A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL GUY HERRMANN



Dear Parents/Guardians,

During the holidays, many of you will travel to visit relatives and friends or they will travel to see you. It is nice to see each other person-to-person, even once a year, to catch up on how things have changed and how your child has progressed in one year. With the communication technology we have today your child is becoming more accustomed to communicating on a frequent basis with relatives and friends via texting, Facebook, Skype, and other forms of electronic communication instead of person-toperson.

When we return from Winter Break in January of 2011 it is fun and interesting to hear what the students received for break and how they are using their new electronic devices. Now that most cell phones come with a camera and have the potential of placing pictures on a Facebook page or a short video on YouTube, we as parents must be as vigilant as ever when it comes to how our child uses their new devices. Pictures that are posted on a Facebook wall can be downloaded by a friend, altered, and sent out as a "joke" to others, without your child ever knowing it. Though they may not set up a Facebook page at your home they might at a friend's house where there is peer pressure to set a page up like all of their peers. They may use the computer their to set a page up and you would not know.

Even gaming systems (X-box 360 for one) has the capability to allow your child to communicate with others in the game environment through a Wi-Fi connection. Your child may not know who some of these individuals are and yet may give away self-identifying information without realizing it.

Phones are now being used for texting and "sexting" which can be used to play very cruel jokes at your child's sake. It is only after this information has been spread to many others do they come to understand what has happened, yet have no place to hide from the comments.

Please sit down with your child and have a discussion (4th grade and up) about the dangers of these types of communication, from the child receiving the unwanted attention to the child that is distributing communications that may cause a negative situation to occur for others.

Paddock School Family Service Project Feed My Starving Children in Schaumburg at their facility (1072 National Parkway, Schaumburg) Wednesday 2/9/2011 6 pm - 7:30 pm



Paddock families and staff are invited to volunteer together for a school-wide family service project at Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) in Schaumburg. We'll pack food that meets the nutritional needs of a 4-to-8-year-old malnourished child which will be distributed through FMSC to another country. Each meal has 20 different vitamins and minerals that are specifically tailored to meet a child's nutritional needs for one day. FMSC will also provide an overview to all volunteers about world hunger.

Here is what their website has to say about what we can look forward to during our project: FMSC focuses on citizenship, social service, asset building and other positive aspects of character development. The FMSC volunteer experience can provide a real-world application of classroom learning. Students are able to work together for a finite period of time and with a specific, high-value outcome. At the end of every volunteer session the group knows exactly how many meals were produced to eliminate hunger in the world.

If interest goes beyond the spots for that night, we will schedule another date later in the year. 


PADDOCK'S BIRTHDAY BOOK CLUB

NOROVIRUS PREVENTION

From the Illinois Department of Public Health

Important Public Health Notice Regarding Norovirus

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has noted a marked increase in the number of reported outbreaks of Norovirus in schools and daycare facilities this fall. The Norovirus is a very contagious acute gastrointestinal virus characterized by diarrhea, vomiting and stomach pain. IDPH has released guidance concerning limiting the spread of the virus and exclusion recommendations for children and staff in schools and daycare facilities.

Norovirus, formerly called norwalk-like virus, is a virus that causes acute gastroenteritis in humans. The most common symptoms of norovirus are diarrhea, vomiting, and stomach pain. Norovirus is very contagious, and is spread through contaminated food or water, by contact with an infected person, or by contamination in the environment. The virus has an incubation period of 24-48 hours. Infected individuals are symptomatic for 1-2 days, but may shed the virus for up to 2 weeks after recovering. Norovirus outbreaks are common in schools and daycare facilities. In 2010, Illinois has experienced a greater number of outbreaks than is normally expected.

Steps daycare facilities and schools can take to reduce transmission of norovirus are outlined below.

- Children and staff who are experiencing symptoms of norovirus should stay home from school or daycare
 until 24 hours after symptoms have stopped. Staff involved in food preparation should be restricted from
 preparing food for 48 hours after symptoms stop. The staff may perform other duties not associated with
 food preparation 24 hours after symptoms have stopped.
- Good hand hygiene is the best way to prevent transmission of norovirus. Hands should be washed with warm water and soap for 15-20 seconds. Children should be taught good hand hygiene practices, and should wash their hands after using the bathroom and before eating. Staff, especially staff responsible for caring for diapered children, should wash their hands frequently. During outbreaks, washing hands with soap and water is preferable to using alcohol- based hand sanitizers. Hand sanitizers are only minimally effective against norovirus1.
- Norovirus is often spread through contaminated food or water. Facilities serving or sharing food should take these extra precautions: Restrict sharing of foods brought from private homes. Restrict students' sharing of any communal food items in classrooms. Instead, the teacher should hand out items to be shared after washing his/her hands. Stop using self-service food bars. Do not let children serve themselves in any manner which might promote direct hand contact with shared foods.

Navigate15: Community and District for Educational Success



In a move to involve the full force of the community in decisions affecting the future direction of Community Consolidated School District 15, Superintendent Scott Thompson recently announced plans to hold a series of community meetings beginning Tuesday, November 16. A small team of staff and citizens will help plan and implement these meetings. The Facilitating Team has given the process a name: *Navigate15*. The name reflects the team's goal of using the engagement sessions to guide the future direction of Community Consolidated School District 15.

The task force will seek the opinions and insights of the entire community—parents, residents, and business leaders. *Navigate15* hopes to open the lines of communication between the District and the communities it serves and will use that feedback to create connections resulting in meaningful recommendations for District 15.

Beginning on November 16 and continuing into the next year, individuals participating in *Navigate15* will study and discuss a variety of topics. *What do other high performing school districts have that District 15 doesn't? What programs would improve student achievement in District 15 schools?* From facilities to finances to demographics to technology, *Navigate15* meetings will provide the information needed to make informed recommendations to the school board in August 2011.

Community involvement in *Navigate15* is vital to its success and the District has extended an open invitation to participate in the meetings. Mr. Thompson earned a master's degree in divinity at North Park Seminary and is currently working toward completion of his doctorate in educational leadership from National Louis University.
