There were many milestones achieved in 2015 within our organization but at the forefront are always those smiles and thank you's we receive by helping so many men, women and children with the most basic necessity: food.

However, we are very proud of some of our other accomplishments that are more than just distributing out food. In 2015, we worked with U.S. Senator John Boozman on a bill he proposed that would make federal child nutrition programs more efficient and flexible to reach children during the summer months when school meals are not available. That bill has received overwhelming support and we are hopeful it will soon pass through congress.

We also saw many changes to make our programs and operations more nutritious and efficient. This included construction on a new Repackaging Center that we will use to convert large volumes of food into smaller packages for distribution to hungry Arkansans. Our programs team launched a new initiative that created awareness and better strategies for addressing senior hunger in our communities. A produce project from Feeding America helped us test what our member agencies and the Foodbank will need to distribute even larger quantities of fresh produce in the future.

The Foodbank also received special recognition from Arkansas Times and Arkansas Business as being one of the "Best Charity" nominees in the state. All of this while being able to stretch your dollar even further as we went from four meals per dollar to five meals!

I can tell you that 2016 will be a big year for our organization. As you may have heard, the Arkansas Foodbank and Arkansas Rice Depot are merging in 2016. We are taking the best of both amazing organizations and turning our efforts into one resolve to better serve hungry Arkansans.

I know that with help from individuals like you, we will achieve our goal of increasing capacity and services while also increasing the quality of food provided. As we plan for this time of growth, it is a great reminder that more can be accomplished when you come together. We are excited to see what successes we will have in serving those who need us the most and we are all **United to Fight Hunger!**


WHERE DID THE MEALS GO?

FY2015 was a great year for the Arkansas Foodbank distributing **16,179,680 meals** across our 33-county service area! The Foodbank serves **280,000 people** a year with **68,000 pounds of food** leaving our warehouse everyday. Here is our county breakdown by distribution for 2015.

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PROGRAMS

Arkansas Foodbank is the foundation in the fight against hunger. We find pathways to connect people, resources and food to reach those in need, providing dignity, hope and a brighter future for all Arkansans. The Foodbank relies heavily on our 350 member agencies and the programs we offer to make sure every Arkansan has a place at the table!

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SENIOR SERVICES

With support from the **Walmart Foundation**, the Foodbank continued its work toward sustainable senior services in 2015. We hosted "community conversations" in White and Clark County which were attended by member agencies, government staff, health care workers, service providers and volunteers with an aim to share and leverage resources for seniors facing hunger in those communities. Five graduate students from the **Clinton School of Public Service** led the efforts in White County. In addition, there were sixteen mini-grants awarded to increase member agencies capacity toward seniors as well as a senior focused food drive that spun across six countiesproviding over 5,700 pounds of diet appropriate food to our member agencies.

CAMPUS PANTRIES

In an innovative effort to alleviate hunger and assist higher education institutions around the state, the Arkansas Foodbank sought to build the capacity of colleges to create and operate food pantries on their campuses. In partnership with the **Clinton School of Public Service**, the Foodbank researched best practices for starting and maintaining pantries on college campuses. Four colleges in our services area currently operate pantries on their campus and with the help of the **King Foundation** we are activily working to assist other colleges to open their own pantries.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Kid's Cafe

Afterschool snack and meal programs operate in local nonprofit organizations and churches, and include child-centered activities. More than **6400 children** had afterschool snacks or meals in 2015.



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Summer Feeding provides crucial nutrition while school is not in session. In 2015, the Foodbank sponsored **7 summer feeding sites that served 900 children in areas that needed it the most.**

School Pantries

School pantries help account for the child and their entire family. We currently work with seven school pantries providing nutritious food to **2300 families and more than 5500 children.**

SNAP OUTREACH



In 2015, SNAP Outreach helped increase awareness, access and advocacy for SNAP benefits to the clients we serve. Our program helps those in need determine eligibility, what benefits can be used for, what the requirements are and how and where to sign up. SNAP benefits present an opportunity to diversify the sources of food for hungry Arkansans further helping more people in need. In just a few month after launching the application assistance program, the Foodbank helped submit 689 SNAP applications which is the equivalent of 237,516 meals. SNAP Outreach is a partnership between local agencies and **Arkansas Hunger Relief Alliance** with support from **Feeding America** and **Walmart Foundation**.

SPECIAL EVENTS & VOLUNTEERS

The Arkansas Foodbank hosts four annual fundraisers. In 2015, these signature events raised **\$300,000** to feed hungry Arkansans. That is enough for **1.5 MILLION MEALS**! Furthermore, the Foodbank had over **5,900 VOLUNTEERS** provide **15,978 HOURS** of service!
