Reduced budget aids crucial areas

New budget to help county survive economy longer

BREVARD — Brevard County Manager Howard Tipton submitted a new budget for the 2013 fiscal year earlier this month that is a 22.3 percent reduction from last year's budget.

"The new budget is about \$62 million less than the current budget," Mr. Tipton said. "A lot of that comes from

reduction in capital projects. We are just not building any-

Along with a decline in capital projects, the new budget will eliminate 15 vacant positions within the county. From 2006 to 2013, the total number of positions cut stands at 452, now placing staffing at 2001 levels.

to the new budget as one that will help the county "hold on" a little longer through the current economic situation.

Mr. Tipton referred

"In many ways, it's a 'let's hold on for one more year budget,'" he said. "We are keeping tax rates the same, but we have a backlog on road projects that are approaching a halfbillion dollars. We have facility needs that are \$10 million dollars that we can't

get to." However, despite the decline in capital projects, Mr. Tipton said the new budget leaves room advancements in two crucial areas for Brevard County.

"We have an 800 MHz emergency system that is 25 years old. If you think about it, that radio system is built for the population at that time. If you think about how we have grown since that time, we don't have coverage in certain areas."

Kimberly Prosser, director of Brevard **County Emergency** Management, agreed with the Mr. Tipton on the need for new radio equipment.

"Our current system has been in place for 25 years, during which the county's population has not only by grown about 180,000, but it has also expanded beyond its original footprints," Prosser



MELBOURNE — Like many others in Brevard County, Sandra Pelham is on a mission to save her community.

"There were times when you would see guys walking up and down the street, selling drugs from car to car," she said pointing toward Monroe Street in Melbourne. "Now, you don't see that as much as you used to."

Ms. Pelham said the decline of crime within her community can be attributed to the awareness spread by the Powell Neighbor-Subdivision hood Watch, a program

Rising heat leads to more venomous snakes on the Space Coast

Local wildlife trapper captures three venomous snakes in one week

BREVARD — A local

wildlife trapper said the rising heat is leading to more venomous snake sightings in Brevard County.

"This week, I have encountered three venomous snakes: two Eastern Diamondbacks and a Cottonmouth," said James Dean, owner of Melbourne-based AAA Wildlife Removal. "With all of the heat, the lakes are drying up, and it is displacing the snakes, just like it would alligators."

According to the Miami-Dade Fire Rescue Department Venom Response See SNAKES, A4

Bureau, three venomous snakes inhabit Brevard County: Eastern Diamondback rattlesnakes, coral Cottonsnakes and mouth/Water Moccasins.

Steven Walker, owner of Brevard's Discount Wildlife Removal, said his company handles primarily Water Moccasins, and the coral snake is something residents should specifically



avoid.

"Mostly, we deal with Water Moccasins. We find them around watery areas," he said. "There is no antivenom for coral snakes."

Mr. Dean said residents, who have snakes in their homes, should remain calm and call for help immediate-

"Anytime I get a call on a snake, I automatically assume it's a poisonous snake because you never know," he said. "When I get a call to a home, I go throughout the house until I locate the snake, and, if I can't, I put glue boards down at the last spot they were seen. Once the snakes are on the glue, the owner will call me back.'

Mr. Dean warned to never get close to a snake to avoid the danger of being bitten.

"Snakes have very poor eyesight. They are basically heat sensitive and (they notice) ground vibrations. That's how they know where to strike," he said. "If you do see a snake, go in the opposite direction. If it's in your house, go ahead and call a trapper.

While he has dealt with

poisonous snakes in the past, Mr. Walker said he primarily receives calls for non-poisonous snakes from residents.

people like to jump to the conclusion that they are venomous. This is usually not the case, but I would rather someone assume they are venomous than they're not," he said. "Most of the time, people don't know what they are (dealing with), but it's better to worry.'

Mr. Dean said he also handles mostly non-venomous snake situations, and that there are ways of preventing snakes entering your home.

"A lot of times, some of the snakes that get into houses are non-venomous. Usually, it's black snakes that get into your house," he said. "What people can do to deter snakes from coming into their homes is to fix where the garage door seals up at the bottom. A lot of times, that seal goes bad, and the snakes crawl underneath it. At that point, they are able to get into the main entrance of the house by going underneath."

After catching the snakes, Mr. Dean said what he does whether or not the snakes

are native to the area.

"Once I capture the snakes, I take them out and release them back into the wild," he said. "If they are not native, I have to destroy them by law."



created by National Night Out, an annual crime-anddrug prevention event, scheduled for Tuesday, Aug.

"It's a nationwide event that's held every year on the first Tuesday in August,' said Ms. Pelham, who is cochairing the event, alongside James Bartell. "We are bringing all the neighbors together to pray about this community because there is a lot of violence here."

Brevard Throughout County on Aug. 7, residents from Rockledge to Melbourne Beach will be celebrating National Night Out event with their own community-focused events.

"It's a great time to get the neighbors together and bring awareness to crime prevention," said Ilene Manzo, a Neighborhood Watch Officer with the Rockledge Police Department. "We are going to have a lot of free stuff for the kids, and a lot of great stuff for adults, too."

Guest speaker for the Melbourne Beach event, Assistant State Attorney Phil Archer, said neighborhoods with an effective neighborhood watch program reduced crime.

"What we found in neighborhoods that have an aggressive approach to calling cops with suspicious reports usually stay crime free," Mr. Archer said. "I always tell people when they see something to call it in. The cops don't mind checking it out, but it's hard sometimes to get people to do that."

Neighborhoods through-

out the town of Melbourne Beach plan to participate in the 29th annual National Night Out event.

From 5-9 p.m. on Aug. 7, residents throughout the town will be encouraged to lock their doors and turn on their outside lights, said Detective Cpl. Melanie Griswold of the Melbourne Beach Police Department, which is co-sponsoring the

Also that evening, at Melbourne Beach's Ryckman Park, will be games for children, prizes, food, music and a bounce house, as well as an opportunity to meet the town's police officers, firefighters and members of Melbourne Beach Rotary Club.

Rockledge Community Service Coordinator Michael Cadore said it is important to raise awareness to the community about ways they can help local law enforcement.

"We are letting our citizens know they should call the hotline no matter how small the problem is," he said. "We have done a tremendous job of (spreading our cause) through social media and the Internet. We have an integrated email system that reaches 2,000 people to help get the word out. If you don't have an email (address), we are meeting within your community. Everyone is on the same page, and everyone is working together. That is a huge blessing.'

Despite the large amount of community involvement, Ms. Pelham said she has encountered a few challenges over the years.

"I would like for the churches to get more involved. I feel if the church would get involved, more people will get involved," she said. "Tuesday night is prayer night for the community. Prayer is very important. Prayer changers things, but I'm only asking for one night. If we don't all come together, it's not going to be successful."

Mr. Bartell agreed that there are certain challenges the neighborhood watch group for Melbourne's Powell Subdivision faces, but he is optimistic about the future.

"The greatest challenge we have is getting people to participate (in the National Night Out event). A lot of people in this neighborhood talk, but they don't communicate," he said. community improved a lot. When we first started, we had very little participation with people in this area, but now we have had a great turnout."

Ms. Manzo said she is impressed with the turnout her community has shown over the years, and she stressed the importance of community cooperation with its local police forces.

"Last year, we had 1,500 people who participated in the event. It's a great way to spread awareness through the community," she said. "We spend a lot of time at neighborhood watch meetings, and we always tell people to call us. They may think it may not be something to bother the police with, but we think no call is too small."

phase of the plan, at an estimated \$43 million, farexceeded the county's available funds and would have required a voter's referendum. With four failed jail referendums in Brevard's recent history, it was not a stretch to believe a fifth referendum would meet the same fate. A fifth failure would have resulted in additional delays that would have further pushed any real corrective actions another two-to-three years down the road. The time for talking was over. We needed real improvements, and we

needed them fast. So after being sworn in as Sheriff in January 2005, our team made a recommendation to the Board to consider an alternative plan including the use of tents and inmate labor to reduce jail expansion costs to a fraction of the price. It worked. The Board approved our plan, directed work begin immediately and avoided the need for a

fifth referendum. Looking back on the past eight years, there have been outstanding improvements

to all aspects of the county jail operation, including: New hurricane-resistant

tent facilities for 400 inmates • A new 346-bed facility

for inmates with special mental health and medical A new infirmary

• A new 297-bed female jail - created by using inmates to renovate an old building · A new kitchen

 Expanded booking, inmate receiving and

releasing areas A new laundry facility • New innovative inmate work programs

The completion of the recent booking room expansion marked the final phase of the jail expansion recommendations. As a result, today's jail, as compared to what the jail looked like in 2004, is as different as night and day.

I am personally very thankful to the County Commissioners and county staff who made the jail improvements a priority and continuously supported our requests. I could not be more proud of the corrections deputies and employees who, under the outstanding leadership of Jail Commander Susan Jeter, worked so hard to maintain the safety and security of the jail during

years of construction and operational challenges. I would also like to recognize the corrections staff, who was here in the days preceding the improvements, for maintaining order in a very overcrowded and challenging jail facility.

For most of us, the jail is out of sight and out of mind. Every year, there are an estimated 10,000 people who go to the Brevard County Jail and after their release they stay out of trouble. I believe a great deal of their success belongs to the corrections staff, who works tirelessly to set a strong example and get those who have broken the law back on the right track. There are more than 400 brave and dedicated corrections professionals, who leave the safety of their homes to be locked for hours on end behind the solid steel doors of the Brevard County Jail. They do this to protect our citizens from harm and to turn the inmates' lives around. They risk their lives, so they can make a real difference in our community... and they do.

"We also use (the helicopters) for firefighting. When we have wildfires, they are used," he said. "There are actually dual

Mr. Tipton said that by keeping taxes the same, it allows the county to remain one of the cheapest places to live within the

"We are within the top ten in the state," he said. "We are providing a reasonable quality of life at a very minimal cost. But, it's not sustainable, and that is a challenge we have."



Riverview Elementary School in Titusville is now Riverview School, exclusively a pre-kindergarten center run by the federally funded early childhood program, Head Start.

The school will offer two classes for 3-year-olds and two classes for 4-year-olds. Overall, more than 70 students will be enrolled at the school, said Teresa Wright, director of early childhood and Title I programs for Brevard Public Schools.

Riverview Elementary School closed because enrollment was declining, allowing for an opportunity to help another market, she said.

"The (Brevard County) School Board saw Riverview as an opportunity to benefit the children in that neighborhood," she said. "We knew there was a need in that community, and so we're using that space to fulfill that need.

• Healthy food enforcements

Brevard Public Schools' division of Food and **Nutrition Services has** designed a variety of changes to implement healthier diets for local students.

Lunches are comprised of five components, including fruit, vegetable, grain, meat or a meat alternative, and low-fat or fat-free milk, and this year, students are required to take three of



"The new meal pattern gives students even more choices then they had before to choose what they want," said Lori Nelson, dietitian specialist for Brevard Public Schools. "USDA requiring students to take a fruit or a vegetable with their meal stresses the importance of having these

weekly.

Some of the other changes include adding 100 percent fruit juice and vegetarian entrées to the menus, implementing more whole grains in recipes and requiring students to eat certain vegetables, Ms. Nelson said.

Brevard Public Schools also announced its plan to continue providing healthy no-cost breakfasts to all students as a part of the National School Breakfast Program. Last year, Brevard County Food and Nutrition Services served over 3.6 million breakfasts at no cost to Brevard County students.

HELP YOUR CHILDREN UNDERSTAND WHO AND WHEN TO CALL

The best time to prepare for an emergency is before it happens. During an emergency, it's easy to become disoriented or upset, so you need to have all the important phone numbers readily available ahead of time. Write

read. Use a pen with dark-colored ink; this is seen the best when you are in a hurry or the lights are dim. Make sure that babysitters and relative familiarize themselves with the list. Once you have filled in the appropriate each phone number clearly so that it will be easy to numbers it is time to practice with your children.

TEACHING YOUR CHILD HOW TO CALL FOR HELP

Have your child practice dialing and speaking into a telephone. Your child should know:

- 1 How to dial 911
- 2 His or her full name & full address

Prompt him or her with questions that an emergency operator would ask, such as "What is your name?", "Where are you calling from?", and "What is the emergency?"

Stress that the description should be short ("Mommy fell down") and that he or she should be calm and stay on the phone.

Practice until your child feels comfortable.

No one wants to think about an emergency happening at home, but it's better to face that possibility than to be caught unprepared. So keep emergency numbers close by. It's a small step that could have big consequences.


