Lessons from the Global Church Room 4201

Flannery O'Connor: Crossing the Divide Room 4205

Start with the Spirit: the Unifying Power of Prayer Room 4108



Main Session Speakers

Rev. Harvey Drake



Harvey Drake is pastor of Emerald City Bible Fellowship, a vibrant multi-racial congregation in Seattle, Washington, committed to making the gospel relevant to every facet of a person's life. He is also Founder and President of Urban Impact, a thriving community-based organization that is proactively addressing the total needs of families in Seattle's Rainier Valley.

Ordained in 1979, Drake has worked extensively with youth serving as Area Director for both Youth for Christ in Oakland, CA and Young Life in Seattle, WA. Since 1987. Drake has been devoted to addressing urban and inner-city issues through Urban

Impact. Drake's activities include participation on a number of national and local boards. He is also involved in various community affairs, believing that effective development necessitates our presence and involvement. Drake is a champion of Biblical justice and racial reconciliation.

Drake is a frequent speaker for conferences, churches and community events. His greatest honor comes from being married to Andrea Drake, Ed.D, since 1977. Harvey and Andrea have two adult sons and three grandchildren.

Rev. Dr. Mark Labberton



Mark Labberton, currently serves as president of Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, Ca. and host of the podcast *Conversing* which interviews national leaders about the role of faith in their work. He was ordained in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and began what was to become three decades of pastoral ministry —along the way meeting and marrying his life partner, Janet Morrison Labberton.

Labberton served for 16 years as senior pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Berkeley, California, when he joined



Fuller's faculty, in 2009, as Lloyd John Ogilvie Associate Professor of Preaching and director of the newly established Lloyd John Ogilvie Institute of Preaching. In early 2013 he received the call to the presidency, succeeding Richard J. Mouw on his retirement, and on July 1, 2013, stepped into service as Fuller Seminary's fifth president.

In 1982 he cofounded the Christian International Scholarship Foundation (CISF) to help fund the advanced theological education of those Majority World leaders, and served on the CISF board for 17 years. He has also been chair of John Stott Ministries (which provides books, scholarships, and seminars for Majority World pastors), co-chair of the John Stott Ministries Global Initiative Fund, and senior fellow of the International Justice Mission. Labberton has been a popular and well-traveled speaker for years, and has taught at New College Berkeley for Advanced Christian Studies."

Dr. Chad Pecknold

Chad Pecknold, once mentored by Presbyterian preaching giants Earl Palmer and Lloyd Ogilvie, is a Catholic theologian who teaches Systematic Theology in the School of Theology at The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. He was trained at Fuller and Princeton Seminaries, before earning his PhD at the University of Cambridge in 2005. Pecknold is the author of a number scholarly articles and books including Transforming Postliberal Theology (T&T Clark 2005), Christianity

and Politics: A Brief Guide to the History (Cascade 2010) and The T&T Clark Companion to Augustine and Modern Theology (Bloomsbury, 2014). Pecknold is a frequent contributor to debates in the public square, writing regular columns for First Things & National Review on a range of topics related to the importance and impact of Church teaching on social and political questions.

He is frequently sought after for his opinion on current events, and has been quoted in hundreds of news outlets around the world such as The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post. He has appeared as an invited guest on radio and television shows such as NPR's "All Things Considered," Vatican Radio, Al Jazeera America, BBC World News, ABC News, FOX News, CNBC Squawk Box, and he is a regular contributor on EWTN News Nightly offering his clear analysis and expert opinion on the Catholic Church, the papacy, and the relationship between the Church and politics in American culture. Pecknold resides in Alexandria, VA with his wife, Dr. Sara Pecknold (who teaches Music history at CUA) and their three kids Will, Catherine, and Jack.

Rev. Mark Hong

Mark Hong has resided in Southern California since coming to the U.S. in 1971 from South Korea. With a B.S. in Behavior Science from Cal Poly Pomona and a Masters of Divinity from Fuller, he was ordained in 1992. Hong has served Korea-American Congregations in the area of Southern California for the last 34 years and currently serves as the Executive/Stated Clerk for the Synod of Southern California and Hawaii. Hong has been married for 34 years and has 2 adult-age daughters.

Rev. Dr. Hope Lee

Hope Italiano Lee has been the Lead Pastor of Kirkwood Presbyterian and The Well in Bradenton, FL for the last 9 years. Lee's passion is evangelism, church growth, and true redevelopment and revitalization of the church. Lee has become a vocal advocate for evangelical women in ministry, challenging churches to consider women in lead roles in their congregations. Most recently, Dr. Lee has been focused on how congregations engage families with special needs, rooted in her own experience of being a mother to a child with autism. Dr. Lee was born and raised in Baltimore, Maryland, graduated from Eckerd College in St. Petersburg, Florida and completed her doctoral work in homiletics at Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary.

Workshop Leaders

Marilyn Borst

Marilyn Borst is Associate Director for Partnership Development of The Outreach Foundation, a Presbyterian global mission agency. She works with churches around the United States to help them discern God's call to global engagement while connecting them to that work alongside the Global Church in Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, Asia and the Middle East---a particular area of specialty for her. She travels extensively, nurturing relationships with church leaders, assessing ministry initiatives and leading short-term vision teams---her journeys have taken her around the globe. Prior to joining The Outreach Foundation staff, Marilyn served for over 6 years as Director of Global Ministry at Peachtree Presbyterian Church in Atlanta. Marilyn holds M.A. degrees in Art History and Theology. She has participated in four archeological digs in Jordan and Egypt, and in 2014, Marilyn led a delegation from The Outreach Foundation to Syria which was privileged to meet with Syrian President Bashar al-Assad. She has made 17 trips to Syria since 1996.

Rev. Dr. Michael Bruner

Michael Bruner is Associate Professor of Practical Theology at Azusa Pacific University in California. Born and raised in the Philippines the son of missionary parents, he received his Masters of Divinity from Princeton Seminary and his Ph.D. in Theology from Fuller Seminary. Michael is the author of the recently published A Subversive Gospel: Flannery O'Connor and the Reimagining of Beauty, Truth, and Goodness (IVP Academic Press, 2017) and is currently writing a commentary on the four gospels with his father, Dale Bruner. Michael is ordained in the Presbyterian Church (USA), a Lily Fellow, and a resident scholar at the Huntington Library in San Marino, and teaches weekly at Hollywood Presbyterian Church.

Rev. Ray Garcia

Raymond Garcia, is the founder and Executive Director of The Philadelphia Project. He currently serves as Senior Pastor at Roxborough Church. Married to Michelle, they have four children: Isaiah, Nathan, Cadence, and Thomas. Together they serve as visionaries for both TPP and Roxborough Church. Having served as a Youth Director for 15 years prior, in 2010, Garcia and Michelle trusted the leading of the Lord to settle into the city of Philadelphia and launch a new ministry that he had been praying about since 1996. It is with great passion and a sense of urgency to reach the lost, that he continues to serve in these capacities, advancing the Kingdom, proclaiming the Good News and looking forward to the Day of the Lord (2 Peter 3:12).

Rev. Bianca Howard

Bianca Howard is a graduate of Valdosta State University with a degree in Broadcast/Journalism. She also has a Masters of Divinity (Howard University School of Divinity) and Masters of Theology (Princeton Theological Seminary). Rev. Howard is currently an associate pastor and the full- time Children and Youth Pastor at Zion Baptist Church in Marietta, Georgia where she has served for 12 years. She has extensive missions experience traveling all over the world to places such as India, throughout Africa, Costa Rica and Europe. Howard is also a blogger and mentor for the Baptist Woman in Ministry (BWIM) organization. Howard is in the process of authoring her first book in which she address the fundamentals of a successful children & youth ministry in the black church. She has been married to Rev. Joseph T. Howard since 2014 and they live in Atlanta.

Rev. Craig Kephart


Rev. Don Meeks

Currently, Williams serves on several national boards including: Fulbright Association Board, (2000-2016); Peer Servants, Board Chair; Degrees of Change Board, Tacoma and Seattle, WA, "Program to equip students of color to learn together through college and lead together back home".
