

Second Report

In the last issue information was provided on the following outings: 19 April: *Missouri Bluffs Golf Course* and 26 April: *Old Hickory Golf Course*. Now

for the second update:

May 3 Pevely Farms Golf Course: 93 golfers showed up to play a soggy Pevely Farms. 89 actually played because 4 golfers got wise and went home to a dry house and more comfortable surroundings. The Karson Kosowski and the Jim Waugh teams tied for first at -4, while the Randy Pratt and Mike Blank teams came in tied at -3. The Ernie South and the Joe Goines teams were third tied at -2. The putting contest was garnered by Frank DeCarlo while the closest to the pin contests were won by Ron Martens and Ken Swehla. There were 3 skins awarded for winning a hole, two to the Kosowski team and one to the Harold Howard team.

May 10 Innsbrook Resort Golf Club: A warm day greeted 93 golfers at the Innsbrook Resort complex. The course was in excellent shape, better than it's ever been for the ACS group. The condition of the course enhanced the scoring opportunities and every team finished under par on this sometimes tricky layout. Two teams tied at -7 for the day: the Bob Thibodeaux team and the Steve Dierker team that included Joe Duran. Three teams tied at -6: the Bob Day foursome, the Charlie Pope group, and the Livingston Sykes crew. In third with a -5 were the Bob Franke group that included Jerry Burgherr, and the Bill Neukom foursome that included Joe Pfeifer and Bill Riordan. The putting contest was captured by Rich Graeff and the two closest to the pin contests were won by Jim Lambert and Don Bartoni. There were 3 skins for the day, won by the Bob Day team, the Charlie Pope team and the Gene Vogt team.

May 17 Normandie Golf Course: Ninety-four golfers descended on this course, the oldest public golf course west of the Mississippi River. In the past few years its condition had deteriorated to the point that it was no longer a pleasure to play. Not so this year. The course has rebounded and is in fine playing shape. But it's still not an easy course. One team, the Avery Womack foursome finished at -8. Two teams, the Charlie Pope foursome and the Livingston Sykes group, finished at -7. And in third place Ed de la Peña showed his foursome how to navigate this difficult layout. The putting contest was won by Earl Phillips and the two closest to the pin holes were captured by Avery Womack and Randy Pratt. There were two skins for the day won by the Jim Waugh team and the Jerry White team with an eagle on #17.

May 24 Mid Rivers Golf Course: The Mid Rivers Course presented us with a new set of problems: lots of wind and short-cut fairways. But these didn't seem to be problems for Gayle Cattau's team with Bob Thibodeaus that turned in a sparkling -10. Next closest was the Ernie South team at -8. Two teams tied for third place at a -6: the Bob Day team and the Charlie Pope foursome that included Ron Martens and Libby Lanning. The putting contest was easily won by Mel Meyer and the two closest to the pins were captured by Doug Torrie and sharpshooter Bill Riordan. Two teams, the Bob Day foursome and the Gayle Cattau team captured the three skins for the day, all of which were eagles.

May 31 Links at Dardenne Golf Course: Here we put the A and B players together and the C players play by themselves. Anyway, 104 players showed up in spite of the threatening rain, etc. to put together 18 holes of fun. For the A/B flight we had two teams turn in dazzling -12's: the Ed de la Peña foursome and the Karson Kosowski group with Doug Torrie. All alone at -10 was the Bob Day team of 70-80 year olds, and one 65 year old infant. Three teams tied at -8. In the C grouping one team with Larry Knopfel turned in a very respectable -7. Coming in at -6 was the Libby Lanning foursome, and three teams including such luminaries at Bill Riordan, Dick Sides, Ed Bronczyk, Tom Dodillet, and George Keil posted a very fine -5. Doug Nolte won the putting contest and the closest to the pins were won by Paul Pals and Jeff Delaplain.

June 7 Aberdeen Golf Club: Just like in Scotland, the wind came and never let up, giving those golfers that tend to hit the ball in the air quite a few fits. If, on the other hand, worm burning is your style, you fit right in at Aberdeen on this fine day. Two teams managed a very nice -8: Ed de la Peña and his crew matched the final tally turned in by the Joe Goines team. Second place was a real tangle with 5 teams turning in a very nice -7 score. Third place went to Karson Kosowki's team which featured Dennis Shannon, Libby Lanning and Dennis Dummeyer. The putting contest was won by George Blaney, while the closest to the pin holes were won Bill Emrick and Mel Meyer.

June 14 The Golf Club of Wentzville: We had 88 golfers show up just outside Wentzville to tee it up in the ever-increasing temperatures. The course was in terrific shape and all of us responded well to the excellent conditions. One team, the Bob Dixon foursome, took home all the marbles with a very nice -9. Right behind at -8 was the Bob Day team including Earl Phillips. Three teams came in third with a -7 score. The Tom Murphy foursome, the Joe Goines team and the Doug

June 21 Emerald Greens Golf Course: There were 91 sweaty golfers at the Emerald Greens course, because the temps got a bit out of hand for the day. Contrary to popular belief, golf carts are not air conditioned and we certainly could've used it on a day like this. In spite of the elevated temperatures we managed to finish and produced some good scores. Randy Pratt's team ran away with the field by shooting a very nice -7. Two teams scored a -6: the Paul Pals foursome and Charley Wilson's team. All alone in third was the Gayle Cattau team starring Larry Knopfel and Ken Swehla. June 28 Stonewolf Golf Club: 88 Golfers drove to O'Fallon, Illinois to play one of the local jewels, the Stonewolf Golf Club. What started as a pretty nice day turned into a torrential downpour after about 7 holes and we spent a good hour in the clubhouse just drying out. We did manage to finish and had 3 winners to show for it: coming in at a -7 were the Ed de la Peña

July 5 Winghaven Golf Club Another hot day, but this time at a new, and very fancy, golf course that is one of Jack Nicklaus' creations and true to his designs, he did not make it easy. There were enough sand traps on this course to build a miniature Sahara desert and some of the golfers found themselves in the traps at inopportune times. Coming in first overall with a very nice -9 strokes was the Ed de la Peña team. In second with a very respectable -7 was the Bob Thibodeaux team and tying for 3rd were the Randy Pratt foursome and the Doug Nolte foursome. The putting contest was put out of range by Pat Reed and the two closest to the pins were won by Bob Franke and Ed Bronczyk.

July 12 Pevely Farms Golf Course. The second time we visited this course the weather, from a moisture standpoint, was a lot better. The May visit was miserably wet, but this time around it was nice. We had 99 golfers show up to participate in our 3rd round of A/B, and C pairings. In the A/B grouping the Gayle Cattau team came in first with a very nice -10. The next closest team, captained by Wayne Warneke, was a distant -7. Four teams showed up with -6's, the Ed de la Peña team, the John Dierker team with Ernie South, the Karson Kosowski team with Joe Goines and Paul Pals, and the Bob Day team of septa/octo genarians. groupings the Joe Roeder group shows up with a dazzling -6, far ahead of the next two teams, the Bob Kriss foursome and the Libby Lanning group at -2. And in third place we had the Bob Eddy foursome and the group headed up by Charlie Fischer coming in at -1. 19 July Crystal Springs Quarry: This is the first time we've played this course, situated a few stones throws from the casinos in the Maryland Heights area. 





Some thoughts as we bring our reunions to a close:

On Thursday, 10 May, 2007 one of our local newspapers, the "Arizona Daily Star", ran an article from the Associated Press written by Katherine Shrader entitled "Satellites photos pose security worry". (Covers NGA) The advent of satellite photography marked the beginning of a new era in mapping, charting, & geodesy (M C & G).

When a new era begins an old one must die or pass from the scene. All who attended our final reunion were members who had their feet firmly planted on solid earth. Men who sat on mountain tops or Bilby towers for days, weeks, and sometimes months to get that one clear night to observe other stations to complete a quadrilateral of triangulation. They have been replaced by men and women with a hand held global positioning system that can establish an accurate geographic position and elevation in minutes under all weather conditions.

The topographic surveyor and computer have been replaced by machines. Many other examples could be cited. Machines, being inanimate objects, can not be a "Band of Brothers". Perhaps it is well that we old timers, with great reluctance, take our place with the relics of history. This handing off of the baton was brought close to home upon learning of the passing of Col (USA, Ret) Alden P. Colvocoresses. Colvo, as he was fondly called, graduated from the University of Arizona here in Tucson in about 1940 with a degree in mining engineering. As an ROTC member, he was commissioned in the Corps of Engineers. He soon joined the 16th Armored Engineer Battalion, 1st Armored Division and was fighting his way across North Africa. He was awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in action. Colvo later served during the War where one of his significant Korean accomplishments was the formation of a flood prediction system for the entire country. Many lives were saved when water levels were expected to rise and troops were advised and could take precautionary measures.

While waiting for his next war he garnered a PhD in Geodetic Science from Ohio State University. Colvo served again during the Vietnam War as the senior M C & G officer in the Headquarters, U S Army, Vietnam. It was my pleasure to serve as his deputy during the years 1967-68, the time of the North Vietnamese Tet Offensive. American infantry units engaged in house-to-house fighting were having great trouble identifying targets in built-up areas such as the Saigon suburb of Cholon and Hue in the north. Colvo remembered his World War II experience to solve the problem using gridded large scale photography.

Within days, a fixed wing light aircraft and aerial camera was acquired and 1:5,000 scale photography flown. In the words of the infantry unit commanders, "This is the greatest thing since sliced bread."

The passing era from man to the machine means the human institutional memory will be lost. The examples cited in the case of Col Colvo show how important that can be. Let us pray that machines are up to the task.

Before adjourning, the group presented the Lund's and Wind's with a plaque reading "Thanks for the memories from all us Topo folks". It was our pleasure to host this great "Band of Brothers".
