### MILO PEE-WEE BASKETBALL

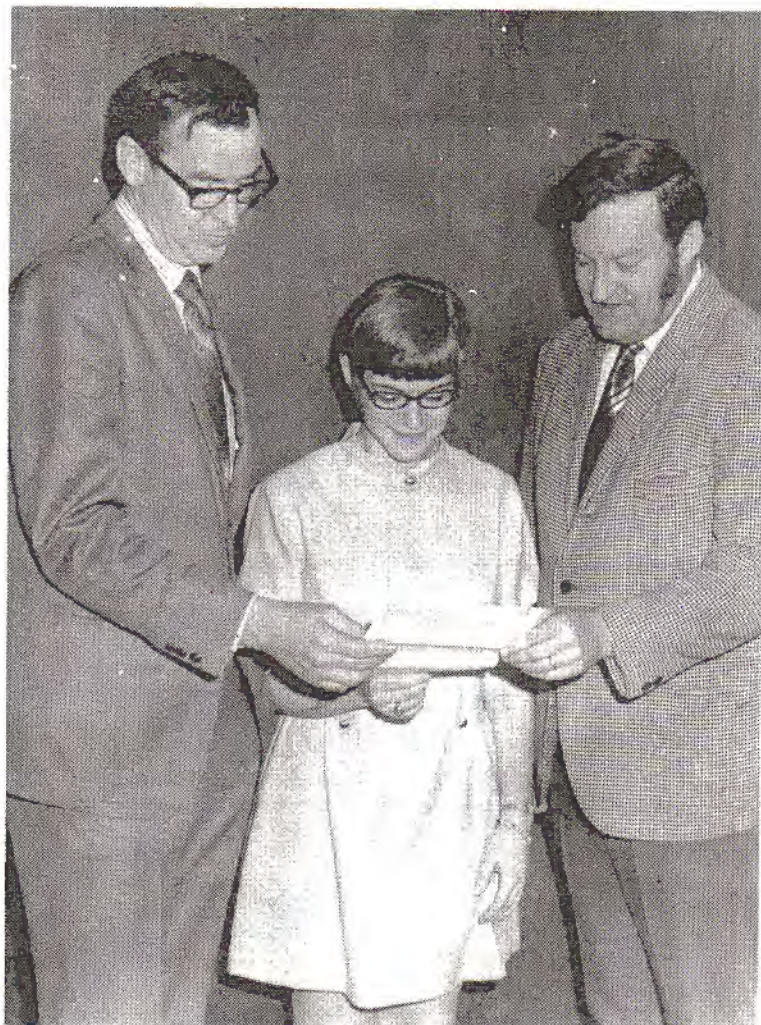

The Legions Firing Line was renewed for Penquis Valley High School.

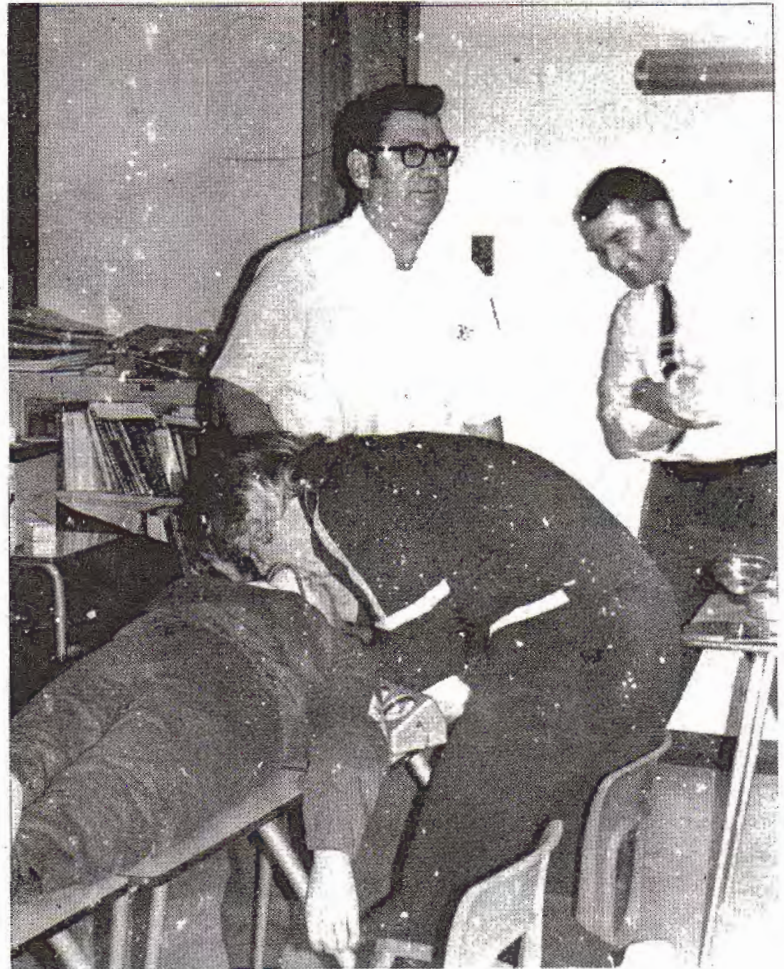
Cards and flowers sent to ill members; sympathy cards as indicated and a birthday card to a veteran Legionnaire.

The reception was held at Derby Community Hall.

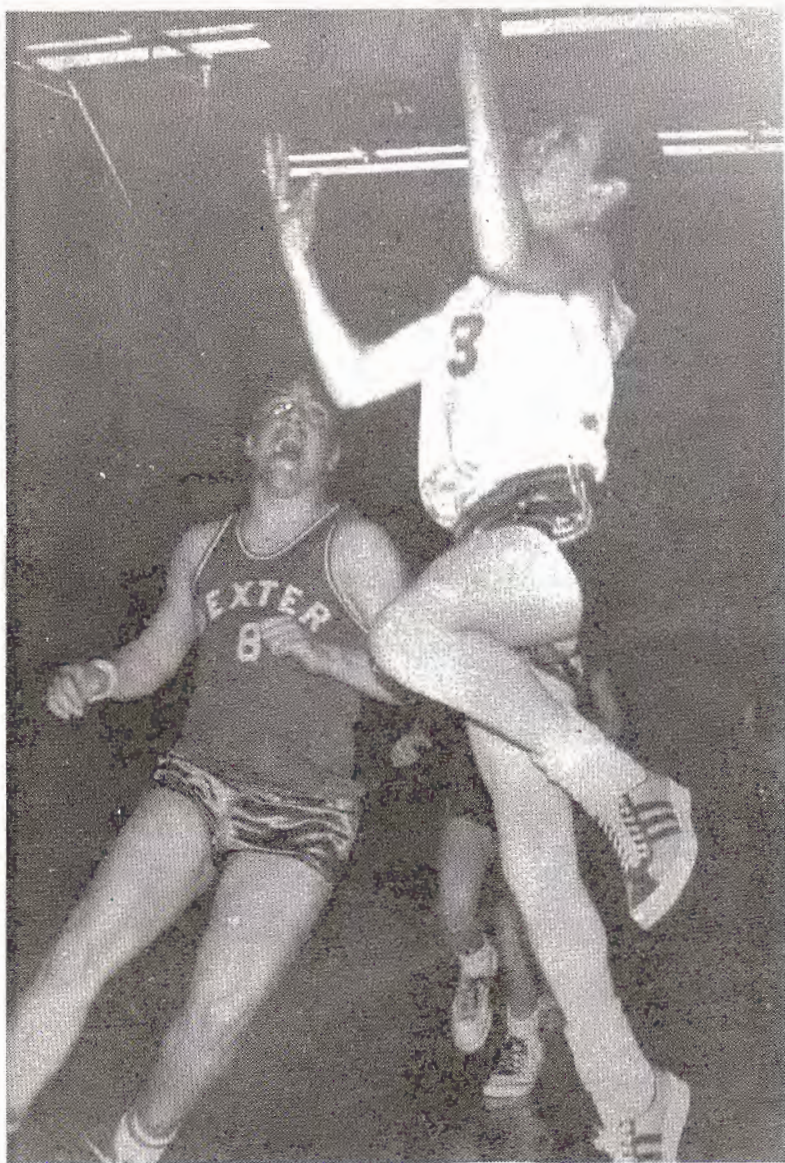
After a trip to Squaw Mountain Ski Resort, the couple will be at home at Stillwater Ave., Old Town.

REPORT FROM  
CAPITOL HILL

FROM CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM D. HATHAWAY  
THE POTENTIAL OF THE PEKING CONFERENCE

"What will be the results of the President's visit to Peking?" This is a question going through the minds of most of us as we watch and read about the progress of President Nixon's discussions with Chinese Communist leaders this week. The President himself has told us not to expect too much, and this is a very realistic attitude to take. China and the United States have been more than geographically distant for too long a time. One week of talk is not going to remove the ill effects of over two decades of silence.

I feel optimistic about this meeting. It is a beginning, and Mr. Nixon's expectations, as explained by White House aides, are both worthy of praise and practical. Some possible results include a limited increase in trade between China and the U.S. agreements to exchange artists, athletes, and newsmen; and arrangement for continuing the dialogue initiated by this trip. The latter will probably not mean the immediate establishment of diplomatic relations between both nations.

Clearly we will know more about the Chinese Mainland and the people who live there as a result of this summit meeting. This itself is a result which should go far in establishing healthy relations between the people of both countries. We know too little about Chinese culture, about the ideologies and philosophies that motivate these 800 million people. I imagine the Chinese are equally unfamiliar with the American way of life, and knowledge will not lead to either people's accepting the values and beliefs of the other, but it may lead to understanding, which is what "peaceful coexistence" in the Twentieth Century should be all about.

The Chinese are Communists and will remain so when President Nixon returns to Washington. This means they are different from us, and we are different from them. It does not have to mean we are enemies--each bent on the defeat or destruction of the other.

No doubt the Chinese rhetoric and propaganda will continue, but perhaps this will now be recognized for exactly what it is and will not serve to blind us to the essential fact the Chinese are human beings, who laugh at jokes, who commit injustices toward their fellow man, who cry when in pain, who create and appreciate beauty. Could they also possibly want peace?

Annual spiritual report, 18 baptisms, 13 First Holy Communion, 7 deaths, 4 marriages, 111 families, 36 households, (a household is only one person) our parish is more or less evenly distributed between the two churches. About 250 parishioners attend Mass regularly, 100 off and on, 100 plus seldom or never. How we need everyone's help and how thankful we are for it.

Religious Education classes, we have 180 of school age, about 100 go to classes regularly, especially the lower grades, but weak in upper grades.

For adult classes, two teachers take Old Town course. The Friday pm adult course 2 from LaGrange, 2 from Milo, 1 from BJ. Sunday is last night also to register for Old Town course.

Today marks my second year with you. Thanks to one and all for your support, financial, physical, mental and above all--spiritual. 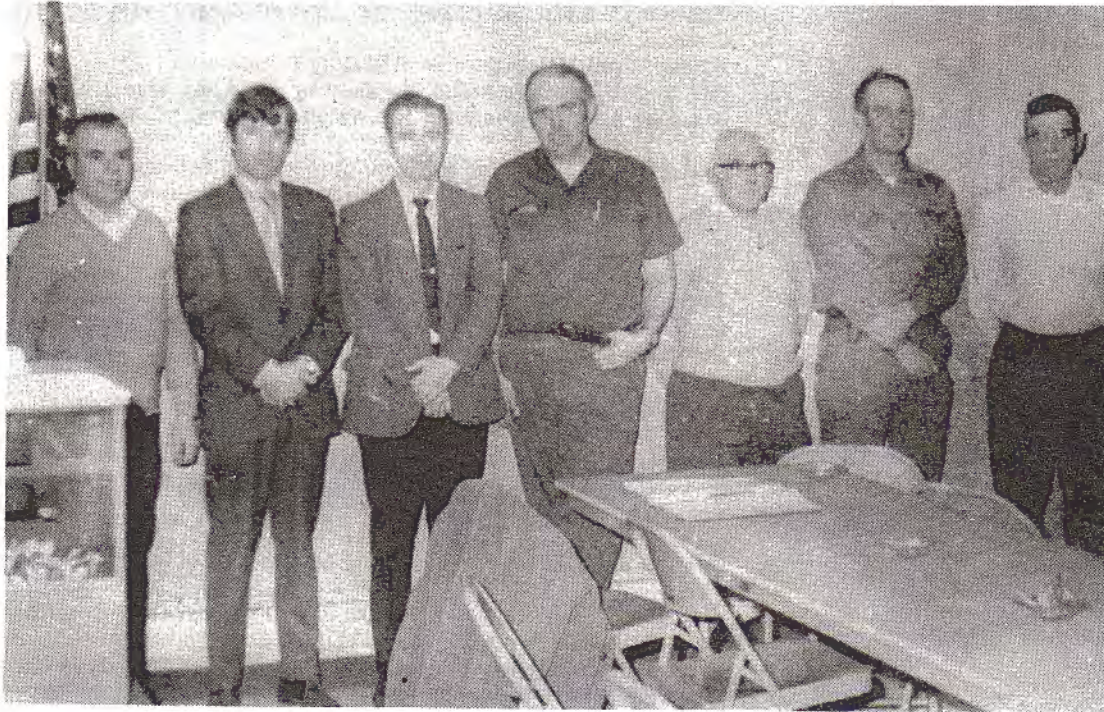

## EXPLANATION OF TAX SHELTERED ANNUITIES FOR 1971 FEDERAL INCOME TAX RETURN.

Whitney L. Wheeler, District Director of Internal Revenue for Maine, announced today that employees of public schools and certain tax exempt organizations who are participating in tax sheltered annuities should, in preparing their 1971 Federal Income Tax return, verify that the amounts paid during the year toward the purchase of the annuity contract are properly excludable from gross income.

It is important to note that an employee's exclusion allowance must be determined each year. Consequently, any contributions made by an employer under a tax sheltered annuity program, to the extent that they exceed the employee's maximum exclusion allowance, represent taxable income. As such, this amount should be includable as additional income on the employee's income tax return.

This allowance can be calculated by multiplying 20% of income shown on Form W-2 by years of service with the employer and reducing the result by the amounts excluded in previous years.

The amount excluded in previous years represent the total tax sheltered annuity payments which were excludable from the gross total contributions made under any other plan to the extent that such amounts, when paid, were excludable from the employee's gross income.

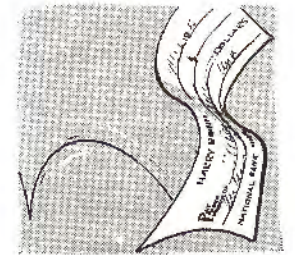
### U OF M NEWS

A student still must produce academically to remain a student at the University of Maine at Orono. Figures released for the Orono and Bangor campuses show that at the end of the fall semester in January some 247 students had either been suspended or dismissed for academic grades that didn't meet minimum requirements. Last year 226 were dropped. Enrollment for the fall semester at the two campuses totaled 8800.



## "Rubber Check"

"Your check bounced." When Harry heard this news from the neighborhood garage man, his first reaction was embarrassment. But embarrassment turned to dismay when the garage man started criminal proceedings against him. The charge: passing a worthless check.



In court, Harry explained to the judge:

"It was all an innocent mistake. Another man's check, which I had deposited earlier, had bounced in the meantime. That is why my account happened to be short."

"The fact remains," replied the garage man, "that he did give me a check that was no good. That itself is illegal."

But the court tossed out the charge against Harry. The court said he lacked the criminal intent that is an essential ingredient of the crime.

As a rule, giving a check that bounces is not a crime if the person honestly expected it to go through. But he must have a reasonable expectation, not just a pious hope. Consider this case:

An oil promoter, trying to sell stock to an investor, thought the deal was almost sewed up. Counting on some quick cash, he wrote a large check to cover various expenses. But the deal fell through and the check bounced.

Was this a criminal offense? A court said yes, because the promoter had no solid basis for expecting his check to be good. "Mere hope," said the court, was not enough.

Suppose the person expects just the opposite: that his check, although good when he wrote it, will be bad by the time it gets to the bank. Thus:

A man wrote a check for \$25 while he still had \$100 in his account. But he knew perfectly well that he had already written several other checks which would wipe out the \$100.

A court ruled afterward that he was indeed guilty of an offense. The court said what mattered was not the situation at the time he wrote the check but the situation at the "moment of truth"—when the check was presented at the bank for payment.

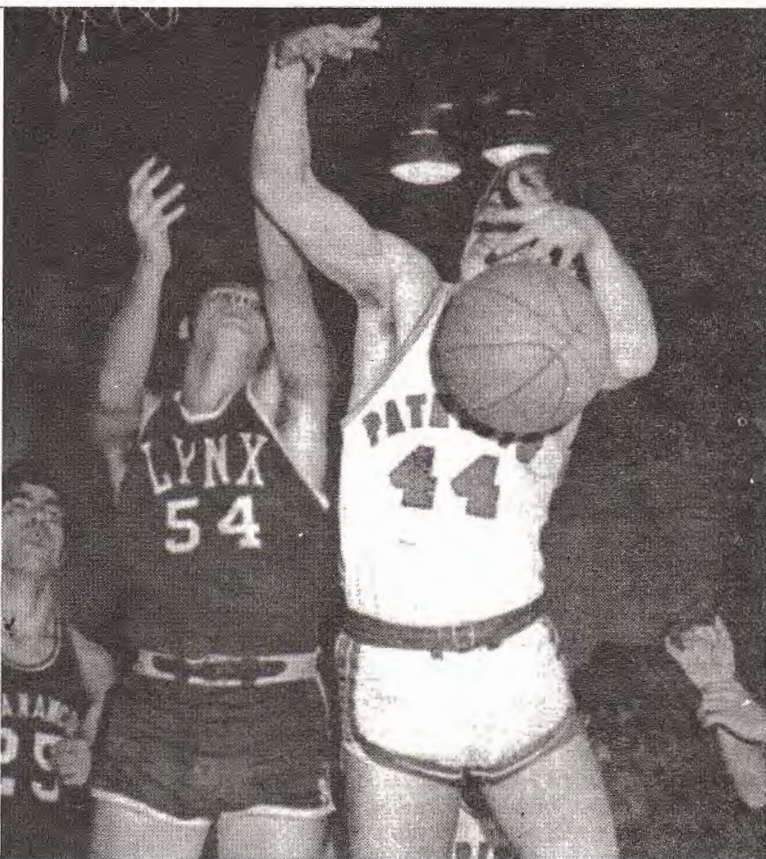
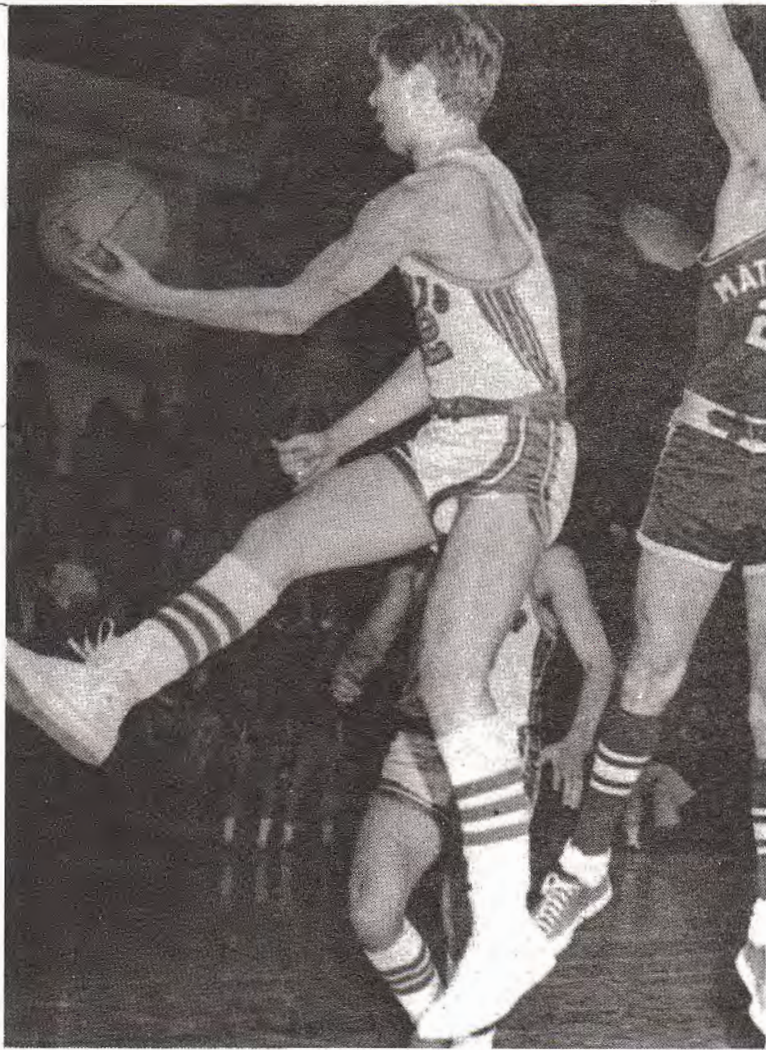

All police departments, state agencies, and military bases will be alerted concerning Pin Point Three and this exercise has been cleared by Federal Aviation Agency.

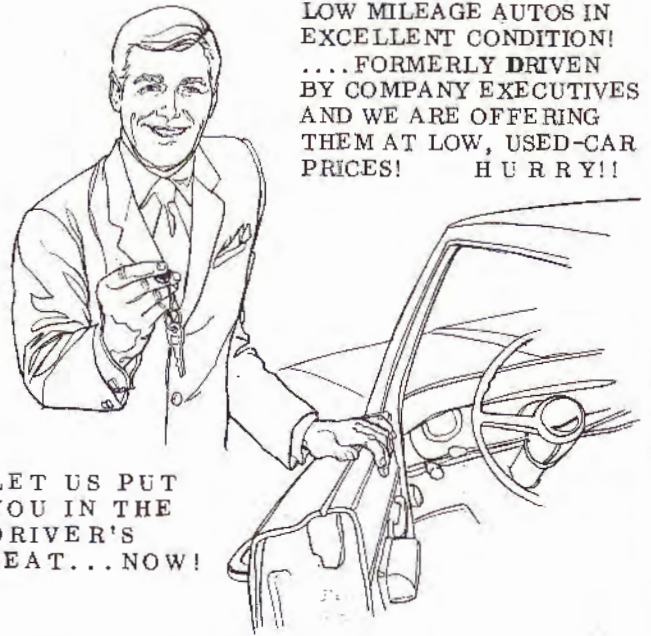
In case of adverse weather conditions or other technical problems, Exercise Pin Point Three will be held at next suitable day, Yeaton concluded.
