Advance Payments of the 2021 Child Tax Credit

THE BASICS

WHAT?

For tax year 2021, families claiming the Child Tax Credit will receive:

- Up to \$3,000 per qualifying child between the ages of 6 and 17 at the end of 2021
- Up to \$3,600 per qualifying child under age 6 at the end of 2021

The total of the advance payments will be up to 50 percent of the Child Tax Credit.

WHO?

The maximum credit is available to taxpayers with a modified adjusted gross income of:

- \$75,000 or less for single filers and married persons filing separate returns,
- \$112,500 or less for heads of household, and
- \$150,000 or less for married couples filing a joint return and qualifying widows and widowers.

Eligible taxpayers don't need to take any action now other than to file their 2020 tax return if they haven't done so. Taxpayers can benefit from the credit even if they don't have earned income or don't owe any income taxes.

WHEN?

Advance payments of the 2021 Child Tax Credit will be made monthly from July 15 through December 15 to eligible taxpayers who have a main home in the United States for more than half the year.

HOW?

- Advance payments will be calculated and paid automatically.
- Eligible taxpayers who don't want to receive advance payment of the 2021 Child Tax Credit can unenroll from payments.
- Eligible taxpayers who don't normally file a tax return can register for the monthly advance payments using the **Non-filer Sign-up Tool**.

With the new variant, Covid Delta, there is no cough, no fever. It's a lot of joint pain, headache, neck and upper back pain, general weakness, loss of appetite, and pneumonia. And of course, more virulent and with a higher mortality rate. It takes less time to go to extremes. Sometimes without symptoms.

Be more careful.

This strain does not live in the naso-pharyngeal region. Now it directly affects the lungs, which means that the 'windows', periods of time are shorter.

I have seen several patients without fever, without pain, but who report mild chest pneumonia on their X-rays. Nasal swab tests are very often negative for Covid-19, and there are more and more false negative results from nasopharyngeal tests. This means that the virus spreads and spreads directly to the lungs, causing acute respiratory stress caused by viral pneumonia. This explains why it has become sharp, more virulent and deadly. Please, be extremely careful. Avoid crowded places, keep 1.5 distance even in open places, double face masks and wash your hands often (and when we cough or sneeze). Please no hugs, it is very dangerous at the moment, as almost everyone is asymptomatic. This "wave" is much more deadly than the first, so we have to be VERY careful and take every kind of precaution.

Do not keep this information to yourself, share it as much as you can, especially with your friends and family.

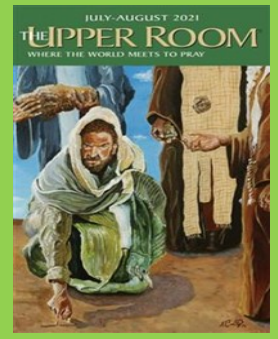
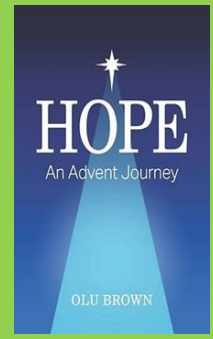

MOTHER WILLIE B. NEAL

Mother Willie B. Neal was born almost 94 years ago, August 16, 1927, in Holmes County, Mississippi, to her parents, Louis and Maggie Weathers. After beginning her education in the Holmes County Public School System, she moved to Yazoo City, Mississippi as a teen. For a short time, Mother Neal resided in Jonestown and later moved to West 2nd Street, where she raised her children.

Mother Neal met and married John Wesley Neal in 1946. Her beloved husband preceded her in death. Five children were born to this union: Johnnie Neal Jackson of Atlanta; John Wesley Neal, Jr. (deceased); Rev. Lawyer Neal, II, Waco, Texas;

Willye Neal Thomas, Yazoo City, Mississippi; and Carolyn F. Neal White (Armond), Indianapolis, Indiana.

An inspiration to her family, Mother Neal stressed the importance of education to her children. She was the unidentified, concerned parent quoted in the 'History of Lamar Street – Ann Brooks Center, who spoke of the need for a kindergarten in Yazoo City. Although she did not know how she would send her five children to college, she prioritized higher education in her home. As a result, all five children earned scholarships which assisted in defraying college expenses.

Having four children in college, Mother Willie B. Neal began studying for her GED and finished the program by passing her exams at Valley State College, now Mississippi Valley State University.

Active in her church and community, Mother Neal was a member of St. Peter Baptist Church for eighty years. At St. Peter, she served in numerous capacities, including: Senior Choir Director; Missionary Society President; Sunday School Teacher of the Children's Class; Young Women's Association (YWA) and Laymen League Coordinator, in addition to Angelic Mass Choir featured soloist. Beyond her local church, she was active in Yazoo County Associations and State Conventions where she shared her talents as Yazoo County Song Leaders Association President, and Mississippi State Gospel Chorus Secretary.

Mother Willie B. Neal's civic and social involvement included the Paul Lawrence Dunbar Federated Club; the NAACP; and the Triangle Cultural Center Board of Directors. She was employed by the State of Mississippi at the former Welfare Department. As a homemaker from 1965 to 1989, she helped bring stability to numerous at-risk families. After twenty-five years on the job, she came home to care for her husband who was ill at the time.

Mother Neal became an entrepreneur in her eighties when she opened "Weathers and Neal Thrift Shop.", She became a radio personality on WJNS Radio, and in her nineties, she hosted "A Thought - With Mother Willie B. Neal", on WYAD, which airs Sunday mornings and Monday nights locally.

Mother Willie B. Neal leaves to mourn her transition her four living children and her grandchildren: Patrice Carlton, Valerie Carlton, Rodney Neal, Russell Neal; Ronald Neal, Cortez Grady, Shayla Smith, James Reginald Jackson, Margaret Neal Enis, Tariq Naseer, Jonathan Neal, Jessika Neal, Felica Neal Smith, Candace Neal, and Crystal Anthony, in addition to numerous great grandchildren. Also mourning her transition are her sisters Vera Weathers Hubbard and Kathy Weathers Perry, brothers, Rev. Joe N. Weathers and Robert "Mane" Perry, along with nieces, nephews and a host of other relatives and friends, including God sons: Eugene Toliver of Daytona Beach Florida, who never failed to check on her on Saturday mornings, and Tommie Spires, Yazoo City, childhood protégé and caretaker.

Clayton State Court Judge Margaret Spencer

“I think this Zoom situation will stay in place for a while,” she said. **JONESBORO** — Clayton County State Court Judge Margaret Spencer marked a milestone recently — a return to in-person jury trials.

After more than a year of virtual court proceedings, Spencer said it felt good to be back in the courtroom, although things aren’t fully back to what was once considered “normal.”

“It just felt really good to see all my staff and see everybody in person instead of on my Zoom screen,” she said Friday.

Although in-person court has resumed, Spencer said courtroom protocols continue to reflect the changes brought on by COVID-19, with the safety of jurors and courthouse staffers paramount. Spencer said the local judiciary got advice from the Centers for Disease Control and the Clayton County epidemiologist on how to configure the courtroom for maximum safety. Jurors, who would normally be seated in the jury box, were socially distanced in the audience seats. Attorneys’ desks were placed perpendicular to the judge’s bench rather than facing it. Once testimony ended, jury deliberations took place in the audience seats as well.

Spencer, who was a prosecutor before being appointed State Court judge in 2017 by Gov. Nathan Deal, said the process went well overall, with a few glitches here and there.

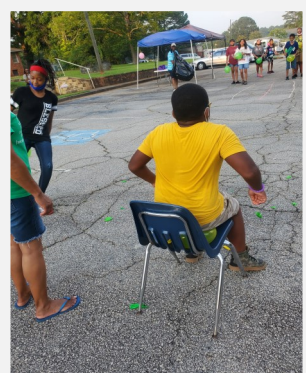
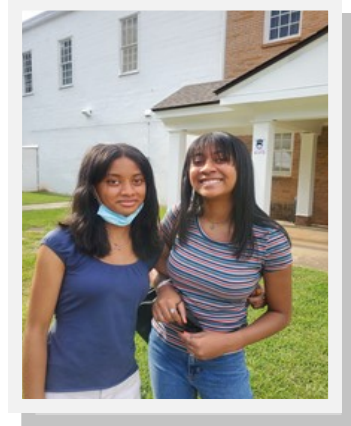
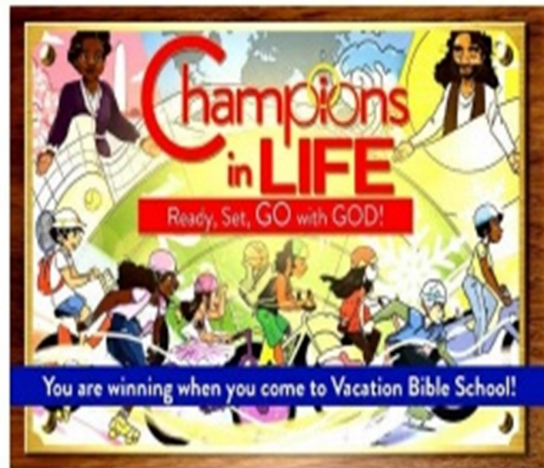
“It ran surprisingly smoothly,” said Spencer. “I told the attorneys and staff we were going to take our time ... I told them to speak up about any issues that they saw.”

Since last March, Spencer said judges at the courthouse have had to adjust to a wide array of changes in schedules for calendar calls, arraignments, trials, hearings and more. She said many court functions will continue to be virtual, but trials will be scheduled in-person for the foreseeable future, although only one trial per week will be scheduled for each floor of courtrooms at the courthouse, a big difference from the two- or three-week jury trial calendars in pre-COVID days.

Spencer said there is a plan in place to increase the number of trials per week in the fall, if circumstances allow.

“We do have a plan to go to two judges on each floor having trials in October,” she said. “It’s really a slow expansion of things, keeping the numbers in mind. Of course, everybody’s safety is the main thing. It’s kind of fluid right now because you just have to see how things go.”

One positive adjustment to come out of changes brought on by the pandemic, Spencer said, is that attorneys and judges have learned they can save time by meeting virtually. In civil cases, she said, attorneys would rather meet via Zoom than spend hours driving to different courthouses for a 15-minute meeting.

PRESS RELEASE ANNOUNCING A PROPOSED PROPERTY TAX INCREASE

(Clayton County) - The Clayton County Board of Commissioners announces its intention to increase the property taxes it will levy this year by 6.25 percent above the rollback millage rate.

Each year, the board of tax assessors is required to review the assessed value for property tax purposes of taxable property in the county. When the trend of prices on properties that have recently sold in the county indicates there has been an increase in the fair market value of any specific property, the board of assessors is required by law to re-determine the value of such property and adjust the assessment. This is called a reassessment.

When the total digest of taxable property is prepared, Georgia law requires that a rollback millage rate must be computed that will produce the same total revenue on the current year's digest that last year's millage rate would have produced had no reassessments occurred.

The budget adopted by the Clayton County Board of Commissioners requires a millage rate higher than the rollback millage rate, therefore, before the Clayton County Board of Commissioners may set a final millage rate, Georgia law requires three public hearings to be held to allow the public an opportunity to express their opinions on this increase.

If yes, the assistant must complete this section. **Voter assistance is only allowed if the voter is illiterate or physically disabled.**

By signing as assisting the voter, you are swearing under oath that the voter is entitled to assistance. Assisting a voter who is not eligible for assistance in completing this application violates Georgia law and is punishable by a fine up to \$100,000 or imprisonment for up to 10 years, or both.
