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A VERY BIG DEAL

ISHOF INDUCTEES ENJOY THEIR MOMENT OF FAME **BY BARRY BRADSHAW. Chairman**

At present we have snow—more, I think, than we had all of last season in our Yorkton area. Now we need some cold weather to freeze the wetness under the snow.

I know all clubs will be scrambling to get trails cleared and signs put up. As long as the snow stays our local club, the Yorkton Sno-Riders, will try and get our signing completed by the middle of December right after deer hunting season is over.

Now onto an exciting event that took place on November 14 at the Saskatchewan Legislature. The snowmobilers from Saskatchewan that have been inducted into the International Snowmobile Hall of Fame (ISHOF) were all invited by the government to be introduced in the Legislature. We were all introduced individually by Greg Ottenbreit, our MLA and Saskatchewan party whip from Yorkton, who is a longtime supporter of snowmobiling in Saskatchewan.

Some background information on those who were introduced by the Hon. Greg Ottenbreit follows: From the 2008 inductions in Grand Rapids, Minnesota, John Popoff of Saskatoon is a long-time volunteer with the Saskatoon Snowmobile Club. As well, John was a founding member of the Saskatchewan Snowmobile Association. Along with John, I was also inducted in 2008—mostly for my work for over 35 years with Snowarama, our Yorkton fundraiser for Easter Seals.

In 2009 Prairie Women on Snowmobiles (PWOS) was inducted into the ISHOF. This was the ISHOF's first induction of a group so it was an exception to the rule. PWOS, as everyone in Saskatchewan knows, does fundraising for breast cancer research. The PWOS ride has raised over \$1.4 million in the 10 years of its week-long yearly rides across Saskatchewan. A very good mix of the women who have ridden over the years came to the Legislature—it was like a school reunion of old friends. I personally know that the two co-founders of PWOS, Jeannie Brewer and Carol Tulik, who were at the Legislature ceremony, never in their wildest dreams expected PWOS to grow into the fundraiser for

cancer research that it is today and be so well known and accepted throughout Saskatchewan.

Last but not least, for their volunteer work for many years, Chris and Jeannie Brewer were just inducted this past September in Eagle River, Wisconsin. I had the privilege of introducing Chris and Jeannie at the induction banquet and what an honour it was to have them both come up to the podium to accept the award. We started the introduction off with Stompin' Tom Connors' *The Snowmobile Song*, which, of course, is a Canadian tune. It was the first time most Americans had heard it, so it broke the ice and went over very well. The folks in Eagle River showed us a great time with their hospitality and certainly didn't cut any corners in the ceremonies.

Eagle River is best known as the home of the World Championship Snowmobile Derby held every year in January. In 2009 the ISHOF committee saw fit to move the Hall of Fame, along with the Derby Snowmobile Museum, from Minnesota to Eagle River, Wisconsin, and call it the World Snowmobile Headquarters. This new facility was made possible by a longtime supporter of snowmobiling-Tom Anderson of Wisconsin. An abandoned strip mall right next to the Eagle River racetrack came up for sale by one of the local banks. Tom had the insight to put in a bid and was the successful bidder. With some remodelling the World Snowmobile Headquarters was opened-what a great facility. For more info and a list of all the inductees over the years go to www.ishof.com.

Now I want to get into more depth on how all these inductions came about over the last few years. One person in the province had the insight to make the nominations happen and her name is Emily Grimes. Emily has been a longtime supporter and volunteer for snowmobiling in Saskatchewan. She was one of the founding members of the Esker Bear Snowmobile Club and of the Forest Fringe Snowmobile Association. She was later nominated to the board of the Saskatchewan Snowmobile Association (SSA) in 1996 and retired in 2009, after spending 13 years serving on

The day the snowmobiles stopped

One chilly fall day in the not too distant future, as you prepare for the upcoming snowmobiling season, you will remember that you have not received your Saskatchewan Snowmobile Association (SSA) and local snowmobile club's annual membership information. You go to the SSA's website only to find a notation from the Internet service provider that the domain name is now available for sale to any interested parties. Huh?

You call up a friend and ask "What's up with the SSA?" He informs you that last spring they announced that they were disbanding due to lack of volunteer support. "Well, exactly what did they ever do for me?" you say. Then you call one of your local club officers only to find that no one volunteered to run for club office and that the current president and vice-president had retired and moved south. Your club has also disbanded and sold your grooming equipment to an out-of-province organization and donated the remaining club money to charity. Your buddy says that the club two towns over is still active and he has joined there, so you decide that you will join there also.

He then mentions that the dues have gone way up since the SSA is no longer around to provide some much-needed grooming money. You decide you had better go to a club meeting to find out what's really happening.

The club meeting holds a few surprises for you as they discuss their huge loss of former friendly landowners. Apparently when they found out that they were no longer covered by the SSAsponsored liability insurance, they immediately revoked permission to ride on their land. You also find out that you can no longer ride from one provincial property to another because of the lack of private landowner connector trails. "OK," you say, "I will just ride in my local town area then." Of course, without your old local club there is no grooming or snowmobile trail maintenance in your area. There is still riding there but only on about 15 miles of unmaintained and ungroomed trails. Furthermore, you no longer have riding access to any food or gas because those connector trails were located on private land. The next day you read in the paper that snowmobiles are being banned on a number of provincial lands due to damage caused by wheeled vehicles.

Incredibly, no one attended any of the planning meetings and spoke up and defended snowmobiling—which has virtually no negative impact on trails. With no organized opposition, snowmo-

biles were simply banned along with wheeled vehicles.

There is also a notice that an environmental group is fighting hard to pass a provincial law banning all internal combustion engines on provincial land to protect the health of native miniature snails. Who do you turn to? "I'll just call my local MLA," you decide. The call goes something like, "Hi, I'm Joe and I like to snowmobile so you need to help me." The response is something like, "Thank you for calling to express your opinion. What organization did you say you were representing?" Now you start to sweat and remember having heard about how to approach your MLA from the SSA, and you realize that your encounter didn't go as you had planned. OK, so you and your friends decide your club should hire a lobbyist. Now, just how will you find one and pay for him or her? Your club will just have to raise lots of money-somehow. Of course, you always voted against dues increases on principle in the past.

You then remember that in the past, revenue from the SSA trail fund helped fund these key access-related activities.

Furthermore, many of your friends said they weren't even going to join the club until there was rideable snow on the ground, because they remember a year in the past when there wasn't much snow.

You call some like-minded friends and you all agree to organize to fight these injustices, but you have no clue how to begin. You also start to experience that sinking feeling that it might already be too late. You want to turn to the guys who have always maintained and groomed the trails for help. Did you know the average age of an active three-man trail crew in Saskatchewan that maintains snowmobile trails on a very large tract of provincial land is now over 70 years old? No answer when you call. You call your friend back only to learn that two of the three have retired from trail work and the other is no longer around. Now what? Where are all of the younger folks who were supposed to take over? You then cringe at the thought that you personally have said many times, "I'll help when I get around to it," but you never did.

Well, you can always drive to nearby provinces where they used to have large trail systems. Maybe they're still in operation.

To get your mind off of this mess, you then decide to drive out of province to attend a snow show. Your wife reminds you that with gas prices at 130.9 cents per litre you can't afford to, since you will need to save the money to go

Keeping it safe

JUST SAY NO TO ALCOHOL AND EXCESSIVE SPEED

Early snow can bring early issues for you and your snowmobile. Given the early snow this year you need to take caution until the trails are set and signed. Objects are hidden under the snow that can cause damage to your sled and could cause injuries to you—stones, stumps, pocket gopher mounds, culverts, farm implements, fence wire and other objects. As well, this season we haven't seen the cold temperatures that allow good ice to form. The early snow isn't helping as it provides too much insulation.

We ask that you stay off all bodies of water until we have a few weeks of extreme cold temperatures. Safety must come first before heading out on your sled. Never go alone, plan your trip and inform someone where you're going and when you are returning. Take a cellphone, make sure your sled is full of fuel and oil and it's in very good mechanical running condition. Remember, you can ride in a half hour what you can't walk in a day.

Be the first in your group to start a new tradition when going out riding—take water and leave the alcoholic beverages at home. Consuming alcohol lowers your body's temperature and will bring on hypothermia quicker. The leading cause of snowmobile accidents, injuries and fatalities is consumption of alcohol—it lowers your reaction time. Speed is the second leading cause of snowmobile accidents, injuries and fatalities and oftentimes speed and alcohol are combined to cause major snowmobile issues.

The SSA has a new safety initiative that makes the Saskatchewan Snowmobile Safety Certificate much easier to access. The safety course is now available online, so visit www.sasksnow.com and follow the link to enroll and take this valuable course.

Anyone born on or before January 1, 1989, must have their Saskatchewan Snowmobile Safety Certificate to operate a snowmobile in Saskatchewan. You can now obtain yours online at www.sasksnow.com for only \$45. If you are new to the recreation of snowmobiling or feel you would like to learn more about the operation of your snowmobile then please go online and take the course.

Keeping expectations realistic

Looks like this year will bring early and plentiful snow across the western snow belt if the current weather patterns persist. With this early snow there seems to be an abundance of unrealistic expectations from the general public about when trail systems will be fully open and complete. In a normal good year without any catastrophes it would take our club until Christmas to have our complete 670-kilometre system open and signed safely.

This year with snow early in November, I am amazed by the number of otherwise intelligent individuals who will ask if the groomers are out yet. These individuals and the business interests that some of them represent obviously have no idea what it takes to annually open a trail system, particularly in the provincial forest. Although there is ample snow to groom, there is no frost in the ground to support a six- to eight-ton grooming unit in the muskeg, and no chance for the minimum two feet of ice to form that is required for any water crossings with such a unit. Also, although the snow is nice to see, it has complicated trail cleaning efforts, with the wet snow making

everything twice as difficult, wet and time-consuming.

As a result of this I often ponder the identity crisis many local clubs must endure. What exactly is our job in all of this? Who actually receives the financial benefit of the trails going in early and the increased season length, particularly in the main snowmobile trail tourism destination areas? In most cases club membership is made up of local individuals who simply have an interest in the sport, and who may enjoy volunteering for some outdoor activity. Those who have a vested interest in accommodation, restaurant and fuel services claim they are simply too busy to become directly involved, but ironically are the first ones who may ask if the work is done and the trails are ready. You can probably see where I am headed with this-when the people with vested interests and those who simply wish to reap the recreational rewards of someone else's volunteer efforts have unrealistic expectations and start to make demands on our goodwill volunteer resources, the fun has ended.

One risk of going off the trail is swamping a big machine. We are in a remote area so it's wise to have snowmobiles checked ahead of time and carry a small saw, hatchet, shovel and small container of gas. Also, a zip-lock bag with pieces of a cardboard egg carton, some dryer fluff and matches will be handy if you need to start a fire. Dry socks and plastic bags big enough to fit your feet into are a big help when you have wet boots.

But most important of all—keep an eye on the gas tank. One can go a long way on a snowmobile, but it's a very long way to walk back. Also keep in mind there is no cell service in the area. It's wise to phone ahead for gas availability since there are no transports in winter and stores have to go for their own supplies.

The tentative date for the Esker Bear Tri-Lake Rally is February 17, 2013. The Lower Fishing Lake cabin owners Esker run is March 2, 2013.
