### Summarizing a Story

- A summary is a **shortened retelling** of the most important events in a story.
- A summary is written as a **short paragraph** that tells the **events in time order**.
- A summary includes a main idea statement and the most important details and events from the beginning, middle, and end of a story.

#### A Summary of *The Three Little Pigs*

Three little pigs learn an important lesson about careful planning. The pigs left their mother's home. The first little pig built a home out of straw. The second little pig built one from wood. A wolf blew both houses down. The third little pig built a house of bricks. The wolf could not blow it down. When the wolf came down the chimney, he was burned by fire. The wolf ran away and never came back.

#### Why Opossum Has a Bare Tail Guided Practice


One day Opossum was walking in the woods around sunset when he spied Raccoon. Now Opossum had always admired Raccoon because he had a beautiful tail with rings all around it.
