Scouting continues to thrive in Australia, as families seek the benefits we offer - values to live by, participation in the community, adventure in the outdoors and a unique opportunity to develop personal potential.

Scouts Australia has selected Youth Leading Adults Supporting as our report's theme. This concept is one element of the revised Scout Method that Scouts Australia adopted in 2017. Youth members from as young as six years of age have the opportunity to take charge of how they develop and progress in Scouting. As our youth members move through the Sections of Scouting, their degree of autonomy increases, with adults ultimately acting as supporters in our older Sections.

Through adult support, our youth develop creative problem solving, leadership, collaboration, and communication skills. In today's 21st Century world, these are exactly the sorts of skills that young people need to develop, and we are proud to be implementing the World Scouting Youth Involvement Policy as we move through our own Youth Program Review.

While we continue to look to the future, 2016 was also a time for us to reflect on our past, with the celebration of the Centenary of the Cub Scout Section. Baden-Powell's realisation that younger children could also become involved in Scouting led to what would become Scouting's largest section, with an estimated 21,000 Cub Scouts in Australia and 28 million worldwide.

This year Australian Scouts travelled to all parts of the globe and we welcomed many here at our own National events and exchange programs. I am proud that Australians proposed a motion at the recent World Scout Conference that will positively impact

> Scouting's worldwide involvement with the environment. We have extended assistance to Scouts in need in

> > Fiji, and we are delighted that after many years of assisting the development of the Scout organisations of Timor-Leste and Myanmar, both were accepted into the World Organisation of the Scout Movement in 2017.

I thank all our Adult Supporters for their continued enthusiasm for our program, and I am gratified we have been able to formally recognise over 1,100 in the Adult

Recognition Awards for 2017. I also thank our Branches for continuing to grow Scouting through their operational management, as well as the many National committees who contribute to Scouting in this country.

As you read through this report of the achievements of our youth members and the adults who support them, it is my sincere hope that you will share my pride in our amazing Movement and the potential it offers the young people of Australia and our world.

Our Vision: Through shared values, by 2023 Scouting will be the leading youth development Movement in Australia, empowering 100,000 young people to be resilient, self-fulfilled positive change makers in their community.

We agreed the Vision statement for 2023 and the associated strategic goals in July this year. It is an exciting and challenging task and we are working hard on plans to deliver this Vision.

Our new Promise and Law are the foundations of our shared values, and the National Council approved them in July this year. In November 2016 Scouts Australia and the Branches agreed to invest over \$3 million over the next few years to improve our youth program. The focus of the new program is on youth leading the program with our skilled adults supporting the development opportunities for our young people.

We had planned a national budget with a deficit of \$289,000 for the last financial year, but understood that deficits were not sustainable. The National Commissioners worked hard to reduce the deficit, and with some good investment returns, the end of year result was a surplus of \$158,000. We are committed to planning balanced budgets for the future.

I wish to thank all those involved in delivering Scouting across Australia. Your dedication and enthusiasm is amazing. You provide wonderful opportunities for young people to have fun and learn skills that last a life time. Thank you for your commitment.

In my first few months at Scouts Australia I have been thoroughly impressed by the variety and scope of our Scouting program. As the first female National General Manager, I have been made to feel very welcome. Given that over 30% of our members are female I am looking forward to playing my part in ensuring Scouting remains diverse and inclusive.

Over the past year, Scouts Australia made significant progress in formalising our policies for keeping Scouting safe. In November 2016 the National Scouts Australia Child Protection Policy was launched. While Branches have had policies for many years, this policy sets a National standard for the whole of Scouts Australia. Leading Australian child protection organisation Childwise had significant input, ensuring that our policy meets the highest possible standards. Child-safe Scouting is our priority and we will continue to work towards becoming an industry leader in this vital area.

On an operational level, the National Support Team is developing new and better ways of supporting our volunteers and youth members. Our Scout Shop now delivers revenue directly to Branches, and is increasing the range of products suitable for Scouting. More members are using our digital resources for programing, networking and administration.

With a background in strategy and change management across four continents, I look forward to continuing to work closely with the Chief Commissioner of Australia and the Chair of the NEC as part of the Executive Team, to serve the needs of our National Commissioners, National Council, Sub-Committees, Branches, youth members and Adult Supporters.

Scouts Australia is undergoing a transformation. The most comprehensive review of the organisation's 110 year history was undertaken from 2013 to 2017. From 2017 Scouts Australia is implementing strategies to keep Scouting relevant, and engaging for generations of young Australians.

In 2017 Scouts Australia finalised the Goals that will move the Association towards its Vision:

Through shared values, by 2023 Scouting will be the leading youth development movement in Australia, empowering 100,000 young people to be resilient, self-fulfilled positive change makers in their community.

Goal 1: Our youth program is fun, challenging, adventurous and inclusive and develops young people to be resilient and self-fulfilled. Scouts are positive change makers in their communities.

Goal 2: We provide leadership training and skills to the leaders of today and tomorrow. Today's leaders are fulfilled by their opportunity to develop the leaders of tomorrow through the empowerment and support they provide to young people.

Goal 3: Our Plan>Do>Review> cycle of every aspect of our program and support services delivers continuous improvement to the quality of everything we do.

Goal 4: Scouting as a national enterprise is effectively led and governed. Scouting resources are optimised to deliver a youth program, which attracts and retains young people and adults as the organisation grows to 100,000 by 2023.

Goal 5: The Scout brand is recognised and respected in Australia as a child-safe organisation, which empowers young people to develop skills which they use to develop their communities.

A SCOUT PROMISE AND LAW FOR ALL AUSTRALIANS

Scouts Australia recognises that what we offer is as relevant as ever, and can help young people navigate their way through modern life. From as young as six years old, our members are introduced to our values at the first step in their Scouting journey – learning the Australian Scout Promise and the Australian Scout Law.

Aiming to ensure all young Australians can participate in Scouting and make our Promise with conviction, from 2013 to 2016 Scouts Australia conducted extensive research and consultation with members, and the wider community. As a result the National Council adopted a new version of the Australian Scout Promise and the Australian Scout Law on the 22 July 2017. The wording had been endorsed by the World Organisation of the Scout Movement, and was enthusiastically received by members who had expressed the need for Scouting to be more inclusive.

Scouts now have a choice of two versions of the Promise, both of which express the Principles of Scouting: Duty to God, Duty to Others and Duty to self.

HIGHLIGHTS

Youth Program Review

The Youth Program Review continued to develop a program that will ensure future generations of young Australians are attracted to and engage with Scouting. In 2016 and 2017 the team focused on developing new parameters for applying the Scout Method in four challenge areas. Combining the new Scout Method with the challenge areas of community, outdoors, creative and personal growth, Scouts will achieve more focused educational outcomes. Excitingly for Scouting, the first trial of the new program concepts was conducted by four Victorian 'Groundbreaker' Groups in 2017.

The Youth Program Review team presented and tested the new program model to members in 2016 and 2017. Over 4,000 members around Australia participated in face to face and online program concept workshops throughout 2016, concluding in August 2017.

With the initial trial of the 'Groundbreakers' due for completion in late 2017, preparations are underway for the next 'Pioneer' stage trial expanding to 100 Groups in 2018.

Messengers of Peace

Scouting plays an integral role in peace promotion and developing peace culture within communities. In 2016 Scouts Australia developed new materials to support World Scouting's Messengers of Peace program. The program encourages members' participation in local service projects and sharing them on a global level. As at the end of August 2017, Scouts in Australia had logged 1.7 million service hours on World Scouting's online register. With over 780 million service hours logged worldwide, Scouting is on track to deliver one billion global service hours by 2020.

The Moot 2017

Scouts Victoria hosted the 20th Australian Rover Moot in January 2017. Six hundred Rover Scouts from Australia and around the world, engaged in 10 days of adventure across Victoria and Tasmania, challenging them, and creating new social networks.

Cub Scout Centenary

Throughout 2016, Scouting in Australia and around the world celebrated 100 years of Cub Scouts. When Baden-Powell realized that younger boys wished to join the Movement along with their older brothers, he made them 'Wolf Cubs'. Working with the framework provided by Rudyard Kipling's 'Jungle Book', Baden-Powell launched the 'Wolf Cub's Handbook' in December 1916. 100 years later, the World Scout Bureau estimates there are now 28 million Cub Scouts around the world. Australia's 21 000 Cub Scouts had a year-long celebration consisting of special events, competitions, badges and a nation-wide campfire held on the 20th of July.

You+Lead

In March 2017 Scouts Australia launched the first stages of its new Leadership Development Program, You+Lead. The program is a three part journey aimed at delivering an outstanding platform for Scouts, Venturer Scouts and Rover Scouts, to develop themselves through learning about their own self, and then learning about how to lead others. The program follows World Scouting's Youth Involvement Policy and aims to create more opportunities for our youth members to develop leadership, 21st-century learning and community engagement skills.

International Sharing

Sharing Australia's program progress at an international level is important in the development of Scouting across our region and the world.

Four Rover Scouts represented Australia at the 13th World Scout Youth Forum in Azerbaijan with a total delegation of 28 members representing Australia at the 41st World Scout Conference. At the Conference, the Youth Program team facilitated discussions on 'Youth leading, Adults supporting' as part of the Scout Method, and the proposed Educational Objectives and SPICES.

National Youth Council

The National Youth Council (NYC) represents the youth members of Scouts Australia at a National level. Members are aged 14 to 24 years, and made recommendations to the National Team, as well as drafted Community Advocacy position papers on a range of issues that affect young people. Particular projects the NYC worked on during the period included exploring the role of youth members in Scouting social media - how they can learn, network and express themselves. The NYC also developed a database of better practice program resources and templates which, by making these accessible to youth members will empower them to lead projects and programming. They also initiated a campaign to increase Scouting youth members' awareness of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.



Environmental Leadership

A key theme for Scouting is how we interact with and care for our environment locally and globally. Scouts Australia implements the World Scout Environment Program, and to ensure we continue to use better practice, Scouts Australia members attended the World Scout Seminar on Environment Education in the Czech Republic, and the Asia Pacific Region Workshop on Environmental Education in Scouting in Thailand. Branch Environment Commissioners also met nationally to share how to better support Groups.

2017 saw the conclusion of the three year Scouts Australia Environment Action Plan. Outcomes included Minimal Environmental Impact Practices online training modules, a new draft Environment Charter and better support resources.

Practical Action

5,000 Scouts participated in Clean Up Australia Day in March 2017. Environment activity camps were held in most Branches for youth members, assisting them to earn environment-related badges.

Global Environmental Impact

Scouting's future global environment program will be enhanced following the Environmental Sustainability Impact resolution, submitted by Scouts Australia and adopted by the World Scout Conference in August 2017. This significant resolution calls upon Member Organizations to review and adopt policies, which promote environmentally sustainable activities and practices within their organisations.

Adult Training and Development

The Scouts Australia Adult Training and Development (ATD) portfolio supports the youth program through the provision of Woodbadge training for Young Adult members and Adult Leaders, and Adventurous Activities training for Venturer Scouts, Rovers Scouts and Adult Members.

Waverly Valley Scout Group in Victoria now generates the energy it needs with 3 kilowatts of solar panels. As part of her Baden-Powell Award, Rover Scout Bec Gibbs lobbied her Group, researched, led fundraising and managed Branch and local council applications to make this a reality. "I chose this project as I'm interested in the environment, but by taking the lead, I learned a lot."





Training Developments

A new Basic Outdoor Skills (BOS) Course replaced the Level 1 Bushwalking Course, with seven new or updated elearning modules and workbooks. This is invaluable preparation for youth members planning for outdoor adventurous activities and expeditions.

The new Rover Scout Basic and Advanced practical supplement was finalized, led by the National Rover Council.

The 28th Course for Potential Leader Trainers was updated and held over the 2017 Easter weekend at Gilwell Park, Victoria, involving several participants from the Asia-Pacific Region.

All Adventurous Activity Instructors are now appointed nationally, with Instructors becoming full members of the National Training Team. Retiring Trainers who have given outstanding service will now be given the title 'Trainer Emeritus', recognizing their contribution.

Preparing for the New Youth Program

Training is introducing new measures to ensure it can support the new Youth Program. A new three-stage Training of Trainers (ToT) curriculum was developed after wide consultation. Trials of the three courses are currently underway, with new modules in development. The National Training, SAIT and Youth Program teams met to discuss the new Youth Program.

The role "National Chief Instructor" was created to oversee the team of National Adventurous Activities instructors. This will be essential for the success of the Outdoor Adventure Skills component of the new Youth Program. Sea Scouting within Australia and the Asia-Pacific Region should see new opportunities with the appointment of a new Sea Scout Liaison, which will also ensure enough instructors are qualified to support the Boating Outdoor Adventure Skills in the new Youth Program.

National Summer Sailing School

Tasmanian Branch hosted the 3rd National Adventurous Activities (Summer Sailing) School in Hobart in January 2017. Over seven days, participants developed greater seamanship, sailing knowledge and skills for safe sailing. Leaders progressed towards Guide and Instructor levels; whilst the Venturer Scout, Rover Scout and other Leader participants achieved Level 1 and Level 2 sailing skills.

Event Management Course

The Event Management Course was held in August 2017, with the aim of preparing Leaders in management roles for AJ2019, and other Scouting projects and events. Of the nine participants, four were aged under 30 including one Venturer Scout. Covering subjects including risk management and safe workplaces, the course aimed to ensure our volunteers have the skills to manage major Scouting events safely and effectively.

Scouts Australia Institute of Training (SAIT)

SAIT is an Enterprise Registered Training Organisation (RTO) run by Scouts Australia to enable members to receive recognized qualifications in a number of areas including Outdoor Recreation and Leadership and Management. This year SAIT worked towards better service delivery and the attainment of milestones associated with the Strategic and Business Plans ensuring that the RTO remains compliant with all requirements.

We are exploring opportunities to expand and change our qualifications on Scope that we are registered to deliver, and ensure that SAIT is well placed to deliver quality training and assessment, as well as support Adult Training and Development and Youth Program with the changes likely with a new Youth Program.

International Scouting

Australia continues to maintain strong representation within International Scouting. Tens of thousands of youth members engaged in weekly programs learning about the cultures and diversity of Scouting overseas. Many are inspired go on to travel internationally with over 1,400 members travelling to international events during the period.

A growing number of Australian Scouts have visited National Scouting Organisations including Fiji, Oman, Indonesia and Thailand, engaging in friendly exchanges.

Australia-Japan Foundation

The Australia-Japan Foundation Grant enabled two youth members to participate in the Scout International Student Exchange Program from 30 July to 20 August 2016.

International Scouting in Australia

Scouts Australia's largest ever exchange saw 42 youth members from Denmark, Indonesia, UK and Japan visit Australia in 2016 hosted by local Scouting families. Hundreds of youth members have been engaging in pen-pals from around the world.



Youth Leadership in International Scouting

The success of the Mawson Scholarship in Leadership has seen youth involvement on Contingent Management Teams continue to grow dramatically. Our expanding participation at international Scouting events is a direct result of the training from this program and a tribute to the amazing leadership of our young and inspiring leaders. To achieve this, Contingent Leaders engage our youth members in the management of these events and offer the ability to learn and contribute to the event organisation.

Jamboree on the Air Jamboree on the Internet

13,000 Scouts Australian youth members participated in the 59th Jamboree on the Air and the 20th Jamboree on the Internet. The annual global event, themed "Discover Our World", encouraged participants to exchange ideas via radio and online real time with other Scouts and Guides around the world.

Digital Scouting

Over one third of Scout formations now record their attendance electronically on Scouts Australia's digital resource Scout Central. Leaders are increasingly using the system to plan their programs online. The online archive for Scouting, Scout Cloud, saw a significant increase in use to nearly 7,000 repositories. A staggering 152,000 badge completions were recorded on Scout Central.

Scout Shop

The Scouts Australia owned online store Scoutshop.com.au continued to grow in sales and in the number of products offered. Scout Shop expanded its outdoor gear and outdoor camping ranges significantly, now providing a comprehensive range of Scout-suitable products for all levels of adventurous activities. In a new arrangement begun in April 2017, Scout Branches now receive a royalty from the online purchases in their state.

Child Protection, Code of Ethics and Code of Conduct

Three important Scouting policies were updated and adopted during the year. The National Child Protection Policy, which brought together the child protection policies followed by each state Branch, was adopted in November 2016. This policy clearly sets out Scouts Australia's position on ensuring we are a child-safe organisation with zero tolerance for harm of any type.

The Scouts Australia Code of Ethics and new Code of Conduct were also introduced in July 2017, establishing the standards by which all adults in Scouting must follow.

Scouts Australia knows the value of encouraging young people to set personal goals, then recognising their achievements.

From as young as six, youth members can participate in an award scheme suitable for their age group. The emphasis is on the youth member's own interests, and the award schemes cover dozens of topics and hundreds of different badge varieties to cater for young minds eager to explore and learn.

Each Section Award Scheme culminates in a top award, which has been designed to challenge youth members, but still be achievable for those willing to put in additional effort.

During the financial year, the Society consolidated its position, having contributed over \$300,000 the previous year, primarily to AJ2016 scholarship recipients. An amount of \$30,000 was made available in 2017 to assist youth members to attend the Australian Venture to be held in Queensland in 2018. In 2017 the Society launched its next Jamboree Fund campaign. Funds raised through the Jamboree Fund will go towards assisting youth members to attend the 2019 Australian Jamboree and the 2019 World Jamboree.
