-Horace Robinson has lost an ivory bolo and two rings, if anyone found them please return to Horace.




-The Attendance prize of \$150.00 was drawn for Cathy Godric who was not in attendance.



GEM OF THE MONTH



Today we have a pair. Our first gem was born in Russia but at the age of nine months his family fled Russia and settled in Germany. As the communist party came into office, it confiscated private property so those who could, fled. Our gem still has brothers and sisters in Germany. He finished school and through trade school became a painter. He also was proficient in cabinet making because training was thorough and if you were a decorator you picked up many skills. He migrated to Canada and one day visited relatives in Chicago. The U.S. sounded pretty good. By now he had found a wife so they applied to migrate to the U.S. His wife had a sister in New York who sponsored them. Immigrants had to prove they could earn a living and had to be sponsored by someone who picked up the bill. No welfare from Uncle Sam!

During the month of January the family visited a sister in California. Knowing about the snow back home they decided that this was the place. When asked how he got started in rocks he said the family visited a show at Castro Valley High School. All those pretty rocks talked to him

ing the 2 boys they had, joined. "Changing a plain tock into something beautiful is so satisfying," he said. He likes all phases of lapidary and each rock presents a different challenge.

Our gem is a linguist. He studied English and French in Canada and can handle German. Russian--just a few phrases. A few years ago he returned to Russia to see if he could find anything out about his family but all records seemed to be lost. Our gem has a few other hobbies. He likes gardening and when asked what kind his answer was "Whatever I can fit between the rocks." He also grafts, experiments with soil mixtures and collects fossils.

Now his wife was born in Germany where she attended school. She migrated to Canada where she was a nanny. Her agreement was that she have time to go to school to learn English. Through mutual friends she met her husband. She recounted the hoops one went through to migrate to the U. S. She said she learned to read English through comic books. Her two sons grew up without T.V. And one graduated from Berkeley, the other Cal State University Hayward. Today one works in Livermore on computers. The other manages a TV station in Florida.

Flat lapping is our gem's favorite. When asked how she got started she said they traveled to many gem shows and she fell in love with flat polished slabs she saw in Sonora and figured family life wasn't going to change, so if you can't beat them join them. She has one first place for her slabs and several other ribbons. For years she and Viola Groves ran the snack bar at shows. Recently she has been sandwich lady. Every Friday she and Amy DeVoe used to polish slabs. She's still doing it and petrified wood is her favorite stone. Before retiring she work in a plumbing firm.

Our hard workers (he always helps set up and take down for the show and she works where needed) are Anna and Willie Kochendorfer.

The Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley is spending a great deal of money on new equipment. Therefore from time to time, articles will be printed on the correct usage of this equipment. PLEASE TAKE TIME TO READ AND REVIEW YOUR TECHNIQUE. If you are confused, ask for help.

TRIM SAW

The trim saw is to be used for just what its name suggests--to trim. It is not meant to make slabs. That should have been done on another saw. Ask one of the saw men what to do. This includes gluing your rock to a piece of wood, writing instructions as to how you want your rock cut, putting your name on the wood block and PAYING the saw man. The club uses this money to replace saw blades.

Your slab should be placed flat on the table of the saw. Trim off any small chips that prevent you from doing this. Mark the cut you want to make. Slowly feed the slab into the blade. Cut only in straight lines. The speed you use will come to you with practice. Toughness and hardness of stones vary. If you see sparks, you are feeding too fast.

If you are working with an irregularly shaped slab, go slow because it is easy to tilt and the rock may grab the blade. Twisting can injure the blade making it unusable. One thing you can do is flatten one side on a grinder giving you a flat surface to feed into the saw blade. Or you may need to make a series of small straight cuts and finish the shaping on the grinder.

Our trim saws are cooled with water. Be sure the water is running on the blade. And clean up when you are through. If you have small chips, put them in the container. Other club members polish these and we sell jars full at the March show. Proceeds go back into the shop fund.

At the front of the saw there is a metal shield that helps prevent spray of water and debris on the sawer. The water is there to act as a lubricant and to wash the debris down. Eventually sludge forms at the bottom of the tank as the rock dust sinks and this must be cleaned periodically. Be sure to wipe the table surface clean.

SLAB SAW

The principles of a stone cutting saw and a wood cutting saw are about the same. A blade is attached to a shaft, a pulley and belt arrangement connects the shaft with a source of power. The material is rested on a platform. A cooling system is also necessary to lubricate and cool the blades as well as wash away the rock dust. This is why periodic cleaning is needed.

NO ONE IS TO USE SLAB SAWS UNLESS THEY HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED BY THE SHOP CHAIRMAN OR BILL COLLINS! You can lose shop privileges if not certified.

The saw blade may be a rim notched blade or a sintered blade. The notched blade is cheaper. The sintered is more expensive and smoother in its operation. Keep in mind the cost is great for these blades. That's why charges are made for cutting and why the shop chairman is so angry about misuse.

Because of the precision of the blade, DON'T feed by hand. Instead a clamp must be used to prevent twisting or wobbling. The clamped rock is slowly fed to the blade.

Saw blades must be mounted on steel shafts thick enough to remain rigid and accurate while in use. The shaft must rest on bearings which permit easy but accurate spin. The saw must be able to remain true for long periods of time. Rocks take time to cut. These bearings require lubrication to keep the shaft centered and to

prevent friction. Modern machines are fitted with stout carriages to hold and move the rocks. Be sure the carriage slide is exactly parallel to the saw blade. Many new comers to sawing are so intent upon getting the maximum of slabs before reclamping, they forget the result can be twisting and ultimately destruction of the blade. As the saying goes in the gift shop, you broke it, you bought it. And no more sawing privileges. Some saws have an automatic cut off switch.

GRINDERS--keep it moving!

Grinders are wheels that are used to do just what the name implies--grind off excess rock for shaping. The abrasive may be sand, garnet, emery, silicon carbide. Most of the newer grinders have wheels of diamond. Grit on a grinder can be very fine or quite coarse. Coarse grit can be 80-100. After you have shaped your future cabochon or sculpture on the slab saws and then the trim saw, you should be ready to further refine the shape on a grinder. As you grind, the surface gradually wears away. This is why you must keep your cabochon-to-be moving or you will wear grooves in the grinder.

Water is necessary to help cool your stone, but more important, to remove excess rock dust and some of that grinder surface. The position of the stone is important because it is being held by hand. Hold your stone in position as if you are about to spread butter on bread. Support your arms so you don't force the machine to chatter. Our machines are designed to grind cabochons and small sculptures and the surfaces of "cubes" about to become spheres.

Steadiness is important so the stone is fed slowly and at a steady speed. The wheel must whirl fast enough to do the job without bumping or jerking. Avoid working too fast or pushing too hard. If you

see sparks, you are pushing too hard. Gentle does it. Examine your stone frequently. Fingers feeling the contour are an asset. Be careful or you won't have any fingernails. Use the WHOLE wheel while grinding. This means keep your stone moving. Grinder life is increased tri-fold if you use the whole wheel avoiding grooves.

You will find small scratches on your stone and the next thing is to get rid of those scratches. You do this by moving on to the sanders.

Softness of stone must be understood to know how to attack the grinder. Soft stones can grind too fast. As you grind be careful to avoid chipping. You can grind a bevel. Be sure to examine the wheel frequently. If the wheel looks white, you are not using water to remove rock dust.

If you are satisfied with the shape, the bevel--move on to the sanders.

The Society did not send a copy of the Internal Revenue Service letter changing the exempt status to the Franchise Tax Board within six months. The Franchise Tax Board now requires a complete application to change status. A filing fee of \$25.00 must accompany the application.

I have enclosed a copy of page 1, 2 and 6 of Form 3500 (application for exemption). I would appreciate it if you could prepare a draft response. On receipt of the draft, I will finalize it based on my knowledge of the Board's methods. Since I will be requesting retroactive change of exemption, any tax on interest income paid for tax years 1994 through 1996 will be refunded with interest.

I have also enclosed a certificate of amendment of the articles of incorporation. The Franchise Tax Board will not grant a change of exemption without a dedication and dissolution clause. Since incorporation of the Society, federal and state law have changed to require the language used for the amendment.

Based on the California Corporations Code and the Society's articles of incorporation, a majority vote of all voting members is required for the amendment to be filed with the Secretary of State. When the amendment has been approved by the Society's directors and then the members, I will prepare the final for submission to the Secretary of State. A fee of \$30.00 must accompany the amendment (4 copies).

Upon the dissolution or winding up of the corporation, its assets remaining after payment, or provision for payment, of all debts and liabilities of this corporation shall be distributed to a nonprofit fund, foundation or corporation which is organized and operated for earth science purposes and which has established its tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- 3. The foregoing amendments of articles of incorporation have been approved by unanimous vote of the board of directors.
- 4. The foregoing amendment of articles of incorporation has been approved by the members in an election conducted by written ballot in accordance with Section 7813.5(b)(ii) of the California (2) Corporations Code.




