PRESENTING FACULTY



April Arseneau, MD, FAAAAI, is an Allergist and Founder of the Valley Allergy & Asthma Clinic, LLC, in Palmer, Alaska, and is affiliated with Mat-Su Regional Medical Center. Prior to founding the clinic in 2014, Dr. Arseneau was chief of allergy at the Medical Center on Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson and an allergy consultant to the U.S. Pacific Air Force. She is board-certified in allergy /

immunology and internal medicine. A native of Chugiak, Alaska, Dr. Arseneau earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Washington – Seattle, and her medical degree from Albany Medical College, New York. She completed an internal medicine residency at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base Medical Center in Ohio, and an allergy/immunology fellowship at Wilford Hall Medical Center at Lackland AFB in San Antonio, Texas. Before honorably separating from the U.S. Air Force in 2014, she reached the rank of major.



Mark Corbett, MD, FAAAAI, FACAAI, is President of the American College of Allergy, Asthma, & Immunology (ACAAI) and serves on the college's Board of Regents. He is also an allergist at Family Allergy & Asthma in Louisville, Kentucky, and has practiced in the Kentucky and Tennessee areas for the past 30 years. Dr. Corbett has been active nationally in the continuing education of

allergy/immunology specialists. He served on the American Board of Allergy and Immunology (ABAI) Board of Directors and was the first private practitioner to serve as ABAI chair in 2010. He served on the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) Maintenance of Certification (MOC) and Continuing Certification committees. Closer to home, he served as president of the Kentucky Allergy Society and Greater Louisville Allergy Society. Dr. Corbett earned a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering and math from Vanderbilt University in Nashville. He earned his medical degree from the University of Louisville (UOL). He completed his pediatrics residency at the University of Alabama – Birmingham, followed by an allergy/immunology fellowship at the UOL School of Medicine. Dr. Corbett and his wife have three children.



Coleman Cutchins, PharmD, BCPS, is a Clinical Pharmacist with the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services (ADHSS), working in the Anchorage-based ADHSS Office of Substance Misuse and Addiction Prevention. He earned his Doctor of Pharmacy degree and is a board-certified pharmacotherapy specialist (BCPS). Pharmacotherapy is the treatment of disease with drugs. His

experience includes population health, academia, inpatient acute care, infectious disease/antimicrobial stewardship, clinical ambulatory care, substance abuse, chronic disease management, healthcare utilization and healthcare quality. Dr. Cutchins had only been working for the state for about two months when the pandemic hit. Due to his background, Dr. Cutchins joined the state's public health leadership team on COVID-19. Jeffrey G. Demain, MD, FAAAAI, FACAAI, FAAP, began his medical career as a medic in the U.S. Air Force, then a physician assistant before going to medical school and completing his residency and fellowship. He is a Clinical Professor at the University of Washington School of Medicine and an Affiliate Professor at the University of Alaska, Anchorage. He is board certified in Allergy/Immunology and

in Pediatrics. Dr Demain founded the Allergy, Asthma and Immunology Center of Alaska, the Allergy Asthma & Immunology Society of Alaska, and a founding member Asthma & Allergy Foundation of America Alaska Chapter, where he now serves as president. He serves on the Board of Regents of the American College of Allergy Asthma & Immunology (ACAAI) and is an incoming member of the American Board of Allergy Immunology (ABAI). He has served on the AAAAI Board of Directors, served as RSL Governor-Region 6, and served on many committees. He is editor of the AAAAI "Ask the Expert" and remains active in advocacy within both organizations. Committed to education, he served 10 years on the AAAAI Annual Meeting Planning Committee. A nationally recognized speaker, Dr. Demain has over 50 peer-reviewed publications, three textbook chapters and continues to research and publish in both insect allergy and the impacts of climate change on respiratory health. He was honored with the AAAAI-RSL Leadership award in 2020 and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) Special Achievement Award in 2021.



Peter Ehrnstrom, MD, FAAD, FASDS, is a Dermatologist and Founder of the Alaska Center for Dermatology in Anchorage. Dr. Ehrnstrom is a board-certified dermatologist and dermatologic surgeon with specialized training in Mohs surgery, a microscopically controlled surgery proven effective for common skin cancers. He has extensive expertise in cutaneous medicine, surgery, oncology,

and telemedicine and telehealth program design. After graduating from the University of Michigan, he earned his medical degree from Weill Medical College of Cornell University in New York City. He completed his internship in internal medicine at Pennsylvania State University Health System, and his dermatology residency at Yale University Medical Center in New Haven, Connecticut. Afterward, he joined the U.S. Air Force, and served on active duty at Elmendorf AFB for nearly nine years. In 2003, at the rank of lieutenant colonel, he separated from the military, and founded the center. respiratory therapist at Providence Medical Center for three years. He served in the U.S. Air Force as a cardiopulmonary technician, taking care of wounded military members overseas as part of a Critical Care Air Transportation team. His final military years were at Walter Reed Medical Center in Washington, DC. Dr. Martin is the Chair of the International Collaboration in Asthma, Allergy and Immunology (ICAALL), and a past president of the American College of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology (ACAAI). He has authored more than 50 peer-reviewed publications and book chapters, and received numerous awards. Dr. Martin completed his internal medicine residency at William Beaumont Army Medical Center in El Paso, Texas.
