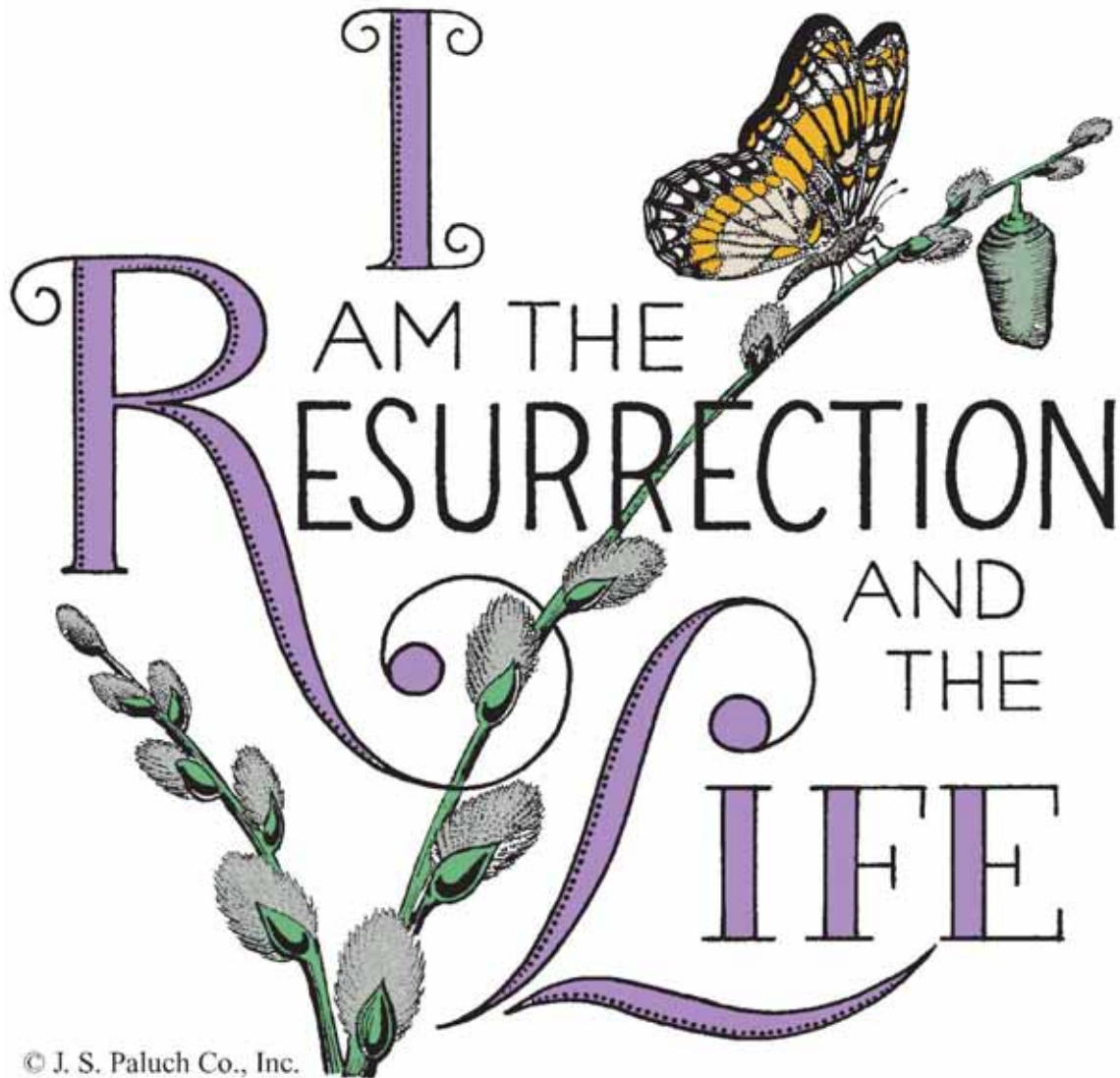

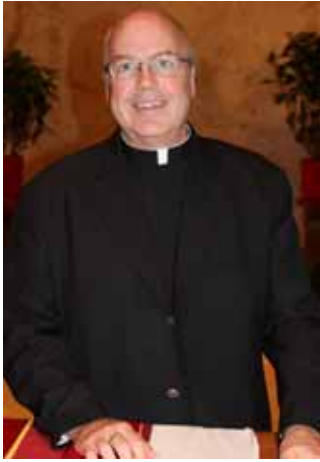

From the Pastor's Desk...

Since All Souls Day falls on a Sunday this year, it gives me the opportunity to clarify what we Catholics understand and believe about eternal life. Our understanding has evolved over centuries of reflection on the faith and belief of people living during Old Testament and New Testament times, as well as theologians and philosophers from the middle-ages to present days.

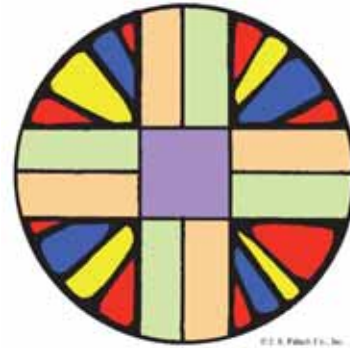
Often to deal with the emotional pain at the death of a loved one we hear it said: "well, no one lives forever." We know that intellectually, at least on the physical level. Our minds try to make sense out of something that our hearts can't. BUT – (that three letter word means **B**ehold the **U**nderlying **T**ruth) – we **DO** live forever! At baptism we are given the pledge that "all who are buried with Christ in the death of baptism rise also with him to newness of life." Our minds try to grasp what eternal life, heaven and hell are like. Images are given to us in scripture... Heaven as a banquet, a home, a mansion and hell as a fiery furnace where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.

While the images of heaven may be comforting and hell not, it is better to think of eternity not in terms of "places" but instead "*states of being*" - Heaven, knowing and feeling the perfect love of God FOREVER and hell being miserable, lonely and never fulfilled FOREVER. How do we get to either heaven or hell?

Ever since God gave Moses commandments which held a people responsible to God for harming a neighbor, our relationship with God has been tied up with our relationships to other people. How well we live our relationship with God and others determines our "judgment" – heaven or hell. Each decision we make in life turns us toward God and neighbor or away from them. One day our life ends and we die who we have become over the course of a lifetime, either loving or unloving. But for most of us, our lives are a mix of selfishness and generous love. That is why we believe purgatory exists...not as a "place" or punishment, but a state of purgation and purification to remove all that kept us in life from being as loving as God is. And that is why we pray for our faithful departed. We believe our prayers can ease the process of purification.

But we can also reject God's mercy and love, God's invitation to share in divine life. It's probably more accurate to say that we damn ourselves than to say that God condemns anyone to hell. Matthew's account of the last judgment says it all... "When I was hungry, you gave me something to eat; when thirsty, something to drink...when you did it for one of my least brothers or sisters, you did it for me." In other words, I think there will be one question from God at the end of our life - did you love? Not just the ones easy to love, but the ones who you found difficult – the ones you would not like to sit at table with in the heavenly banquet – because until you can do that, you will not see God face to face!

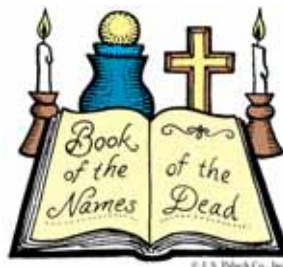

C.A.R.E. CORNER

Let's start our look at St. Paul with a physical description, offered by the second century writer, Onesiphoros. He described Paul in this way: A man rather small in size, bald-headed, bow-legged, with meeting eyebrows, a large, red and somewhat hooked nose. Yet he was strongly-built and full of grace. There are painted frescoes on Roman catacombs that confirm this description. But which came first – the description or the pictures? This we don't know. But at least the description and the pictures are consistent. Is this how you pictured Paul?

We know him as Paul, but his given name was Saul which is a Hebrew name. He was born in Tarsus in Asia Minor which is modern-day Turkey. Tarsus was a large, prosperous city in the Roman Empire. Tarsus was a highly Greek influenced city, with a university, a gymnasium, a theatre, an art school and a stadium. Paul was a Roman citizen and would have enjoyed all the privileges granted to Roman citizens, including the right to vote. The name Paul in Latin means "little." This might have been a nickname he was given early on in his life. So now you know a little bit about Paul's personal background.

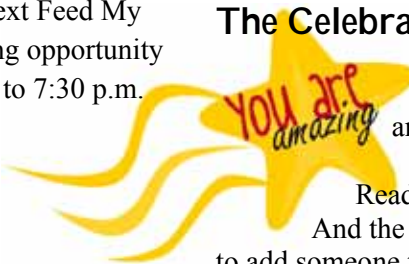

Haiti Twinning Medical

St. Thomas has been twinning with Ste. Marie-Madeleine and the village of Duchity, Haiti since 1999. In the medical area, initially there was one medical mission every couple of years. A large clinic facility was built and a full time doctor is now employed. St. Thomas for some time has been sending two medical missions each year.

Medical Missions 2015 Volunteers needed WITH and WITHOUT medical training!

St. Thomas parishioners are needed to staff the medical missions for next spring. Individuals with no medical training and with a desire to help are most welcome on these teams. There are many tasks to be done that do not require medical training.

Of course, doctors in any discipline, nurses, others with medical background are also needed.

Last year there was one team of 14 without a St. Thomas parishioner! While it is wonderful that the effort has grown beyond the parish, St. Thomas owns the relationship and needs to be represented on each team. Please consider becoming a medical mission team member. It is a very rewarding experience. Contact Mike in the Outreach and Social Justice Office (see below).

Medical Team Fundraising

Help is needed for the Twinning Medical efforts, in support of the clinic and the mission teams. Team members pay their own travel expenses, but funds are needed to purchase medication for use during the visits. The Twinning Medical Team also supports the salary of the full-time doctor and some level of medications for the clinic. The clinic income from patients and prescriptions supports the additional clinic employees.

October 2014 Letter from Fr. Don Kenny

Fr. Don, second pastor of St. Thomas the Apostle, spent 12 years ministering to the people in the barrios of Quito, Ecuador. He is now back in the area and below is an excerpt of his comings and goings. To read his entire letter, go to www.stapostle.org and enter Fr. Don Kenny-October Letter in the search engine.

Queridos amigos y amigas:

This is the first letter I've written since coming back from Quito. I knew I was going to miss the people in Ecuador. But then something dawned on me. I realized that, just as I have kept up contact with and visited people in my previous parishes up here, so I can go back to Quito and hopefully stay in the same blue-colored casa where I stayed in my last year there.

Now I'd like to say a little about the Quito programs. Both the Food Pantry and the Adult Education Program have reached the goal of self-sufficiency. Going forward, Quito Barrio Outreach (www.QuitoBarrioOutreach.org) will continue to fund the Day Care Center and the Medical Clinic, with a plan in place that anticipates the Medical Clinic being self-supporting by end of 2015.

What have I been doing? In my official Diocese of Joliet, I am saying Mass, meeting with a men's group, facilitating a Spanish speaking study group, and doing home Masses in Spanish. But I feel that God is calling me to a third mission in my priesthood, after 36 years in suburbia and then 12 years in Ecuador, to work with poor Spanish-speaking people, especially the elderly housebound and those near death.

There is a parish in Aurora-St Teresa's-in the Rockford diocese. I have agreed to give a Bible class in Spanish every Saturday night and often to say Mass in Spanish beforehand. Along with the principal of the struggling Catholic school, we will start a Young Christian Student's group like I had in Ecuador. We are also going to start an English language program for men and families, expanding on the program given for women during the day.
