## **Assessment**

*Assess and monitor population health status, factors that influence health, and community needs and assets*

### Community Health Assessment Steering Committee Continues Work

The Community Health Assessment Steering Committee met to kick-off the data collection process with Professional Research Consultants. The committee discussed the impact of COVID-19 and other key topics for research, as well as the timing for collection of secondary data. Dave Donovan, Scott County EMA, provided an update on COVID-19 recovery planning and data that will need to be collected. The team discussed the structure of the stakeholder committee and roles, as well as provided feedback on the creation of a focus group guide to be utilized virtually as part of the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships process.

*Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards affecting the population*

### Communicable Disease Program

A total of five thousand, one hundred and ninety communicable diseases were reported during December. They included one case of campylobacteriosis, one case of giardiasis, two cases of hepatitis B, two cases of hepatitis C, one case of salmonellosis, one case of shigellosis, and five thousand, one hundred and eighty-two cases of COVID-19.

In January, one thousand, eight hundred and fourteen communicable diseases were reported. These include one thousand, eight hundred and three cases of COVID-19. One case each of campylobacteriosis, cryptosporidiosis, pertussis, and Lyme disease, on Escherichia coli infection, two cases of hepatitis B, and four cases of hepatitis C were reported.

### Rabies Risk Assessments

In December, eight individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposures to five dogs and three cats. In January, eighteen individuals required rabies risk assessments after exposures to ten dogs, seven cats, and one bat.

### Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

In December, there were nine children receiving individual case management. This number decreased to five in January. Of those, two had a blood level less than 15 ug/dL, two had a level between 15-19 ug/dL, and one had a blood lead level between 20-44 ug/dL. Seven children with an initial blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL received supportive services for lead poisoning during July and August. Of those, two had a blood lead level between 10-14 ug/dL and five had a blood lead level less than 10 ug/dL. These children receive public health nursing support until two consecutive blood lead levels equal to or below 5 ug/dL are obtained.

### Sexually Transmitted Disease Program

Fifty-five individuals received sexually transmitted disease (STD) clinic services during

December. Five clients tested positive for chlamydia and six tested positive for gonorrhea at the Health Department's clinic. In total, eighty-nine cases of chlamydia, sixty-five cases of gonorrhea, and three cases of syphilis were reported in Scott County during the month.

Four individuals were seen for HIV testing by appointment outside of STD clinic hours in December. The availability of HIV testing appointments outside clinic hours will continue to be promoted in the coming year.

In January, thirty-eight clients received STD clinic services. Six clients tested positive for chlamydia, two clients tested positive for gonorrhea, one client tested positive for syphilis, and one client tested positive for HIV at the Health Department's clinic. In total, there were eighty-seven cases of chlamydia, forty-nine gonorrhea cases, four syphilis cases, and one HIV case reported in Scott County during the month.

## **Policy Development**

*Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health factors that influence it, and how to improve it*

### COVID-19 Communication Efforts

There continues to be a continued public information effort between the Scott and Rock Island County Health Departments. Coordination between the two counties has ensured that messages, methods, and timelines have mirrored and supported one another, allowing for a Quad Cities area-wide response. The Quad Cities public information officer (PIO) group continues to meet once weekly to connect public health, local government, and health care PIOs and organize messages. A few subgroups have been identified to work on messaging for the business community and African American community to ensure that needed information is shared and available.

The SCHED Health Promotion Team continues to provide support for COVID-19 messaging. Social media posts were developed and shared related to holiday guidance, vaccine information, priority populations, masking, and general COVID-19 prevention. The SCHED COVID-19 webpage was updated with COVID-19 vaccine information. The team worked to update the phone script for SCHED to include vaccine information. In an effort to look for innovative ways to promote the vaccine, the HPT worked with a vendor to secure a "selfie station" which is a backdrop with the hashtag #VaccinateQC and the tagline "This Is Our Shot". This is on display at the COVID-19 vaccine clinic and those who get their vaccine are able to share a selfie on their social media page with the hashtag. Stickers have also been purchased for people to wear after getting their vaccine.

Staff participated in a Facebook Live educational forum with Dr. Olatude, from UnityPoint Health-Trinity, Dr. Carr, from Genesis and narrator, Dr. Kit Ford to discuss COVID Vaccine and the African American community. The event was sponsored by the Rock Island and Davenport Chapters of the NAACP.

### World AIDS Day Information Shared

In observance of World AIDS Day, three social media posts were created and boosted (paid advertising) to reach Scott County residents providing links to HIV education and promotion of SCHD's HIV and STD testing services. Grab bags with promotional items were also given to a local food pantry for distribution. The bags contained HIV educational information and contact information to access testing services.

### Education Provided to Substance Abuse Treatment Groups

Staff provided HIV/hepatitis C and STD prevention education via zoom to participants in two outpatient substance abuse treatment groups at Rosecrance New Life Outpatient Center. Group participants learned the signs, symptoms, modes of transmission and prevention for these communicable diseases. Participants were also given service information about SCHD clinical services and other related resources in the Quad Cities.

### Mouth Care Matters Program Pilots Virtual Class

Staff worked with Iowa Caregivers to pilot the Mouth Care Matters full-day Zoom class as an instructor. There were two, three and one half hour classes held on two different days. Staff took part in the modification of the in person class modules to fit the Zoom style setting. There were eight direct care providers working in long-term care facilities and home health settings in attendance. Also in attendance were three other Mouth Care Matters instructors to give feedback to Iowa Caregivers.

*Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities, and partnerships to improve health*

### Quad Cities Area Trauma-Informed Consortium Plans for Future

Staff attended the December 2020 Quad Cities Area Trauma-Informed Consortium (QCTIC) meeting led by the Child Abuse Council (CAC). While the funding for the QCTIC coordinator position at CAC has been eliminated, the QCTIC steering committee is continuing to meet. Survey feedback from QCTIC participants has been gathered and the steering committee is in the process of reviewing the information now to help inform how QCTIC operates going forward. Trauma Informed Care (TIC) trainings will continue to be offered by CAC and other community agencies in the area. Davenport Community Schools are currently in the process of completing district wide TIC trainings. Additionally, CAC will continue to coordinate online Equity Speakers Bureau presentations that feature speakers from a diverse range of community agencies discussing equity..

### Scott County Oral Health Network

The department's I-Smile™ and I-Smile™ Silver coordinators hosted the first quarterly Scott County Oral Health Network meeting. William Jackson, WGTV radio broadcasting, was the spotlight speaker and presented on the grant award received from Delta Dental Foundation to promote the importance of oral health in the black community. The group brainstormed ideas for topics to share with this audience throughout the upcoming year. I-Smile™ has a jingle that is currently being aired.

### Discussion on Maternal Health Services with Pregnancy Organizations

In an effort to promote the SCHD Maternal Health (MH) nursing and social work services, and to network with local community agencies, staff contacted Sarah Jansen, LCSW, Women's Choice Center Social Worker, and Annetta Cooper, Pregnancy Resources Center Director. Staff discussed the available SCHD MH services that include: Presumptive Eligibility Medicaid application assistance; depression, domestic violence and substance abuse screenings; psychosocial assessments; listening visits; linking to Scott County healthcare providers and community programs; breastfeeding support; and pregnancy and postpartum health education. The partner agency staff reviewed their services as well. Working to maintain and strengthen community connections is essential to serving MH clients in Scott County.

### Scott County Kids Provider Panel/Clinical Review Committee Meets

Staff attended the Scott County Kids Provider Panel/Clinical Review. Amy Groth presented about Eagle View Behavioral Health Center. The Center is a seventy-two bed, freestanding hospital for ages five and over that offers inpatient, partial hospitalization, and outpatient services. David Bonde presented on the Scott County Juvenile Auto Theft Accountability Program. He reviewed how this restorative justice program is based on an evidence-based model from Oakland, California.

### Community Partnerships Protecting Children Receives Program Updates

Staff attended the January 2021 Community Partnerships Protecting Children meeting. There were two spotlight agency speakers. The first speaker was Heather Lamb who works in Prevention Education at Child Abuse Council (CAC). CAC offers education on a range of child abuse related topics for teachers, parents, and the general public. The second spotlight agency speaker was Todd Noack from Life Connections Peer Recovery Services. They offer supportive services for individuals experiencing mental health and substance abuse addiction issues.

### National Children's Dental Health Month Partnership with Scott County Library System

The I-Smile™ Program is partnering with the Scott County Library System in February to celebrate National Children's Dental Health month. Each Friday, a toothbrush tip will be posted on their webpage, a grab-and-go activity will be available on February 15<sup>th</sup>, and later in the month, I-Smile™ will be hosting story time and providing a toothbrushing lesson.

*Create, champion, and implement policies, plans, and laws that impact health*

### CDC Updates STD Treatment Guidelines for Gonococcal Infection

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released the updated STD Treatment Guidelines for Gonococcal Infection, 2020. Based on recent evidence, the increasing concern for antimicrobial stewardship, potential impact of dual therapy on commensal organisms and concurrent pathogens, continued low incidence of ceftriaxone resistance, and increased incidence of azithromycin resistance, CDC has revised the treatment regimen for gonorrhea. Staff sent a memo describing the changes to Scott County health care providers and revised the department's STD clinic treatment standing orders.

### NEMS-R Assessment at The Lucky Frog Bar and Grill

Staff met with Tonya Lamphier, General Manager/Co-Owner at The Lucky Frog Bar and Grill in McCausland to discuss Nutrition Environment Measure Survey - Restaurant (NEMS-R). The Lucky Frog Bar and Grill is updating its menu and is interested in promoting healthy options as the restaurant has assisted Milestone Area on Aging with Meals on Wheels during COVID-19. The NEMS-R assessment was completed and technical assistance to reduce barriers and increase healthy eating will be provided.

### Guidance on Community Design for Walking and Biking Provided

Staff and Bi-State Regional Commission facilitated a series of meetings to provide guidance and technical assistance to improve community design to enable more walking and biking near Luther Manor and Luther Heights in Bettendorf. The team shared walk audit and senior needs assessment results with Geifman First Equity (ownership of Bettendorf Hy-Vee). Geifman First Equity explained current planning efforts to revamp the Bettendorf Hy-Vee parking lot and shared its willingness to collaborate on the Physical Activity Access project. During a similar meeting with Cardinal Capital Management (ownership of Luther Manor and Luther Heights), they expressed interest in collaborating to improve pedestrian safety and access to Hy-Vee's main entrance. Technical assistance will continue to be provided.

*Utilize legal and regulatory actions designed to improve and protect the public's health*

### Immunization Audits Conducted

In December and January, staff conducted audits of the schools. This year, for the public schools, all records were brought to a central location in each district and a team of SCHD staff went to the one location for multiple days to audit the records. The non-public school records were brought to the department to audit. This process went well. Final results are pending. Staff is also currently auditing child care and preschool records.

### Pre-Opening Inspections Completed

A pre-opening inspection was conducted for a new tattoo establishment in Davenport. Fusion Salon and Spa offers microblading.

The downtown Davenport Y closed and a newly constructed facility opened on East 4<sup>th</sup> Street in Davenport. The facility contains two swimming pools and a spa which were inspected by IDPH's engineer before opening. SCHD staff conducted a reinspection the week following the opening and found some of the noted deficiencies had not been corrected. One critical safety violation included no instructions at the emergency phone on the pool deck. This violation was corrected at the time of the reinspection.

### Environmental Assessment Conducted

Food service staff conducted an environmental assessment at a Bettendorf food establishment following an illness complaint affecting three individuals from two separate households. One stool culture returned with a positive result for Norovirus. An inspection of the establishment was completed, along with an interview of management regarding the facility's policies and

procedures. A full norovirus cleaning was completed in the facility. No additional complaints regarding the facility were received.

Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals Presents Webinar of 2017 Food Code

Staff attended a Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals webinar about the 2017 Food Code. In February, Iowa is moving from the 2013 to the 2017 Food Code. The only major change is with the certified food protection manager (CFPM). A facility can continue to employ only one CFPM if the following conditions are met:

1. CFPM is a manager/supervisor; and
2. Person-in-charge (PIC) demonstrates knowledge; and
3. PIC demonstrates active managerial control.

If at any time, any of these are marked out of compliance, then anyone who would be a PIC is required to become a CFPM within six months. The webinar also discussed “food stands operated by a minor” which is a law that was passed in 2020. This allows anyone under 18 to operate a food stand without a license and free from regulation if the stand is on private property, does not involve alcohol sales, and sells food that does not require temperature control (example-lemonade stand).

**Assurance**

*Assure an effective system that enables access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy*

First Med Pharmacy Review

In November and December, an average of two hundred inmates received an average of seven hundred and thirty-three prescriptions. The use of generic mental health medication was at ninety-nine percent and overall medical prescriptions was at ninety-eight percent generic.

Efforts to Link Individuals with Care Continue

Staff continues to provide Presumptive Eligibility applications for pregnant women and families remotely. Five pregnant women, two families, and two children were assisted and approved for immediate, temporary Medicaid in December. Maternal health services were provided to

six pregnant and postpartum individuals. In addition, staff assisted twelve adults with dental care coordination.

#### Influenza and Tdap Vaccine Provided to Child Care Providers

Staff offered free influenza and Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis) vaccine to child care providers. Forty-four influenza and five Tdap vaccines were given during December. Scott County Kids Early Childhood Iowa funds the vaccines.

#### HIV and Hepatitis C Outreach Testing Conducted

Outreach testing for HIV and hepatitis C (HCV) was offered in January and at Muscatine Center for Social Action and New Horizons substances abuse treatment program in Muscatine as part of the Integrated Testing Services grant extended service area. Eight individuals were tested for HIV and seven for hepatitis C. No new positive cases were diagnosed, but one individual who was previously positive for HCV and lost to care was interviewed and reconnected with a care navigator at the Project of the Quad Cities.

#### *Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce*

#### Tobacco and Mental Health Facilities Webinar

Staff attended the webinar, *The Other Epidemic Addressing Tobacco Use in Mental Health Facilities*. Working with behavioral health professionals is one of the goals for the Tobacco Grant and this webinar provided valuable information on connecting and making the case for using the Quitline Iowa Fax Referral System with clients in behavioral health settings.

#### Training for Maternal Staff on the 4 P's

Staff attended *Identifying and Intervening in Risk: 4 P's Plus Behavioral Health Intervention* training provided by IDPH, featuring Lauryn Muzny from the Iowa Children's Justice Center. The 4 P's Plus is a validated behavioral health screening instrument that is designed specifically for use with pregnant women. It was developed by Dr. Ira Chasnoff, MD, a Chicago pediatrician who has focused on helping children who have been exposed to substances, before and/or after birth. Staff will use it to screen clients for alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and illicit drug use, as well as, depression and domestic violence. This tool will help staff to assess for potential issues and offer supportive and care coordination/referral services to clients as appropriate. Examples of screening questions included in sub-sections of the "4 P's Plus" include:

- 1) Parents-did either of the client's parents have problems with alcohol or drugs?
- 2) Partner-does the client's partner have a problem with alcohol or drugs?
- 3) Past-during the past two weeks, has the client felt down, depressed, or hopeless?
- 4) Pregnancy-how many beers did the client drink in the month before she knew she was pregnant?

#### Mental Health Listening Visit Training

Staff attended the *Listening Visit* training provided by IDPH and led by Lisa Segre, Ph.D., from the University of Iowa College of Nursing. Listening visits offer the opportunity for maternal health service providers to spend therapeutic time with a client while the provider and the



client process through issues that the client is dealing with in her life. The emphasis of the listening visit service include: supporting the client so that she feels as if someone is actually listening to her; noting her strengths; being nonjudgmental and empathetic; and working collaboratively with the client to find solutions. Service providers use the Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale (EPDS) to determine appropriateness of fit for the client to receive the listening visit service. This training additionally offered information on: perinatal mood disorders; the listening visit model and barriers to service provision; how to effectively invite clients to participate in listening visits; reflective listening; and agency listening visit protocols, billing and associated paperwork. A videotaped example of a listening visit was shown for the group. Additionally, to finish the training process, staff completed a listening visit simulation via phone with another provider.

#### Lactation Support During COVID-19 Webinar

Staff watched the *Navigating Lactation Support Programs in the Era of COVID-19: The Path Forward* webinar provided by National Association of County and City Health Officials. The webinar emphasized that breastfeeding is a public health priority in that it strengthens food security and boosts an infant's immune system in the short term, as well as offers a potential reduction in chronic disease. As such, reinforcing breastfeeding support programs is a key public health strategy.

Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH, funded by the CDC) offers culturally tailored interventions to address preventable risk behaviors and reduce chronic disease in disproportionately affected racial and ethnic groups. Supporting nutrition and breastfeeding continuity of care is a REACH strategy. The webinar provided several examples of the REACH initiative partnering with local agencies and federally qualified health centers to support and reinforce nutrition and breastfeeding continuity of care, especially during the time of the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### Workplace Health Symposium

Staff virtually attended the American Heart Association's 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Workplace Health Symposium. The symposium highlighted strategies such as continuous quality improvement, connectivity using social media, and team building to improve health in the workplace.

#### COVID-19 Webinars

Staff continue to participate in weekly COVID-19 webinars hosted by IDPH. One webinar is targeted towards long-term care providers, one is targeted towards vaccine providers, and another is targeted to local public health with an emphasis on epidemiology and disease information. In addition, department staff continue to meet weekly with Scott County school leadership.

#### Iowa Department of Natural Resources Webinar

The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) hosted a webinar for county sanitarians in DNR Region 4. Webinar topics included updates on private wastewater and private well

programs, public water supply regulatory updates, open burning, disaster clean-up and interesting case studies.

#### Food Program Staff Member Standardized

All Food Program staff must be standardized. Mendell Smith is now a Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Standardized Food Inspector. He successfully completed eight joint inspections which included a facility that feeds a highly susceptible population and a verification inspection of a facility that has a variance/hazard analysis critical control point (HACC) plan.

#### Identifying Opioid Misuse Training

Staff attended *Identifying Opioid Misuse and the SBIRT* training provided by IDPH staff. The training provided a comprehensive overview regarding opioid and opiate use, including discussion surrounding: substance use as a public health issue; detailed information on different types of opiates and opioids and their impact on the body; barriers to treatment; using appropriate language for substance use terms; CDC guidelines for prescribing opioids for chronic pain in primary care settings and guidelines for maintaining a low health risk for opioid patients; medication assisted treatment (MAT) options like methadone and suboxone; other harm reduction strategies; and overdose risk factors, signs of overdose and overdose prevention.

Additionally, the training offered information on the screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment (SBIRT) process. SBIRT is an evidence-based strategy to help identify and address the risky use of alcohol and other drugs. This strategy offers a universal prescreening approach. Based on the prescreening, a provider can complete additional assessment as appropriate. If a referral to treatment is recommended, the provider should give feedback about the screening results; assess the patient's readiness to change; discuss goals and strategies for change; and arrange for the referral to follow-up care. Maternal health staff plan to utilize the SBIRT process as a direct service for clients.

#### Virtual Iowa Bicycle Summit

Staff attended the *2021 Virtual Iowa Bicycle Summit* to learn lessons on the latest bicycle facilities, technology, and programming. This year, the Iowa Bicycle Summit showcased how COVID-19 and inequities have impacted walkability and bikeability around the United States.

#### Presentation on Environmental Health Response to 2019 Flood

Staff discussed Scott County's Environmental Health response to the 2019 flood with the National Environmental Health Association (NEHA). NEHA is revising the *Food Safety in Emergencies* national course to include recent examples of disasters and how food safety was impacted.

*Improve and innovate public health functions through ongoing evaluation, research, and continuous quality improvement*

#### COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics

The department hosted its first health care provider COVID-19 vaccination clinic on December 30, 2020. Clinics for health care workers continued to be held throughout January. These clinics were organized in partnership with Scott County EMA and supported with staffing from Bettendorf Fire Department, Community Health Care, Genesis Health System, MEDIC EMS, and UnityPoint Health - Trinity. After each clinic, staff working were asked about what worked well and what could be improved in an effort to streamline processes. The average throughput time for individuals was calculated to assure that changes made did not negatively impact clinic flow.

In December, Health Department staff, in partnership with Scott County Information Technology staff, began to test and advise the implementation of the department's new data system, PrepMod, that can assist with coordinating COVID vaccination activities. The software has modules for organizing patient preregistrations, vaccine inventory, clinic scheduling, electronic documentation, and automated data entry into the state Immunization Registry Information System vaccine database.

*Build and maintain a strong organization infrastructure for public health*

#### Local Public Health Administrators' Meeting Discusses Public Health Changes

At the regional public health administrators' meeting, Joy Harris from IDPH provided a presentation on the changes made to the Essential Services of Public Health. Becky Nowachek reviewed Local Public Health Services contract information and shared that the Iowa Department of Human Services (DHS) and IDPH are participating in an evaluation of services provided to Iowans by both agencies. They are working to identify clear, shared program goals; align and integrate programs, practices, and policies to improve delivery of services; and most effectively leverage funding sources. The evaluation will also identify community-based stakeholders and other stakeholders to provide input and guidance to the departments' programmatic and policy efforts; engage all levels of staff to inform the departments' established goals and project plans; create an organizational structure optimizing delivery of services, supporting efficiency, and easing of work for staff; and integrating the departments' programs and services with community and other available resources.

#### Iowa Public Health Association Social Media Community of Practice Group

Staff joined the Iowa Public Health Association's newly formed Social Media Community of Practice group. It is a group of individuals who provide social media messages for local public health agencies, but does not include state agencies. The goal is to learn from each other about best practices, and build upon each other's messages. The group will meet virtually monthly and all participants will have access to a google group where message templates can be shared. A presentation will be provided at each virtual meeting to learn from each other.
