Be committed to protecting the fragile story of the child's history. They have been placed in Foster or Adoptive Care for sensitive reasons. Real support, care, and love can be provided to a Foster or Adoptive Family without knowing all the specific details of a child's past. Allow for the future dignity and honor of this child to be protected.

physical needs, Connecting Principles for attachment needs,
and Correcting Principles to disarm fear-based behaviors. While

# Respite Care

Respite is a request by the foster child's current foster family to have a break. Respite care allows for the foster children to be placed with another caregiver for a short period of time – not to exceed 72 hours per session. Take action by one of two routes: 1) Work specifically with the social worker of your identified family. 2) Work directly with Stanislaus County to become a certified respite home.

#### Start a Support Group

Start a support group with the people you are getting connected with during this class. It can be specific to Foster Care or Adoption, or parenting in general, and can include Foster and Adoptive Families as well as Support Families.

# Become a Mentor or Foster/Adopted Grandparent

Becoming a mentor or tutor for a child in foster care is a great way to make the difference of a lifetime for children in need of permanency. Recommendation: identify a family with a school-aged child, and begin working with the family to create a friendship leading towards mentorship. All kids need godly mentors.

Become a Court Appointed Special Advocate

the courts to mentor youth & support them in court to help

Become a "Safe Family for Children" or a Supporter "Safe Families for Children" are volunteer homes that take children in while parents get back on their feet. This is an intervention before the children are placed into state care. Become a Safe Family or support the program. Safe-Families.org



Become an Adoption Friendly Workplace

# Provide Pro Bono Therapy Services

Are you a qualified therapist? Our counseling department can work to connect therapists with foster youth for weekly, pro-bono therapy for as long as it takes.

# Provide Pro Bono Legal Services

As a lawyer, you can make a different in a child's life by volunteering as a pro bono attorney. We recommend connecting directly with a local Foster or Adoption agency.

# Foster Youth Internships

Work with your company to create an internship role or an internship program for foster youth. Remember foster youth don't have parental support, so PAID internships with an IDENTIFIED MENTOR within the organization are ideal!

#### Stanislaus County Respite

Two Current Stanislaus County Foster Care System Goals depend on Respite:

- 1) *Mockingbird model*, one core family, with other families that support through respite
- Large sibling groups, one core family, with other families that support through respite

#### Olivianna's Closet

The purpose of Olivianna's Closet is to provide assistance to any qualifying parent or guardian of infants and toddlers through bi-monthly appointments. We gather gently used items and newly purchased items to distribute to those in need. We also support other local community organizations that would benefit from our storehouse of resources.

# Gently Used Items:

Blanket, Sleepers, Onesies, Apparel, Socks/Booties, Burp Cloths

#### Newly Purchased Items:

Diapers, Baby Wipes, Lotion and Bath Products, Socks, Bibs, Bottles, Teethers and Pacifiers

Sizes: up to size 5T

PLEASE NOTE: We are accepting donations of strollers, walkers, high chairs, cribs, pack n plays, toys and books. We cannot accept car seats and drop side cribs.

#### Drop off location at Big Valley Grace Community Church

There is a permanent accessible drop-off site for donations. Look for the white crib with the Olivianna's Closet signs in the hallway next to the infant check-in area.

#### Comfort Kits

Many children enter foster care with just the clothes they are wearing or a few belongings in a garbage bag. Please create a Comfort Kit for a child who has just been uprooted from his/her family.
