VIII. COURSE POLICIES

A. Late Assignments

Late assignments will only be accepted with prior approval from the instructor. You are to notify the instructor **by email** of any delay in assignment submissions and request an extension, either before or the day that the assignment is due. No assignments will be accepted after the last day of the course (when the last assignment is due). No Incompletes (I) due to a student's inability to meet the required work for this course will be given in this course. The instructor may offer the chance to resubmit an assignment; however, a 20% point deduction will be given.

Your attendance and participation in each class session is vital for your learning; this is a very interactive and experiential class. Lack of respect for the instructor or fellow classmates in any manner will also result in a reduction of participation points and can negative affect your final grade. Furthermore, you are expected to check Blackboard daily during the intensive and actively participate in all assignments. To receive a passing grade, you must attend class every day during the intensives week. Any missed classes will automatically result in final course grade of an "F." After a five minute grace period, students will lose 50 points per half hour for tardiness. This course is called an 'intensive' to depict its rigorous nature. You must plan travel to take into account possible delays. It is also advisable to reschedule your course if you become ill.
