# **A Letter** from the CEO

The first half of 2019 has been very positive for Central Virginia Electric Cooperative (CVEC) and its members. Unlike investor-owned utilities, CVEC is owned by the members it serves and meeting their needs remains the key priority for the CVEC Directors, management team, and all employees. Whether the focus is increased reliability, lowest possible power costs, or increased security and safety – you will benefit from the "Cooperative Difference."

Keeping the lights on is the number one goal of the Cooperative and the best way we can serve our members. Major strides have been made in reliability across CVEC's distribution grid and we are not done yet! In addition to keeping the rights-of-ways trimmed and hazard-free, CVEC is committed to improving performance at substations that require maintenance and upgrades.

As a result of member requests, **CVEC introduced a community solar program called Solar Share**. In just over a year, the program is 86% subscribed and still going strong. CVEC continues to seek out renewable generation where cost effective to avoid wholesale transmission fees and stabilize low energy costs for the long-term.

The system-wide fiber communications installation that is underway will increase security, improve electric service reliability, lower power costs, and enable demand response programs. In addition, **all CVEC members will have the option to subscribe to reliable, affordable high-speed internet** with Firefly Fiber Broadband<sup>SM</sup>, CVEC's wholly-owned subsidiary. The construction costs for the communication network will be paid for by the sale of the internet sales and the profits from Firefly will be the property of CVEC and its members.

Your team here at CVEC is committed to providing stellar service and reliable, affordable and safe energy every single day. In addition, we will seek new ways to communicate with members and offer information on ways to reduce usage and save money.

#### **2019 Annual Member's Meeting**

CVEC members and special guests gathered at Nelson County High School on June 19<sup>th</sup> to participate in CVEC's 82<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting.

During the meeting, members received updates on CVEC's 2018 achievements and finances. CEO Gary Wood discussed Solar Share, CVEC's community solar program, and updates on CVEC's rural broadband initiative.

After the election, members were able to ask questions before adjourning to collect their prizes. CVEC members returned 1,784 proxies by mail and 106 in person. Members who mailed in ballots were entered into a drawing for a \$100 bill credit.

#### "United We Light: Project Bolivia 2019"

Three CVEC linemen are heading to Bolivia for three weeks this fall to expand the existing power network, providing power to families in Oruro Bolivia for the first time.

Fifteen lineworkers from Virginia and Maryland cooperatives will work 8-10 hours a day to set poles, string wire and hang transformers to bring power to 42 homes in rural areas. Lineworkers will need to acclimate to the elevation, which is more than two miles above sea level, and the temperature that ranges from 25 to 60 degrees in a day. All three of these seasoned CVEC linemen have traveled abroad and have helped many states during hurricanes and other natural disasters but they are all very excited to use their skill set to help bring power to rural parts of Bolivia.

### Fiber Build: How Do We Choose?

# *"When will my neighborhood get broadband and how do you determine which area is next?"*

CVEC has several factors to consider when determining

which area is next for fiber construction: density, lowest cost to serve and network connectivity. During the first several years of the fiber build, it is important to the project finances to build in areas where the cost to serve is lowest. Areas with more members per mile bring internet to more members at once and are less expensive to build. However, grant funds can help to offset the cost of the build and make more rural areas eligible. Finally, the engineers must evaluate how CVEC can connect each area together and the sequence that makes most sense.

The majority of our membership has struggled to find

a solution to the lack of reliable options for internet

access in their homes. Building 4,500 miles of fiber is a large undertaking, but CVEC is committed to building fiber to each of its members by 2023. Internet service will be offered by Firefly Fiber Broadband<sup>SM</sup>, CVEC's wholly-owned subsidiary. Please check the Firefly website often for updates: **www.fireflyva.com**.

#### Interested in seeing the development and expansion of renewable energy sources?

CVEC offers a 100% Renewable Energy Attributes Electric Service Rider (Schedule RE-1). This Rider is available on a voluntary basis as a "companion rate" to any residential customer for the entire month's electricity usage. After a member signs up for the 100% Renewable Energy Attributes Electric Service Rider, an additional charge of \$0.015 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) is added to the monthly bill. This is a sellat-cost charge with no profit or added fee for CVEC.

Renewable Energy Certificates (REC's) are produced every time a renewable source (windmill, solar array, hydro, etc.) generates 1,000 kWh. Renewable Energy Credits previously purchased are sourced from one or more of the following:

- Armenia Mountain Wind Farm in north-central Pennsylvania (Tioga and Bradford counties); and/or
- Stony Creek Wind Farm in southwestern Pennsylvania (Somerset County).

The purchased Renewable Energy Certificates (REC's) are retired in an amount equal to the energy used by the customers participating in this rate rider. Once the previously purchased REC's are retired, CVEC will use the REC's associated with energy purchases from the Coronal solar farms: Martin Solar, LLC and Palmer Solar, LLC.

## **CVEC Attends Dedication of New Training Center**

CVEC Directors and Staff attended the May 22 dedication ceremony of the Virginia, Maryland & Delaware Association of Electric Cooperatives (VMDAEC) Training Center and joined more than 120 co-op officials, elected representatives, government officials and dignitaries at the site located adjacent to the CVEC Palmyra office.

CVEC was presented a proclamation of gratitude on behalf of the VMDAEC for its donation of the nine acres to the association for the \$1.5 million project at a favorable price.

"This building is a great investment in a number of ways," said Gary Wood, CVEC President and CEO. "It's a deposit on the continuing investment co-ops are making in Fluvanna County. It's an investment in all the instructors and trainers because you now have a great tool to deliver your messages. And it's an investment among co-ops in our relationship because our strength comes from the partnerships we share."

In addition to line-worker training on-site, the 9,600-square-foot building will provide classrooms that employ state-of-the-art video technology for indoor training. The building also offers a full-service kitchen with a catering window, a break room, showers, and large garage bay for equipment demos and training in inclement weather.
