


Women Wall of Fame



We are writing this letter on behalf of the Bridge School community to elicit your support in developing a Northside Agricultural High School on the underutilized Dunning property. Graduating 8th grade Bridge students currently have only Steinmetz High School as their neighborhood school choice. A new options high school in the area would afford our children more choice in their high school selection. High quality educational opportunities greatly enhance the desirability of Chicago residents to reside in our wonderful area. Our children deserve no less.

Apparently a very small group of vocal activists have perpetrated the misconception that area residents are not in favor of the development of this high school. Having surveyed the hundreds of parents who have children attending Bridge School has shown otherwise. There is a great desire among hundreds of neighborhood residents to develop an attractive high school option for their children. We feel fairly comfortable in stating that other community residents who have children attending neighboring elementary schools feel the same.

We appreciate the support you have shown in the past in securing much needed services for your constituents. The speed bumps installed to slow down local traffic and the recently installed street lighting have greatly improved the safety and quality of life in our school's community. The long list of other improvements you have initiated in our ward have also been greatly appreciated by the community. Please help us increase the educational opportunities for our children by supporting the development of an options high school in our area.

Once again, on behalf of the Bridge School community, we would like to thank you for looking out for the welfare of the Bridge School children and the residents of the 38th Ward community.


