The brain is the most complex organ in the body. It has a surface area of approximately 150 -200 cm². That is kind of like a double page of a newspaper. The human brain weighs about 1,300 grams and is roughly the size of a small cauliflower. It makes up around 2% of what the body weighs but it uses 20% of the oxygen and 20% of the energy needed by the body. It's made up of as many as 100 billion neurons and the senses send the brain up to 11 million bits of information per second for processing. Most of the processing is automatic but the brain consciously processes some 50 bits per second of information. Research shows that the brain can make new connections, grow and adapt even with increasing age.

The skills each team develops will help the company as well, as they will be able to carry over their increased sense of team spirit to their day-to-day work. Fewer decisions would need to be made as one person can suggest a project and others can join in with it. In conclusion, I believe that team projects are more effective since they promote collaboration within the company in addition to the other benefits of volunteering.
