Sovereign Prince, Illustrious Brother John F. Kessler, 33° was born on March 24, 1956 in Hartford, CT to Ray E. and Phyllis H. Kessler, as the middle of three sons. He graduated high school from The Watkinson School in Hartford, CT in 1974, participating in varsity baseball, hockey and soccer. He attended three years of college at Nasson College in Springvale, Maine until 1977.

He worked in his family's construction business, The Kessler Construction Company, Inc. in Hartford, CT, until 1980, then for the Times Mirror Cable Television Company, being promoted to manager of his Division in 1983. In October, 1985 he returned to work in his family construction business and is currently partners with his brother in the ownership and management of their three companies.

On October 15th 1988 he married Barbara L. Schumacher. He and Barbara live in Southington, CT with their dog "Buddy".

He was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on November 17, 1986 at Wyllys Lodge #99, (now Wyllys-St. John's Lodge #4 in West Hartford), in the same lodge as his father and grandfather. He joined the officer's line as the Senior Steward in 1994, advancing to the East as Worshipful Master in 1997 and serving for three terms. John has also served as District Deputy of Masonic District 6C.

In May 15, 1999 he joined the Valley of Hartford and the Sphinx Temple Shrine.

John was elected to receive the Illustrious 33rd degree in 2005 and received it on August 30, 2005 in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Valley of Hartford Portrays "The Drama of Secret Master"

On the evening of March 6, 2008, the Spring Class of 2008 and some of our newer Scottish Rite brethren experienced some unique ritual as the Valley of Hartford portrayed the Drama of *Secret Master* for the first time since it was "retired" as a degree in favor of the new 4th Degree *Master Traveler*. Brethren who have joined the Scottish since 2004 have only known the *Master Traveler* degree as the 4th degree. Brethren joining before 2004 remember *Secret Master* as the 4th degree they saw at their entrance into the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite.

Filled with beautiful lessons, such as the "majesty of duty," the drama of Secret Master served as wonderful bridge between Blue Lodge Masonry and the Lodge of Perfection in the Scottish Rite. Many brethren from the Valley of Hartford were dismayed that these lessons might be lost through disuse, and requested permission from Ill. Jim Spencer, 33°, Deputy for Connecticut, to portray the Drama in addition to the usual 4th degree.

On March 6, the candidates and attending brethren experienced the Lodge of Perfection in "retro style": watching the "old" beginning of the Lodge of Perfection journey, followed by the culmination of the Lodge of Perfection with the regular 14th degree, *Grand Elect Mason*.

Brethren who participated in the portrayal had experience levels ranging from 10-plus years in the Valley, to one of our newest brethren, who joined in 2006 and experienced *Secret Master* in a truly unique way: performing as opposed to viewing.

Many thanks go out to the cast: Brothers Frank Way, Bud Buckner, Ric Manner, Charlie Weiss, Justin Duffy, John Spencer, Frank Dlugoleski, Bill Bohman, Austin Clark, John Kessler, Gerry Mamaclay, Steve McMahon, and Jon Beatty. In honor of the evening, the cast, as well as the Officers of the Charter Oak Lodge of Perfection, wore a special "4th Degree Secret Master" pin, as a way of celebrating its first portrayal in five years. Usually tickets are picked up at the "Will Call" window, but in any case, I will contact you in that last week.
- 4. I batch up the checks and give them to the Treasurer in one batch, just before the game, so if you send your check in early, please don't call and ask why it has not yet cleared.

It Cannot Be As It Once Was

The river of time flows through our lives without interruption. It marks the changes in our day-to-day existence. Some of those changes are easy, some are difficult. The older you get, the more difficult change becomes. The river of time has had an effect on Scottish Rite Masonry, and because we failed to change the way we do things, Masonry suffered. I was made a 32nd Degree Mason in 1983, one of a class of 75 Brothers. Fifteen years after that I worked in a Consistory Degree with one solitary candidate in the audience. American society had changed and had passed us by.

What kind of change is necessary in order for us to be a vibrant social organization? It is certainly not necessary that we change who we are and what we believe in. Those things are eternal and will never change. We do need to interact with people who are not Masons. We need to let them know who we are and what we are about. We need to include spouses and families and make Family Life programs an important part of our operation. People no longer have time on their hands, and will not inquire about us unless they know we exist.

So, how do we get the attention of the general public? Radio and television promotions have shown excellent results in other jurisdictions, and I believe would show the same results in Connecticut. Use of newer communication devices and techniques (Email being one) would also be of assistance.

That being said, I believe there is a great need for what the Scottish Rite has to offer. People have become somewhat isolated from one another in the Electronic Age. We were not meant to be solitary creatures, and I believe that many good men would welcome the opportunity to share communion with others in a group espousing the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.

Because of the leadership shown by many members of our Valley, Hartford has put in place many new ways of addressing this problem. Of course, leadership is meaningless unless you have a willing group of Brethren to carry out solutions to problems. We are very fortunate to have a great core of Scottish Rite Masons. As a result of this, it is my firm belief that we will grow and keep growing as the river of time flows on.

At this time, Masonry is showing a general increase in membership. The Valley of Hartford has shown a steady increase in membership because of the hard work of our Brothers. Especially helpful were new programs which include spouses, such as presentation type programs and dinners for newly made 32nd Degree Masons. With a steady outlook toward the future, we will continue to grow and prosper.

To those for whom these changes are difficult, I ask your indulgence. I wish you to remain an active part of the Rite and to give your knowledge and experience to the younger Brethren. I do understand that you want the very best for our Valley.

To all our Brothers, please remember that "It cannot be as it once was".

It can and WILL be better.

Virtus Iunxit Mors Non Separabit

"Whom Virtue Unites, Death Cannot Separate" by Francis G. Way, MSA

While not as visually captivating as the Chapter of Rose Croix's *Knight of Rose Croix* degree, or as dramatically appealing as the Princes of Jerusalem degrees, with the tempting of Zerubbabel or the antics of Barticus, Artiban and Araspes, the 14th Degree, *Grand Elect Mason*, is one of the most intellectually profound degrees in the entire Scottish Rite.

After working in this degree for many years, I have developed a deep appreciation, and a growing understanding of this, the culmination of the Lodge of Perfection. The moving language, the deeply symbolic portions of the degree, and the highly refined concepts can make a profound and lasting impression on candidates if the degree is properly portrayed.

Unlike other degrees in the Lodge of Perfection, the cast is not in costume, but the officers instead portray the degree in tuxedo, with aprons and jewels, similar to a Blue Lodge degree. The officers' constitutional titles are used. I feel that this is intentional, so as to not distract the candidates from the important concepts of the ritual itself. This also serves to set this degree apart from those that have preceded it, and lends a certain dignity and dominance to the degree in the Lodge of Perfection.

One of the first points that comes to mind when contemplating this degree is that the setting is the Secret Vault **under** the Sanctum Sanctorum. This fact is barely mentioned, in just one short line of ritual, early in the degree. This concept, however, should have deep connotations for any brother who is also a York Rite Mason. It also invokes a strong parallel with the 13th degree, *Master of the Ninth Arch*, which is the dramatic climax of the Lodge of Perfection and prepares the way for *Grand Elect Mason*.

Another point that is often missed is that when praying, the officers kneel at the Sign of the Burning Bush, kneeling on one knee, one hand raised beside the face as if to shield it from heat or fire. This sign has strong allusions to Moses at the Burning Bush, and Moses on Mount Sinai plays an integral role in the lessons of this degree. However, this fact is not spelled out anywhere except in a stage direction in the ritual. One wonders if the candidates ever make the connection?

A central part of the degree is the "ancient aroba", a pledge or covenant of friendship by breaking bread together. By partaking of the aroba, the brethren are forging a covenant, an alliance, and this parallels the covenant God forged with Moses through the Ten Commandments. Once this surety of friendship has taken place, all have been prepared for the full unveiling of the Ineffable Degrees' mysteries in the latter parts of the degree. Virtue has united all the participants.

The Ineffable Degrees conclude with the Thrice Potent Master revealing the Grand Ineffable Word of a Grand Elect Mason, fulfilling a promise that was made in the Drama of *Secret Master* (which prior to 2004 was the 4th degree, the start of the Lodge of Perfection). This conclusion resolves much of the foreshadowing that has started in Secret Master and continued in various parts of the Ineffable Degrees.

Much as *Secret Master* was intended to be a bridge into the Lodge of Perfection, I feel that the entire Lodge of Perfection, with its Solomonic dramas that lead to and culminate with *Grand Elect Mason*, serves as a bridge to the rest of the Scottish Rite. Possessing the unadorned but beautiful simplicity of a pure ring of gold, the 14th degree is often overlooked in favor of the ornate degree work later in the Rite. But if one concentrates on the beautiful oratory, and the deep, symbolic concepts, one can find wisdom, strength and beauty.

Properly equipped with this wisdom, strength and beauty, the candidate is thus prepared for the rest of his Scottish Rite journey, climbing steadily onward, and upward, toward broader horizons, loftier planes of thought, and nobler conceptions of Deity.

With over 40 years of solid history behind them, the folks from TNOS take their theater seriously, and have again and again expressed an appreciation for both our venue, and our willingness to give back to the community by letting them perform there.
