Smith has 1,321 rushing yards in 2016 to go along with 15 rushing touchdowns....The Golden Eagles registered 472.1 yards per game during the regular season, ranking No. 25 in the FBS, while allowing just 330.9 yards per game, which ranked No. 18 in the FBS.

NOTING THE HILLTOPPERS: WKU will be looking to win a bowl game for the third consecutive season...The Hilltoppers are just the second school to win back-to-back C-USA Championship Games and WKU is one of eight FBS programs to win 10 or more games each of the past two seasons....For the first time in FBS history, the Hilltoppers have produced a 4,000-yard career receiver (Taywan Taylor, 4,090 yards), a 3,000-yard receiver (Nicholas Norris, 3,026 yards) and a 3,000-yard rusher (Anthony Wales, 3,097 yards)....The Hilltoppers rank No. 2 nationally in scoring offense (45.1), No. 5 in passing offense (336.8), and No. 7 in total offense (517.4)....WKU's defense leads C-USA in scoring defense (24.1) and rush defense (99.1, fourth-best mark in the FBS).

Marshall won the inaugural Boca Raton Bowl in 2014, defeating MAC Champion Northern Illinois, 52-23....The game is played on the campus of Florida Atlantic and the six-year old FAU Stadium is located just 1.5 miles from the Atlantic Ocean.

NOTING THE MONARCHS: Old Dominion is going to its first bowl game in just its second season that the program is fully eligible....Junior RB Ray Lawry has 12 touchdowns (11 rushing) this season and is now the school's all-time leader in TDs with 40....Lawry (1,122 yards) combines with Jeremy Cox (685 yards, 13 TDs) to give ODU the top-ranked rushing offense in C-USA (199.1 yards per game)....Senior QB David Washington has the top TD: INT ratio in C-USA at 7-1, throwing 28 touchdown passes with just four interceptions. He has at least two TD passes in each of his last six games....ODU leads C-USA and ranks fourth nationally in turnover margin at +13 (22 gained, nine lost).

NOTING THE EAGLES: This marks the first bowl game for Eastern Michigan in 28 years, ending the third-longest bowl drought in the FBS. The Eagles only other bowl was a win over San Jose State in the California Bowl in Fresno in 1987....Junior QB Brogan Roback made nine appearances this season (six starts) and finished the regular season with 193 completions for 2,394 yards and 16 touchdowns. He has five 300-plus yard games and a season-high of 468 yards....Defensively, the Eagles have forced 23 turnovers, 20th in the nation. Sophomore LB Kyle Rachwal led EMU in tackles with 101 stops, while senior DL Pat O'Connor, the school's all-time leader in sacks, had eight this season.

GAME NOTES: Conference USA will be a part of the third annual Popeyes Bahamas Bowl. The winners of the first two games (WKU and Western Michigan) went on to rank in the top 25 the next season....This was the first post-season FBS bowl game outside of either the United States or Canada between two U.S. teams since the Jan. 1, 1937 Bacardi Bowl in Havana, Cuba.

WKU WINS C-USA FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Anthony Wales rushed for 209 yards and four touchdowns, Mike White threw for 421 yards and three more scores and WKU defeated Louisiana Tech, 58-44, in the Dynacraft Conference USA Championship Game.

The Hilltoppers (10-3) and Bulldogs (8-5), who won the regular-season matchup 55-52 on Oct. 6, combined for 1,163 yards of total offense in the highest scoring championship game, not only in C-USA history, but of any FBS Conference championship game. It is the second straight title for WKU, which becomes just the second C-USA school to win back-to-back championship games. Both the Hilltoppers and LA Tech are headed to bowl games for the third year in a row, with bowl announcements set for Sunday afternoon.

Wales was named the game's MVP after setting a new C-USA Championship record with five total touchdowns. He finished with 262 yards of total offense, catching five passes for 53 yards in addition to his work on the ground.

"I thought it was one heck of a football game and what championship games should be about," said WKU head coach Jeff Brohm. There was a lot of high scoring going back and forth with plays being made. We were fortunate enough to make more in the end and found a way to win."

White was 21-of-31 for 421 yards, with Taywan Taylor grabbing seven passes for 194 yards and two touchdowns.

For LA Tech, Higgins was 35-of-57 passing for 502 yards and three touchdowns, while Henderson caught nine passes for 202 receiving yards and a touchdown. Trent Taylor added 108 receiving yards of his own, while Kam McKnight saw the end zone twice, once through the air and another on the ground.

CHAMPIONSHIP NOTES

**WKU became just the second school to win the Conference USA Championship Game in back-to-back seasons (East Carolina in 2008 and 2009). The Hilltoppers join ECU and Southern Miss (1996 and 1997) as the only schools to be crowned league champion in consecutive seasons.

**WKU senior RB Anthony Wales was named Most Valuable Player. He ran 36 times for 179 yards and four touchdowns, while catching five passes for 53 yards and another score.

WKU RB Anthony Wales broke the C-USA Championship record for total touchdowns with five and tied the record for rushing touchdowns with four (both set by UCF RB Kevin Smith in 2007 vs. Tulsa).

**With a combined 102 points, this becomes the highest-scoring conference championship game all-time for ANY FBS conference. The previous record was 101, set in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game (Wisconsin 70, Nebraska 31) and matched in the 2013 SEC Championship Game (Auburn 59, Missouri 42). The previous Conference USA record was 77 (Southern Miss 49, Houston 28 in 2011).

WKU scored at least 10 points in each quarter and Louisiana Tech scored 10 or more in all but the fourth quarter.

The 41 combined points made it the highest scoring first quarter in C-USA Championship history. The previous high was 24 points (East Carolina 14, Tulsa 10 in 2008). The 65 combined points made it the highest scoring half in C-USA Championship history. The previous high was 58 points (Tulsa 31, UCF 27 in 2005).

The 48-yard interception return for a touchdown by Louisiana Tech's L'Jarius Sneed in the first quarter was just the second INT for a TD in C-USA Championship Game history (East Carolina's Travis Simmons vs. Tulsa in 2008).

C-USA BOWL LINEUP

Conference USA will be sending a record seven teams to play in bowl games this holiday season. Back-to-back Champion WKU leads the seven squads, joined in the postseason by West Division Champion Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, Old Dominion, North Texas, Southern Miss and UTSA.

WKU enters postseason play on seven-game winning streak when it represents C-USA in the Boca Raton Bowl. The Hilltoppers will face American Athletic Conference foe Memphis in the game, which kicks off at 7 p.m. EST/6 p.m. CST on ESPN. This will be the third straight bowl appearance for a WKU program that has been bowl-eligible six straight seasons after moving to the FBS level in 2007. The Hilltoppers are 11-2 on the season, making them one of eight FBS programs to win 10 or more games each of the past two seasons.

Louisiana Tech will be in a bowl for the third straight season for the first time in school history when it participates in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl on Friday, Dec. 23 (4:30 p.m. EST/3:30 p.m. CST on ESPN). The Bulldogs will face AAC member Navy in the game, the third all-time meeting between the schools.

Middle Tennessee will participate in the Hawai'i Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 24, marking the sixth bowl game of the FBS era for the Blue Raiders. Middle Tennessee will play Hawai'i of the Mountain West Conference for the first time since 1993 at 8 p.m. EST/7 p.m. CST from Aloha Stadium in Honolulu. The game will air nationally on ESPN.

North Texas will return to postseason play for the first time since 2013 when it faces Army in the Heart of Dallas Bowl on Tuesday, Dec. 27 (12 p.m. EST/11 a.m. CST on ESPN). It will be a rare bowl game rematch, as the Mean Green defeated the Black Knights, 35-18, on October 22 in West Point, New York.

Old Dominion will participate in the third annual Popeyes Bahamas Bowl on Friday, Dec. 23, marking the first bowl appearance for the Monarchs in just their second season of being fully-eligible. ODU will play Eastern Michigan of the Mid-American Conference team for the third consecutive season, having won the first two meetings. Kickoff is Noon EST/11 a.m. CST from Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium in Nassau and the game will be televised by ESPN.

Southern Miss will be making a second straight bowl

trip when it plays in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl. The Golden Eagles will be making their 24th all-time bowl appearance (most among C-USA schools) and will face Louisiana-Lafayette in the game. This will be the 52nd time these schools have met, with Southern Miss owning a 39-11-1 lead in the series, which dates back to 1923.

UTSA will play in the postseason in its sixth year of football and fifth year in the FBS, matching South Alabama (2014) and Georgia State (2015) for the earliest a program has played in a bowl. The Road-runners will make their postseason debut in the Gildan New Mexico Bowl against a New Mexico team that tied for first place in the Mountain Division of the Mountain West Conference. This game is the first of the bowl season, with kickoff in Albuquerque is set for 1 p.m. CST/12 p.m. MST and ESPN televising the contest.

C-USA posted a .600 winning percentage during the 2015-16 bowl season, trailing only the SEC (.800) for the best winning percentage among all leagues. C-USA is 18-8 over the past five years in bowl games.

MR. JONES AND ME

UTEP senior RB **Aaron Jones**, a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award, topped 200 yards for the third time this season and fifth time in his career with a career-best 301 yards in a 52-17 win over North Texas Saturday. Jones is the school's all-time leading rusher with 4,114 yards. Jones is now ranked seventh in Conference USA history. He leads C-USA and ranks third nationally with 147.78 yards per game this season and has run for 17 TDs (seventh in the FBS).

ODU AND UTSA IN BOWLS

Old Dominion and UTSA will both be making their first bowl appearance this season, making them two of the youngest programs in the FBS history to play in a bowl game. UTSA will play in the postseason in its sixth year of football and fifth year in the FBS, matching South Alabama (2014) and Georgia State (2015) for the earliest a program has played in a bowl. Old Dominion will be playing in a bowl game in its eighth season as a program and its second year of full eligibility at the FBS level.

ODU TO BAHAMAS BOWL

Old Dominion will play the first bowl game in school history in the third annual Popeyes Bahamas Bowl against Eastern Michigan. The game will be played in Nassau, Bahamas on Friday, Dec. 23 and will air at 1 p.m. EST/Noon CST on ESPN.

TAYLOR MADE I

Louisiana Tech senior WR **Trent Taylor** caught 11 passes in the C-USA Championship game, his seventh game this season with 10 or more grabs. He enters the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl with a C-USA single-season record 124 receptions, shattering the old record of 114, set by East Carolina's Justin Hardy in 2013. Taylor became just the fourth Bulldog in school history to record two 1,000-yard seasons in a career by totaling 1,570 yards and 10 touchdown receptions this season. Taylor holds the Louisiana Tech program record with 315 career receptions.

TAYLOR MADE II

WKU senior WR **Taywan Taylor** leads Conference USA and ranks second nationally with 1,586 receiving yards. He has topped the 100-yard mark in eight games this season, giving him 17 outings with 100+yards in his last 29 games. He has 89 receptions and 17 touchdowns on this season, Taylor owns every season and career receiving record in WKU history

IT MATHERS MOST

Middle Tennessee senior RB **I'Tavious Mathers** is the seventh player in FBS history to have 1,500 rushing yards and more than 500 receiving yards in a season. He joins Ryan Benjamin, Pacific (1991), Brian Calhoun, Wisconsin (2005), Dri Archer, Kent St. (2012), Kerwynn Williams, Utah St., (2012), Jay Ajayi, Boise St. (2014) and Christian McCaffrey, Stanford (2015) in accomplishing this feat. Mathers is second in C-USA in rushing with 1,504 yards and has 589 receiving yards to go along with 19 total touchdowns.

WKU'S LAMP AN ALL-AMERICAN

WKU senior OL **Forrest Lamp** was named a second team All-American by USA Today. He becomes the first C-USA OL to win All-American honors since 2011. According to Pro Football Focus, Lamp ranks third at the offensive tackle position, earning an 86.3 overall rating with only three pressures allowed in his 12 starts this season.

LA TECH'S REED EARNS FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

Louisiana Tech OL **Ethan Reed** has been selected to the 2016 USA TODAY Sports Freshman All-America team. As a redshirt freshman, Reed earned a starting role for the Bulldogs in fall camp and started every game this season at right guard. He helped lead a unit that ranks third nationally in tackles for loss allowed (3.69/g). Reed helps pave the way for an offense that ranks fifth nationally in scoring (44.0 ppg) and eighth in total offense (516.1).

C-USA EXTRA POINTS

CHARLOTTE 49ERS

Charlotte concluded the 2016 season with a 33-14 loss at UTSA to finish 4-8 overall, 3-5 in C-USA play. The four victories double the win total of 2015, the 49ers' first at the FBS level. Six of Charlotte's eight league games were either wins (3) or one-possession losses (3). Senior WR **Austin Duke** finished with 115 yards and a TD in his final game. Duke established the school career record with 3,437 career receiving yards. Senior RB **Kalif Phillips** finished with the 49ers career record of 4,020 rushing yards. Sophomore QB **Hasaan Klugh** finished his first year with the 49ers connecting on 120-of-224 passes for 1,356 yards (123.3 per game) and 10 TDs, while ranking third on the team with 426 yards rushing.

FIU PANTHERS

FIU closed out the season with a 42-28 loss at Old Dominion. Senior TE **Jonnu Smith** had two catches for 50 yards and a TD, while becoming the fifth player in FIU history to amass 2,000 or more career receiving yards (2,001). Smith caught a pass in his 43rd consecutive game, one shy of the FIU record. Smith caught a pass in every game he played during his career. Senior RB **Alex Gardner** picked up 53 yards and finished with an FIU career-record 2,221 rushing yards. Junior LB **Anthony Wint** posted his sixth double-digit tackle game (10) and posted 108 stops on the season, second to junior LB **Treyvon Williams** (109).

FLORIDA ATLANTIC OWLS

Florida Atlantic scored 56 points, but it was not enough as the Owls lost the highest scoring regulation game in C-USA history, 77-56 at Middle Tennessee. Freshman RB **Devin Singletary** gained 235 yards on the ground, second all-time in the FAU record book to his 257 gained three weeks ago vs. Rice. He had three touchdowns, finishing with 12 on the season, just one shy of senior RB **Greg Howell's** record of 13 (those are the two highest tallies in program history). Singletary finished with 1,021 rushing yards on the season, marking the fourth time an FAU back has achieved that milestone. Senior DE **Trey Hendrickson** closed his career as the school's all-time sack leader with 29.5 (seventh in C-USA history).

MARSHALL THUNDERING HERD

The Herd closed out its season with a 60-6 loss to WKU. Freshman QB **Grant Morrell** made his second career start in place of injured sophomore **Chase Litton** and was 19-of-35 passing for 143 yards and one touchdown. Junior TE **Ryan Yurachek** caught the TD pass, extending his streak of consecutive games with a reception to 29. Junior CB **Rodney Allen** led Marshall with 11 tackles, while senior S **Corey Neely** added nine tackles to finish as the season leader in that category with 79.

MIDDLE TENNESSEE BLUE RAIDERS

Middle Tennessee will face Hawai'i in the Hawai'i Bowl on Dec. 24. The Blue Raiders broke single-game records with 77 points, 757 total offensive yards and nine rushing touchdowns in a 77-56 win over Florida Atlantic, the highest scoring regulation game in C-USA history. Redshirt freshman QB **John Urzua** was injured early, so Middle Tennessee turned to the run game, totaling a C-USA-record 495 yards on the ground. Sophomore WR **Richie James** ran for 207 yards on 22 carries and added four total TDs (three rushing, one receiving). Senior RB **Tavious Mathers** had 213 rushing yards and three scores on 18 attempts. Mathers is the seventh player in FBS history to run for 1,500 yards (1,504) and catch passes for more than 500 yards (589).

OLD DOMINION MONARCHS

The Monarchs finished the regular season on a five-game winning streak and tied for first place in the East Division with a 7-1 league record. Old Dominion will make its first bowl appearance on Dec. 23 when it plays Eastern Michigan in the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl. Junior RB **Ray Lawry** has posted six 100-yard games this season and has rushed for 1,122 total yards. He has run for 11 touchdowns this season and became the school's all-time TD leader with 40. Senior WR **Zach Paschal** had eight catches for 101 yards and a TD vs. FIU in the regular season finale, passing Antonio Vaughan for the most career receptions in school history with 231. Senior QB **David Washington** threw two more TD passes vs. FIU to give him 28 on the season with just four interceptions.

WKU HILLTOPPERS

WKU became the second school to win back-to-back C-USA Championship games and will face Memphis in the Boca Raton Bowl on Dec. 20. The Hilltoppers have now won 20 of their last 21 games vs. C-USA opponents. Senior RB **Anthony Wales** set a C-USA Championship record with five touchdowns (four rushing), extending his WKU single-season rushing score record to 24 (second-most in the FBS). Senior WR **Taywan Taylor** caught a TD pass for the ninth straight game. The school's all-time leading receiver has 89 receptions for a C-USA-leading 1,586 yards (fifth nationally) and 16 touchdowns (tied for fourth in the FBS) in 2016. Senior QB **Mike White**, the C-USA Newcomer of the Year, has six games with three or more TD passes this season and 34 total. Over his last nine games, he's 184 for 262 (70.2%) and averaging 324 yards with a 28:3 TD:INT ratio.

LOUISIANA TECH BULLDOGS

Louisiana Tech won the West Division title and will play Navy in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, the third straight bowl trip for the Bulldogs (a first in school history). Senior WR **Trent Taylor** has a C-USA-record 10 games with 100 or more yards this season. He also broken the league record for receptions and enters the bowl game with 124 catches this season. Senior QB **Ryan Higgins** now has 37 passing TDs, which is the second-most in program history. He also has 4,208 passing yards, which is also second in school history. Junior WR **Carlos Henderson** has 21 touchdowns this year (17 receiving, two rushing, two kickoff returns), the fourth-most among FBS players. Sophomore DL **Jaylon Ferguson** leads Conference USA in sacks (14.5) and tackles for loss (16).

NORTH TEXAS MEAN GREEN

The Mean Green will be making their first bowl appearance since 2013 when they face Army in the Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowl on Dec. 27. The game will be a rematch from the Oct. 22 battle in which North Texas posted a 35-18 win at West Point, New York. North Texas finished with a four-game improvement in the first year under head coach **Seth Littrell**. Despite missing two full games and parents of two others with an injury, junior RB **Jeffery Wilson** leads the team with 855 rushing yards and 13 touchdowns. Junior RB **Willy Ivery** has totaled eight touchdowns on the season; six on the ground and another two receiving. The Mean Green are third in C-USA in pass defense and three of the four starters in their secondary were named C-USA Defensive Player of the week this season. Junior K **Trevor Moore** has now made 95 consecutive extra points, extending his own school record after going three-for-three at UTEP.

RICE OWLS

The Owls closed out the season with a 41-17 loss at Stanford. Senior RB **Jowan Davis** scored a pair of touchdowns and rushed 10 times for 49 yards. He closed his career with 2,028 rushing yards, moving into a tie for eighth-place on the school's career rushing list. Sophomore RB **Samuel Stewart** ran for 77 yards on 13 carries. Junior LB **Emmanuel Ellerbee**, a first team All-C-USA selection, posted his seventh double-digit tackle game of the season with 14 stops. He finishes as the regular season leader in C-USA with 118 tackles.

SOUTHERN MISS GOLDEN EAGLES

The Golden Eagles became bowl-eligible with a 39-24 win over West Division Champion Louisiana Tech. Southern Miss has been bowl-eligible in 20 of the past 23 years. Senior QB **Nick Mullens** threw for 342 yards and three touchdowns and ran for another in his final home game. Mullens, who sat out the last two games because of a concussion after having a 25-game starting streak end, became the Eagles' all-time touchdown passing leader with 86, passing Austin Davis (2008-11). Senior WR **D.J. Thompson** caught a season-high 12 passes for 135 yards with two scores. The 12 catches tied the M.M. Roberts Stadium record. Senior RB **Ito Smith** had his seventh 100-yard rushing game this season with 127 yards on 24 carries, while adding 63 yards on four receptions. Junior DB **Picasso Nelson, Jr.** became the second Golden Eagle this year to record two interceptions in a game and he had a game-high nine tackles. The eight rushing yards allowed marked the lowest vs. an FBS team since holding LA Tech to negative-2 in last year's meeting.

UTEP MINERS

The Miners closed out the 2016 season with a 52-24 defeat of North Texas. UTEP registered a season-high 555 yards of total offense, the most in the **Sean Kugler** era, and the 52 points were the most scored since the final game of the 2009 season. Junior RB **Aaron Jones** ran for a career best 301 yards, the second-best total in school history, fourth-best in the FBS this season and sixth-most in C-USA history. He also had a career-high four touchdowns, including a season-long 83-yard score in the first quarter. Jones finished the season with the single-season school-record 1,773 rushing yards and 20 touchdowns. Sophomore QB **Ryan Metz** threw a pair of TD passes, giving him 14 on the season, most by a Miners QB since Trevor Vittatoe tossed 22 in 2010. Senior TE **Hayden Plinke** caught his eighth TD, most ever by a UTEP tight end.

UTSA ROADRUNNERS

UTSA became bowl eligible for the first time in the program's six-year history with a 33-14 victory against Charlotte. The Roadrunners will face New Mexico in the Gildan New Mexico Bowl on Dec. 17. Junior QB **Dalton Sturm** threw 18 touchdown passes with just five interceptions this season. Junior WR **Kerry Thomas, Jr.**, set a program record with 145 receiving yards on five catches vs. Charlotte, including a 73-yard TD on the third play from scrimmage. Sophomore RB **Jalen Rhodes'** two-yard rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter was his ninth of the season, which is a new UTSA single-season record. Junior DL **La'Kel Bass** recorded one tackle for loss to push his season total to 11 and tie UTSA's single-season record. C-USA Freshman of the Year LB **Josiah Tauaefa** led the Roadrunners with 104 tackles this season, which marks the first 100-stop campaign in program history.

C-USA BOWL SYNOPSIS

Conference USA has secured guaranteed commitments with six bowl partners for the 2016 season, as well as one secondary agreement: the Gildan New Mexico, Hawai'i, Boca Raton, Popeyes Bahamas, R+L Carriers New Orleans and Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowls are primary agreements. The Camping World Independence Bowl in Shreveport, Louisiana, is a secondary agreement, should the ACC or SEC not be able to provide a bowl-eligible team. There is no set selection order among C-USA's bowl partners.

C-USA and the College Football Playoff

As a member of the College Football Playoff, Conference USA will be a part of one of the College Football Playoff bowls if it has the highest rated champion from among the American, C-USA, Mid-American, Mountain West and Sun Belt Conferences.

The Playoff

During the 2014-15 season, college football entered a new era when postseason playoffs began. The format is simple: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

The Selection Committee

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that No. 1 will play No. 4 in one semifinal and No. 2 will meet No. 3 in the other, with the two winners advancing to the national championship game.

The Rotation

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

For the 2016-17 season, the Peach Bowl (Dec. 31), Fiesta Bowl (Dec. 31), Rose Bowl presented by Northwestern Mutual (Jan. 1) and Allstate Sugar Bowl (Jan. 1) will host its regular bowl games, while the Capital One Orange (Dec. 31) and Goodyear Cotton Bowl (Dec. 31) will host semifinals. The College Football Championship will be held on Monday, Jan. 11 in Glendale, Arizona.

GILDAN NEW MEXICO BOWL

Conference USA will enter its third year as a primary partner with the Gildan New Mexico Bowl and is scheduled to send a team to Albuquerque each season between 2016 and 2019. C-USA will face a representative from the Mountain West Conference each season at University Stadium on the campus of the University of New Mexico...C-USA has participated in the New Mexico Bowl twice before, as UTEP met its former conference rival BYU in 2010, and the Miners met Utah State in 2014...This year's game will mark the 11th in the bowl's history, which produced two of the highest scoring and most exciting comeback finishes among all bowl games in 2012 and 2013...This bowl will once again be played on the opening day of the bowl season, which it has nearly each time during its existence.

UAB FOOTBALL BACK IN 2017

The UAB Football team returns to action September 2, 2017, when the Blazers host Alabama A&M at Legion Field. Under the direction of head coach Bill Clark, UAB will practice during the 2016 campaign in anticipation for its return to the field in 2017.

On June 17, 2016, the University of Alabama Board of Trustees approved the final stages of UAB's proposed Football Operations Center. The Blazers begin construction on a \$22 million practice facility this August, which includes an open-air pavilion covering the turf practice field, making UAB a pioneer in this architectural design. Included in this was a \$4.2 million sponsorship and naming agreement with Legacy Credit Union – the largest of its kind in UAB Athletics history. The Blazers anticipate the Football Operations Center and Legacy Pavilion to be completed by the start of the 2017 season.

Clark will lead the Blazers onto the field in 2017 just as he did in his first year as head coach of UAB in 2014. Clark inherited a team that was 2-10 and turned them into a team that won six games and earned bowl eligibility for the first time in a decade.

The Blazers also proved that they will be competitive from the moment they step onto the field as Clark signed the league's No. 2 recruiting class in 2016.

FIVE C-USA PLAYERS EARN ALL-DISTRICT ACADEMIC HONORS

Five Conference USA student-athletes were named CoSIDA Academic All-District, the College Sports Information Director's of America (CoSIDA) has announced. Charlotte senior QB **Lee McNeill**, Old Dominion senior OL **Tyler Compton** and junior DL **Bunmi Rotimi** are joined by Southern Miss senior OL **Cameron Tom** and junior DB **Picasso Nelson, Jr.**, on the list of honorees. All First Team Academic All-District honorees will advance to the CoSIDA Academic All-America® Team ballots, where first-, second- and third-team All-America selections take place.

C-USA HAS SEVEN CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALISTS

Recognizing the top scholar-athletes in college football, the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame announced the semifinalists for the 2016 William V. Campbell Trophy. C-USA is represented by seven outstanding student-athletes. Five of the seven were members of the 2015 C-USA All-Academic team: Florida Atlantic senior OL **Dillon DeBoer**, Old Dominion senior OL **Tyler Compton**, Rice senior RB **Darik Dillard**, Southern Miss senior OL **Cameron Tom** and WKU senior DB **Marcus Ward**. Marshall senior TE **Emanuel Byrd** and North Texas senior LB **Fred Scott** were also named to the list of semifinalists.

HENDERSON NAMED NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Louisiana Tech junior WR **Carlos Henderson** was named National Player of the Week on Oct. 16 by the Walter Camp Football Foundation and CBS Sports following his performance in a 56-26 win at Massachusetts. Henderson caught 12 passes for 326 yards and five TDs. The 326 yards are the second-most in both LA Tech and C-USA history, while the five TD catches tie the school and conference records.



2016 C-USA FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Conference USA hosted its 12th football championship game in 2016 as WKU defeated Louisiana Tech, 58-44, in the highest scoring conference championship game any FBS league has ever had.

WKU became the first school to host the game in back-to-back season. Seven different schools have hosted the first 12 championship games.

WKU won its first Conference USA Football Championship in 2015 with a 45-28 win over Southern Miss in Bowling Green, Ky., becoming the first league school to go undefeated in league play and then win the Championship Game. Marshall took its first C-USA title in 2014 with a triumph over Louisiana Tech in Huntington, W. Va. In 2013, Rice won its first C-USA Football title with a victory over Marshall at Rice Stadium. Southern Miss won the 2011 C-USA Championship, when the nationally-ranked Golden Eagles defeated previously undefeated Houston on the Cougars home field. Former members East Carolina, Tulsa and UCF each won two championship games, while Houston claimed one crown.
