All new freshmen are encouraged to register for 15 credit hours per semester. By successfully completing 15 credit hours each semester, you will:

- Save time by not extending time to degree;
- Save money on tuition and other charges by not requiring additional time to get your degree (taking 15 or 16 credit hours per semester costs the same in tuition as taking 12 credit hours); and
- Enter the workplace and begin earning an income sooner.



University Services

University Services addresses students' non-academic needs. These services include: ONE Card/ID Office; Parking and Transportation; Barnes & Noble Bookstore at Radford University; and Dining Services. Check your Radford University email throughout the summer for important information about tasks to complete before classes start.

ONE Card/ID Office

The ONE Card serves many purposes: an ID; a library card; access to Radford Transit; and swipe access to your residence hall, the fitness center, computer labs, campus events and your meal plan!

The ONE Card also gives you access to a debit account to which you may add money at any time and spend at participating locations on or off campus. Since this account is not part of the meal plan, the funds roll over from semester to semester.

Parking and Transportation

Students who wish to bring a car to campus can purchase a parking permit in person or online. All permits should be displayed on the rearview mirror by Wednesday of the first week of classes. Visit www.radford.edu/parking to learn about campus parking regulations. Students living on campus may park in lots BF, CC, DC, FF and Z. The University enforces parking regulations every Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

There are two kinds of parking: campus parking and street parking. To learn more about city parking regulations and how to obtain a city parking permit, please visit www.radfordva.gov/260/Parking-Enforcement.

Radford University, in cooperation with the City of Radford, offers a transit bus system to provide safe, reliable and convenient transportation for students. Radford University students are provided with unlimited free rides on Radford Transit with their ONE Card. The transit has routes around campus, as well as within the City of Radford and to the towns of Christiansburg and Blacksburg. The status of bus routes can be tracked with NextBus, accessible via the website or the RU Mobile app. For further route information and schedules, visit www.radford.edu/parking.

Roanoke Amtrak

Radford students have a safe and comfortable way to travel to and from the Radford area: passenger rail. From the Amtrak station in Roanoke, travelers can conveniently connect with trains serving the Northeast Corridor and cities such as Washington, D.C., Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York. From Radford, the Amtrak station in Roanoke can be reached via the Smart Way bus in Blacksburg from Monday through Saturday.

Barnes & Noble Bookstore at Radford University

The Barnes & Noble Bookstore at Radford University, located in Dalton Hall, is where students go to purchase textbooks, supplies, Radford University items and apparel and more. Students may order their textbooks online before the semester starts or buy their books when they arrive on campus. Students who wish to use financial aid to pay for textbooks can apply for bookstore vouchers on the Radford portal through the "Finances" icon. Once approved, the voucher can be applied the Monday prior to the start of the semester and will expire three weeks after the semester starts. Once the deadline for using vouchers has passed, any excess money will be refunded to the student.

Dining Services and Meal Plan Options

Radford University strives to provide students, faculty, staff and visitors with a wide array of excellent dining options. These options include two all-you-care-to-eat dining halls, two food courts, a convenience store in Kyle Hall and a full-service lunch and dinner restaurant in Muse Hall. There is also a Starbucks in the College of Humanities and Behavioral Sciences (CHBS) Building.

For residential students, there are three meal options to choose from: the 15 Meal Plan, 19 Meal Plan or the Flex Plan.

The 15 and 19 Meal Plans guarantee students that number of meals per week in Dalton Kitchen. The Flex Plan allots funds in Flex Dollars that can be spent in any of the dining facilities on campus. When using the Flex Plan in the dining halls, students receive a 60-70% discount off the door rate for that particular meal period. Students who eat in the other dining locations receive a 50% discount. For pricing and other information, visit www.dineoncampus.com/radford.

The deadline for students living on campus to change their meal plans is the Sunday before the start of classes.

Radford University Post Office

The Post Office is located on the ground level of Dalton Hall. All students living on campus are assigned a box and receive their USPS mail at the Post Office, as well as FedEx and UPS deliveries. The Post Office offers a full-service counter. Customers may purchase postage stamps; special postage and mailing services including priority, certified and insured; money orders; and more at the customer service counter. The Post Office is a contracted USPS unit and is open to the entire University community, as well as the surrounding Radford community, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. For more information, visit www.radford.edu/post-office.




MARAH CHEEK Senior, Psychology

STAY UP TO DATE

As the summer progresses and the University looks forward to the 2020-2021 academic year, updates and details regarding move-in will be posted on our website. Please continue to monitor your Radford University email account and the Housing and Residential Life website throughout the summer for more information.

RA: Resident Assistants are trained resources for residents, current student leaders and your go-to person for questions, concerns and getting connected to the community.

RD: Resident Directors are professional staff members who oversee residence halls and University-operated apartments. They also supervise Resident Assistants.

AD: Assistant Directors are professional staff members who oversee portions of campus and supervise Resident Directors.



Housing Assignments

While there is no deadline to submit your housing deposit and application, we encourage you to do this as soon as possible. The period to request a specific roommate ended on June 1; while we will make every effort to accommodate your roommate request, preferences cannot be guaranteed. Housing and Residential Life plans to communicate room assignments in July, but the assignment release date is subject to change. Roommate change requests made after move-in can begin in the third week of classes.

MUSE HALL

At 13 stories tall, Muse Hall houses 857 students, including the majority of first-time students. Since the building does not have air conditioning, Muse Hall residents should bring a fan to use during the first few weeks of the fall semester.



TEMPORARY ROOM ASSIGNMENTS

To offer on-campus living to as many students as possible, some students may be placed in temporary room assignments until more space becomes available. Most students in temporary room assignments are moved to permanent assignments by Thanksgiving. Temporary assignments include living with a resident assistant in a double occupancy space. Any new student could be assigned to a temporary space. For more information, visit www.radford.edu/housing and read the FAQs.

Bunk and Loft Kits

All beds are bunkable. If you wish to bunk, all you need to do is stack the beds; they have built-in pegs to lock into place. If you want to loft your bed to create empty space underneath, loft kits will be available to students at move-in on a first come, first served basis.

What to Bring

NECESSITIES

Bring twin extra-long sheets for your residence hall bed. Don't forget bathroom essentials, including bath towels and a shower curtain. Some items are not allowed in University-operated housing. Visit www.radford.edu/housing for more details.

OPTIONAL ITEMS

Feel free to decorate up to 10% of your walls with posters and photos that can be attached with damage-free removable adhesive strips. To add comfort and personality to your room, you can bring accessories such as pillows, blankets, rugs or photos. Some residence halls allow microwaves and mini-fridges, which can be very convenient. To use residence hall kitchens, you will need to bring your own kitchen supplies. For optional protection, we encourage students to purchase renter's insurance or see if their family's homeowner policy provides coverage for their belongings.

Residence Hall Amenities

- One bed, desk, chair and dresser and/or closet space for each resident;
- Window blinds;
- A full bathroom;
- Cable television ports; and
- Wired or wireless internet.

ALL RESIDENCE HALLS HAVE

- At least one kitchen;
- A laundry room that accepts the ONE Card; and
- A smoke-free policy, which includes vaping (this also applies to Universityoperated apartments).

 - Pay by eCheck or Credit Card (VISA, MasterCard, American Express and Discover) (2.7% additional fee).
- Pay in person at the cashier window in Heth Hall, second floor, August 3-10, 2020. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
 - Payment options:
 - Cash;
 - Check; or
 - Credit Card (VISA, MasterCard, American Express and Discover) (2.7% additional fee).
- Pay by mail with a check made out to Radford University and addressed to the Office of the Bursar. Please include the student ID number on the check.

AUTHORIZED PAYER

You can register your parent/guardian as an "authorized payer" on your account.

RADFORD PORTAL > FINANCE > MAKE A PAYMENT

This will take you to the site to set up the authorized payer. All authorized payers will receive all notifications of e-bills and will have access to view the student account online.

EXPECTING A REFUND FROM THE OFFICE OF THE BURSAR?

Receive refunds faster by completing the Direct Deposit Form in the Office of the Bursar to receive any overpayments on your account by electronic transfer instead of paper check. This form must be completed prior to the refund being processed.



Financial Aid

Financial aid is an important part of a student's and/or family's decision on how to pay for a college education. Every situation is unique; in most cases, it is best to speak directly to a financial aid counselor to have your questions answered. Staff can help you create a plan to manage the financial obligations of attending Radford University.

Here are some general steps to take if you have applied (or are planning to apply) for financial aid:

- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The Radford school code is 0003732.
- Once FAFSA is finalized and requested documents verified, you will receive an email of awards you are eligible to receive. Follow the steps as outlined in the award email.
- Go to the Radford portal and click "Finances" and then "Financial Aid Award." You must accept or decline the awards offered.
- Parent and private educational loans are available.
 Visit the Financial Aid website for more information.

Accepted financial aid will be deducted from your billing statement.

- Financial aid comes in three forms:
 - Grants and scholarships, which do not require repayment;
 - Loans, which do not need to be repaid until a student is no longer enrolled at least half-time; and
 - Private educational loans, which are secured directly from the lending institution.

Most questions can be answered by reading the "Award Memorandum" found on the Financial Aid website.

Investing in a college degree offers great rewards and a long-lasting impact on your job satisfaction and financial future. It also represents a commitment and obligation on your part. Staffers in the Financial Aid Office will help you however they can. Please visit the office, call or email your questions.

Your Classes

SCHEDULE ADJUSTMENT (AKA "DROP/ADD")

During the first week of the semester, students may add and drop classes without penalty or grades. New freshmen **must** visit their advising center to adjust their course schedules. Transfer students can adjust their schedules without visiting their advising center.

WITHDRAWALS

Students may withdraw from a total of five individual courses during their careers at Radford University. Each withdrawal must be approved by an academic advisor and submitted to the Office of the Registrar by 5 p.m. on the Friday of the 10th week of the semester. Students who officially withdraw from courses by the deadline will receive a "W" for withdrawal.

Students who withdraw from Radford University — and therefore from all of their courses — receive W's for those courses. However, these withdrawals do not count against the five-course limit. Students may withdraw from the University through the 12th week of classes.

Your Grades

MIDTERM GRADES

All new students receive midterm grades for each course during their first two semesters of enrollment. Midterms are available to view in the Radford portal by the end of the eighth week of the semester. Midterms are typically excellent predictors of final course grades, but they are unofficial and will not appear on transcripts.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

Radford University grade point averages are calculated on a 4.00 scale. Each student must maintain a specified GPA to remain in good standing and to prevent being placed on academic probation or academic suspension.

DEAN'S LIST

Students who earn at least a 3.40 GPA in at least 12 hours of courses graded A-F, who earned no grades below a C and who received no incomplete grades, are honored with Dean's List recognition at the end of the semester.

SUSPENSION

Radford University expects students to demonstrate an appropriate level of academic achievement each year. Failing to do so may result in academic suspension. The cumulative GPA required to avoid suspension is determined by the student's total number of credit hours attempted. See the Undergraduate Catalog for details.

Harvey Knowledge Center

The Harvey Knowledge Center supports students in achieving academic success. Using a learner-centered approach, students are provided with free academic coaching and workshops to support skills and confidence in navigating the opportunities and challenges of their coursework. The focus is to help students develop and leverage their own strategies for learning which can extend beyond the questions that bring them to the center.

SERVICES:

- One-on-one assistance and small group tutoring for writing, math, science courses and more;
- Short-term and sustained tutoring and skills groups;
- Workshops on time management, test-taking approaches and similar topics; and
- ESL tutors are available for students in need.

Academic Advising

You will work with both professional and faculty advisors. They will help you understand course and program requirements, and they will assist with course selection and registration.

Your advisor's name can be found on your Degree Audit soon after the semester begins. You must meet with your advisor at least once each semester. Ideally, you will meet more frequently, developing a partnership to pursue your educational and professional goals and develop your academic skills.

10 Keys* for Opening the Door to Academic Success

Take UNIV 100. In a welcoming, accessible environment, you will learn numerous first-year survival skills that will improve your academic, personal and social transition to college.

2 ATTEND EVERY CLASS ... and listen carefully. Just being there is not enough; you must be alert, attentive and undistracted.

Avoid procrastination. The same effort that earned you A's and B's in high school will typically earn you C's and D's in college. Given the increased workload, you must not fall behind. A good rule of thumb is to accomplish some work for each class every day.

Lead a balanced life. Stay physically fit and healthy, appropriately manage the inevitable highs and lows of college life, get involved in clubs and organizations outside the classroom and make good decisions about the consumption of controlled substances.

Get to know your faculty. Find a good mentor who will support you; challenge you to participate in valuable experiences like internships, undergraduate research, study abroad or leadership positions; and eventually write you strong letters of recommendation. Students with greater experience often stand out when applying for jobs or graduate or professional school.

ATTEND EVERY CLASS ... and take good notes.

Develop a note-taking style that works for you. In most classes, a significant number of test questions will be from class lecture and discussion, not the textbook.

Teducate yourself about academic policy! For example, deadlines to add/drop classes. Remember, when in doubt, talk to your academic advisor.

Be a proactive advisee. Your academic advisor will help you navigate your curriculum, but the final responsibility for completing all requirements is yours. Always arrive prepared for advising appointments.

Seek help when you need it. University life is a big adjustment, and you'll encounter bumps along the way. Reach out to someone, whether it's your RA, friends, faculty, staff or Student Counseling Services. Radford has the resources to help you.

ATTEND EVERY CLASS ... and participate. Get the most out of class and your instructors by coming prepared, asking thoughtful questions and engaging fully in the class.

UNIV 100

UNIV 100, or Introduction to Higher Education, is a small seminar-style course that helps students transition to college by teaching the skills and resources necessary to be both personally and academically successful at Radford University. This course is interactive, incorporating regular discussion, hands-on activities and out-of-class explorations that help students grow and form a community within their classrooms. UNIV 100 is worth one credit and is graded A-F.

Instructors

UNIV 100 is co-taught by a faculty-student teaching team. Faculty instructors are Radford University faculty members or administrators who have chosen to go above and beyond their regular responsibilities because of their strong commitment to student success. Peer instructors are highly trained upperclassmen dedicated to mentoring their fellow students and providing a real student perspective. While each teaching team takes a unique approach to the course, they all ensure that students receive thorough and useful information for success at Radford University.

Course Topics

UNIV 100 covers college success skills (such as studying, time management and career planning), University policy (such as registering for classes, meeting with advisors and understanding conduct and academic expectations) and personal development topics (such as getting involved on campus, living with roommates and maintaining wellness). While most sections are open to all students, some are restricted by major or program. Sections might also include a course theme based on the instructors' interest and expertise. With 70+ sections, we hope that all students can find their ideal class.

Center for Career and Talent Development



SPEAKIN' OUR LANGUAGE

SAVE ACT: A federal mandate that requires all colleges and universities to address sexual violence by providing educational programming to all incoming students on the prevention of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking. Radford University has partnered with EverFi, an online educational company that develops learning courses, to provide education to incoming students on topics of sexual violence and substance use. Radford University requires incoming students to complete two interactive, online EverFi courses called AlcoholEdu for College and Sexual Assault Prevention for Undergraduates.



REMINDER

New incoming students are required to complete both AlcoholEdu for College and Sexual Assault Prevention for Undergraduates prior to the start of classes.

Remember to check your Radford University email beginning in early August for detailed completion instructions and due dates.

Mission

Radford University's Substance Abuse and Violence Education Support (SAVES) services is dedicated to reducing substance abuse and/or violence through campus-wide initiatives that address these issues and promote student success.

Services

- Confidential advocacy, counseling services and support groups are available
 for students in recovery from substance use disorders and/or impacted by
 sexual violence. Students can stop by or make an appointment by contacting
 the office by phone or email.
- Educational programming and campus events are offered on topics of sexual violence, alcohol and other drug use and bystander intervention.
- RU Aware offers substance use assessment, brief intervention and referral to treatment as needed.
- Recovery United provides a safe, comfortable environment for students in recovery to strive academically, connect with peers and attend to their emotional and physical wellbeing with trained professionals.
- Health educators and peer health educators provide educational programming on other health and wellness topics.

AlcoholEdu FOR COLLEGE TOPICS INCLUDE:

- How media, family and social expectations shape ideas and behaviors;
- Body and health factors, including blood alcohol concentration (BAC);
- Potential risks associated with problem drinking, such as violence and drinking and driving; and
- Impacts of alcohol on academic performance, resources, BAC calculator and reference guides.

SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION FOR UNDERGRADUATES TOPICS INCLUDE:

- Sexual assault, consent, relationship violence, stalking and bystander intervention; and
- Assessments of sexual violence-related knowledge, attitudes and behaviors.

Purpose

The Radford University Police Department works to provide a safe environment for all students, faculty, staff and visitors. Police officers are valuable resources and are advocates for students. RUPD urges students to make responsible choices, be proactive bystanders and take care of one another.

Services

RUPD responds to emergency and non-emergency calls. Mental Health Crisis Response officers work with Residential Life to do well-being checks on students when concerns arise. RUPD officers deliver presentations on topics such as alcohol awareness and sexual assault awareness to UNIV 100 classes, student clubs and organizations and Greek Life. If a student feels unsafe walking on campus, officers can act as a safety escort. This service is available 24/7. Students simply call 831-5500 or use a Blue Light phone to connect with police dispatch. Additionally, Radford University has the "Adopt-A-Hall" program. Each residence hall is "adopted" by an officer to provide students with a familiar RUPD face.

To prepare students to achieve their life goals through personal accountability, an essential component of the growth and development of a Radford University student.


