Would you like to become President of the United States? Below are the duties (jobs,) requirements, and your salary (how much you would make in a year) in order to be eligible to become President. Follow the directions below the information you just read.

Duties

The president of the United States is the chief executive of the federal government and commander-in-chief of the United States Military. Below is a list of presidential responsibilities.

- The president manages the U.S. government and the country's national affairs.
- The president can issue executive orders - rules or actions that do not require congressional approval.
- The president can mobilize and call to action the National Guard.
- The president nominates all heads of executive departments.
- The president prepares the national budget.
- The president can veto acts of Congress (though the presidential veto can be overridden via vote).
- The president prepares the State of the Union Address, a nationally televised speech outlining the status of the United States.
- The president appoints members of the Supreme Court.
- The president can pardon individuals convicted of breaking federal law.
- The president is responsible for the establishment and maintenance of relations with foreign nations.
- The president appoints ambassadors to other nations.
- The president is responsible for the protection of Americans abroad.

Requirements to be President

The president must be a natural-born citizen of the United States. The president must also be at least 35 years old and a resident of the United States for 14 years.

Presidential Elections

Presidential elections are held every four years. Presidents can serve a maximum of two terms, or eight years in office. The president and vice-president are the only officials elected on a national scale.

Salary (how much you would be paid yearly)

The president of the United States is the highest paid government employee. The president earns \$400,000 per year. That said, did you know the CEO of Apple (Tim Cook) makes over 200 times what the President of the United

President of the United States



Every four years, the people of the United States vote for the country's leader. The winner of that election becomes the nation's president.

The president may be a man or a woman. He or she will live and work in the White House in Washington, D.C. What does the president do? Here are some examples.

The president is the leader of the American government. The president suggests laws he thinks the country needs. The president may work with the members of the U.S. Congress to get his ideas turned into laws.

The president appoints people to help run the government. These people include judges and leaders of government departments. Often, the president's choices have to be approved by the U.S. Congress.

The president is commander-in-chief of the country's military. That means the president is responsible for the actions of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard.

During any one day, an American president can do many things. The president can speak with advisers, give a speech, or sign a bill into law. The president may meet with leaders of other countries. In the evening, the president sometimes attends special events.

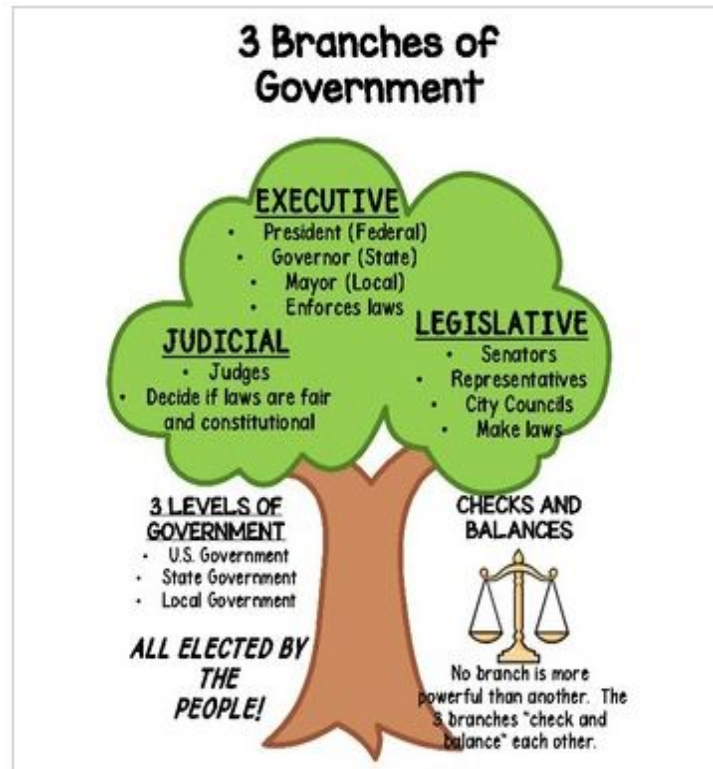

Then they created a system of checks and balances among these branches. Every power the president has is balanced by a different power Congress or the courts have. For example, the president is commander in chief of the armed forces. But only Congress can declare war. Still, over the years, many presidents have added to the powers granted to them in the Constitution.

1. Who/which group can only declare war? _____

In 1803, President Thomas Jefferson bought a huge amount of land from France. It was called the Louisiana Territory. The Constitution does not specifically give presidents the power to buy land. However, it does give them the power to make treaties. Jefferson interpreted this as giving him the power to sign a treaty that purchased the Louisiana Territory.



The Constitution gives the president the right to veto (say no to) a law passed by Congress. Andrew Jackson was president from 1829 to 1837. He was the first president who vetoed bills he did not agree with. Before that, presidents had vetoed only bills they believed were not allowed by the Constitution. Jackson vetoed more bills than all the presidents before him put together. Here are some other examples of checks and balances. The president can make treaties with other countries. But a treaty is not valid unless the Senate agrees. The president appoints members of the Supreme Court. But the Senate must approve the person the president chooses. Congress passes bills, and the president can either sign them into law or veto them. But Congress can override a veto with a large enough vote.

Presidents' Day Is Here!

Presidents' Day is observed on the third Monday of February. Do you know why we honor George Washington and Abraham Lincoln on that day? Both presidents were born in February.

George Washington was our first president. He was born in Virginia on February 22, 1732. He was president from 1789 to 1797.

Fun Facts

When he was a boy, his favorite subject was math.

He started writing in a journal at age 16. He had good handwriting. He wrote about what he did each day.

He was a soldier and a farmer before he became president.

He had many dogs and horses. He also had a parrot named Polly.

At the age of 22, he started to lose his teeth. When he became president, he had only one tooth left. He wore false teeth.

He never lived in the White House. Why? It had not been built yet. Work on the White House was started in 1792. It was finished in 1800.

Abraham Lincoln was our 16th president. He was born in Kentucky on February 12, 1809. He was president from 1861 to 1865.

Fun Facts

When he was a boy, he loved to read. One of his favorite books was about the life of George Washington.

He was known for being honest. People often called him "Honest Abe."

He was a shop owner and a lawyer before he became president.

He had goats, dogs, and a cat named Tabby. Tabby was the first cat to live in the White House.

He was the tallest president. He was 6 feet 4 inches tall.

He was the first president to have a beard. He grew it after getting a letter from a little girl named Grace. She told him that his face was thin. She said he would look better with a beard.

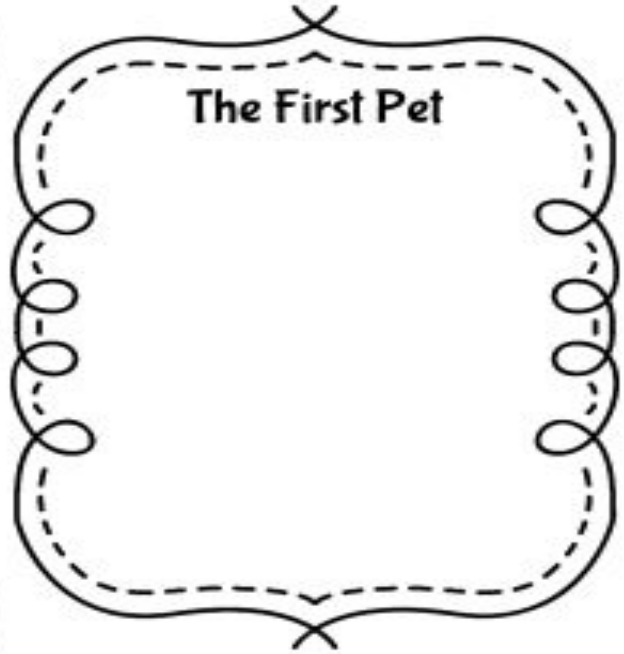

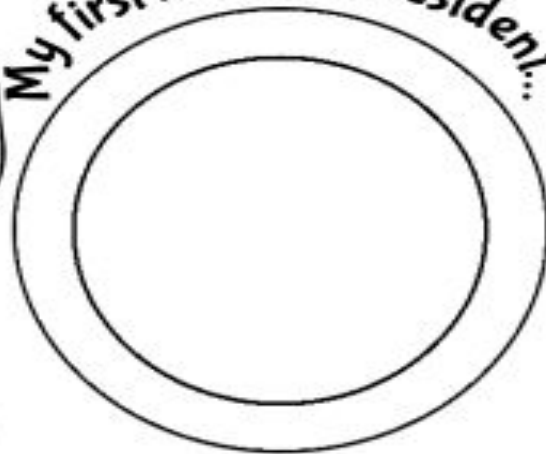

Hello, Mister Obama

The president of the United States has an important job. He or she is the leader of the armed forces. This person executes and enforces United States laws. The president is able to sign bills to become laws. He or she is also able to veto, or reject, laws. In addition, the president works with the leaders of other countries.

Meet Barack Obama! He was the 44th president of the United States. He was the first African American to become a U.S. president. Obama was elected in November 2008. In January 2009, he began a four-year term as president. In November 2012, Obama was reelected for a second term.

Barack Obama and his wife, Michelle, have two daughters. Their names are Malia and Sasha. They all lived in the White House during his presidency. It has been home to every president except George Washington.

The White House has 132 rooms and 35 bathrooms! One room is called the Oval Office. That is where the president usually works. In another room called the Cabinet Room, the president meets with people like the heads of the U.S. government departments, members of Congress, and leaders of foreign nations. Here they talk about topics such as national security and energy. The discussions are often about how to help solve national and global problems.

But the White House isn't just for serious work. The White House also has a tennis court, a jogging track, a swimming pool, a movie theater, and a bowling lane to entertain the president, the president's family, and their guests.

What is Mount Rushmore? Read about it below and respond to the questions/statements below.

Mount Rushmore is a sculpture carved into the side of a mountain in South Dakota.

You can see the faces of four important presidents. Those presidents are:

Washington, Lincoln, Jefferson, and Theodore Roosevelt. It took 14 years, 400 workers, and almost one million dollars to carve the mountain. In order to sculpt the faces, workers had to remove over 800 million pounds of stone using dynamite. If you worked on Mr. Rushmore, you would have made only about 50 cents an hour. Lots of people go to Mount Rushmore every year to hike or bike up the mountain and visit the monument.

The White House



The White House is the name given to the official home and workplace of the President of the United States. It is located at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C. Every President except George Washington has lived there. It was built between 1792 and 1800; in 1814, it was burned by the British army when they invaded the city during the War of 1812.

After the war ended, the White House was rebuilt in the 1820's and has been expanded over the years. It has been redecorated on the inside and today is open for public tours. The President's family also lives in the White House.

The President's office is called the Oval Office because the room is shaped like an oval. In the Oval Office, the President signs bills, meets with staff, and hosts guests and visitors. The furniture in the room may change over the years, but one of the most famous pieces is the Resolute desk, which was a gift from the British Queen Victoria to President Hayes in 1880. It was made from the wood of a British ship.
