Meet the Brennemans

his month we'll get to know Lynn Brenneman and her girls—Crystal and Rachel.

Lynn was born and raised just outside Nashville, Tennessee. She got her Perry County connection through her mom, who married Tom McGowan Sr. of Landisburg. "My parents met while my dad was at auto deisel college in Nashville," Lynn says. "They divorced when I was really young, and we lived with my mom. She remarried when I was around nine. My father also remarried to a woman who had three daughters. My dad and stepmom had another daughter and two sons. When I was around 12, we started spending our summer vacations up here in Perry

County with my grandparents. They influenced my life and my daughters' lives very much; when I was up here I worked in the McGowan General Store. There they taught us the value of money and responsibility. This past October my grandmother passed at 90 years old; she and my grandpap were the pillars of our very extended family. Later on in my adulthood, I met my girls' father, John, while I was working at my aunt's country music bar. We moved to Pennsylvania after John's father developed bone cancer in 1992. My first winter here the snow was over the cars, which was a huge change from a Southern climate. I feel very blessed to have two sets of parents; I have learned from all of them."

It was in the blood

"I remember being in a playpen in the middle of my grand-mother's restaurant, not far from Music Row in Nashville," Lynn says. "After high school I went into the restaurant business myself. I started with waitressing and bartending, but later moved to banqueting which is what I had hoped to be in. I was then banquet manager for several large hotel chains. I spent almost 20 years in the food industry and banqueting business. I feel very fortunate that in my

experience in the banqueting business I got to see and meet lots of music stars, interesting people, and actually served a couple of presidents. When my husband and I moved up here, I worked for the Holiday Inn East on the Carlisle Pike for a year. I had Crystal and decided to be a stay-at-home mom, but I delivered *The Patriot-News* at night for 18 years. Then life circumstances forced me to go back to a full-time job. I went to Empire Beauty School and received my Nail Technician license. I'm now going into my eighth year of owning my own salon along with electrolysis and a massage therapist.

Making memories

"As my children grew up, Fridays through Sundays were always something remembered. John would grill out every Friday night. Sundays were Steelers football. There was always something fun going on at the Brenneman house. The girls were raised in Ickesburg on the mountain between Port Royal and Ickesburg. Being in the middle of nowhere we got to have a lot of family memories. We gardened, hung out in the woods, fished, 4-wheeled, etc."

The journey to Cornerstone

For 20-plus years Lynn didn't attend church regularly. Only when she was very young, and when she went home to

visit her parents in Tennessee, did she attend a Southern Baptist church. "After we had our children, John and I decided we wanted to raise them in a church home," Lynn says. "We attended Centre Presbyterian in Loysville. There I was involved in VBS and I was a Sunday school teacher. Later on in life, my girls, especially Crystal, questioned God for the problems we faced at home and in our family as loved ones died. We neglected church until Crystal's freshman year in high school. Her 'big sister' in field hockey, Natausha Davis, invited her to come out to Cornerstone for Youth Group. Crystal was overjoyed after her first time there and continued to go to Youth Group with the Davises. Not long after that we started attending Sunday services and instantly fell in love with this church. We've been here for two years now. All of us have been deeply affected and thank every friend and every member of the church for that. What keeps us coming is the friends we've made and the powerful services from Pastor Mike and Dan that continue to strengthen our relationships with God. I always leave the church feeling refreshed and renewed. I am a part of the Hospitality Team, and Crystal is part of the Evangelism/Outreach Team and serves in the Nursery as well. Rachel should be taking her place in the church soon. The girls also attend Youth Group. Since the church is continuing to grow, i would like to see even more ways to connect with each other and have fellowship."

The two girls

Lynn's oldst, Crystal, is a junior at West Perry, and keeps quite busy with lots of activities. "I am a member of the Field Hockey team (indoor), the National Honor Society, ACE (architecture, consturction, engineering) Mentor Program, a waitress at West Side Diner in Newport, am an independent sales consultant for Avon, and Class of 2012 treasurer," Crystal says. "My dream when I leave high school is to go to Penn State and major in Architecture and possibly minor in Special Education. There is always a big debate whether I look like my dad or like my mom, but I definitely have my dad's attude and personality."

"My other daughter is Rachel," Lynn says. "She is a freshman at West Perry. Although Crystal and Rachel look alike, they are almost complete opposites. Rachel is very energetic and charasmatic, but she is SO giving. She has such a big heart, but often her high spirits spark you first. She enjoys working with animals—she works with Natalie Knowles and her bunnies, dog sits, and enjoys socializing, and her Middle School counselor said the paparazzi would be following her someday. She always has something to make us laugh, which makes her very personable. She is still deciding on what her future goals may be, but she has

talked about assisting people with self-confidence issues."

Crystals favorite food is creme brulee. Rachel's favorite food is nachos or tacos. Lynn's favorite food is pizza; she even enjoys it cold for breakfast. Both Rachel and Lynn are very picky but there's not many desserts they will say "no" to. Crystal eats just about everything, just like her dad. Crystal is infamous for her success at Youth Group Food Challenges like canned coconut milk, sardines, Big Mac and large fries, and whole can of jalepenos.

A veritable zoo

"Although we don't have any pets now, we have had a deer, a cougar, an alligator, an African Grey parrot, snakes, geckos, iguanas, pirahanna, squirrels, and many different breeds of dogs," Lynn says. "Now Crystal won't stop bugging me for a Teacup Miniature Potbellied Pig."

Change for the better

"I am so thankful that God led us to Cornerstone," Lynn says. "We have a saying in our living room above our mantel that says 'The will of God will never take you where the grace of God will not protect you.' This is very inspirational to me and gives me hope. Over the last few years, as a single mom, I have had many struggles. I am thankful God is here to help me through them. This past year has been a very changing year in my faith and I've learned that patience is key to listening and understanding God's plan for us. In October 2010, I had a major epiphany. I was delivering papers and all of a sudden I felt like all the answers came to me. I feel like my life is changed. In that moment, I realized ultimately that we can get through anything if we believe in Christ."







Even though I grumble and bemoan my fate from day to day and wish my circumstances were not so modest, thank you, Lord, for life.

The purpose of life

An interview with Rick Warren, author of The Purpose Driven Life and pastor of Saddleback Church in California. In the interview by Paul Bradshaw, Rick said:

People ask me, "What is the purpose of life?" And I respond: In a nutshell, life is preparation for eternity. We were made to last forever, and God wants us to be with Him in Heaven. One day my heart is going to stop, and that will be the end of my body—but not the end of me.

I may live 60 to 100 years on earth, but I am going to spend trillions of years in eternity. This is the warm-up act—the dress rehearsal. God wants us to practice on earth what we will do forever in eternity.

We were made by God and for God, and until you figure that out, life isn't going to make sense. Life is a series of problems: Either you are in one now, you're just coming out of one, or you're getting ready to go into another one.

The reason for this is that God is more interested in your character than your comfort. God is more interested in making your life holy than He is in making your life happy. We can be reasonably happy here on earth, but that's not the goal of life. The goal is to grow in character, in Christ likeness.

This past year has been the greatest year of my life but also the toughest, with my wife, Kay, getting cancer. I used to think that life was hills and valleys—you go through a dark time, then you go to the mountaintop, back and forth.

I don't believe that anymore. Rather than life being hills and valleys, I believe that it's kind of like two rails on a railroad track, and at all times you have something good and something bad in your life. No matter how good things are in your life, there is always something bad that needs to be worked on. And no matter how bad things are in your life, there is always something good you can thank God for. You can focus on your purposes, or you can focus on your problems. If you focus on your problems, you're going into self-centeredness," which is my problem, my issues, my pain." But one of the easiest ways to get rid of pain is to get your focus off yourself and onto God and others.

We discovered quickly that in spite of the prayers of hundreds of thousands of people, God was not going to heal Kay or make it easy for her. It has been very difficult for her, and yet God has strengthened her character, given her a ministry of helping other people, given her a testimony, drawn her closer to Him and to people.

You have to learn to deal with both the good and the bad

of life. Actually, sometimes learning to deal with the good is harder. For instance, this past year, all of a sudden, when the book sold 15 million copies, it made me instantly very wealthy. It also brought a lot of notoriety that I had never had to deal with before. I don't think God gives you money or notoriety for your own ego or for you to live a life of ease.

So I began to ask God what He wanted me to do with this money, notoriety and influence. He gave me two different passages that helped me decide what to do, II Corinthians 9 and Psalm 72.

First, in spite of all the money coming in, we would not change our lifestyle one bit. We made no major purchases. Second, about midway through last year, I stopped taking a salary from the church.

Third, we set up foundations to fund an initiative we call The Peace Plan to plant churches, equip leaders, assist the poor, care for the sick, and educate the next generation.

Fourth, I added up all that the church had paid me in the 24 years since I started the church, and I gave it all back. It was liberating to be able to serve God for free.

We need to ask ourselves: "Am I going to live for possessions? Popularity? Am I going to be driven by pressures? Guilt? Bitterness? Materialism? Or am I going to be driven by God's purposes (for my life)?"

When I get up in the morning, I sit on the side of my bed and say, "God, if I don't get anything else done today, I want to know You more and love You better."

God didn't put me on earth just to fulfill a to-do list. He's more interested in what I am than what I do. That's why we're called human beings, not human doings.

Everyone needs to be loved, especially when they do not deserve it.
