STEVE NICOL HEAD COACH

ow in his seventh season at the helm of the Revolution, Steve Nicol is the longest-tenured coach in Major League Soccer, and is regarded as one of the top tacticians and talent evaluators of soccer talent in this country. His 75 career victories entering the 2008 season have eclipsed the combined win total (73) of the previous four head coaches in Revolution club history.

Nicol was named head coach of the team on November 6, 2002, after serving as the interim head coach for the final 21 games of the 2002 regular season and the postseason

In each of his six seasons with the Revolution, Nicol has guided the club to the MLS Eastern Conference Championship game - an MLS record - and has four times led the team to MLS Cup (2002, 2005, 2006 & 2007), including each of the last three championship matches. The Revs are one of just three MLS clubs to return to MLS Cup in back-to-back seasons.

Nicol's hiring marked yet another impressive accomplishment in the Scotland native's distinguished career. During his playing days, Nicol, 45, gained worldwide fame while playing for Liverpool FC in England's top division before moving on to play for Notts County, West Bromwich Albion, Sheffield Wednesday and Doncaster Rovers.

Nicol, who was born in the Scottish town of Troon, began his pro career at the age of 18 with Ayr United before being signed by Liverpool in 1981. The £300,000 transfer fee remains the Ayr United club record.

While with Liverpool, Nicol made 467 appearances as a defender and midfielder and scored 46 goals. He was at the heart of a Liverpool side that won four English League Titles, three F.A. Cup Titles and the 1984 European Cup. In 1989, his importance to the team was honored when Britain's soccer writers named him Footballer of the Year. Between 1984 and 1992 Nicol appeared 27 times for the Scottish National Team, and started for his country at the 1986 World Cup in Mexico.

Nicol's coaching career began in 1995 when he was named player/manager at Notts County. Four years later, he arrived in New England as a player/assistant coach with the Boston Bulldogs. In September of that year, he joined the Revs as interim coach for the final two games of the season, both of which were Revolution wins. He returned to the Bulldogs as a player/coach for the 2000 and 2001 season before re-joining the Revs as an assistant coach prior to the 2002 campaign.

Nicol was named the 2002 MLS Coach of the Year after leading the Revolution to within a goal of the MLS Cup, played before a record crowd at the new Gillette Stadium. In 2003 and 2004, he led the Revs to within an extra time goal

and a penalty kick shootout, respectively, of making the league final again. He coached the Revs to his second MLS Cup final in 2005, after winning the Eastern Conference Championship with New England for a second time. Since 2005, Nicol has guided the Revs back to MLS Cup with two more Eastern Conference Championship titles and helped the team set the MLS record for consecutive appearances in the conference championship with six (2002-present).

Nicol was also honored for his coaching excellence in August 2005, when he was chosen to lead the MLS Select XI against Real Madrid at the Santiago Bernabeau Stadium. In 2007, Nicol added to his coaching honors when he led the 2007 MLS All-Stars to a victory over Scottish giant Celtic FC in the 2007 Sierra Mist All-Star Game. Nicol's lineup, including three Revolution starters, defeated Celtic, 2-0, to extend MLS' winning streak against international competition to three straight since the adoption of the current All-Star Game format.

Nicol holds a USSF "A" coaching license. In addition to his coaching duties, Nicol is also a guest analyst for ESPN International.

Nicol resides in the western suburbs of Boston with his wife, Eleanor. The couple has two adult children, Michael and Katv

PAUL MARINER

ASSISTANT COACH

aul Mariner enters his fifth season as Steve Nicol's top assistant coach in 2007. He has helped lead the Revolution to three straight MLS Eastern Conference Championship games, as well as three consecutive MLS Cup championship game appearances.

Born in Bolton, Lancashire, England, Mariner is remembered by world soccer fans as one of the top center forwards in English football in the late 1970s and early 1980s. He earned 35 international caps playing for his country, and led the England attack in the 1982 FIFA World Cup. He is the coholder for the England National Team record for goal scoring in consecutive games (6).

After starting his professional club career with Plymouth Argyle, Mariner scored 97 goals in eight seasons for Ipswich Town from 1976-84, before playing three seasons with Arsenal FC in London and finishing his English Leagues career with Portsmouth

Mariner's many honors as a player include winning the 1978 FA Cup Final with Ipswich Town – a game in which he was named Man of the Match despite not being the goal scorer – in the classic 1-0 over Arsenal. He was also a key member of the 1981 UEFA Cup-winning Ipswich Town team. He scored for England against France in the 1982 World Cup, and also scored in a qualifying match against Hungary on Nov. 18, 1981, a 1-0 victory at Wembley Stadium that put England through to the 1982 World Cup.

Mariner came to the United States in 1988 to coach the Albany Capitals of the APSL, followed by a stint with the league's San Francisco Bay Blackhawks. Before joining the Revolution, Mariner was an assistant to former Revs forward and current Duke University head men's soccer coach John Kerr, Jr. Mariner has also served as Technical Director for the FC Greater Boston Bolts, one of the top youth soccer clubs in the U.S.

Mariner has worked as a color commentator on BBC North West broadcasts of the English Premier League and as a World Cup analyst on New Zealand television and ESPN International.

Mariner and his wife. Dee. live outside of Boston.



GWYNNE WILLIAMS

GOALKEEPERS COACH

wynne Williams is in his second season as the goal-keepers coach for the New England Revolution. He joined the Revolution coaching staff in February 2007 after 12 seasons on the staff of NCAA Division II soccer powerhouse Lynn University in Boca Raton, Fla.

An NSCAA National Goalkeeping Instructor, Williams is a member of the USSF National Coaching Staff and holds a USSF "A" coaching license.

In 2007, Williams was on the coaching staff that guided the MLS All-Stars to a 2-0 victory over Scottish power Celtic FC at Dick's Sporting Goods Park in Commerce City, Colo., in July. Revs goalkeeper Mat Reis, an MLS All-Star "First XI" selection and All-Star Game starter himself, went on to post 10 shutouts for the third straight season, in addition to three postseason shutouts in the Revs' first three games.

An excellent talent evaluator and instructor, Williams also worked with the Revs' reserve keepers, as Doug Warren posted a 1.00 goals against average in reserve-league action and first-year stopper Brad Knighton had a 1.40 GAA as the pair combined for four shutouts on their way to a second-place finish in the reserve division.

A native of St. Helens, England, Williams has been on the coaching advisory councils of the Canadian Soccer Association and Bermuda Football Association.

Williams earned his certificate of education from Nonington College of Physical Education in 1975, and completed his bachelor of education degree at London University in 1976.





BRIAN BANFILL EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Rian Banfill is in his third season as the equipment manager of the New England Revolution.

Banfill's responsibilities include organizing and maintaining the team's uniforms, practice gear and equipment, and overseeing the gameday equipment staff that assists in both the Revs' and visitors' locker rooms and on the field. He also works closely with the technical staff on setting up and equipping training sessions both at home and on the road.

Banfill was honored for his exemplary work when he was selected to be the equipment manager for the 2007 MLS All-Star Team that defeated Scottish giant Celtic FC in July.

Banfill joined the organization as the Revs' equipment manager on Nov. 28, 2005 after three seasons working with the team's volunteer gameday staff, the Revs Brigade. He contributed in many areas during this time, also working in the popular Soccer Celebration pregame interactive entertainment area before joining the gameday staff where he worked both the home and visitors' locker rooms.

Prior to joining the Revolution, Banfill worked for eight years in the sporting goods retail industry. He is an avid ice hockey fan and participates in adult pick-up games in his spare time.

Banfill lives in central Massachusetts with his wife, Melissa, and their son, Kyle.



SEAN KUPIEC HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

ean Kupiec, A.T.C., P.E.S., is in his first season with the Revolution as the team's head athletic trainer. In addition to being a certified athletic trainer, Kupiec is also recognized as a performance enhancement specialist by the National Academy of Sports Medicine.

Kupiec's responsibilities with the Revs include overseeing and directing all aspects of the team's medical care and players' rehabilitation and sports performance, both in-season and during the off-season.

Prior to joining the Revs, Kupiec spent the 2006 and 2007 NFL seasons with the New England Patriots as the team's athletic training intern, where he worked closely with the Pats athletic training and strength and conditioning staffs to maintain the health and fitness of the record-setting 2007 AFC Champions. With the Pats, he also coordinated the daily responsibilities for the season and training camp interns, com-

piled the team's daily injury and NFL reports, administered the team's IMPACT testing, as well as overseeing several gameday procedures with opposing teams.

Before joining Kraft Sports Group, Kupiec spent two years as a graduate assistant athletic trainer at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, where he worked with the school's wrestling and men's and women's track and field and cross country teams, and assisted with the football team's care. Kupiec also earned his master's in exercise and sports science in 2006 while at UNC.

A native of Utica, N.Y., Kupiec graduated from Springfield College in 2004 and currently lives west of Boston. He enjoys running, golfing and watching movies in his spare time.



WAYNE PENNIMAN

REHABILITATION SPECIALIST

ayne Penniman, P.T., A.T.C., CSCS, is in his second season with the Revolution and in his first in his current position as the team's rehabilitation specialist. In addition to being a certified athletic trainer, Penniman is also a registered physical therapist and certified strength and conditioning specialist and uses that broad-based knowledge to assist Revs players rehabilitate from injuries and surgical procedures. Penniman collaborates with the Revs' medical and athletic training staffs to develop and implement programs that allow Revolution players to return to full fitness as soon as possible. He also works with the medical staff to develop the team's off-season workout plans.

In his first season with the team in 2007, Penniman's work was honored when he was selected to be the athletic trainer for the 2007 MLS All-Star Team, which defeated Celtic FC last July in Colorado.

Penniman came to the Revs from the Bancroft School in Worcester, Mass., where he was the head athletic trainer since 2006, and the Clinton Irish Blizzard of the Eastern Football League, where he has had two stints as the head athletic trainer. Prior to his work at the Bancroft School, Penniman was the Director of Athletic Training Services at Nashoba Valley Medical Center in Ayer, Mass., a staff physical therapist at South County Physical Therapy, and a senior physical therapist at Spaulding Neighborhood Rehabilitation Center in Wellesley, Mass.

In 2007, Penniman completed the requirements for his master's degree in post-professional physical therapy at Oakland University, where he was the head trainer for the men's soccer and baseball teams during the 2002-03 academic year.

Penniman, a native of Maynard, Mass., now lives in the suburbs west of Boston with his wife, Leigh. The couple welcomed their first children - twin boys - during the offseason.

How Acquired: Traded to the Revolution from Los Angeles in exchange for allocation money on Jan. 18, 2008.

One of MLS' top right backs, Albright joins an already strong Revolution defense after earning in-season and postseason laurels for his play out of the back the last few years in Los Angeles ... a complete package with skill, speed and size in the back ... just 29 years old, Albright is in his 10th MLS season and joins his third club after entering the league in 1999 as a Nike Project-40 player out of Virginia ... after missing most of the 2007 season with a torn right hamstring, Albright will look to return to the form that saw him named to the U.S.' squad for the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany ... an experienced champion, he has won MLS Cup championships with three teams (D.C. in 1999, L.A. in 2002 and 2005) and one U.S. Open Cup Championship (L.A. in 2005).

2007: Started the first five games of the season before suffering a torn right hamstring in the 15th minute of the team's fifth match – a 1-1 draw against Chivas USA on May 20. Missed the remainder of the regular season after undergoing reconstructive surgery in late May to repair the injury. Rehabbed the rest of the regular-season, but progressed enough to play minutes in all five of the Galaxy's postseason friendlies.

2006: His second season as the Galaxy's right back saw him named the club's Defender of the Year and earn a spot in Bruce Arena's U.S. team for the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany. Scored two goals and added five assists – his second-high season total – while starting all 23 games he played. Was unavailable from May 10 through June 17 as a result of being in Germany for the World Cup, missing eight games before returning to the lineup on June 24 against Houston.

Started all but one game for L.A. after returning from the World Cup and was named to his third consecutive MLS All-Star Game as the MLS All-Stars defeated EPL juggernaut Chelsea FC, 1-0, in Bridgeview, Ill. Scored his first goal of the season in a 1-1 draw against Chicago on April 8, and netting his second – the go-ahead goal – in a 5-2 victory at D.C. on Aug. 26.

2005: Capped the season by earning MLS Best XI honors after garnering MLS All-Star recognition midseason. In his second season as a true right fullback, recorded one goal and added two assists, helping lead the Galaxy to the domestic double of the MLS Cup championship and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Missed nine games in the middle of the season (May 25-July 9) with a severely sprained right knee. Surpassed the 10,000 career minutes played mark on Sept. 25 in a 2-1 victory over Kansas City. Started all four of the Galaxy's postseason matches, playing all 390 minutes as the Galaxy won MLS Cup 2005 in overtime against the Revolution in Frisco, Texas.

2004: Moved to right back prior to the season after making the transition on the National Team under head coach Bruce Arena, and enjoyed his finest season as a professional to date. Posted a career-high six assists as he adjusted to his new position along the right touchline. Earned his first MLS All-Star appearance, starting for the West All-Stars at RFK Stadium. Recorded his first career multiple-assist game on May 8 when he collected two assists in a 3-1 road victory at Dallas. Registered assists in back-to-back games on May 19

and May 22 at D.C. and San Jose, respectively. For the second time in his career, recorded one goal and one assist in a game, helping L.A. post a 3-2 victory over Chicago at home on June 12.

2003: In his last year as a forward, he played in a career-best 27 games, earning the starting nod in 23 of them. He scored three goals, tying a career-high and added four assists – his best year as a professional to date. Recorded his first-career two-goal game on June 25 at Colorado, notching both of L.A.'s goals in the 2-2 draw. Followed that performance with his first-career multiple point performance in the team's following game, registering one goal and one assist in the team's 3-0 victory against Dallas on June 28. Earned MLS Player of the Week honors for Week 13 for his performances against the Rapids and Burn. Posted single assists at the MetroStars (April 19), at Kansas City (May 24) and against New England (July 4). Appeared in both of the Galaxy's two playoff games, coming on a second-half substitute in both contests.

2002: Traded to the Galaxy with a second-round selection (24th overall) from D.C. in the 2002 MLS SuperDraft on Jan. 11 in exchange for L.A.'s first- and second-round selections in the 2002 MLS SuperDraft and a conditional pick in the 2003 MLS SuperDraft. Appeared in 14 games and made eight starts at forward. Recorded one assist on the season, coming on July 4 in a 2-1 victory against San Jose. Missed 12 games (most of April and May, and the beginning of August) because of injuries. Appeared in five of Los Angeles' six postseason games, starting two, while scoring one goal and adding one assist as the Galaxy won MLS Cup 2002 in Foxborough at Gillette Stadium.



One of America's top defenders, Parkhurst is a rarity: an effective central defender who is also a skillful soccer player .. 2007 was truly a career year for Parkhurst, garnering MLS "Best XI" honors, winning both the MLS Defender of the Year and Fair Play awards and earning his first international caps with the U.S. senior national team ... often wins the ball because of his ability to read the play before it unfolds ... possesses a keen sense of tactical understanding and is a heady defender who plays bigger than his physique ... has remarkable passing touch for a back and possesses deceptive speed ... the 2005 MLS Rookie of the Year and 2006 MLS U.S. Soccer Foundation Humanitarian of the Year, Parkhurst devotes a great deal of time to appearances and community service initiatives ... voted to the 2007 MLS All-Star Game as a "First XI" (top vote-getter) selection, marking his second career All-Star nod ... grew up a fan of the Revs and attended the team's first ever home game at Foxboro Stadium in 1996.

2007: An MLS Best XI honoree and the 2007 MLS Visa Defender of the Year. Also won the 2007 MLS Fair Play Award. Started all 25 games for which he was available. Committed just five fouls during the regular-season and went the full season without being cautioned. Scored his first-career MLS goal – on his first-ever MLS shot – at Toronto on Oct. 20 when he chipped Toronto keeper Kenny Stamatopoulos from behind the midfield line in first-half stoppage time. His goal was one of five finalists for MLS Sierra Mist Goal of the Year. When injuries struck the central midfield, Parkhurst played in the defensive midfield for several games: May 6 vs. Chicago, June 30 at Chivas USA and July 7 vs. Chivas USA. Missed the Revs' first three games with a dislocated left shoulder, suffered during one of the Revs' preseason trips, and also missed two Revs games because of National Team duty. Started and played all 90 minutes in each of the Revs' four postseason games on their way to a third-straight appearance in the MLS Cup title game. Anchored the Revs' defense, which allowed just two goals in the postseason and posted three straight shutouts to begin the playoffs.

Arguably the best right-sided midfielder in MLS history. Ralston possesses great technique, tactical knowledge and determination ... debuted in the central attacking midfield role late in the 2007 season and through the playoffs to great effect ... he has also filled in capably as a left-sided midfielder and right fullback during his five seasons with the Revolution ... the MLS "Iron Man," Ralston holds all three of the league's longevity records - minutes played (29,885), career appearances (337) and career starts (335) entering the 2008 season ... also enters 2008 ranked first in MLS career assists (121) and game-winning assists (33) ... set the U.S. record for professional appearances with his start at MLS Cup 2007, collecting his record 371st professional appearance ... is one of three Revs who have started and played in each of the Revs' four MLS Cup appearances (2002, 2005, 2006 & 2007) ... last year, appeared to play like a man years younger with a renewed vigor and energy and was rewarded with his sixth career MLS All-Star nod ... named team captain prior to the 2007 season.

2006: Netted six goals and added five assists on the season, marking his ninth professional season with five or more goals. Ralston collected all five of his assists in the final 12 games of the regular season, in which the Revs went 6-2-4. Tied for the MLS lead in game-winning assists (4). Scored the game-tying goal in the final minute of stoppage time in the Revs' 1-1 draw at Kansas City on July 29. His go-ahead, turn-around goal at Chicago on July 8 was an at-large nomination for MLS Sierra Mist Goal of the Year. Set up Pat Noonan for the game-winning goal against the Red Bulls on Sept. 9 at Gillette Stadium. Assisted on Khano Smith's 88th-minute game-winning goal against Columbus on Oct. 14 to help the Revs clinch second place in the Eastern Conference. Spent much time during preseason training and early season matches shuttling between the Revolution and U.S. Men's National Team camps and friendlies.

2005: With his start at Columbus on Sept. 21, Ralston made his 100th appearance in a Revolution uniform, his first having come on March 23, 2002 against the MetroStars. He finished the season with 103 starts, enough for fourth all-time in that category for the Revs. His assist on Taylor Twellman's sixthminute goal at the MetroStars on May 21 gave him the Revolution record 36th career assist to surpass Joe-Max Moore (35) as he finished the season with 40 career assists. Was an MLS All-Star selection, his fourth such honor. Started all three of the Revs' playoff contests, scoring one goal and adding two assists. Assisted on Avery John's game-winning goal against Columbus in Game One of the Eastern Conference Semifinals, then converted a penalty kick and assisted on Pat Noonan's 85th-minute, game-tying goal against D.C. in the Eastern Conference Final.

Considered by many to be the top goalkeeper in the league, Reis brings an unmatched presence and intelligence to the position ... positionally sound, brave in traffic and excellent with the ball at his feet, Reis is also a strong organizer and communicator ... serves as the team's captain in Steve Ralston's absence ... a fantastic shot-stopper on penalty kicks, and one of head coach Steve Nicol's first selections to take penalty kicks ... holds every New England career goalkeeping record, including games played in goal (122), games started in goal (121), minutes played in goal (10,937), goals against average (1.28), wins (50), saves (485), shutouts (33) and saves percentage (.724) ... has 30 regular-season shutouts since the start of the 2005 season, more than any other MLS goalkeeper ... enters 2008 having started and played every minute (including overtime if played) in each of the Revs' last 78 MLS matches - regular-season and playoffs - dating back to September 2005, a span of 6,910 minutes ... enters 2008 second on MLS' list of consecutive minutes played (regular-season games only), having played in the team's last 6,300 minutes - shy of Pat Onstad's record 6,648minute stretch (2005-2007) ... is ranked second in MLS career postseason goals against average (0.71) behind former Rev Adin Brown (0.67) ... now has seven career postseason shutouts (six with Revs) ... nominated for 2007 ESPY Award for Best MLS player ... voted to the 2007 MLS All-Star Game as a "First XI" (top vote-getter) selection ... his selection marked his third consecutive All-Star nod.

MLS in shutouts (10) and his 141 saves outpaced the next closest goalkeeper by 33, matching and setting New England records, respectively. One of two players in MLS to play every minute of every game, tying the MLS and Revolution records and setting new personal single-season marks in both categories. His 1.09 GAA was the best among all full-time MLS goalkeepers and established a new Revolution single-season club record. Stopped two of the three penalty-kick attempts against him during the season to further entrench his reputation as the league's best in PK situations. Made five or more saves 15 times during the season, including two games with eight. Went 5-0-2 with an 0.57 GAA in the final seven games of the regular season, leading the Revs now annual charge into the postseason. Started all four postseason games, earning a 2-1-1 record and 0.64 GAA as he led the Revs to MLS Cup 2006 for the second consecutive season. Was voted to Soccer America's 2006 MLS Cup Playoffs Best XI and was the publication's top goalkeeper in MLS for the 2006 season

2005: Reis' second season as the Revs number one goalkeeper was his best yet as a professional. Reis was named to the league All-Star team for the first time in his career and set all-time single-season club marks for wins, saves, shutouts, minutes played in goal and starts in goal. He was also the MLS Select Team's starting goalkeeper for the prestigious Trofeo Santiago Bernabeau match against Real Madrid on Aug. 23. Led MLS in saves with 115, and his 1.13 GAA was tied for second-best in MLS. Ranked second in MLS in wins with 16. His 10 shutouts in 2005 placed him third in MLS in that category. Posted a league-leading 384-minute shutout streak in six matches between April 23 and May 21. On Sept. 10 against Columbus, Reis set a new Revs all-time career mark for wins by a goalkeeper with 22. Also, by playing the full 90 minutes in goal, he took over the top spot for minutes played in goal with 4,817, and also broke the Revs' all-time club mark for saves by tallying his 207th stop. With his start at Colorado on Aug. 20, Reis recorded his 51st start putting him tops for all-time Revs starts in goal. Voted the 2005 U.S. Soccer Revolution Humanitarian of the Year.

2004: Posted a 7-10-7 record with a 1.36 GAA and three shutouts. His 24 appearances and 23 starts were both career highs. 

One of MLS' most lethal scorers ... Twellman remains the league's premier penalty-area predator, combining a diverse arsenal of scoring abilities with fierce determination in front of the goal ... has been on a scoring tear since the tail end of the 2006 season with a total of 22 goals since the start of the 2006 MLS Cup Playoffs (34 games) ... has now reached the 10-goal plateau in five of his six professional seasons and the 15-goal mark four times ... became the youngest player in MLS history to score 75 goals (26 yrs., 221 days) with his game-winning goal at D.C. on Oct. 7, 2006, surpassing Jason Kreis (29 yrs., 168 days) for the record ... is on pace to become the league's youngest 100-goal scorer in 2008 ... in the MLS career records. winning goal in the Revs' 2-1 victory at RFK Stadium. Was one of six MLS players to start all 32 games, and ranked fourth in MLS in minutes played 2,856, setting a new personal single-season best. Was second in MLS in shots (86) and shots on goal (42), while ranking ninth in fouls suffered (60). An MLS All-Star selection, although he was unable to play in the game because of the Revs' rescheduled game at Chivas USA. Twice scored goals in three straight games during the regular season (April 30 vs. Chicago through May 13 vs. Chivas USA and again June 28 vs. Dallas through July 4 at Colorado), and then again in the playoffs. Notched a goal against Chicago in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Semifinal Series to pull the Revs within one goal on aggregate, and after Pat Noonan knotted the series on aggregate later to send the series to a decisive penalty-kick round. After scoring goals in the Revs' final three playoff games, Twellman was named to Soccer America's 2006 MLS Cup Playoffs Best XI. Spent much of preseason training and the early season going back and forth between the Revolution and U.S. National Team camps and friendlies.

2005: Voted MLS Honda MVP and won MLS' Budweiser Golden Boot, while making his second appearance on the end-of-season MLS RadioShack Best XI. An MLS All-Star for the third time in his career, and earned All-Star Game MVP honors after scoring one goal against EPL side Fulham FC. Scored two hat tricks in 2005 - against Dallas on July 16 and against Columbus on Sept. 10 - setting the club record for career three-goal games (3). 


