

From the Rector's Desk

his newsletter will
be for two months
but will actually be
a part of three major seasons
for the church year. During
December and January, we
will worship in the seasons of
Advent, Christmas, and
Epiphany. We literally move
from preparation, to

celebration, to recognition. We will prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ at his Incarnation and at the second coming. We will celebrate his Incarnation among us. Finally, we will recognize that Emmanuel, the Light of Christ, has indeed come into the world.

I don't believe it is an accident that we chose to combine the newsletter this month. For what it has done is allowed us to see the full breadth and meaning of these three seasons at one opportune time. We tend to think of Advent as preparing for the birth of a child. In many ways, we do prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth. It is a busy time with lots to do before the expected date. Just like a family expecting a child, we work hard to get everything done before the bundle of joy arrives.

Advent is also a time for reflection and reassessment. We reflect on our lives and on our own mortality. We wait in expectation, not just for the birth of Christ, but for Christ coming again. We know that when Christ comes again, all of creation will be different. The difference will be for the better. We don't know exactly what it will look like or feel like, but we do know that it will be better. We know that God's love will be supreme--and nothing is more glorious than God's love.

This time of preparation leads us to the Christmas season. We celebrate the miracle of God Incarnate. Our hope comes into the world to deliver us from our own sins and helplessness

God. Our hope has indeed come into the world. Jesus shows us the hope that is possible through his ministry of teaching and healing. He shows us the true meaning of God's plan for us as he dies on the cross to be resurrected on the third day. The three events, the birth, the death, and

the resurrection, are inextricably linked and woven together as one. We cannot think of one without being reminded of the others. Jesus is the hope of the world!

We see the beginning of God's redemptive plan through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the promise of the fulfillment of that plan to come. wonderful time of year! So for the next eight weeks, I hope we take the opportunity before us to reflect and prepare, to celebrate, and to recognize that Jesus Christ has come among us and that Christ will come again. Perhaps we will see the fruition of the words we pray so often, "thy kingdom come, thy will be done."

Have a blessed Advent, a Joyous Christmas, and a Wonderful Epiphany.

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

The Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper will be on February 8, 2005. The men's club could use help in all areas of this function. We would like all men in the church to get involved and make this day a successful

function this year. Please attend the next two men's club meetings and volunteer your help.

The Men's Club sponsors this annual affair to raise funds for the upkeep of our building and grounds. We view this as opportunity to invite our friends

in the community to join us in fun and good food. Approximately three hundred people annually attend this event on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday.

Here's a good description of Shrove Tuesday and the tradition of pancakes from the "Universitetsforlaget" web site:

"Shrove Tuesday: Also known as Pancake Day. In the old days the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday was the day when the priest "shrove" his parishioners -- meaning that he heard their confessions, so that they could enter the fasting season, Lent, with a clear conscience.


People were not allowed to eat milk, eggs or fat during Lent, and to use up all these things they made pancakes. Traditionally the pancake is turned in the pan by tossing it in the air. In many places this is done by women while running in a pancake race! An ancient ceremony at Westminster School, called the Pancake Greeze, involves the cook tossing a large pancake over a high bar before the boys scramble for it."

Men's club meetings are held on the first Thursday of every month. 6:30 PM in the Parish House.


