## INDEPENDENT LIVING COVID-19

 RESTRICTIONS REDUCTIONSAll of our indicators for the lifting of restrictions continue to be positive, and we are moving forward with our May plans to lift additional restrictions. Please note the following changes that will be taking place during the month of May:

- We will allow the Suwannee County Tax Collector's office to resume on-campus services for property tax issues. The FLOW Mobile for driver's licenses is operated by the state of Florida, and they have not yet announced when they will resume service.
- The professional offices will be allowed to return and resume services at the VS. You should check with them individually for scheduled times and appointments.
- Beginning May 10 we will no longer lock DH, CH, RV, or Lawrence House during the day. However, for the time being, we ask that you continue to restrict off-campus visitors. Please continue to contact your service coordinator if you plan to have off-campus visitors.
- CCC will begin to allow all CCC members to resume use of the facility. Until further notice, we ask all members to make an appointment to limit the overall occupancy of the facility, and use will be limited to the hours of 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- We are scheduling an outdoor event for the Members Association in May. More details to follow.
- Beginning in May we will resume our new member receptions.

## CABLE TV UPGRADE

In early May work will begin on the cable distribution to upgrade various pieces of equipment, as well as to install new equipment to insure better reliability and quality of service. We are changing vendors, which does bring with it some changes in programming, and for many of you it will eliminate the need for a receiver box.

By the time you read this, each on-campus independent living resident should have received some information on the new system and channel lineup, as well as the new rates, which will take effect on July 1. With our current limit on group sizes, I plan to try to communicate with folks in written form. However I do plan to hold one or more in-person meetings with folks. These meetings will be for groups of approximately 40 people and will be by reservation.

As long as the websites listed on the letter are wh.gov/arp and IRS.gov/coronavirus, and the phone number at the bottom is 800-919-9835, you're safe. Here's a tip: If you'd like to verify the validity of a phone number, Google it to see if it appears on the correct website for the organization. Also, any website that ends in ".gov" (wh.gov, IRS.gov and SSA.gov for instance) is always safe because only government organizations can register that type of domain.

Speaking of letters that are not a scam, neighbors all over the area are receiving invitations to join Nextdoor. Nextdoor is a social network like Facebook, but it groups neighbors by geographic location. Instead of sending email invitations, the network sends physical letters. Feel free to either join or just discard the letter.

The outdoor gathering I have mentioned a couple of times previously scheduled for Tuesday, May 18, has been rescheduled for Tuesday, May 25. I hope you had already marked your calendar, and I apologize for you having to re-mark your calendar with the changed date. Looking up into the sky in the predawn hours this past Friday morning, I witnessed an accomplishment worthy of celebrating. The launch of the Space X rocket was scheduled for early Thursday morning, however, all systems were not "go for launch". The launch was postponed for 24 hours, and all systems were go for Friday's launch for its journey to the ISS.

A small group of Village folk were on hand to view this miracle of modern science technology. No one was disappointed by the delay, for the view from the field between the swimming pool and the communication tower was spectacular. Even better than it would have been on Thursday due to less cloud cover. A sense of anticipation was evident due to the scrubbed launch from the previous morning.

I have my mother to thank for instilling in me the wonder of the skies and the thrill of watching "Echo", a metalized balloon communication satellite
which launched on Aug. 12, 1960. It was a gamechanger in the field of communications; the 100-foot-indiameter satellite was to serve as a reflector, allowing a signal sent from Earth to "bounce off" of it and return the signal back to the ground. At that time, Eisenhower was the president and had the honor of being the first person to send a message to radio operators across America by using Echo.

Our local paper gave the sighting times for our area and, when visible, my mother and I would rouse from sleep to watch its trip across the sky. That giant balloon was the coolest thing in space at that time.

It is no wonder that I still set my clock to get up while the skies are dark to go and meet friends so that we can look up into the skies and see the accomplishments of modern day science technology. From the lowly Echo to the marvel of Space X, another reason for celebrating. A lot has happened in the past 60 years.

I hope that the next time a launch is scheduled more of you will join in celebrating the marvel of space travel from within the gates of ACV by watching from the field behind the swimming pool. A sight to behold indeed! There is plenty of room for you! Come on out and join us.
