The goal is to produce 10 more displays so that each Royal Arch district in the state will have one available for use at special events and activities.

Other projects here in Tabernacle No 1 have really slowed down. However, we did distribute several make-up kits to Chapters and provided additional video tapes that we produced on how to apply the make up, apply beards / wigs, etc. The make-up kits and videos go hand in hand.

Several instruction papers will be available at Grand Chapter. To the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Officers and Companions of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio:

History, like time, is inexorable. The events of the present insatiably command our attention. Yet all the pleasures, all the trials, all the disappointments become history in the inevitable process of time.

It will please your Grand High Priest and give your Chapter the potential for improving its service to its members and community. Please consider completing or updating your history. Somebody, someday, will thank you. As do I.

The first meeting of the Ohio Chapter of Research in this Capitular Year was held in Athens, Ohio, on September 11, 2004. Two interesting papers were presented. Rt. Ex. Comp. and the Rev. Paschal A. King's topic was "The Lodge Goat". The insight given by Ex. Comp. King into this practice of the distant past aroused much interest and discussion by the Companions assembled. Comp. Ivan M. Tribe, PhD, presented the second paper, which was titled "Freemasonry in Albany, Ohio". This historical presentation also evoked significant interest and discussion.

It was my pleasure, at the Grand Convocation of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio on October 8, 2004, to present our Selby Award to Ex. Comp. Richard D. Snow, one of the Past High Priests of this Chapter.

The second meeting was our Historic Joint Meeting with the Chapter of Research of New York, which was very successful and provided many opportunities for interstate Masonic fellowship and education. MEC Ted Harrison, High Priest of The Thomas Smith Webb Research Chapter of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of New York, and I arranged this meeting, which was held in Lackawanna, New York (a suburb of Buffalo),

on October 22, 2004. The meeting was very successful. Four papers were presented, two by Companions of each Chapter, as follows:

- "Early Ritual of the Holy Royal Arch" by E. Piers A. Vaughan, Secretary, Thomas Smith Webb Chapter of Research
- "The Grand Master, His Canal, and Free Public Education" by REC Curtis M. Jackson, PDDGHP, Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio
- "Brothers In Blue" by REC Norman G. Lincoln, Grand Historian, Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio

It is my thinking, that if I do not make progressive change, I can not expect you to be excited about using changes I may report on from other Grand Jurisdictions.

This year my report will have four (4) Sub-sections

- First, will be my standard way of Reporting to you.
- Second, will be what I call, "Representative Reports."
- Third, "Things not usually reported to Ohio Members."

• Last, an area of, "This and That."

I will bring this to mind and then continue with a story as I believe it will lend credence to the Report. You do recall we, as Grand Chapters, are not willingly trying to keep our members, as we can SNPD them easily and just be happy with less. BEING HAPPY WITH LESS is not our focus. Our focus needs to be happy with what we have!

Author, Kent Nerburn once took a train ride across Canada. On his journey, Nerburn encountered a man whom the other passengers avoided. This fellow was assumed to be a

drunkard because of his slurred speech and unstable gait. But Nerburn began a conversation with the man and soon learned he was recovering from a stroke. This man was once an engineer and operated trains along the very tracks that they were riding now. For the next several hours, he told Nerburn tales of the land they were traveled through and legends of the people who once lived there. He also offered insight into some of the characters who worked for the railroad.

"Most of you know, but new readers of this report need to be informed: The Grand Chapter of Ohio currently recognizes eighty-three other Grand Jurisdictions with which we exchange Grand Representatives. The Grand Fraternal Correspondent's primary responsibility is/to report on their activities with items of interest or significance, although other Masonic news is not to be excluded. Not all Jurisdictions publish proceedings on an annual basis. Some do not publish at all and delays in printing or for other reasons make information irregularly available from a few.

Additional material comes from various newsletters, Proceedings of Grand Councils, Grand Commanderys, Grand Representatives near Ohio, and various other Masonic publications." Again, I thank you, Louis.

Andrew Carnegie said, "No man will make a great leader who wants to do it all himself or to get all the credit for doing it."

Guy Ferguson puts it this way:

- a. To know how to do a job is the accomplishment of labor;
- b. To be available to tell others is the accomplishment of the teacher;
- c. To inspire others to do better work is the accomplishment of management;
- d. To be able to do all three is the accomplishment of true leaders."

A happy person is not a person in a certain set of circumstances, but rather a person with a certain set of attitudes. Believe it my Brethren, I have done the best I can, and I

wish for you to enjoy Glen's Masonic: Gems, Jewels, Tools, and Rules! Remember, "Motivation is what gets you started, Habit is what keeps you going."

THE STANDARD WAY OF REPORTING

<u>ALABAMA</u>: In the Fraternal Correspondence Report, it was noted about a request from the Chairman. Please let me know when you have had correspondence with your counterpart in other states. It makes it easier to make the Report when others have items or suggestions. Many things are happening across the United States and Outside that are different. We should be reporting on the differences, etc.

Credentials Committee reported a possible total vote of 106 Votes. The Grand Secretary reported a total of 15 Chapters with one not reporting. They have a total membership of 3,082 Companions. They did raise their Per-capita from \$4.00 to \$6.00 during this Convocation.

In the Report of the Ill. Grand Master of Council, Mac Arthur Davis 2004, I will quote. "We must stir the coals and wind the sparks before they go completely out in many of our Bodies. A positive attitude, a friendly smile and a caring spirit will be a place to start."

ALBERTA, CANADA: Fraternal Relations stated they received only 16 Reports from 85 Grand Representatives. He said this will never do! In the Report of the statistics: 2 Chapters Gained Members; 20 Chapters lost Members; 2 Chapters remained the same. They have a total Membership of 1,562 Companions. He finishes the Secretary Report by issuing his Resignation. He has been in the Position for 12 years and that is enough.

A Motion was made to open with 7 Companions, not 9. This was given a second and discussion was aggressive. I want you to read just one: 'We have roughly 19 resident members, of which 1 is a Doctor on call, 1 is in poor health, 1 works in a distant shop and 1 is now moving to Stettler. That leaves us with 15. In the winter time we have 2 Snow Birds that disappear, 1 Companion lives 110 km away, 1 is 75 and our First Principal is 40 km away. We now have 10 local members that we can count on to attend Chapter. One is subject to ambulance call; 2 are subject to military alerts. You can see our position. If there happens to be a storm and our out-of-town members cannot attend, it is not possible to open. This is the reason for this motion'. They voted and it passed!

BELGIUM: This is the 2004 Convocation and they maintain fraternal relations with 55 Grand Chapters. I was able to read one section that sounds so much like we hear local state: 'Unicorn Chapter, as always, is going steady. It is sometimes not easy to find officers due to their particular professional duties of most members. But some really indestructible veterans are always prepared to step in and save the day.' Does that sound familiar?

After visiting the Provincial Silver Museum, the ladies attended the banquet with the Companions in the Masonic Hall. I noticed they still list Rt. Ex. Comp. Phillip E. Engle as the Grand Representative of Ohio.

BRITISH COLUMBIA and YUKON, CANADA: This is the 2004 Proceedings. The Grand First Principal was most praiseworthy of the (RAILROAD DEGREE TEAM) as it functioned several times this year. One time, the Grand First Principal was the

working Candidate. During another time, the Most Worshipful Grand Master was the privileged member.

Advertising: the Committee has already arranged for and put in place, internet advertising, linking a highly reputable Hotel Group tour Grand Chapter website. This has been done for a fee. We have reasonable assurance that all are planning to renew.

The total number of Chapters in this Jurisdiction is 36 with 31 being present. They have 2,180 Companions with 180 of those members in attendance and registered. They have a total possible vote at this Grand Session of 189 Votes.

Our Grand Representative from Ohio is our PGHP Allan D. Hart. I thank him for\all he does to strengthen this program. This was the Eighty-sixth Annual Convocation.

CONNECTICUT: This is the 2004 Convocation and the 206th Session. The Grand High Priest stated the festival at Meridan went well with 27 new members. They have 22 Chapters with 10 not having any exaltations. There were 8 Chapters that did not fill all the chairs. The Grand High Priest recommends that this Jurisdiction have 4 State Degree Teams. One team for each of the Chapter Degrees. They should be ready to assist any Chapter.

The Grand Secretary reported 2,105 Companions as members in 22 Chapters. Of this membership, 29 are dual Members, 236 are 50 year members or are in Masonic care institutions. The Per-capita tax base is only 1,840 Companions. Credentials Committee reports a total possible vote of 82. M.E.P.G.H.P. Robert J. Maxwell is listed as the Grand Representative from Ohio.

<u>IOWA:</u> The Committee on Chapters Chartered we find good information over a 10 year period. At this tine they have 51 Chapters. Their Membership has dropped from 6,811 to 4,053. Fifty of those Chapters have shown a loss. Two others show a gain only due to consolidation with other Chapters.

During this 10 year span, Grand Chapter has had 932 exaltations, lost 2020 members by death or demitted; 1,387 for N.P.D. and reinstated 279.

The Committee on Leadership listed what I wish for you to read. "There seems to be three definite groups of leaders in every organization. PAST, PRESENT and FUTURE".

- PAST leaders protect our history and purpose. They are the watch dogs, the wisdom and pride.
- PRESENT leaders are filled with the desire to make needed changes in a short time frame but, careful not to disrupt the peace and harmony. This is a difficult leadership position.
- FUTURE leaders are filled with the enthusiasm and energy to 'build a better mousetrap.' Their input helps make an organization grow and progress. We all lead by example.

The Iowa Charity Fund reports their revenue averaging 'X Amount of \$' per month is down 30% from the previous year. This is the result of the interest rates dropping from the 6% to the 2% range. This seems a standard in other grand reports.

The Committee on Fraternal Correspondence has given a very good overview of the financial difference between Proceedings Books and Proceedings on compact disks. They estimate the average cost of a book of the Proceedings at \$6.00 and mailing each at

a \$1.00 for a total of \$7.00 average. On the other hand the cost if a CD would be less than a \$1.00 and the postage about 65 cents. This would be about \$1.65 For any person the comparison is a substantial difference.

This 2004 Proceedings was the 148th Annual Convocation. They have 51 Chapters with a total membership of 3,657 Companions. Chapters having an increase in membership--7; Chapters that remained the same--5; Chapters showing a decrease in membership--31; Chapters not reporting any Returns--8.

In the Speech of the Grand High Priest's address, we find an area he titles 'Saving our Fraternity.' He states, 'First join or organize a High Twelve Club. It is a Luncheon or

evening meal in a quality restaurant with entertainment to which members bring business clients, both Mason or non-Masons. Yes, you may bring your wife as well.'

Ohio Grand Representative is E. Gene Peepers, Rt. Ex. Comp.

KENTUCKY: This was the 2003 Proceedings and it was the One Hundred Eightysixth Annual Convocation, it was held in Louisville.

The Grand High Priest, in his address listed what he called, "Success Stories," about Chapters in his year. The Grand Secretary noted that eighteen Chapters exalted 71.21% of the new Chapter Masons.

This year they have one new chapter. This is something to make all of us pay attention. The Chapter has 53 members; 18 of which are new Royal Arch Masons. The remaining members are dual members of surrounding Chapters with several years of Capitular experience.

Kentucky listed a financial Comparison Chart, using 19 Grand Chapters. I will list what they listed for Ohio in 2003. Ohio: 26,412 members, 174 Chapters, and a budget of \$104,702.70. Salaries: \$6,700---Grand Secretary; \$11,280.00-Secretary; \$300.00-Grand Treasurer; \$100.00-Grand Chaplain; \$100.00-Grand Guard; \$100.00-Grand Fraternal Correspondent. Ohio has just 100 more Chapters than Kentucky. They have over one half of our budget but they only have one fourth the number of members. Ohio must be operating very conservatively.

THE REPRESENTATIVES REPORTS

My Companions, I wish for you to have an example of what all of our representatives should do immediately after the Grand Session. The following is what has been happening by only a very few of the Ohio Representatives. I wish to use this as a classic, as it gives a very good, efficient and informative capsule of what just happened in the Ohio Grand Session. When the Representative sends the "PREPRINTED, Proceedings, he is giving his counterpart a tool to search for himself. This does something else that is the most important action, you make your counterpart OBLIGATED. He sees you have invested both time and money for his benefit.

You, my Ohio Representatives, will not have only done the right thing, you will have done the right thing RIGHT! Please read and enjoy these fine reports from your Representatives.

TEXAS:

Dear Companion Joe, Well, here it is October and our Grand Convocation has just concluded. I grabbed an extra copy of the Annual Address and committee reports and have mailed it off to you for your review, should be in your mailbox this week. It gives a fairly accurate accounting of what has happened in Ohio this past year. The highlight of the proceedings is the report of our Grand Fraternal Correspondent Glen Opp. He's been on the job for 10 years now and spends a considerable amount of time in compiling a very comprehensive report. As a matter of fact, we've found out that some of our sister jurisdictions are now copying Glen's report for their own use.

You will recall that in 2002 Ohio formed a 501c (3) charitable foundation (Royal Arch Foundation). Took a year to come together and we really got rolling in 2003 - 2004 with the Adopt America Network, headquartered here in Toledo, as the recipient of our charitable activities. Their goal is to place special needs children, currently in foster

care, into permanent homes. This past year we forwarded over \$17,000 in their support, but even more remarkable, is the grass roots support from the Companions. The Ohio Companions now have an Ohio based charity that they can put their hands around and get excited about!! A group down in Cincinnati, after hearing of Adopt America's need for computers, has re-furbished 18 computers and donated them to AAN; districts have held fund raising dinners; several districts have held adoption fairs in their Masonic Temples where prospective parents can meet with AAN representatives. That's great exposure for both us as Masons and the Adopt America folks!

We, the Grand Chapter of Ohio, have now moved into the 21st century with an internet web site. It took a few years to launch but turned out pretty well. If you have the time, go to - www.ohiograndchapter.com. We have a past district deputy who has done a fine job in putting this all together. There's even a comment page that you can go in and leave a message. Let me know if you access it and what you think.

Joe, there's really nothing new to report on Ohio. No new legislation was presented this year. Finances continue to be a concern - membership (and the related per-capita) continue to decline, however, as you know, expenses always tend to go up. The finance committee has done a good job of reducing unnecessary costs so our annual operating budget has not increased, but with the reduction in per-capita, coupled with the reduction in income from interest on our permanent fund, necessitated a per-capita increase from \$2.50 to \$5.00 which takes effect this coming year. \$2.50 doesn't sound like much but it will put many of our local Chapters in a pinch. I would guess many Chapters will have to increase their dues structure to make up the difference.

I am awfully proud of the Education program here in Ohio. It's quite comprehensive ranging from flip charts for candidate counselors to use with new candidates all the way up to an in-depth program of instruction for Masonic researchers and scholars. Don't overlook the outstanding report of the Education Committee in the annual address. The Chairman is one swell fellow and did a great job on his report. One area that was deemed deficient was in providing short talks for our Chapter Education Officers to use in the Chapters. We request that each CEO present a short program at each meeting. Many were willing to do so but reluctant to do the prep work needed for these presentations. This past year we put together a 36 page booklet with education talks for them to use. I have attached a copy for your review. Let me know if you have any problems in accessing this file. I'll go ahead and put a book in the mail to you just in case. I think you'll find it interesting.

Joe, that's it for today. Chrysler seems to think that they pay me to do work for them rather than for Royal Arch Masonry. I trust that all is well with you and yours down in Texas. Wishing you the very best of everything. I remain -

The 137th Annual Convocation of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Delaware was opened by R.E. Companion, Walter F. Lokey, Grand King, at 1:00 P.M. on

Saturday March 12, 2005 at the Masonic Temple, 818 Market Street, Wilmington Delaware, with all constituted Chapters properly represented. Most Excellent Grand High Priest Franklin R. Townsend was received into Grand Chapter and proceeded to preside over the Grand Convocation.

Most Excellent Roger A. Douillette, Deputy General Grand High Priest for the Northeast Region and General Grand Master of the Third Veil of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International was present for the Annual Convocation and the Friday evening Banquet.

Grand Chapter was honored to have present throughout the Convocation, and the banquet Friday evening, Most Worshipful Donald D. Thomas Grand Master of Masons in Delaware, who welcomed our distinguished visitors and commented on how much he had enjoyed being with the Companions during these sessions.

The F. Irving Crow Award was presented to Past Grand High Priest Wayne Schutz this year. The committee holds this award with high regards and did find a candidate, Wayne Schutz who was distinguished to receive the award this year.

The Distinguished Service Medal of the General Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons International, was presented to Maurice C. Barnes.

Grand Chapter experienced a loss in membership for the year of 24 from 533 to 509 members. The record show 7 exaltations, 1 reinstated, 1 affiliations, 4 demits, 6 suspensions, and 23 deaths. The winner of the Membership Plaque for the year was Brandywine No. with 3 exaltations.

Grand Chapter approved continuance of the Liability Insurance Coverage provided in conjunction with Grand Council and Grand Commandery. Each subordinate body will be billed \$32.00 for their share of the insurance.

Grand Chapter was honored to have representatives from 10 of our sister jurisdictions present including representatives from Florida, and Ontario.

The 138th Annual Convocation is scheduled to be held in Wilmington on Saturday, March 11, 2006 at 1:00 P.M. or at an earlier hour should circumstances so permit.

GEORGIA: I want all of you to know, as I wrote about in the introduction, many items are to be reported. Well, this is one of those items. I have always placed this Representative's Report in the Report as he has written after his annual attendance during the Grand Georgia Session. Our M.E.C. Arthur Ross has sent a most complete report to me every year I have been the Correspondent. So I wish for his letter to be your enjoyment.

Glen, I thought you might be interested in a point of trivia. I attended a stamp show held at the North Atlanta Trade Center in Norcross, Georgia. In the same building the stamp show there was a huge antique show being held. Being of a somewhat curious nature, I ventured into the antique show. On a rather out of the way booth I paused to inquire of the owner of the display if she had any Masonic items? as it has been some time since aluminum Marks were used by Findlay Chapter. Imagine an "Ohio boy" finding a Findlay Chapter No. 58 Mark in the "deep south". Glen, was I ever surprised. Wonders never cease!

So much for trivia, Glen, but I thought you might enjoy this since you are a member of Findlay Chapter. We hope to see you in October if the Lord continues to bless Carole and me with good health.

GERMANY: As the Grand Representative of Germany near the Grand Council of Ohio, It was my privilege and pleasure to attend the Grand Convocation of both the Grand Chapter of Germany and the Grand Council of Germany on April 29th and 30th, 2005. I carried a dispensation from the Grand High Priest Jean W. Justus, Jr., authorizing me to represent him at this Convocation, and a dispensation from the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Robert R. Rettig also authorizing me to represent him at the Assembly.

A word of explanation: There are only 8 Chapters and 7 Councils in all of Germany. They do not have enough members to have a separate Formal Grand Chapter and a Formal Grand Council, 80 the Grand Officers of one Body are the Grand Officers of the Other Body. These Grand Bodies operate under the auspices of the General Grand Chapter and the General Grand Council. The Grand Chapter of Germany received their Decree and Patent on the fifteenth day of September, 1956 and the Grand Council of Germany received their Decree and Patent on the twenty-second day of March, 1958 and are both apparently sovereign bodies.

The schedule called for the Order of the High Priest Hood and the Order of the Silver Trowel to be conferred the afternoon of the 29th.

The Grand Convocation/Assembly was scheduled for Saturday the 30th of April in one of the Meeting Rooms of the Courtyard Marriott in Frankfurt, Germany. What I observed seated in the near east, was the usual order of business, {just *like* home}. There were attendees and officers from Saudi Arabia, Scotland, Germany, Rumania and France. In addition there were representatives from the Grand Chapter of Slovenia / Monte Negro, a newly formed Grand Body, and Rumania. Since each officer serves a two year term, there were no elections or installation.

I was asked to rise and give Fraternal Greetings. I gave greetings from the Grand Lodge of Ohio, Most Worshipful Grand Master Jim Deyo, the fraternal greetings of the Grand High Priest of Ohio, R.A.M., Most Excellent Companion Jean W. Justus, Jr., and

the fraternal greetings of the Most Illustrious Grand Master of Ohio, R. & S.M., Most Illustrious Companion Robert R. Rettig.

One of the business matters was the 50th Anniversary of the Grand Chapter of Germany, which would happen in 2006. Plans are being made for this celebration, but are not finalized. After a short recess, A Banquet was given at 8:00 P.M. that evening. There was no head table but there was plenty of food from an open buffet with good drinks and a lot of fellowship and good-looking ladies. We said our farewells after the banquet, receiving the good wishes of the Companions present.

NEW SOUTH WALES: (Companions please, give your attention to these words) Brother Anthony R. Lauer announced a *new* Masonic Ceremony, The Ceremony of Mark Man, had *been* agreed between this Grand Lodge and the United Supreme Grand Chapter of Mark and Royal Arch Masons of New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory. Drawing from both the Degrees of a Fellow Craft and of a Mark Master Mason, the new ceremony expands upon parts of the Fellow Craft story which although traditionally forming a part of that Degree - have *over* the years come to be omitted and have instead been included in the story of Mark Master Mason.

By agreement with United Supreme Grand Chapter, these parts of the original Fellow Craft story have now been drawn together into a separate and distinct Ceremony, that of Mark Man.

Similar to a Degree, the Ceremony will form the work of a particular meeting. The ritual, which has already been written and approved, will approximate in time to that of the Second Degree. The Ceremony will only be available to Brethren who have been raised to the Third Degree of a Master Mason so as not to interrupt the regular Craft sequence and those who have been' identified' as Mark Men will be recognized by a special jewel worn with a Master Mason's regalia as well as by a separate Certificate.

The new Ceremony will form an essential link between the Craft and the Degrees of Mark Master Mason and the Holy Royal Arch, and should encourage Brethren to proceed in that direction so as to complete all the Degrees of pure Ancient Masonry. The Ceremony will become a mandatory prerequisite to the Degree of Mark Master Mason and any Brother who has not passed the Ceremony in a Craft Lodge and wishing to become a Mark Master Mason will have to pass the Ceremony in the Royal Arch Chapter where, under the control of United Supreme Grand Chapter, the same Ceremony will be worked. Any Brother who has already had the Degree of Mark Master Mason conferred upon him in a 'regular' Mark Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter that is a Mark Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter holding a Warrant issued by the United Supreme Grand Chapter of NSW and the ACT or by another recognized 'regular' Mark or Royal

Arch Constitution, will be accepted as a Mark Man by this Grand Lodge and will be permitted to wear the Mark Token and / or the Mark Jewel he already possesses with his Master Mason's apron.

All Lodges in this Jurisdiction are advised that they may now or hereafter apply to the Grand Master for a License to work the Ceremony of Mark Man following the signing of the Concordat with United Supreme Grand Chapter on 8th June 2005.

Application for such a License is <u>entirely voluntary</u> and a matter of decision for each individual Lodge. A Lodge desirous of seeking a License must first pass a motion, at a regular meeting and after due notice, expressing its wish to work the Ceremony of Mark Man and then make application to the Grand Secretary, in writing, setting out the details of said motion.

Copies of the ritual and further information concerning the Ceremony will shortly be available from the Grand Lodge Office.

License for a linked Craft Lodge and Royal Arch Chapter.

At the same Grand Lodge Communication held on 12th March 2005, the Grand Master also announced agreement with the United Supreme Grand Chapter of Mark and Royal Arch Masons of New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory for the linking of a Craft Lodge and a Royal Arch Chapter to form a single administrative unit.

It is intended that in such a linked Lodge and Chapter all members of the Lodge shall precede on to complete the Degrees of pure Ancient Masonry by taking the Mark Master Mason and Holy Royal Arch Degrees offered in the Royal Arch Chapter, and all members of the Chapter shall also be members of the Lodge.

The Lodge and the Chapter shall exist and work under the Constitutions, Regulations, Rules and control of the United Grand Lodge and the United Supreme Grand Chapter respectively and these supreme bodies will maintain their Masonic responsibilities for their particular subordinate bodies.

However, the linked Lodge and Chapter shall operate as one single Masonic body based on: meetings held at the same place; on the same day of the month; and at the same time of the day; one set of specially designed and extended By-Laws; one Management Committee; one single membership record; one single joining fee; one set of dues; one only rental contract and one only set of catering arrangements.

Of course, the regalia worn in the Lodge and the Chapter shall be separate and as required by the respective controlling supreme bodies and, further, the Installation

Ceremonies of the Lodge and the Chapter shall also be separate and take place at separate meetings. The intent throughout is to preserve intact the separation of the Masonic powers and responsibilities of the respective supreme bodies whilst enabling the linked Lodge and Chapter to operate as an effective single administrative unit.

It is hoped that this new concept will excite and motivate Brethren by providing for a continuous philosophic stream and education bridging the Craft and the Royal Arch. and by creating an opportunity for greater satisfaction in Freemasonry for those who genuinely wish to follow its teachings and study its ideas and thinking. Furthermore, it should achieve this in a time and cost efficient manner

All Lodges in this Jurisdiction are advised that they may now or hereafter apply to the Grand Master for a License to link with a Royal Arch Chapter following the signing of the Concordat with United Supreme Grand Chapter on 8th June 2005.

Application for such a License is <u>entirely\voluntary</u> and a matter of decision for each individual Lodge. A lodge desirous of seeking a license must first pass a motion, at a regular meeting and after due notice, expressing its wish to link with a nominated Royal Arch Chapter and then make application to the Grand Secretary, in writing, setting out the details of said motion.

Further information concerning the procedure for putting the License into practice, specifically for the preparation of the specially designed and extended By-Laws will shortly be available from the Grand Lodge Office.

Rt. Ex. Comp. Edward Howard is the Grand Representative from Ohio. We thank Comp. Howard for his outstanding attention to this possible change in Masonry.

NORTH CAROLINA:

Dear R.E. Glen Opp,

I did attend the Annual Communications of the Grand York Rite Bodies of North Carolina held at the Village Inn in Clemmons, North Carolina I am inclosing a copy of the program and Report of the Grand High Priest and the Preliminary Reports.

I attended the Devine Service on Sunday in my Commandery Uniform. The Grand Presiding Officers Reception was an ice cream social and everyone there had some good ice cream and some really good fellowship.

The York Rite College breakfast was a breakfast buffet, and the Grand Master of Masons in North Carolina gave an address. Although Masonry is still losing members in North Carolina, he was very optimistic that Masonry is in good shape in North Carolina.

All York Rite Bodies open in Joint Session. The Grand Chapter opened the Joint Session this year and the Grand Council and Grand Commandery declare their bodies open. The opening rotates and next year the Grand Council will open the joint session.

All introductions are held in the Joint Session. There were four Grand Representatives there, and we were escorted into the convocation and given Grand Honors at the Altar. The Grand Chapter distinguished guests were introduced first then the Grand Council and then the Grand Commandery. I don't know if this will rotate next year or not.

After the introductions the business common to all three bodies was conducted. The three bodies all have the same Grand Secretary, Recorder, and Treasurer. They gave their

or no other candidate, Grand Chapter all of the officers were elected by acclamation. The Grand Chapter was then closed. There session lasted approximately 2 hours.

After lunch the Grand Council opened and conducted their business. The Grand Council closed. The next morning the Grand Commandery opened and conducted their business.

The Grand Banquet was well attended with approximately 250 people. They had a very good dinner of roast pork.

The Grand York Rite bodies **all** have their Installation of Officers together. The charge is given to the Grand High Priest and Grand Illustrious Master and Grand Commander separately and **all** others pledge together to do their best to uphold the duties of their office.

I was received with Masonic honors and was made to feel very welcome.

You may not want to print **all** of this report in the Proceedings. I was present and was treated very well. I did meet the Grand Representative from Ohio near the Grand Chapter of North Carolina and had a good discussion with him. The Grand High Priests from South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and District of Columbia were there. Representatives were there from the General Grand Chapter, General Grand Council, and Grand Encampment were in attendance also.

SOUTH CAROLINA: Most Excellent Companion Justus, the South Carolina Grand York Rite Annual Meetings was held in Rock Hill, South Carolina on March 13, 14 & 15, 2005. All activities, except the Knights Templar Religious Service, were held in the Holiday Inn located at 2640 North Cherry Road.

The Knights Templar Religious Service was held in the Oakland Baptist Church at 4:30 P.M. This service was conducted by the Grand Prelate, Rev. Hugh J. Bickley with the Excellent Grand Chaplain, Rev. Haywood Fowler assisting. The pastor of Oakland Baptist Church, Rev. Dr. Robert D. Shrum made a Welcome comment and a response was made by S.K. N. Haskel Brabham, the Right Eminent Grand Commander. This was a fine Religious Service. This church was quite large and its interior was furnished in early American style - light green walls with lots of paned windows with white woodwork and two large brass chandeliers. An impressive setting for this service. The church was approximately one mile from the Holiday Inn.

At 7 P.M. we attended the Annual Grand York Rite Banquet. This is the "kick off' for the meetings. Proper dress is either a Tuxedo or Knights Templar uniform (less chapeau and sword). Monday afternoon the Grand Council conducted its business, elected and installed new officers. Tuesday morning at 8:30 A.M. the Grand Chapter was opened. These are some of the highlights of the reports that were made.

- Time and Place: In 2006 the Grand York Rite Meetings will be held on March 12, 13, and 14 at Greenville, South Carolina.
- Grand Secretary: A printed copy of each report, (Chapter, Council, & Commander) on one page, was included in the registration packet. A motion to adopt the Chapter Report as printed was accepted.
- Grand Treasurer: A printed copy of each report, (Chapter, Council, & Commandery) on one page, was included in the registration packet. A motion to adopt the Chapter Report as printed was accepted.
- Finance: A printed copy of the report and recommendations for each body (Chapter, Council & Commandery) three reports on one side of the page and three sets of recommendations on the opposite side of the page were included in the registration packet. Thus, a brief explanation of a few of the recommendations was made - a question from the floor for clarification of one item - no other questions - and the motion to adopt was accepted.
- Membership: There are 31 Chapters in the state. In 2004 they show a loss of 365 members. "Non Payment of Dues" is still the main reason for this loss. The total membership in the state is 6191.
- Other Business: Carl R. Truesdale, PGHP asked for the support of all present in his bid / run for the office of General Grand Scribe of the General Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons International. (Note: M.E. Companion Truesdale is the South Carolina Grand Representative for Ohio.)

Around 11:40 A.M. the annual election of officers was held. The Nominating Committee presented a slate of five officers -

Since there was no opposition, it was moved that this slate of six be elected by unanimous ballot. All other Grand Officers and Deputies are appointed.

An open Installation of Officers was then held. After exchanging jewels and aprons and a closing prayer, the Grand Chapter was closed by declaration!

The Grand Secretary/Recorder, Johnnie T. Morris became ill during the night (Sunday night) with severe flu like symptoms and was in such bad shape that he went to the hospital early Monday morning. He was admitted, given intravenous fluids and medications and kept for 24 hours. On Tuesday morning he was back at his desk, looking pale and very tired. Thus, the Grand Commandery and Grand Council meetings were conducted with the aid of a pro-tem Secretary / Recorder. The printed reports made it

much easier to conduct business but there were some rough spots when the pro-tem could not find important lists and letters, etc.

<u>IOWA:</u> We all seem to be in the same predicament as far as loss of members goes. The_membership rolls are showing the effect the elimination of either, York Rite or Scottish Rite membership to join the Shrine has had.

I have read of the financial problems some Jurisdictions are experiencing in the decline of membership along with the interest rate dropping. Some have gone so far as to cut the amounts allowed for the Grand Secretary, extra help, mileage and per-diem and the Grand Officer allowances.

BRITISH COLUMBIA and YUKON: We have met several times throughout the year and profitably studied and discussed our system of Grand Representatives, but have not finished that task. The Committee sees an urgent need for a written definition of the duties and responsibilities of a Grand Representative, thus clarifying their expectations as well as those of Grand Chapter.

<u>CONNECTICUT:</u> We have reviewed many of the Proceedings. These were then given to the Chairman and he gives every effort to see they are sent to each Grand Representative.

OREGON: They do not have such a Committee or person. All is through the Office of the Grand Secretary. This is the same for the Grand Jurisdiction of Washington, Wisconsin and Vermont.

SOUTH CAROLINA:

Nothing was mentioned about other Grand Jurisdictions. They did report the following, NPD's still plaque us. If we put forth an effort to help our Grand High Priest carry out his plans to improve NPD's we should lower them.

THIS AND THAT

<u>Ohio:</u> These are items that may interest the Ohio Membership. Glen is lifting each from Correspondent's Reports he has received but not reported.

<u>Alabama</u>: I am asking our Representatives to let me know when they have contact with their Counterpart. Please send me information from their Jurisdiction that you have received, for my report.

<u>Connecticut</u>: The Grand Correspondent receives the Proceedings from the Grand Secretary and he sends them on to the proper Representative for his reading and then, they are to send him a report. He finishes his Report to Grand Chapter with, "As reported in previous years, this Committee does not feel that the Grand Chapter needs this Committee." Hey, that will get you out of a job! (Glen)

<u>Iowa:</u> He stated that West Virginia now has a "Traveling Award" and it is for visiting other Chapters. It will be awarded to any Companion who visits nine (9) or more Chapters during the year. They will be placing their Proceedings on CDs in the future. New Jersey is recommending that the Grand High Priest serve two years instead of one.

<u>British Columbia and the Yukon</u>: There is no Grand Chapter of Hong Kong, although Chapters chartered by England, Scotland and Ireland, are active there.

<u>Michigan:</u> They do not have a Fraternal Reporter. During the 2003 Convocation they extended Fraternal Relations with Belgium, Brazil and Romania.

Alberta: It is reported that New Zealand has 85 Chapters with a total of 2,671 Companions. New Zealand has a Committee appointed to consider having Grand Convocations every two years. In Illinois they have a program called "Chapter Worked Club" to assist Companions in learning and keeping fresh, the Work.

CONCLUSION

In bringing this eleventh Grand Fraternal Correspondent's Report to a close, I wish to bring your attention to some reading I have found. Many times while reading the total number of Proceedings, I get the feeling some report in a way that the truth is somewhat lost or stated to give a measure of protection. It is called, "Spinning the Standings."

I read about a company always holding a summer picnic, which included a hotly contested softball game between two departments that had developed a rivalry over the years. They played only this one game every summer and argued over it the rest of the year.

One year Department A won the game, but Department B posted the following writeup on the company bulletin board: "Department B is proud to announce that following this year's softball game, we finished in second place, having lost only one game all year. We also offer our condolences to Department A, which finished next to last in the standings, having only won one game the entire season."

My Brethren and Companions please remember to say, "thank you" to our very special couple, MEC Dale G. Ray, Jr. and his most attractive bride, Jacqueline. They have created an atmosphere of harmony and assistance in our Grand Secretary Office.

Greater help, you will never need. We all, RESPECT, you both because you have earned it! OHIO GRAND CHAPTER, I applaud you!

All of the 159 constituent Chapters and the 3 Mark Lodges were represented except: Garfield #150

All Grand Officers were in attendance. All Past Grand High Priests were present except Louis H. Doerman, Dwight L. Kane, James A. Getty, Robert M. Huntzinger, Paul Nyitray, Robert J. Maxwell, and Terry B. Meyers.

All District Deputies Grand High Priest were present except Ronnie L. Ford, DDGHP-5th District. Also present were 23 District Education officers, 43 Past District Deputies Grand High Priests, 17 out-of-state Guests, 38 Ohio Distinguished Guests, 248 voting delegates other than the above, 111 voting Past High Priests other than the above, and 11 non-voting Companions. Total number of Companions registered was 548. 150 ladies were registered.

The per capita contribution to the Ohio Masonic Home for the year ending May 31, 2004 was \$5361.75, plus an added voluntary contribution of \$1,500.00.

You as the High Priest are not expected to be able to do all of the work. For this reason, you need to set up committees to assist you in the management of your Chapter. It is extremely important that you pick individuals that are not only qualified to chair these committees but have the attitude and commitment to see that these are functional committees with a goal in mind. Be sure to acknowledge your committees at each meeting by asking for a report or update.

Keep in mind - use your companion's skills and talents. Select chairman that have unique skills that they would be willing to use on a committee. If you know of a companion with a special talent or skill, form your committee around that skill rather than forming the committee then choosing the companion.

The following are a list of required and possible committees and/or appointments you may want to make:

Finance Committee: This committee is required by code and must be appointed the night of installation. It should consist of 3 members. Refer to section 104.05 of the Code.

Welfare Committee: Appoint 3 Companions in each Constituent Chapter to make contact with those Companions who are in arrears with their dues, ascertain if they are destitute and need assistance with their dues. Make recommendations on those that need their dues remitted such as those in nursing homes. Visit the sick and distressed Companions of the Chapter and let them know that we still care about them.

Widows Committee: Appoint 1 Companion in each Constituent Chapter to maintain contact with the widows of deceased Companions for the express purpose of inviting them to local and state Chapter functions that involve the ladies.

Charities Committee: Appoint interested Companions to speak on and promote each of the three charities that Grand Chapter supports: The Ohio Masonic Home, Grand Chapter Royal Arch Foundation (Adopt America Network) and Royal Arch Research Assistance (RARA). This committee's main function will be to arrange a special night or event to designate the proceeds to go to one of these charities. Designate this committee to report on the charity, explain its function, how the donations are used, and distribute literature.

Reinstatement Committee: Appoint a team of Companions to make personal contact with those Companions who have demitted or been suspended. A reinstatement is a reinvestment in your Chapter. Let us find out why these Companions have left, and work to reinstate them. This committee should work closely with and make recommendations to the Welfare Committee when appropriate.

Keeper of the Marks: Appoint 1 Companion in each Chapter to see that not only the Mark Book is maintained but to instruct all new Mark Masters on the purpose and intent of selecting their mark and to see that it is properly recorded.

If a chapter consolidation takes place, it is the duty of the Keeper of the Marks along with the Secretary of the chapter to obtain the Mark Book and all marks of the previous chapter, and keep them with the records of the surviving chapter.

Publicity Committee: This committee's purpose is to report on special events such as award nights, installations, inspections and see that the information is publicized in local newspapers, newsletters, via the Internet, the Grand Chapter web site and District web sites. All publications are to be forwarded to the Public Relations Committee of the Grand Chapter. If we are to survive, we must advertise.

Membership Development: This is one of the most, if not the most, vital parts of your Chapter. Its goal is to stimulate growth in our membership. Each Chapter must appoint a membership development Chairman and that Committee must work on Social Activities, Public Relations, Petitions and Reinstatements. If your Chapter is going to survive, this Committee must be active. Have your Chairman stay in close contact with the Chairman of the Grand Chapter Membership Development Committee. This Committee is taking a very active position in membership development this year and is very enthusiastic in their pursuit. The Grand Chapter Membership Development Committee Chairman and members and phone numbers are listed in this Bulletin.

Chapter Education Officer: A Companion that is not only knowledgeable, but is committed to Masonic Education. He is responsible for short talk programs at stated and special convocations; arranges for the District Education Officer program, appoints candidate counselors, and provides information to complete the DEO inspection report.

Knowledge is the foundation of our future and education is the building block to that foundation. Appoint your Chapter Education Officer with the quality and expertise to build the future.

Candidate Counselor: With the newly developed flip charts, each Chapter should have a capable Companion assigned to counsel each candidate before each degree between sections, and after each degree conferral. This Counselor should place the degree in perspective and tell the candidate what to look for and how to get the most out of the degree. He should invite questions, and briefly explain the significance of the various sections of the degrees after they are conferred.

Degree Directors: For proper and effective conferral of the Degrees, we must appoint a Degree director for each Degree. These Companions will insure a complete cast is prepared for each degree and that prior to conferring any Degree ample rehearsals are scheduled. Each Degree Director is to insure the Candidate is properly prepared and made to feel at ease during the conferring of degrees. He is to see that the degree starts on time, and that paraphernalia, robes, equipment, and props are ready, in good repair and set up properly.

It is important that the degrees of Capitular Masonry be presented in a manner that will impress the candidate and cause him to feel that his time was well spent. Remember, the candidates that pass through our degrees will be our best salesmen as they go back to their Lodges with favorable impressions of Capitular Masonry.

Chapter Historian: It is requested that each Chapter appoint a committee to research and write the history of their Chapter from its origin to the present time. The history should include such items as: circumstances under which the Chapter was formed; date

of the dispensation; date of the charter; date of institution; date of consecration and dedications; list of charter members; list of Chapter Officers; location of the first meeting; and, unusual events that have occurred in the history of the Chapter. Copies of the Chapter's history should be submitted to the Grand Secretary and the Grand Historian. The Grand Historian stands ready to help any Companion who requests help in writing the history of his Chapter.

INFORMATION

Communications

It is requested that each Constituent Chapter Secretary and High Priest is prompt in answering all communications. Requests for supplies, educational materials and service awards are to be submitted directly to the Grand Secretary.

Requests for approval of By-Laws must be approved by your District Deputy Grand High Priest for form and substance before mailing. Please note that changes in By-Laws which do nothing but change fees or dues, or change the specified time (or date) of stated meetings, do not need to be approved by the Grand High Priest. When approval is needed, the request should be mailed directly to the Grand High Priest, not to the Grand Secretary.

Dispensations

All requests for dispensations should be forwarded to the District Deputy Grand High Priest, who will review them, and if warranted, will forward same to the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee: <u>George Hall,28 Park Avenue West, Mansfield, OH 44902-1692</u>, <u>Phone: 419-524-9811 Fax (419) 522-5758</u>. If it is a proper request and in proper form, the Jurisprudence Committee will forward the dispensation form to the Grand High Priest for signature. Any deviation from this process will cause undue delays.

Religious Re-Affirmation Sunday

Every chapter is asked to participate in a DISTRICT-WIDE religious service on Sunday October 24, 2004. This service should be organized by the District Deputy Grand High Priest and he may be assisted by the District Officers Association.

This observance should be separate from a church worship service, as all masons are expected to attend their church. Let us make this special effort to thank God for his gift to us.

Why do we have a Religious Reaffirmation Sunday? Because it was instituted by the General Grand Chapter in 1797 as a day on which all Royal Arch Masons in the United States would be attending a church service at approximately the same time. This first service took place on Sunday, October 24, 1798. We, therefore as Royal Arch Masons, reaffirm our solemn vow to Almighty God on the Sunday nearest to that date in October.

This observance should be a special event involving the family, and invited guests, and the whole Masonic Family. If properly planned and conducted, this can be a splendid opportunity to let the community know what Masonry, and especially Capitular Masonry, stands for.

Royal Arch Schools

Masonry is a teaching institution. It always has been, and its strength is in the WELL-INFORMED MASON. We are reaping the benefits of the great lessons laid by our Companions of yesterday. Our duty is to improve ourselves by those teachings and to pass our enriched experiences down to posterity. Royal Arch Schools are made available in each District to provide an opportunity for members to become Masonically well informed. Every District is URGED to hold several of these schools, and each High Priest is encouraged to persuade his officers and companions to attend them.

Awards

All awards given in recent years will be continued this year. These awards include: Sojourner, District Work Horse, Outstanding High Priest, Outstanding Chapter in the District, Most Improved Chapter in the District, No Loss Award of Distinction, and the Star Award to Chapters with 3% or more net gain.

Four recipients in the entire state will receive the "Distinguished Service Award" from the Grand Chapter. These nominations must be submitted through your District Deputy Grand High Priest and these recommendations must be in the hands of the Grand Chapter Awards Committee (Ralph M. Curtis, 8198 Jug Street Rd., Alexandria, OH 43001 by June 30, 2005.

Christmas and Holy Week

The weeks of Christmas and Easter mean a great deal to the religious community. Therefore, I am requesting that no Special Meetings be held during these two weeks, and

that the activities of Stated Meetings be held to the barest necessities. No Degree conferrals during these two weeks!

Special Dates

The Grand Chapter Officers will perform the Ceremony of Rededication at the following Chapters: Lafayette #60 on November 14, 2004 at 3:00PM; Shelby Chapter #178 on December 12, 2004 at 3:00PM; and Marion Chapter #62 on April 30, 2005 at 3:00PM with the 9th District GHP reception following the rededication.

The 189th Grand Chapter Convocation will be held in Columbus, Ohio on October 5th and 6th, 2005 at the Holiday Inn East at I70 and Hamilton Road. The GHP will also be guest inspector at Walnut Chapter #172 on November 29, 2004 and Shawnee Chapter #237 on December 1, 2004.

Do not delay this important action. If the Companion cannot get to the Temple, take it to him. If he lives out of state or is not in your geographic area, inform the Grand Secretary at the time of request, so that he may assist you in arranging for the presentation. Companions it is better to be several months early on these presentations, than it is to be one day too late!

Grand Historian

I highly encourage each Constituent Chapter to write or update its history. If you need any assistance, contact our Grand Historian. This year the Grand Chapter is very fortunate to have a very knowledgeable Companion with expertise, qualifications, and background in the writing and research of Royal Arch Masonry and other Masonic Bodies. He is most willing and stands ready to assist any Companions in researching and writing their Chapter history. Do not hesitate in contacting our Grand Historian, Norman G. Lincoln. Each Constituent Chapter should send a copy of the completed history to the Grand Historian and the Grand Secretary.

York Rite Cooperation

Please make every effort to cooperate with the other York Rite Bodies in your area. Among the positive ways to cooperate are:

Schedule degrees so that Councils and Commanderys can conveniently arrange for their degrees and orders;

.Respect the other bodies' schedules;

Participate in York Rite Festivals.

We must sell York Rite Masonry to our Symbolic Lodge Brethren. We need to tell them that the lessons learned in the York Rite build on what they have learned in Blue Lodge. Visitations to your local Blue Lodges is a very good way to get this word to them by your example or by talking up York Rite Masonry. We must sell York Rite Masonry!

Festivals

It has always been my feeling that the Capitular degrees are intended to be conferred on individuals on a personal, one –on–one basis. However, I do support the purpose and need to have one-day festivals in order to meet the needs of those individuals who cannot attend weekday evening meetings. I highly recommend the continuance of using individual Chapter meetings to confer the Capitular degrees on candidates in order to convey the one–on-one personal touch and utilize the festivals when this is not an option. When scheduling a festival, I recommend that it be set up as a District—wide function, thus, obtaining the best ritualists, paraphernalia, and location available to enhance the portrayal of the degrees. Festivals can also be utilized to portray the degrees to candidates in a shorter time frame than over several months, which can be advantageous to those individuals who are desirous in completing the York Rite in a more timely manner.

Royal Arch Research Assistance

In 1974 the General Grand Chapter International launched this philanthropy under the leadership of our M. Ex. Comp. Edward Selby to help research Auditory Perception problems in children. Although we no longer belong to the General Grand Chapter, we still support this philanthropy. I ask that you set a goal of \$1.00 per member donation to RARA. Donations may be made in honor of a deceased member. A money making project could be used just for RARA.

Ohio Masonic Home

In 1892 the cornerstone was laid for the Ohio Masonic Home. It was a way in which the Masons of Ohio dedicated themselves to the idea that care should be provided for other Masons, their wives, widows and orphans.

Many changes have been made in the "Home on the Hill" since those early days, but the care, compassion and concern that has been the hallmark of the Home is as good today as it was in the beginning. Ohio Masons can be very proud of their Home. All Royal Arch Masons should support our Home to assure that it will sustain the level of excellence it now has. Be generous in your support of the Ohio Masonic Home.

Royal Arch Foundation

The Grand Chapter of Ohio at the 186th Convocation held in Columbus, Ohio, approved the formation of the Royal Arch Foundation. The purpose of the Foundation is to oversee the distribution of monies collected in support of the Charity that the Foundation selects. The Foundation elected to support for three years, the Adopt

American Network. The Adopt America Network is a Toledo based charity that finds permanent homes for hard to place children that are currently in the foster care system. These are the children most difficult to place (older children, minority and mixed race, children with physical or emotional problems). Adopt American Network utilizes a network of volunteer adoption specialists, who are themselves adoptive parents, to recruit and match families with waiting children. Every child needs a permanent loving home and with our support, this can be achieved. The Royal Arch Foundation is a 501 (C) 3 tax deductible organization.

Youth Organizations

The Youth organizations are our future. We must support each of them the best way we can. If there is DeMolay, Rainbow Assembly or a Bethel of Job's Daughters in your area, please support them with your time, money and talent. You will be welcome at any of their meetings and I encourage you to attend whenever possible. This year, I am requesting that each Chapter District sponsor a DeMolay, Rainbow or Job's Daughter night. This can be a friendship night, prospect night, or an awards night. I am also asking each Grand Officer and District Deputy Grand High Priest to attend at least one youth meeting, installation or inspection during this next year. Our money support helps, but the thing they need most is our attendance and encouragement. I am asking any Companion who attends one of the Youth meetings to be my representative and to bring the greetings of the Grand Chapter.

Grand Chapter Web Site

The Grand Chapter web site is up and running. Much work has been with more to do as time allows. Contact the webmaster REC Kenneth Finkel with questions or suggestions. The address is: ohiograndchapter.org. There are links on the web site to other Masonic contacts.

Conclusion

Traveling, Traveling: What a journey I've had traveling around this great state of Ohio presenting my Grand King's program, making many new friendships and renewing some old.ones. I want to thank each and every Companion who gave up their time, participated in, and attended these schools to listen to my message. As your Grand High Priest, I am looking forward with anticipation to the upcoming Chapter inspections and will be traveling to your part of the state in the near future.

My theme this year, "The Circle of Unity Starts with You", continues with traditions of Capitular Masonry. Remember the lessons that are taught in our Royal Arch Masonry are the foundation to build a spiritual life that many of our Brethren have never been given the opportunity to receive. Inform a Brother Master Mason of the enthusiasm that you felt when you received the Ancient Masters Word, that which was lost, "The Long Lost Secret of a Master Mason", available only in the Royal Arch Degree. Companions, inform a brother master Mason today!

I have two personal goals that I have presented while traveling across this great state. The first is to continue with the Ritualistic Excellence of the ritual work that I have observed in the degree conferrals in our Chapter during my travels as a Grand Officer. The other is to stop the loss of Chapters in the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of

We will print dues cards starting March 22, 2005. If you have not recently given us an Update Report so we will have the correct names to print on the cards, please do so immediately or your cards will be printed with the old names on them and you will have no cards for your new members. The cost is changed very slightly since last year, as per the table above. All cards should be shipped to you by April 17. If you do not receive yours, please let us know immediately. Remember to give us any variations desired on the dues cards, e.g. C. Robert Jones instead of Charles R. Jones. Also remember that candidates. for whom you have reported to us the "minor" degrees but no Royal Arch date, will not be picked up by the computer

Annual Returns: By May 21, you should have received your Preliminary Annual Return (that is the listing of all members in good standing and all changes in membership reported to us since May 31, 2004). Included with this will be the needed Annual Return Forms, Election Return Forms, Ritual Receipts and various other year-end forms that you need.

This Preliminary Return is very important to you. It shows what has been reported to us thus far. Entries that need to be added to update the lists to May 31, 2005, must be reported to us by an Update Report Form. Using this information, we can then complete your Return, print the final lists and send you a copy along with a bill for your per capita dues and fees. So please check the preliminary lists carefully.

We have again made out the Cover Sheets of your returns for you based on the 2003 Election Returns you have given us. (The directions for doing this will be repeated with the instructions included with the Return mailing.)

This makes filing your Annual Return a very easy chore if you have followed the directions. It does require your cooperation.

<u>Service Pins:</u> Again, you as Secretary must request the pins before they can be sent. This is so that you can tell us if the member does not live locally. Please check the address of the Companion, and then request the pin, giving us the address if he lives out of your area.

Endowed Memberships: Now is the time to apply for endowed memberships. Please remember the March 31 deadline for getting applications submitted in order to get credit for the 2007 dues. Anything received after March 31 will apply to the 2008 dues (payable June, 2007). **If you need more application forms, ask for them immediately.**

Add 3760 to the common era. Thus: 2002 and 3763 = 5765

<u>Red Cross of Constantine</u> dates from the year of the foundation of the Order after the battle of Saxa Rubra, October 28, 312 A.D., near Rome and the official recognition of the Christian religion by Emperor Constantine, ANNO ORDINIS "in the year of the Order."

There being no nominations from the floor, they were each declared elected to their respective offices and duly installed in proper form.

A proposal to amend section XI of the by-laws, changing the amount of petition fee, was then presented as follows:

Section XI, currently reads: The fee for conferring Order of High Priesthood on any candidate shall be thirty dollars (\$30.00) if the application and full amount of the fee are received by the Recorder not less than ten (10) days before the annual meeting of the Council and thirty-five (\$35.00) if the application and full amount of the fee be received by the Recorder less than ten (10) days before the annual meeting of the Council. The certification, application and full amount of the fee shall be filed with the Recorder before a ballot may be held.

Be amended to read as follows: The fee for conferring Order of High Priesthood on any candidate shall be Forty dollars (\$40.00) if the application and full amount of the fee

are received by the Recorder not less than ten (10) days before the annual meeting of the Council and Fifty (\$50.00) if the application and full amount of the fee be received by the Recorder less than ten (10) days before the annual meeting of the Council. The certification, application and full amount of the fee shall be filed with the Recorder before a ballot may be held.

The amendment was adopted by the Companions.

M. Ex. Comp. Dill introduced our out-of-state visitors. He made a motion to extend honorary memberships to those visiting Grand Officers and guests who were not members of Ohio Council. The motion was seconded and approved by the members.

There being no further business to come before the Council, it was closed in due form at 4:30 P.M.
