
#### **Carol Ann Duehr**

**Book Talk** by Ed Starkenburg member of Northwest Iowa Reading Council and Zone A Director



Jennifer Fosberry has written her first children's book, and it's a good one for teachers and parents to know. *My Name is NOT Isabella* is a short picture book which helps introduce children to several women who have made an impact in our world. These change agents include Sally Ride, Annie Oakley, Rosa Parks, Marie Curie, and Elizabeth Blackwell. Do you know what is historically significant about the lives of each of these women?

The storyline of this book is very common to teachers and parents. The main character, Isabella, is pretending to be someone else throughout the day as her mother encourages her to do several tasks that children like to avoid. Mike Litwin's illustrations bring the story alive with a variety of colors and textures.

The book doesn't provide a lot of information on each of the women it highlights. Like many similar books, there are some factual details summarized in the back. But the book can serve to raise questions that will encourage readers to investigate further. How did these individuals impact society? Who else has served to make our lives better and more interesting? There are enough "holes " in the day captured by the book that other heroes can be inserted into the story.

Who do you see as influential in the world today? Which individuals and groups have established our cultural literacy? *My Name is NOT Isabella* can set readers thinking and investigating. Those are pretty good jobs for a story!

# New Zone E Director


Lori Vicker


It's Monday and I'm reading my Every Monday
