Work Smart Salary Negotiation Training October 13 in Baton Rouge!

On October 13 our Baton Rouge Branch will host a *Work Smart Salary Negotiation Training* in Baton Rouge, Saturday, October 13, 10 am- 12:30 pm at the Bluebonnet Library. We hope to hold *Work Smart Salary Negotiation Trainings* in each of our branches over the next year to help AAUW train 10 million women across the country by 2020.

AAUW Work Smart is designed to help you negotiate for a new job, raise, or promotion. In every two-hour workshop you'll gain confidence in your negotiation style through facilitated discussion and role-play and learn

- how to identify and articulate your personal value
- how to develop an arsenal of persuasive responses and other negotiation strategies, including how to get a raise or promotion
- how to conduct objective market research to benchmark a target salary and benefits
- about the wage gap, including its long-term consequences

Why is negotiation so important? AAUW's research on the gender pay gap shows that, **one year out of college**, women are already paid significantly less than men. Women who work full time take home **80 cents (70 cents in Louisiana)** for every dollar a full-time male worker is paid. And over a lifetime, those lost potential earnings add up.

Women who negotiate increase their potential to earn higher salaries and better benefits packages. By negotiating fair and equitable salaries, you'll be better able to pay off loans, buy the things you want and need, and even save for retirement.

2020 WOMEN'S VOTE CENTENNIAL INITIATIVE **LOOKING FOR VOLUNTEERS**

2020 marks 100 years that women in America have had the right to vote. The 2020 Women's Vote Centennial Initiative (WVCI) <https://www.2020centennial.org/about/> is a collaborative effort created to share information and stimulate activities around the country in the years leading up to 2020. It is a volunteer initiative that is composed of a broad range of groups and individuals who collectively represent various segments of the historical women's suffrage movement and contemporary women's organizations.

Its mission is to serve as a central organizing and information-sharing entity for programs, projects, and activities that commemorate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment, educate the public on the legal and social advances resulting from the amendment, and stimulate dialogue to address the ongoing fight for women's rights.

AAUW of LA president Vivian Guillory was contacted by Tanya M. Shlosman B.A., M.A., American History and Museum Studies, Writer, and Louisiana State Representative for the Women's Vote Centennial Initiative (WVCI).
