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





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rats in the kitchen

Pixar and Disney do it again with Ratatouille

The thought of rats in the kitchen is enough to make you lose your appetite. But, somehow, Pixar makes the sickening scenario deliciously appealing in their latest animated tour-de-force Ratatouille, which opens this week.

Auguste Gusteau (Brad Garrett) is the Emeril of France. Years of owning and operating Paris' only five-star restaurant have catapulted him into the limelight, making the chef a worldwide celebrity. Soon after releasing his best-selling cookbook, Anyone Can Cook, Gusteau earns the disdain of snooty food critic Anton Ego (Peter O'Toole), who visits the restaurant and gives it an unfavorable review, causing it to lose a star. Soon after, Gusteau dies, many say because of Ego's brutal criticism, and according to French tradition the restaurant loses another star when the chef dies. With the head chef gone, the once grand example of French cuisine is relegated to a tourist trap.

Our story actually begins a couple years later with Remy (Patton Oswalt), a lowly rat. We soon find, however, that our hero is not your average rat. Blessed with a superior sense of smell and a delicate palette, Remy is put off by the garbage his family eats and searches for the good food found in human homes. During his trips to the kitchen, Remy learns about cooking from reruns of Gusteau's television show and his famous cookbook. But before he gets a chance to shine in the kitchen, the culinary party is cut short when the owner of the home Remy and his family lives in discovers the hundred-or-so unwanted guests. In the scuffle, the aspiring chef is swept down a sewer and separated from his family. When he finally makes it above ground, Remy finds that he's unknowingly lived minutes away from Paris, France, home of the greatest food in the world.

As fate would have it, Remy ends up in Gusteau's restaurant where he meets a lonely garbage boy named Linguini (Lou Romano). After spilling a pot of soup on his first day, Linguini tries to fix it before anyone notices to avoid losing his job. The result is disastrous and Remy can't stop himself from fixing the brew, a sight that causes Linguini to do a doubletake. When the change in the soup is discovered and adored by the customers, Linguini gets the credit and a promotion. This is, of course, a problem since the young man can barely boil water. Linguini is desperate to keep his job and Remy is itching to cook, so the two secretly join forces, wowing customers and critics with their food. Linguini's success in the kitch-

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en raises the eyebrow of the restaurant's executive chef, Skinner (Ian Holm), who worries the newcomer may be a threat to his position. The renewed buzz about the restaurant also catches the attention of Anton Ego, who is sure the meals people are raving about are sub-par at best. Remy and Linguini must get past these two formidable obstacles if they want to make their dreams of culinary glory a reality.

Ratatouille is hands down the best Pixar film since the Toy Story movies. Both hilarious and heartwarming at the same time, the story never fails to hold the attention of movie-goers young and old. This is the kind of film parents will take their kids to see and then want to hire a babysitter so they can go back and see it all over again without the little ones in tow. Brad Bird mentioned in a recent interview with Entertainment Weekly that kids are just 10 percent of the audience he's making movies for and it shows with Ratatouille. The humor is perfectly suited for families, with jokes and gags that will keep parents laughing but won't alienate kids with overly "adult" innuendos.

That's not to say that the kids won't get a kick out of this rat-infested film too. There's plenty of silly wordplay and slapstick to keep them happy. I'm sure it goes without saying that the animation was great, but some scenes actually had me gasping at the sight of them. When Remy takes his trip through the sewer, the water was so incredibly realistic my mouth literally dropped. The backgrounds are also wonderfully drawn, capturing the essence and beauty of "The City of Light" perfectly.

I've seen all of Pixar's previous films and have liked every one, but Ratatouille blows Nemo out of the water. It scares up more laughs than Monsters Inc and it runs circles around Cars. Pixar's got a new hit on their hands and it's delicious.



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michael moore sick of it all

Sicko movie review

In this shocking documentary, Michael Moore has, in his trademark satiric way, exposed the festering boil of our broken health care system as a corporate fraud–set up to deny as many claims as possible. By presenting real life HMO horror stories, Moore overcomes his tendency to grandstand with pomposity.

The individual patients' stories are eye-opening, but most viewers will understand because almost everyone has been through this Machiavellian system. I'm still paying for my cancer treatment from back in 2005, when the insurance only covered 80% and my share was thousands of dollars.

In true documentary style, Moore lets his subjects tell their own tragic stories. One man had to decide between reattaching one finger out of two, because the ring finger cost \$12,000 as opposed to the middle finger, which cost \$20 grand. Even though he had insurance, it wouldn't cover both fingers.

Then Moore features a widow whose husband had a rare type of cancer. He was denied coverage, and they couldn't afford the treatment, which was deemed experimental (a typical excuse for denial) and he died. In effect, the HMO killed him. Moore presents other cases which are equally tragic and he shows the HMOs only care is reducing costs, not the patients' well being.

Moving on, Moore spotlighted the former employees of the HMOs who could no longer live with themselves, so they quit and testified before Congress about their jobs of denying patients coverage. One woman said she got a bonus for denying so many patients. One guy, known as a "hit man," would search through the forms looking for a minor mistake that would result in denial of the coverage. In other words, the HMOs' mission is strictly profit motivated.

Moore traces the origins of the HMO system back to the Nixon administration. Thanks to those famous tapes from February of 1971, when Edgar Kaiser and his profit-rigged system became the first HMO–Kaiser Permanente, which was set up in the



beginning to minimize patient expenditure to maximize profit. As the HMOs grew into a powerful Jabba the Hutt, the companies began lining the pockets of the politicians insuring their business would profit at the expense of compassionate patient care.

One of the most interesting segments in the film is when Moore presents footage during Bill Clinton's first term, when Hillary Clinton tried to introduce universal health care to Congress. She was met with a wall of resistance. One by one the Senators and Congressmen gave the typical anti-socialized medicine speeches, which have always tied socialized medicine with communism. Hillary was beaten-up badly for her righteous effort to change the system.

To show that our leaders' opposition to socialized medicine was profit-motivated propaganda, Moore traveled to countries that have thriving universal healthcare—Canada, Britain, France, and Cuba, where he discovered fully viable, top-rate healthcare systems that are completely free—even the drugs. He was amazed by what he found.

Moore delved deeply into these countries' medical systems, interviewing doctors, patients, and the Americans living in these countries. Contrary to what we have always been told, in each country that has universal health care subsidized by the government, the quality of care has not suffered because it is free.

In France, doctors earn from \$160,000 to \$200,000 a year and live very well indeed. Since they don't have to worry about money, they concentrate on their patients' health. If you get sick in France, you go to a clinic or a doctor and whatever it takes to get you well they will use, including MRIs and other high tech methods, that are deemed too expensive here. And it's all free. The most interesting segment is when Moore takes a group of chronically ill 9/11 rescue workers to Cuba (he inexplicably got into the country). They went to the Havana hospital, the Cuban doctors treated the patients, and they were able to get their medication either free or at a fraction of the price in America.

On the down side, Moore did not present the fact that under Castro, Cuba has degenerated into a dirt poor third world nation where everyone wallows in poverty except Castro and his family. However, Moore was making a point that even in this banana republic, people get free, first-class healthcare.

Finally, Moore's documentary asks the pertinent question: If socialized medicine works well without sacrificing quality care in many other countries, why have we been so against adopting a system that is proven effective? Moore's film exposes blatant HMO fraud, so we can conclude that many legislators are getting filthy rich from the HMO payoffs while the American people suffer. Perhaps this film will cause people to wake up and help change the system.

Just when you thought our nation's computer grid was safe, a fiendish computer genius skirted our most complex security networks to wreak havoc on our nation's computer systems. The hacker intrusion underscored our dependence on computers that run everything from traffic lights to power stations. The brazen cyber-attack could cripple our country's infrastructure.

Ah, but have no fear, Bruce Willis is back with a vengeance as his celebrated John McClane character. Now, Detective McClane hangs in there after 30 years on the job. The likable working class cop is still old school. After 9/11 he is concerned about terrorist attacks, but at work, he goes with the flow.


Die Hard 3 was released in 1995. Now, 12 years later, McClane is divorced and has a strained relationship with his grown up daughter Lucy (Mary Elizabeth Winstead). As this scenario evolves, Mc-Clane is relegated to picking up suspects and other go-for duties. While going to fetch a hacker wanted for questioning by the FBI, McClane stumbles on a plot to compromise our national computer grid, shutting down our country in what hackers call "a fire sale" attack.

Yeah, the serious gun action starts right away, as McClane saves Farrell and gets him back to the FBI

Admittedly, the *Die Hard* series is one of my quilty pleasures. But this episode is by far the most exciting of the series. It's updated and ramped-up exponentially from Number 3. Willis has refined Mc-Clane into a Terminator-like grumpy geezer, but with his droll one-liners intact. Sure, you have to suspend your disbelief to buy some of the outrageous stunts, but that is what makes Willis so appealing. He doesn't take himself seriously, and his daring stunts are in the name of a righteous cause-revenge for ruining his day. He tells the cyber terrorist mastermind "I'm coming to kill you," and we believe he can do it, despite the odds.

Justin Long has graduated to the big time from his Ed character and his Apple commercials. His pivotal role as Matt Ferrell in this film was a real coup for his career. He's funny and makes a lovable foil for McClane's aversion to anything with microchips.

He even comes to McClane's rescue on several occasions. Violence of this level is totally alien to the young hacker. When he meets McClane, trained killers are trying to rub him out and things only escalate from there. Long is the comic relief.

The cyber-attack mastermind has a special agenda and Farrell figures it out, which puts him and McClane in further danger. There is no backup on this caper, as the two unlikely partners go into battle with the heavily armed terrorists. It is continuous action with character development on the fly. There is no time for sappy romance or other action film cliches, McClane is all business.

Skillfully directed by Len Wiseman and written by committee, the film is an action tour de force. Willis seems joyous to be back in action wearing his dirty T-shirt with blood flowing from numerous wounds, and his only motivation is personal revenge.

When the terrorists black out of the city, McClane and Farrell visit Farrell's hacker buddy Warlock, played with stand-out humor by Kevin Smith. Of course, he has back up generators and his "control center" is located in his mom's basement. They find him because his house is the only one with lights. With Warlock's help, McClane and Farrell unravel the mastermind's end game. The smartypants kingpin can't believe one man and his hacker tag-along can get close to him with his crack secu-

this is a fast and furious ride as McClane and Farrell close in on the cyber-attackers. Watching this new Die Hard, made me realize how much I'd missed the

Primeval dvd review

The idea of a massive crocodile with a taste for human blood sounds like something straight out of Hollywood. In truth, a monster croc named Gustave lives and hunts in Burundi, Africa and it's been said that he's taken the lives of over 200 people. In true Hollywood form, a CGI version of Gustave made his big screen debut earlier this year in the film Primeval. The modern-day monster movie is now available on

Tim Manfrey (Dominic Purcell) is a cynical broadcast journalist who is forced to cover a story about an African killer croc with his trusty cameraman Steven (Orlando Jones) and pretty young reporter Aviva Masters (Brooke Langton). While Aviva, who's used to churning out animal fluff pieces, is excited to cover something more dangerous, Tim is more interested in using the assignment as an excuse to do a story about Burundi's raging civil war. The three city-slickers head to Africa and meet up with a crocodile hunter who plans on taking the animal alive and a hardbitten guide who has a better idea of what to do with old Gustave,

like blow him up with grenades. The team sets off to capture the beast and soon finds that the killer croc has other plans. If that's not bad enough, the brutal warlord who rules the area, and has dubbed himself "Little Gustave," is going around killing people and Steven captures it all on tape. Little Gustave, of course, finds out about the video and begins hunting down the intrepid reporters.

The Primeval DVD has just a couple of extras. First is a look at the CGI used to create Gustave entitled "Croc-umentary: Bringing Gustave to Life."



Here, the filmmakers and crew members (none of whom are named, strangely) discuss the film's real-life origins and pat themselves on the back for making their CGI croc "look so real." Next are 51/2 minutes of deleted scenes. Here, director Michael Katleman and visual effects supervisor Paul Linden talk about why the scenes were cut as they play. Unlike most releases, the commentary is not optional. Finally, Katleman and Linden talk about the production process and why they think the film is good in a feature-length audio commentary track.

A few years ago, back when we were broke and didn't have cable, my husband and I were flipping through the 6 channels we had and came across a documentary on PBS called "Capturing the Killer Croc." It was about Gustave and a team's attempts to capture it alive to keep it from devouring more villagers. The beast was never caught by the team who made "Capturing the Killer Croc," a misnomer to be sure, and Gustave continues to hunt in the region to this day. Measuring at around 21 feet long and weighing over one ton, the crocodile is a living legend and a nightmare to those who live along the banks of Lake Tanganyika. Primeval, which seems to crib a lot from the PBS documentary, has something in common with the monster crocodile: it strikes fear in the hearts of movie-goers. You see, they're afraid that if a movie this monumentally bad got made, what ghastly dreck could be on the hori-

Right away, you can tell this movie isn't going to be pretty. The characters are immediately introduced as cookie-cutter stereotypes: Tim is the hero, Aviva is the damsel in distress and Steven is the funny, but ill-fated sidekick. Overacting abounds in Langton, who successfully masters the art of looking scared and screaming and nothing else. Purcell is a bit better but not by much. Stone-faced expressions and wooden deliveries make him about as interesting as the tree in the background. He's an attractive tree, but a fruitless one. Jones, too, is one note. His acting is the best of the bunch; he seems much more adept in front of the camera; but his character is nothing more than mediocre one-liners.

As if the acting and the character development weren't enough, the "Big Bad" in the film, Gustave, was so poorly animated that he was more amusing than scary. In fact, I found myself erupting in laughter when, toward the climax, the hokey CGI crocodile began bounding through the plains like a puppy while in pursuit of his prey. I actually rewound the scene so I could watch it again, it was that ridiculous. What's worse is the person he was chasing was someone the audience should have cared about but, because of the silly effects, couldn't.

Not good enough to be a Jaws and not campy enough to be a Snakes on a Plane, Primeval fails to elicit more than a groan and a giggle. In fact, it just fails. Save your time, money and brain cells and skip

Flight of the Conchords and Creature Comforts

Two aspiring musicians/comedy writers, Bret McKenzie and Jemaine Clement, have come to America to make their mark. Already big stars in New Zealand, McKenzie got an agent and did a series of funny commercials for Outback, which caught the interest of HBO producers Anna Dokoza and Christo Morse. The connected producers helped the pair develop a thirty-minute show for HBO called the Flight of The Conchords. The duo's naïve, slacker characters are clueless about the American music biz. They bumble along in their own delusional world, which they reveal through funny songs that come out as comically sentimental without a hint of angst.

Think of them as Tenacious D on downers. The duo has one fanatical fan (Kirsten Schaal) who stalks them and a dolt of a manager who uses a cell phone to shoot their first video about two robots in ridiculous homemade costumes. Not surprisingly, the duo say inappropriate things to women with whom they are trying to connect, like, "You're so beautiful... like a high-class prostitute...you could be a part-time

The duo's music is eclectic and funny while featuring their precise vocal harmonies and masterful guitar playing. Their quirky, wry humor is at first odd, but this pair of idiot savants waxes lovable, soon drawing the viewer into their world. Struggling musicians will see themselves in McKenzie and Clement as they face an apathetic American public. Remarkably, their innocence works out in their favor, making them fearless as they stumble into fertile situations that could either get them the recognition they crave or get them kicked out. Their behavior is almost like they came from another planet rather than New Zea-

McKenzie and Clement present a staggering selection of musical genres at the oddest times. Suddenly, after making a call from a public phone, Bret bursts into song about some inane situation. The music could be reggae, rock, blues, or alt-rock, but the duo's songs are funny and catchy. In a parallel universe, this pair could have written the music for Little Shop of Horrors. Their hipness is born out of their naïveté, leaving them oblivious to anxiety. Savvy viewers may find themselves wanting to protect the pair from the music biz predators.



Based on the pilot episode, we can expect more droll comedy from this talented duo. Like a delayed high, the show sneaks up and suddenly makes you laugh at the off-the-wall humor. It's totally different in an appealing way.

Another oddball comedy debuting on CBS is Creature Comforts, from Nick Park and Peter Lord of Aardman Animation, the Oscar-winning British animators who created Wallace and Gromit and Chicken Run. Created in the time-consuming medium of stop motion claymation, Creature Comforts is an unseen reporter shooting a documentary on American's opinions. Park and Lord actually went across America interviewing ordinary people on a variety of subjects such as animal magnetism and keeping a secret.

These real interviews are spoken through a gaggle of claymation pigs, hippos, cows, birds, dogs, owls, forest creatures and insects. Its wry humor is funny coming from the mouths of the animated animals. At first, viewers may not buy into the concept, but after a few minutes it's completely endearing and addictive. It even sounds authentic, like the stop-motion clay animals are real.

Park and Lord have created typically British characters but with American accents. It's whimsical with subtle humor, but it is engrossing. A tiger complains of his inability to get fresh meat. An opossum covered in babies tells the reporter she doesn't get out much and koalas wear eyeglasses. In Park and Lord's imaginative world, anything is possible and animals understand much more than we could have possibly imagined.


MURRAY HILL THEATRE

Based on the old adage, "it's better to give than to receive," community activism comes from a person's heart. There are innumerable ways to give back to one's community by volunteering in various organizations or doing personal acts of kindness. Most people who become involved with community service do it without fanfare or thoughts of receiving accolades. It's a way of touching one's spiritual core. Whether it's one Saturday a month cleaning up litter in the neighborhood or using one's talents in music, arts, or education to help kids become better citizens, the one constant in the equation is: activism enhances one's feeling of self-worth

For the mega-wealthy, like Bill Gates, becoming a philanthropist was the only path that could give him any sense of self-satisfaction. By using his vast fortune to help the impoverished, starving, and HIV-infected African nations, he is fulfilling his spiritual commitment to use the money for the common good. Sure, he has all the trappings of the ultra-rich—his own private jet, a huge mansion in Seattle—anything he could think of or imagine he can buy. But all those material things can't give him a feeling of self-worth. Only helping others enables Bill Gates to sleep at night.

When people show me random acts of kindness, I'm so astonished by the spirit of giving that I reciprocate by trying to follow the golden rule. Years ago, my old 1960 Volkswagen's engine blew up on the Sunshine Parkway, leaving parts of the engine strewn all over the roadside. Of course, this was before cell phones or emergency call boxes, so I was stranded. It's a lonely, depressing feeling. After about an hour of trying to flag someone down, a man in a pickup truck stopped to help, and it so happened he was going to Jacksonville, like me. He attached a rope to my car and towed me all the way to my home in Jacksonville. I offered him money for gas, but he refused. He wouldn't even give me his address or phone number. A complete stranger helped little old me. Wow! Today, I still think of that guy's incredibly unselfish act of kindness.

With all the violence and war in the world, it's hard to focus on the people who give their time and money to help others. When I feel discouraged by the heinous killing in the Middle East, I think of the unsung heroes in our community who joyously help to better humankind by their community activism. Believe me, no matter what is bothering you, helping others will put things in perspective.

When I covered the Opening of Wolfson's Children's Hospital, Barbara Bush was the guest of honor. After her entourage toured the hospital, the members of the press were taken on a tour. Seeing the chronically ill children touched me deeply. Some of the kids had terminal cancer or advanced Cystic Fibrosis. I was humbled, and whatever little niggling problem happened to be bothering me that day was nullified by my compassion for those sick kids. The one thing that impressed me the most was that all the kids, no matter how sick they were, were smiling and laughing. It was a peak moment for me. Now, when I complain or grumble

about trivial things, I think of those kids, and it's a jolt of reality.

There are countless ways to get involved with community service. Google "volunteerism" and a plethora of sites come up for organizations like Volunteers of America (voa.org) Retired Senior Volunteer Program, or Volunteers of America North Central Florida Permanent Housing.

First Coast News' website (firstcoastnews.com) is a great site to get inspiration on their 12 Who Care honorees' page. I was especially impressed with Harry "Tom" Heery's story. Although Tom himself is blind, helping other people is his passion. Harry lost his sight years ago, but he refused to let it hold him back. Tom volunteers his time to counsel other people who are losing their sight and to teach them how to cope. Tom is married with two children and is a devoted family man, but he still finds time to help others who are going blind by reassuring them that losing one's sight is just a minor inconvenience.

Clearly, celebrities like Angelina Jolie have discovered that community or worldwide activism is the only way they can get peace of mind. They take part in all the superficial partying and other foolishness, but one day they wake up, grow up and become responsible adults.

Finally, activism can be flexible enough to involve as much time or money as one can afford to spend. Just helping an elderly neighbor by checking on them every day and making sure they are well is a random act of kindness. It can give a warm feeling of community to anyone, and when one does it, it starts a cascade of kindness that proliferates across the land. The rewards are immeasurable.



When I first mentioned to my editor that I might like to skydive for a story, he was pretty clear that it wasn't an assignment and that any ensuing death or paralysis was all my doing. My husband, who feels that bungee jumping is a safe activity, simply asked me why I would jump out of a perfectly good airplane. Although I'm oddly comfortable with the idea of stepping out of a plane soaring thousands of feet above the earth with a man strapped to my back, I would never bungee jump. I've just seen too many Road Runner cartoons. Anything involving what is essentially a giant rubber band never ends well for Wile E. Coyote.

Maybe it isn't the best idea to make life-altering decisions based on a cartoon, but as long as they didn't pack an anvil instead of a parachute, everything would be just fine.

And it was, which is why I'm not dead and writing this now.

I wasn't really all that nervous on the way up. I'd already considered my death, plus, the law and safety rules pretty much require that you jump tandem on your first time. This is a good idea because skydiving is one sport where it's best if you don't make mistakes. (If at first you don't succeed...splat!) Tandem means, as I mentioned, that you're going to have a man strapped to your back (an experience that may or may not be familiar to you). That man is responsible for all the fun stuff, like checking his personal altimeter, pulling the 'chute cord and steering you down. Even if your new bestest friend passes out, there's a safety mechanism in place that tells a computer to release the parachute.

I was feeling just a tad queasy when we took the step out of the plane. It wasn't what I expected. Here we were, hurtling towards the earth, and I didn't feel like I was falling; I didn't get that stomach-in-your-shoes, stomach-in-your-throat feeling you get from an elevator. It felt, actually, something like what flying might feel like

Although you're only supposed to be falling for about a minute before the chute billows out, it feels like a dreamtime infinity. When the chute does catch, you're jerked a little and gravity becomes a reality again. You're no longer flying. When the chute opens, it feels more like a controlled fall. My tandem buddy worked the lines on the 'chute, and we did circles in the air, looping down. When the chute was open it felt more like a ride at the fair.

As we came down, I remembered to lift my legs up and let my tandem buddy handle the touch down. As soon as we touched down, I was promptly sick, mostly on my shoes.

I'd definitely do it again.

The 55,000 square-foot center offers a variety of sports, some conventional, some not so much.

DODGE BALL

Famed dodge ball champion Patches O'Houlihan once said "If you're going to become true dodge-ballers, then you've got to learn the five d's of dodge ball: dodge, duck, dip, dive and dodge!" You're guaranteed to master the five d's after a season of adult coed dodge ball at Jacksonville Indoor Sports. The 7-week season begins on July 18th, with leagues at the recreational and intermediate levels. Each team will play one match a week on Wednesday evenings. After the regular season, single elimination playoffs will determine which team is number one. Register now to join a league. The price is \$575 for a team of 15 players or \$60 for individuals. This popular callback to the school yard fills up fast, so sign up soon to get in on the action.

VOLLEYBALL

pedal power: interview with cycle spectrum's clif lee by jon bosworth

With gas prices nearing three dollars, the climb in oil prices does not show any sign of slowing. Although a great deal of hubbub is being made about alternative fuels, there is one sustainable resource that makes a glaring impact on the oil struggle. Pedal

Clif Lee is the regional manager for Cycle Spectrum. He is also an avid biker. The "bicycle guy" in his circle, which includes a number of other area cyclists, Lee rides bikes everyday.

"I ride bikes everyday for my job and I try to ride a couple times a week in my free time. I don't have a set schedule," said Lee.



From the managers of his stores to his assortment of friends in the San Marco, Riverside, and Downtown area, Lee knows many of the people at the core of Jacksonville's urban biking scene.

Before the biking bug struck, Lee went to school to become and auto mechanic but found he preferred working with bicycles.

'There is more steady work in bicycles and it's actually fun. The customers aren't mad at you because their car is broken. Bicycling is recreational, people want to do it."

I caught up with Lee after work to pick his brain about the local biking scene.



EU: What kinds of biking is there around Jacksonville?

CL: There's road biking, BMX parks or skate parks you can ride BMX in, and trail biking, or off-road biking, in Hanna and Westside Regional Park. The best road biking would be on the Baldwin Trail, a railroad track that has been converted to a bike road.

EU: If someone wants to get into a biking group, where do they look?

CL: Go to North Florida Bicycling Club online or check with the various shops for novice rides to experienced rides. There's also family biking and all-around biking groups. North Florida Bicycling Club is the best place to look. (nfbc.us)

EU: Do you ever find out about group rides?
CL: Through our store? Not too much. We don't have a lot of people that ride from our store. We usually send them to other shops. Open Road has some sessions and UNF has a club as well.

EU: What is the deal with fixed gear bikes?

CL: (laughing) You had to ask me that. I don't know, it's a simple bike, you know, nothing can go wrong with it. It's good for commuters, good transportation. Its a fad right now, but it's not good for people with bad knees, for sure. Anyone that gets a fixed gear should get brakes put on them in case of stop signs or emergencies.

EU: What are some of the other new bicycle trends around town?

CL: I've seen a lot more of the BMX kids out doing flat land and street ramps and stuff. They're always up at Metro park and at the Riverwalk around Friendship Fountain.

EU: What sides of town are especially good for bicycling?

CL: There's a lot of bicycling activity on San Jose, vehicles need to be more aware of that fact. A1A from the beach to St. Augustine has a good lane now. Down 17 has a nice off-street path for all users, runners, bike riders, all types. It's probably the safest one, besides the Baldwin Trail.

EU: What's the best starter bike?

CL: A comfort bike. Just get into cycling and see where you want to take it. You might just want to ride around the neighborhood or you might want to get some serious mileage. You can also do anything in a comfort bike, on road or off road, and be comfortable.

Cycle Spectrum has three locations in Jacksonville. Look for their stores in Jacksonville Beach, Flemming Island, and St. Johns Town Center. They are the ones with signs that say "Bike Shop." Or you can find them online at bikesdirect.com. There is a fourth of July ride from Jacksonville to the Baldwin Trail if you are interested in getting started as soon as possible. Get good enough and you may be able to cut your gas usage in half. See you on the streets!

The beer fest crowd was vast yet harmless- a yuppie bunch who wore matching outfits purchased at the Town Center and clutched their purses all the way into the building. They must have each driven individually, because it was harder to find parking than if it were ArtWalk

By the time I made my way back to London Bridge, the Shang gang was frustrated because London Bridge had double-booked the evening. Shangrala and A Slight Breeze had been promoting their London Bridge show for weeks on MySpace, but London Bridge had booked a cover band to play jukebox hits all night. So Jude Kahle, the singer for Shangrala, Brandon Highfill, the guitarist for A Slight Breeze, and I walked over to Burrito Gallery and asked Marco, one of Burrito Gallery's owners, if the show could be performed there.

By ten o'clock, Shangrala was rocking Burrito Gallery's Urb Garden, but I wasn't there to catch the beginning. I walked over to TSI and watched Joel Land's new act.

When I saw him take the stage I was thrilled. If you've never seen Joel Land before, he is a local comedian that performs his standup act before local bands in area venues. Usually, he gets up in front of the crowd after the band has set up and tells some jokes to get the crowd warmed up. His observational humor is funny and insightful. But on Friday he changed up his shtick.

He had a friend join him onstage to play some minimalist drums, while Joel had an electric guitar on his lap, which he played with a slide. It created a musical backdrop for his routine that added more punch to his punch lines. It was as hilarious as ever, but it made his act fit seamlessly into a live music show. He developed a cross between spoken word, experimental performance art, comedy, and rock. It was a terrific idea that was executed perfectly.

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After Joel's routine, I hoofed it back to Burrito Gallery to catch the last of Shangrala's set. As always, it was remarkable, even if I only got to see a few songs. Their music filled up the valley created by the buildings that surround the Urb Garden, yet without overpowering the listeners standing just a foot away from the stage, which was spilling over with band

During the change over, I walked back to TSI. Although it was the most exercise I had gotten in weeks, I love it when there is more than one great event going on downtown. It's worth walking back and forth. Even if a large portion of the other people on the streets were beer festers who rarely drop a dime on local shows, it's always pleasant to know there are so many people taking advantage of the city. It gives downtown an electrical charge.

At TSI, Tuffy was performing their laid-back, lo-fi, ramshackle set. Their music is relieving to listen to and catchy in an offbeat sort of way. It's like seeing Eric's Trip or an acoustic Guided by Voices, and they were everything I wanted Mice Parade to be when they played Jack Rabbits a couple of weeks back. I wanted to stay for more of their set, but I had never seen A Slight Breeze, and by now I was certain they would be set up and playing. I killed my beer and headed back, walking past the people leaving a graduation at the Florida Theatre and into the Urb Garden as A Slight Breeze leaned into their instrumental set.

Instrumental bands often tend to scare average rock fans away, since they don't have singable choruses. Many people don't know how to get into music that isn't built with the typical verse-chorus-verse formula, but there is something about Burrito Gallery. Marco has trained his patrons to expect jazz, avantgarde and experimental music projects. Because of that tone, and because A Slight Breeze and Shangrala drew most of those patrons in, the crowd hung in there and let A Slight Breeze take them on their postrock mind-trip.

I hope some of those beer festers and graduating visitors to the urban core stepped away from their microcosms to enjoy a little of the culture that makes downtown so cool, namely our local music and club scene. But either way, I always revel in a great night downtown, and Friday was one of the best. It was so good that it didn't end until the sun was about to come up Saturday morning. After all, how often can you see two shows in a single night and still have time to crawl the pubs afterward? Only downtown.

I am sick and tired of hearing the same band over and over again, night after night in this colony of clones we call home. There was something my art history teacher once told me that really stuck: "You don't know where you are going until you know where you've been." In other words, study the classics, don't rip people off because you're too lazy to do the research and develop your own style utilizing the styles that came before.

I ran into this same problem when I served as a judge on the 2007 Florida Music Festival. After listening to more than 300 bands trying to get in, I found myself lost trying to figure out if I had already listened to the same band twenty-six times, or if these so called "musicians" had really given up on all attempts of creativity in an industry that is supposed to highlight just that (see Vans Warped Tour). So finding a number of bands that are professional enough to be reliable, have a strong enough following to fill a large venue, and have the talent to represent the event well is a daunting task, but The Florida Theatre is up to it.

They have committed their fabulous stage, which has seen most of the world's musical legends in it's lifetime, to helping regional bands showcase their talents and bring in their crowd for a good cause. That ought to look good on some resume in some record executive's office, right?

JaxRox is a benefit concert that raises money for Body & Soul, a non-profit organization that utilizes art and music to help the healing process in local healthcare facilities. By bringing musicians in to play for people that need comfort and putting art on the walls to liven a painful experience, Body & Soul is committed to helping people heal by encouraging the heart and soul through art while medical care tends to the needs of their body. Nothing can help people heal better than their own love for life, and nothing brings that love out better than music. In that spirit, The Florida Theatre has brought back JaxRox for a second year, which complements this Body &

Soul series that included an acoustic concert a few months back called Uncommon Music for a Common Cause. JaxRox will feature three rock bands from Florida. Twenty Weight, Dubwise, and Blistür.

Twenty Weight welds rock and reggae much like Operation Ivy wove punk rock and ska. It's seamless and the stage presence is as exciting as its music. Originally from Key Largo, this incredibly full three-piece boasts a wide variety of songwriting in every set, their influences range from The Police to Dr. Dre to Slayer. The best part is their attitude, no matter how small or how big of a crowd, they are all over the place; born to light up a stage. Take notes, Jacksonville bands, always appreciate your crowd. Dubwise, another three-piece band with good songwriting plays reggae with a subtle tinge of punk. Poppy and easy to swallow, this group of gentlemen have a way of drawing the listener in.

In Jacksonville, you find a trend that prompts "nu-metal" bands to intentionally misspell their band names. Why? Desperate to know the real answer to this question, we called Neal Gupton, the drummer for Blistür, to ask him all about it.

EU: How is your band name supposed to be pronounced?

NG: People think there's a deep meaning to it, but it's web based. If you search for it by that spelling online then you get us. And the dot com was available

EU: Are you "Nu-Metal?"

NG: I would call it alt-rock, alt-hard rock, alt-metal, maybe. Clearly we have crossover material. We're radio-friendly and we are kind of all over the map. We have played all types of music, from Steely Dan to Metalica, so there is a little bit of everything in our music. But we're definitely hard rock.

EU: Does your band ever play in hospitals to help sick people feel better?





NG: Well, you know that's interesting because when I saw what the charity did I sent a reply back saying I hope the recipients won't be in attendance because of the type of music we play. But they told us not to worry about it, just to rock. Its going to be a hard rock show.

EU: You opened for Joe Bonamassa at the Florida Theatre not too long ago. What is your favorite thing about playing at the Florida Theatre?

NG: Everything. The acoustics, the way it's arranged, I have been there to see shows before, obviously, but when I walked the stage, I was amazed at how close the seats were to the stage. The sound crew is great, almost any show you see there ends up sounding great.

EU: Tell us about the T&N Summer Acoustic Tour.

DS: We're going out with two newer bands on Tooth & Nail called Ruth and Surrogate. We are excited and take pride in our acoustic shows. It's much more intimate and you can actually hear everything that is going on. So mistakes are noticed very easily...uh

EU: What's your favorite song to perform live?

DS: Well, since we have new songs right now, probably a new one called Rock-n-Rule.

EU: You've toured with a number of different bands. Who would you like to tour with again?

DS: Alexisonfire, mewithoutYou, Boys Night Out, Jonezetta and probably others that I can't think of.

EU: I read you'll be releasing a new album in the near future. What can you tell us about it?

DS: It rules. Just kidding, but seriously, it rocks. We are extremely happy with it and so excited to get it out there for everyone to hear. We hope everyone loves it because we are most proud of it. I guess every band always loves their newer stuff best, but hopefully we are correct. It comes out on October 4, if I am not mistaken. It's a must purchase!

EU: What's been the biggest obstacle in making the new record?

DS: Actually nothing that I can think of. It went so smoothly and we loved the entire process. We recorded in a beautiful studio in the country and couldn't have asked for a better experience.

EU: You had a line-up change last fall. How did that affect the recording process?

DS: It really didn't affect much. Joel was a good bass player, but the songwriting was still there, so we were able to recover pretty well.

EU: When writing new songs, is there a particular band member that comes up with the songs or is a group effort?

DS: Toby and myself come up with most of the music and all of the lyrics and melodies. Matt usually writes a song or two and gives them to us to write vocals to, but he is great at arranging all the guitar parts and other instruments for the songs. It is a good collaboration between us. Dave is good at elaborating on the drum parts as well.

EU: What do you do in your spare time?

DS: Play golf, exercise, play with my cats, water my lawn, paint my house, watch lots of movies and hang out with my lovely wife.

lan Ranne is insane. He DJs, owns a bar, runs Hip Hop Hell all over Downtown and, if that wasn't enough, he has now started a record label. I was more than interested to see what these guys were all about. I'll put it to you this way, the CD stayed in my car for over a week. The great thing about this album, Ian tells me, is that there is one MC and one producer. Straight to the point, a work of art. Signing them was a no-brainer, not only because of the music, but because they are self-sufficient in meeting deadlines, producing amazing material and putting on a fantastic show. Go to myspace.com/thenword-music to check out some of their videos or check them out live at Freebird in Jacksonville Beach on July 1st.

EU: The name of your group is pretty interesting. Care to explain?

Nomad: (Laughing) It's simple, yeah.

Notsucal: Yeah, we just took the first letter of both

Nomad: Plus it's just a cheap way of creating some buzz. (Laughing) That's basically the whole gist of it.

EU: There has been a lot of controversy over MCs using the "N word." Where do you stand in all of it?

Nomad: I don't use it that often. It's just a preference. I really don't have a comment on it, if you want

to do it, you do it. But I choose not to use it. It's just not a part of my vocabulary.

EU: You'll have to forgive me, I'm a little green when it comes to hip-hop terminology, but I love the choice of old school soul embedded in your tracks. You produced your beats?

Notsucal: Yeah, I did all the beats on it. Yeah, that's the shit I listened to, ya know? So, if I'm going to sample something, I want to be able to listen to it myself first and foremost, and thank God everyone else is liking it so far too.

Nomad: Basically, yeah, it starts from digging. Digging through the old stuff we listen to here.

EU: There's a real fresh and upbeat vibe in all of your music. What do you feel sets you apart from other hip-hop acts?

Nomad: I would say all the songs are pretty much conceptualized. You'll hear a lot of hip-hop tracks. Let's get five people in the track and rap about different things or let's rap about three different things in three different verses. Pretty much, we start a song and have to have a premise to the song. You might not catch the meaning because it's built on a lot of metaphors, but every song, pretty much has a concept to it. I think that sets us apart from a lot of local acts. for sure.

Notsucal: Yeah, we think about it before we do it. We

don't sit in a studio all day, we don't actually record that often. We think about what we're going to do before we do it. Get it ready, get it planned out and then we go in there and record it.

EU: You guys are the first act on Hip Hop Hell records. Excited, honored and nervous?

Nomad: I've known this cat for a long time (pointing to lan). He's always been talking about putting something together. He's kept his word after what, three different groups I've been in? He's kept his word and he's doing his thing now.

lan: It started over a drunken conversation about five years ago at the Art Bar. (All laughing)

Notsucal: Yeah, I'm excited about it, I mean, lan's the only one that puts together the showcases that I like to go to. He caters to our genre and for him to pick a record that I'm part of, to do, I'm loving that. Nomad: We're all pretty much on the same wavelength when it comes to hip-hop so it makes it much easier.

EU: My personal favorite track is D.A.R.Y.L. What inspired the song and where does most of your writing come from?

Nomad: My government name. It just basically stands for Data Analyzing Rocking Youth Life Forms. I took it off the old eighties movie and I turned myself into a hip-hop robot. If you listen to the song, it's based upon a whole bunch of crazy mechanical type of phrases. We have a video for it too.

Notsucal: Yeah Dolfo hooked that up. Go watch it.

Trained dogs? No big deal. Been there, seen that, got the circus t-shirt. Trained housecats? Now that's something I've got to see. Thanks to Moscow Cats Theatre coming to the T-U, I'll get the chance to see real kitties performing death-defying balancing acts and acrobatics, all for a treat from their trainer. In an EU interview I got the chance to speak with the general manager of the Moscow Cats Theatre, Yanis Gelfman.

EU: How long has this show been around? Gelfman: Well, here in North America, about 3 years. But cats doing tricks and things has been around for almost 30 years in Russia.

EU: Are the cats in this show from here or are they from Russia?

Gelfman: No, they're Russian.

EU: So how did you get all the cats from Russia to here? Did they have to be quarantined?

Gelfman: Of course. I think it was something like 4 weeks quarantine, and then we flew them over here.

EU: Do all the cats get along?

Gelfman: Not really. Most of them get along, but, obviously, we get cat fights still, so we try to separate the ones that don't get along...There are mean cats, but we just put them in a separate cage.

EU: Do they work together some in the show. Gelfman: Yes of course...There are some tricks that they do together.

EU: I've heard you have one dog in the show... Gelfman: Yes, there's one dog. It's a chow-chow. It's one confused dog. It pretty much thinks it's a cat

EU: It doesn't do any tricks though?
Gelfman: It does do tricks, he can jump...walks on its hind legs, does a little twirl.



EU: At what age do you start training the cats? Gelfman: We start training them about 2 months, 3 months...We start playing with them; we expose them to toys, balls, sitting posts, see what their natural inclination is and them we base the trick around that.

EU: How long does it take to get them



trained to the stage?
Gelfman: Stage ready? About 2 years.

EU: Is there a particular kitty that is the star of the show?

Gelfman: There is one, I don't want to give too much away, but she's a singing cat. It meows into a microphone, which is hysterical, we get a great response.

EU: Do the cats ever get stage fright?

Gelfman: Yep, they do and they get moody also.

There are some divas, but usually we just move on. Once we do move on they kind of get the point and they know that the attention isn't on them so then they start performing.

EU: Do they like being in front of an audience? Gelfman: They don't really notice the audiences... all they notice are trainers. They know the trainers have treats. They pretty much focus their attention on the stage...Usually, we do the routines with music on so they don't get frightened.

EU: So it's not all that difficult to train them? Gelfman: I wouldn't say it's not difficult. I'd say it's time-consuming... You have to stay consistent. And they love the treats. During the week we keep them on dry food and we use raw meat as treats for performances...Females are a little bit smarter and it takes them a little less time to get a routine down than the males.

EU: This show has been going on for quite a while in Russia...Are there any retired kitties? Gelfman: Oh yeah, they stay at the Moscow Theatre in Russia. They usually can perform until 10 or 12 and then they just, I guess, go to a retirement home for kitties.

paintings by Trevis X. Geary on display at the Main Library

Believe it or not, it was my first visit to Jacksonville's new Main Library. Located Downtown on Hemming Plaza, the Library sits next to MOCA Jacksonville, the epicenter of modern art. Little did I know that the library also houses some impressive works of art, all of them created by artists residing somewhere in Northeast Florida.

Entering the Library from it's rear entrance took me through the belly of the building. As I walked down a long corridor, I found an exquisite display of photographs by such prominent area photographers as Jay Shoots, Anna Tomczak (more on her in an upcoming issue), Jerry Uelsmann, and Tom Hager. Already I was treated to some wonderful images, and I hadn't yet reached the art I came to see.

Rumor had it that there were paintings of cranes on the third floor. I'm not a huge fan of wildlife paintings, but I was assured that this artist's work was interesting. And so it was.

Trevis X. Geary did indeed have a display of



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twelve paintings on the third floor. And indeed, they were paintings of cranes; 150-foot tall container cranes used to load cargo ships at Jaxport. Definitely a pleasant surprise.

Not only was I glad to see such unique subject matter, I was delighted to see them painted so interestingly. Using acrylic and charcoal on canvas, Geary's cranes evoked an obtuse sort of impressionism. The classic Monet color palette was present, complete with light blues and yellows, but Geary's brushstrokes leaned away from the dabs of paint so definitive of impressionism. Her cranes peeked through slashing brushstrokes that simultaneously obfuscated and defined the image. The charcoal beneath the paint tempers its voracity and renders depth through a bit of shadowing. It's obvious that the straight lines of the cranes' massive structures are on the canvas somewhere, most likely pre-drawn with the charcoal, but the actual image does little to remind us of their strength and rigidity.



My three favorite paintings were "Fenders," "Barge Cranes," and "Ship Cranes." Each of them offers us a stately image of machinery that typically gets no second look. Even Geary states that, "the idea of something so big going unnoticed is really

Through her treatment of line, color and texture, Geary was able to soften the cranes to life, depicting them in the same way a great wildlife artist might

capture a moment in the life of a real crane. We are treated to the delicate snapshot of a container crane in its natural habitat- on the docks and hovering over a cargo ship.

This exhibit runs through July 6th, so hurry to Jacksonville's Main Library to catch them. Take the elevator to the third floor and take them in. While you're there, bask in the pleasures and resources of our new library.

the deathtrap you don't want to miss


Limelight Theatre revives a classic darkcomedy thriller

For my money, there's nothing quite like an intelligent thriller, or for that matter, a cleverly scripted dark comedy. Couple those two styles with a theaterinsider's knowing, wicked jibes at the theater world, and you come up with something quite like Deathtrap, Ira Levin's 1978 Broadway hit, currently enjoying a revival at St. Augustine's Limelight Theater.

The title of the play derives from a venerable literary device whereby the villain (or in some cases the hero) plots an intricate, torturous, and diabolical revenge against his nemesis, calculated to inflict the most psychological cruelty possible. While there's often an ever-present sense of impending and inevitable doom—something horrible is never far from appearing—this play's surprise plot twists are its hallmarks and the reason for its enduring success.


The story opens at the Connecticut mansion of inveterate mystery playwright Sydney Bruhl, holder of two of Broadway's top honors: one for the longest successful run of a production, and the other for the longest dry spell since a success. Though living



comfortably in the 18-year interim, thanks in large measure to his wife Myra's substantial family assets, that tenuous grasp on the Good Life is about to dissipate rapidly unless Sydney is able to summon the Muses for one more lightning bolt strike of artistry. As luck would have it, Sydney is contacted by budding playwright Clifford Anderson, a former playwriting workshop student whom he met sometime ago, who is anxious to have Sydney read his new work and share the benefit of his experience and insights. Upon reading the new work, Sydney recognizes right away that it has the potential to become a Broadway smash. Though crestfallen and envious at first, Sydney's curiosity is piqued when the young playwright requests an audience with Sydney; in the course of their conversation. Clifford reveals that no one else knows about the play, no one knows of his plans to visit the Bruhls, and that he'll be bringing his only other copy of the play with him. After humorously entertaining several grisly fantasies about doing Clifford in and claiming the fledgling writer's work as his own, Sydney suddenly realizes, to his surprise and Myra's horror, that he's considering the murderous deed for real.

The tension builds and fireworks begin once Clifford arrives—and in the interest of not spoiling the surprise for anyone who has not yet seen the play, I'll dispense with further recounting of plot points. Suffice it to say, expectations are set up and dashed right and left, and the story (when in capable hands) evolves into a veritable six-ticket ride. Further complicating matters is the uninvited arrival of the Bruhl's neighbor, famous psychic Helga Ten Dorp, who picks up impressions of deadly occurrences yet to come. Though unexpected, the plot twists never come off as contrived, but rather as brilliant strokes that, in retrospect, are oddly inevitable.

As the once-at-the-top-of-the-ziggurat playwright Sydney Bruhl, Todd Lidh brings his native love of language to the role, just what one might expect from the college English professor: savoring his words as if they were wine, registering responses





for vintages both venerable and venal, and tickling his palate with every mouthful of irony. As the perpetually flustered Myra, Terry VanderWier turns in a performance that encourages comparisons with Dyan Cannon, a bristling brunette bundle of nerves and neuroses whose heart is very much not in this murderous endeavor.

Joshua Reynolds' turn as young playwright Clifford, arguably cast against type, was the revelation of the evening. Arriving in the cast just two weeks before the show's opening, Reynolds certainly rose ably to the occasion. Though he's not likely to be mistaken for the film version's Christopher Reevenot that that's a bad thing—he is a very watchable presence on stage, much like a young Orson Welles, and his comfort inside this character's skin (a performance within a performance, for those familiar with the show) is all the more remarkable considering the short amount of time he had to prepare for the role.

The production's supporting characters are very adeptly performed. Gayle Featheringill is delightfully trippy as Helga, the nosy psychic neighbor, appearing onstage at just the right moments to either provide loopy relief from the tension or to ratchet it up to an appropriately excruciating degree. Eddie Gantner (Porter Milgrim) proves the old theater adage that there are no small roles, turning in a performance as Sydney's old and trusted attorney friend that is engagingly naturalistic, unfailingly believable, and, well, just plain fun to watch.

Scott Ashley's set is a joy, a wonderful place to be invited to for the evening. Evoking a rustic Tudor ambience, the Bruhl home has every bit as much personality as any of the characters, deliciously decorated with macabre props from Sydney's past stage successes.

The production contains all the ingredients for a hit; unfortunately, not all those ingredients were fully in place on opening night. Pacing was uneven, energy was low, and one particular uncooperative prop nearly got the better of the cast. The good news is that that particular moment proved a galvanizing one for the troupe: what might easily have brought the production to a grinding halt actually proved their mettle and resourcefulness. Hardly missing a beat, the players rallied and inventively soldiered on, strapping the play on their backs and taking it to the audience. Given the steep and daunting trail the production has had to tread—with numerous cast changes right up until two weeks prior to opening—it's understandable how elusive finding one's rhythm can be under those circumstances. But the storm's past now, and expectations are high.





PROTECT YOURSELF FROM THE SUN

Summer is a wondrous time of year when a growing number of people get off the couch and start getting out doors. Having just stepped into the first day of summer, more and more of us will start enjoying everything from beach outings to hikes in the woods, and the sun bathing beauties will be out in full force at beaches and pools around the area. However, along with increased exposure to the sun, comes a greater need for sunscreen. The number of people being diagnosed with skin cancer is increasing daily. Everyone either has someone in his or her family or knows someone who has gotten skin cancer, which makes the use of sunscreen even more important.

KNOWLEDGE IS KEY

Sunlight consists of two types of harmful rays: Ultraviolet A (UVA) and Ultraviolet B (UVB). UVB rays are the major rays that cause the immediate feeling of sunburn, and are the most targeted sunrays that sunscreens seek to protect our skin against. UVA rays also cause sunburns, but are less targeted in sunscreens. They mostly penetrate deep into the skin, causing long-term damage such as wrinkles. While most people think you only need to worry about protecting yourself from harmful Ultraviolet rays during sunny days, you also have to be careful on cloudy days, because about 80 percent of the sun's harmful rays still make it through.

UNDERSTANDING SPF

Sunscreens have a variety of Sun Protection Factor (SPF) ratings ranging from as low as 2 to as high as 60, which refer to the sunscreen's ability to block out harmful rays from the sun. For the most part, the SPF refers to the sunscreen's ability to protect against UVB rays, and not UVA rays, because there isn't a consensus on what percentage of ingredients is needed for adequate UVA protection. The SPF rating results from comparing the amount of time one can spend in the sun unprotected to the amount of time one can spend in the sun protected with sunscreen. In simpler terms, take the amount of time it takes you to normally burn, and multiply that time by the SPF rating to find out how long you can last in the sun without getting burned. Even though you have done the math and you can stay out for 10 hours now without getting burned based on this equation, remember that it is highly recommended by most skincare professionals that you reapply your sunscreen every two hours, because it wears off.

CHOOSING A SUNSCREEN

With so many different sunscreens out on the market right now, choosing the right one can be tough. When choosing your sunscreen, you need to think about the type of activities you are going to be doing, and what skin type you are. These factors will help you decide on the proper SPF to use. The American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) recommends that everyone, regardless of how easy you burn, use sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher that provides good coverage against all ultraviolet light. No matter what type of activity you are doing, the sunscreen you choose should be waterproof to prevent it from coming off when doing water activities or sweating. Look on the back of the bottle to see what it is made of. You should look for these key ingredients recommended by the AAD: Benzophenones (Oxybenzone), Cinnamates (Octylmethyl Cinnamate and Cinoxate), Sulisobenzone, Salicylates, Titanium Dioxide, Zinc Oxide, Avobenzone (Parsol 1789), and Ecamsule (Mexoryl SX).

APPLYING SUNSCREEN

When applying sunscreen you should always apply liberally, making sure to cover all sun-exposed skin. The key areas you should protect include your face, ears, hands, and arms, which usually have the most exposure to the sun. Most sunscreens need to be applied at least 30 minutes before going out into the sun, to give the sunscreen time to absorb into your skin and be effective. If time is of the essence, check into quickly absorbed products like Bull Frog's Quick Gel line, which dries instantly. When out in the sun for long periods of time, be sure to reapply your sunscreen approximately every two hours, and more frequently if sweating profusely or taking part in prolonged water activity, because sunscreen does wear off.

FORECASTED CONDITIONS

No surf has been sighted in a while, and the streak continues. This weekend shows no real potential for quality surf, but might produce enough size and power for a longboard. If you don't have a longboard already, you might want to checkout your local surf shop's selection, because it looks like it is going to be a longboard summer if this keeps up. Continuing to the week, there is no real potential in sight for any type of surf. But don't take my weekly word for it, call or log onto your local report daily to find out what the present conditions are for your favorite break.

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
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WIMBLEDON

The Tennis Championships at Wimbledon are being held as we speak over in merry old England. For all intents, this is the premium event for both Men's and Women's tennis. On the Mens' side, defending Champion Roger Federer comes off a tough loss in the French Open Finals to Rafael Nadal, who has won the last three French Opens. But Nadal has yet to win the giant plate/trophy at Wimbledon, and the question remains whether he can defeat Federer on the grass surface, after having done so well on the French clay. American Andy Roddick is also in the running, but he must win to establish himself in the same class as Federer and Nadal.

WOMEN'S GOLF

This weekend the Women's U.S. Open is being held in Southern Pines, N.C. All of the 'big names' will be

there to compete, including Michelle Wie. I believe there is growing pressure on Wie to perform and produce. We have known about this girl for a while now, even thought she's still a teenager, yet we have not seen her win anything of note. FINAL WORD

This past weekend we heard about a gruesome situation in the Atlanta area. WWE wrestler David Benoit was found dead in his home, along with his wife and seven-year-old son. Apparently, Benoit, 40, had killed his wife on Friday night, then strangled his son on Saturday, before hanging himself on Sunday. This is certainly an awful story, but it falls on the heels of other situations in which WWE wrestlers have died at an early age. In the Benoit case, Georgia police found prescription anabolic steroids in the house.

For a number of years, steroids have been seriously linked to the WWE. In 2002, Davey Boy Smith, known as the 'British Bulldog', died of heart failure. The coroner suspected long term steroid use. In 2003, Curt 'Mr. Perfect' Hennig died from an overdose of painkillers. His father believes steroids were involved in that death as well. And in 2005, Eddie Guerrero died of heart failure at 38, linking the death to possible steroid use. Both Hulk Hogan and Jesse Ventura admitted to doing steroids. Now, I know a lot of people don't consider WWE wrestling to be a sport. But it certainly involves very physical activity and a good degree of skill. There's no question all wrestlers are bulked up and cut, and steroids can and will do that to a person, without question. The reputation of the whole thing has been tremendously soured, and should be denigrated to further depths, or else we'll simply see more wrestler suicides and killings, possibly due to 'roid rage and fury. Isn't that what the WWE loves in the first place?
