Dear Friends and Benefactors,

Every priest has the desire to make his apostolate bear fruit. Indeed, one of the most common reflections of a priest during his daily meditation is upon how he might make his apostolate bear fruit in the day ahead. Usually such thoughts are distractions because the priest considers only the material aspect of his apostolate: buildings, finances, projects, the 'things to do' list, etc.. The spiritual side, the founding of his apostolate on an increasingly holy and personal relationship with our Blessed Lord—an assimilation to Christ— is so easily forgotten.

Also forgotten is that the fruit of his apostolate depends not only upon his own holiness (which makes him a useful instrument in God's hands), but upon the holiness of those around him: his fellow priests, religious brothers and sisters, faithful, together with his family and friends. Indeed, many priests are supported by a small army of spiritual benefactors without whom their apostolic zeal would be but tinkling cymbals.

So if a priest wants to make his apostolate bear fruit, then holiness is the foundation, ...but wait a minute, isn't holiness the fruit as well?

May we all grow in holiness.

SHOULD WETEACH MORE SCIENCE IN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS?

INTRODUCTION

A few months ago a young man, a pupil of the elite Our Lady of La Salette Academy in Idaho, U.S.A., while visiting Veritas Academy, voiced his concern over the teaching of sciences in traditional Catholic schools. This young man was a keen scientist and regretted the lack of attention given to the sciences.

Compared to most schools, it would be fair to say that traditional Catholic schools do not devote as much time or as many resources to the teaching of the natural sciences (biology, chemistry and physics), but should they do more?

SCIENCE IN MODERN SCHOOLS

It is clear that in many schools today the sciences are being taught in a way that actually opposes Catholic faith and morals. In general, the sciences are portrayed as yielding the highest form of knowledge (Revelation and metaphysics are completely ignored) and realities that cannot be measured by science (i.e. the spiritual order) are deemed not to exist at all. In effect they are used as a vehicle to promote atheistic materialism and some of

the moral aberrations that usually accompany it (contraception and abortion are the most striking examples).

The sciences are often placed in opposition to the humanities too, again because of the way they are taught. A snob might say, "Sciences are not real education, just preliminary job training." An inverted snob might reply, "Whado ya wanna study English and Latin for—complete waste of time." The error on both sides is to regard the sciences as only having a utilitarian end which differs from the end of humanities which is entirely intellec-

tual.

In reality, the natural sciences are actually as much liberal arts as literature and languages. They might commence with the observation of concrete particulars, but in their pure state they terminate in universal knowledge. The problem, again, is the way they are taught in modern schools and universities.

ANSWERING THE QUESTION

And so should traditional Catholic schools give more time and resources to the sciences? The answer must be nuanced. If our schools are not forced to follow a restrictive ideological and utilitarian syllabus and if they have the resources, then most certainly they should teach more of the sciences. The reasons are several.

They may be taught easily in a way that conforms to the perennially effective educational praxis of the *trivuim* (the "grammar" is induction and classification, "dialectic" is analysis and deduction and "rhetoric" is synthesis (formulation of

theories).

Furthermore, the natural sciences give a child a knowledge of nature which is nothing less than the knowledge of the reflected attributes of God. In theology especially, an understanding of the natural order is indispensable for the understanding of the supernatural order, for we can only know the supernatural order by analogy with the natural order.

Finally, for those who wish to make their living as scientists, medical doctors, technicians or engineers, the natural sciences should be taught to provide a foundation for their professional education in later years.

CONSOLATION

This article is probably not very consoling for the young man from La Salette because he will probably remain scientifically deprived at his traditional Catholic school, but perhaps the following words of consolation might help: Keep your head down, excel in the humanities at your school and then take time out after high school to catch-up in the sciences. There are many bright scientists and engineers in the world, but very few of them have a rounded education in the humanities too. Ω

HISTORY

The Institute of the Consolers of the Sacred Heart or "Consoling Sisters" was approved by Bishop Massimiliani of Civita Castellana (about one hour north of Rome) in 1961. The community started with five sisters, but grew quickly to thirty sisters in four different houses by 1975. Along with every other religious community it suffered the dreadful effects

of the "aggiornamento" that followed the Second Vatican Council. Its founder, Don Basilio, saw much of his careful work undone by a spirit of independence and innovation within his community and it was with a heavy heart that he eventually retired to the house in Vigne di Narni to keep the flame of devotion burning there through his great love of the Blessed Sacrament.

Providence never abandons a faithful servant and so, before he died on 23rd August 1996, in answer to his prayers, Don Basilio found a successor in Father Emmanuel du Chalard of the Society of

Saint Pius X. To Father du Chalard, Don Basilio entrusted the spiritual welfare of his dear sisters and, although only six remained to submit to their new spiritual guide, it was not long before the new spirit of tradition transformed their community. Out went the Novus Ordo Missae and modern office; in came the Mass of all ages and the traditional office together with a traditional rule of life cen-

tred around the traditional Roman Liturgy, devotion to the holy Eucharist and perennial Catholic theology, morals and acsetics. It was not long before new shoots sprang forth.

APOSTOLATE

The Consoling Sisters console the Sacred Heart of Jesus not only in their devotions and the promotion of devotion to the Sacred Heart (through the practice of "The Guard of Honour" and the recitation of the nine "Offices of the Sacred Heart"), they also console Him in their work for the elderly who reside at the convent, they console Him through their invaluable assistance to the priests of the Society of St. Pius X (such wonderful cooking!), on retreats, on summer camps and above all in India.

Following an invitation by Father Couture, the District Superior of Asia, in 2006, the Consoling Sisters agreed to welcome a postulant from India who ran her own orphanage and home for the elderly. The postulant is now Sr. Maria Immaculata and her work is now their own.

The vocations that Divine Providence has sent them (both western and Indian) since 2006 now numbers one professed sister, three novices, one postulant and two prepostulants. A new orphanage is being built in Palaymakottai, and there are plans to build the new primary school and girls school on the same site soon after.



An Overview of the Southern Mission

PRIORY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY



The priory (estd. 1986, built 2002) accommodates two priests, a brother, a postulant brother, two volunteers, nine boy orphans and fourteen boy boarders.



The Chapel of the Most Holy Trinity (built 2006) is on the same site as the priory and is the principal chapel of the southern mission.

THE CHAPELS



St. Anthony's Chapel, Singamparai (estd. & built 1987) is one hour west of the priory (20 miles). Thirteen of its children attend Veritas Academy.



St. Thomas' Church in Nagercoil (estd. 2006, built 2007) is about 2 hours by car southeast of the priory and is served by Fr. Valan on Sundays and feast days along with the Christ the King Church, Christurajapuram and St. Anthony's, Asaripalam (below).



St. Anthony's Church, Asaripalam, (estd. & built 1986) was the first chapel built by the Society in India.



Christ the King Church, Christurajapuram, (estd. 1989, built 2005) is about 3 hour southwest of the priory.



St. Joseph's Chapel, Trichy, (estd. 1997, built 2007) is served by a helper priest, Father Mathias. Trichy is a six hour train journey north-northwest of the priory.



St. Francis Xavier's Chapel (estd. 1986). This was the first Mass Centre in India and still resides in the house of Miss Josephine Caleb. It is served by a helper priests, Father Xavier-Ignatius and Father Methodius.

THE SCHOOL





Veritas Academy (estd. 2006) is located in a rented building about 1 mile from the Priory. One day we will build a school for the girls and then for the boys.


