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## A LETTER FROM YOUR MAYOR

Dear Fellow Citizens,

I am pleased to announce that the Town of Hickory Creek has once again received an excellent audit by Carl Deaton of Hankins, Eastup, Deaton, Tonn and Seay Accounting Firm. The town's financial statements of governmental activities and all accounting activities are audited annually to ensure compliance with standards contained in the Governmental Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. The following statements can be found in the 2020 Town of Hickory Creek Financial Statements and Accountant's Opinion:

#### Financial Highlights

- The assets and deferred outflows of resources of the Town of Hickory Creek exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows at September 30, 2020 by \$15,003,161. Of this amount, \$3,144,750 may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The Town's total net position increased by \$517,485 during the fiscal year from the results of current year operations.
- As of September 30, 2020, the Town of Hickory Creek's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$4,844,240, a decrease of \$125,829 in comparison with the beginning of the period. Approximately 70 percent of this total amount, \$3,398,946, is available for spending at the government's discretion (unassigned fund balance).
- At the end of the current period, unassigned fund balance for the general fund of \$3,398,946 was 68.25 percent of total general fund expenditures
- The fund balance of the Town's general fund decreased by \$86,420 during the current year compared to a \$105,769 increase in the prior year. Key factors are as follows:
- Revenues increased \$811,981 or 19.89% from the previous year, primarily due to increases in building permits and sales tax revenues.
- Expenditures increased \$952,602 or 2.65% from the previous year, primarily due to increased street maintenance and capital outlay expenditures

For the past year, I have participated in weekly Zoom calls concerning the Covid-19 pandemic with County officials. Excellent teamwork and relationship building through these calls has been one of the silver linings that has come from the pandemic. These established relationships proved to be vital during our recent winter storm. All of our elected officials, including our Legislative delegation, came together to make sure our communities and our needs were heard by our utility companies. We are also working together to debrief and to plan for future emergencies. I have heard from officials in other counties that they do not have the relationships we have in Denton County. I am proud to live and serve in Denton County, and I am grateful for our County Commissioner, Bobbie Mitchell, our County Judge Andy Eads, and all of our Commissioners, for their excellent leadership during these troubled times.

The past year has been especially hard on so many, whether due to COVID-19 or the winter storm. I am especially proud of the way our community has come together, and I am grateful to live in a community that cares. COVID numbers have already dropped significantly in Denton County, and all of the trends are positive. I know that even better days are ahead! We are #HickoryCreekStrong #DentonCountyStrong

# ARBOR DAY FOUNDATION NAMES HICKORY CREEK TREE CITY USA® FOR 13TH YEAR

On February 22, 2021, Hickory Creek Texas was named a 13th year Tree City USA® by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters.

Hickory Creek achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

"Everyone benefits when elected officials, volunteers and committed citizens in communities like Hickory Creek make smart investment sin urban forests, " said Matt Harris, chief executive of the Arbor Day Foundation. "Trees bring shade to our homes and beauty to our neighborhood, increase property values, reduce home cooling costs, remove air pollutants and provide wildlife habitat, among many other benefits.

Sometimes the scammers will use special computer software to "spoof" (send false information to change the caller ID on your end), making it easier to believe the scammers are calling from a place you trust, such as a bank, your police department, or other government entities.

According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), Many different kinds of imposters ask you to pay with gift cards. Someone might call you and claim to be from the IRS, collecting back taxes or fines. The caller might say he's from tech support, asking for money to fix your computer. The caller might even say she's a family member with an emergency and needs money right now.

#### SGT. CAUSSEAUX AND CHICO ATTEND NEXT LEVEL K9 TEXAS WORKSHOP



Hickory Creek's Sgt. Causseaux and K9 partner, Chico, attended a week long Next Level K9 Texas Workshop the second week of March. The event was hosted by Prosper Independent School District and was lead by their K9 Officer and The National Narcotic Detector Dog Association, Inc. (NNDDA) Certifying Official Steven Antommarchi. The workshop involved over forty K9 teams from nine different states and included bomb detection dogs, narcotics only dogs (single purpose) and patrol dogs (dual purpose). Each area was instructed by a certified instructor that specialized in each area to improve each team on a one-on-one basis. During the workshop, most K9 teams certified through the national organization, The National Narcotic Detector Dog Associate, Incorporated (NNDDA). During the event, Sgt. Causseaux and K9 partner, Chico, for the first time, certified as a dual purpose team so they can better serve and protect the citizens of Hickory Creek.

For several months leading up to the event, Sgt. Causseaux and Chico have been training with Officer Antommarchi and have made significant improvements to obtain the dual purpose verification. Stg. Causseaux and Chico are part of a training group led by Officer Antommarchi that includes Frisco, Grapevine, Prosper, and Northeast Police Departments and Rockwall County SO. The training group meets weekly and continues to improve as a team.



Applications and a copy of the Permit Fee Schedule are available on the Permits page of the towns website. **PROJECTS STARTED WITHOUT A BUILDING PERMIT ARE SUBJECT TO DOUBLE PERMIT FEES.**

## -REPUBLIC SERVICES SENIOR DISCOUNT

Hickory Creek provides a 30% senior discount on trash and recycling services for residents over 65. To get signed up, bring your trash bill and drivers license to Town Hall and let us know you're eligible for the discount. The Town will contact Republic Services for your discount on future bills. Once your information has been submitted, there is no need to reapply each year. Senior discounts previously applied for with Waste Management will carry over to Republic Services.

## GARAGE SALE PERMIT

Spring is the perfect time to go through your house and get rid of unwanted items. If you want to hold a garage sale in Hickory Creek there are a few things to remember:

- ⇒ A permit is required. The permit fee is \$5. Only two sales may be held at an address per year.
- ⇒ The sale may last for 3 consecutive days and may open at sunrise.
- ⇒ The only items that can be sold are the used personal property of the residents holding the sale. Items purchased for resale or made specifically to be sold at an occasional sale are prohibited.
- ⇒ A total of 5 signs may be placed out. All signs must display the address, dates and times of the sale, and the permit number. They may be no larger than 4 square feet, be posted on a wood or metal spike in the ground and must be placed on private property. Any signs found on public right-of-ways, attached to any other signs, posts, poles or traffic


control devices, or that do not have a valid permit number will be removed.

⇒ Signs may be placed out 24 hours before the sale starts and all signs and sale items need to be picked back up the morning after the sale closes.

## Town of Hickory Creek Special Election Proposition - Reallocation of Sales & Use Taxes

On January 25, 2021, the Town Council approved an ordinance calling for a special election for the purposes of submitting a proposition on decreasing the sales and use tax of one-half (1/2) to one-fourth (1/4) of one percent for the benefit of the Type B Economic Development Corporation; increasing the local sales and use tax from the rate of one and one fourth (1/4) percent to a rate of one and one half (1/2) percent.

#### What is Sales and Use Tax?

The State of Texas imposes a state sales tax of 6.25% on all retail sales, leases and rentals of most goods, as well as taxable services. Towns may impose local sales tax at a rate of up to 2% for a combined state and local tax rate not to exceed 8.25%.

State law capped the amounts of the additional sales and use taxes.

#### What is the Town of Hickory Creek's Sales and Use Tax Rate?

The Town of Hickory Creek currently imposes sales and use taxes at the rate of 8.25%, of which 2% is allocated as follows:

- Local Sales and Use Tax 1.25%

- Property Tax Relief .25%

- Economic Development Corporation .50%

#### Why is the Town Council calling a special election?

On September 1, 2015, House Bill 157 went into effect which essentially removed the current caps on the general and dedicated sales taxes and authorizes a town to hold an election to *reallocate sales tax revenue within the two percent local sales tax cap*. In a nutshell, the bill allows a town to assess its funding priorities and reallocate the distribution of its general and dedicated sales taxes, so long as the total local tax rate does not exceed 2%.

#### What is the Ballot Language?

"Decreasing the Local Sales and Use Tax rate in Hickory Creek for the Type B Economic Development Corporation from one half percent to one fourth percent; and the adoption of a Local Sales and Use Tax in Hickory Creek at the rate of one and one half percent."

#### Why is the ballot language worded this way?

State law allows for a combined ballot proposition which protects the town's interest by eliminating the risk that one tax will be voted out by the citizens without the other tax being voted in. State legislation governs requirements for the wording of the ballot, which has led to some confusion due to reading "...and the adoption of a local sales and use tax..."

The proposition does not call for an increase in the overall sales tax rate. If the proposition is adopted by the voters, there will be <u>absolutely no increase in the overall sales tax rate</u>. It will <u>reduce</u> the Economic Development Corporation Sales and Use Tax from .50% to .25% and <u>increase</u> the Town of Hickory Creek Local Sales and Use Tax from 1.25% to 1.50%. If the proposition is not adopted, there will be no change in the sales tax rates.

#### What is the Economic Development Corporation Sales Tax and how is it used?

This is a Type B Economic Development Tax Section 4B can be used to fund projects that are typically considered to be community development initiatives. Funds can only be used for authorized categories under Section 4B/Type B of the Development Corporation Act. Expenditures by the Economic Development Corporation must be approved by the Town Council prior to expenditure.

#### What is Local Sales and Use Tax and how is it used?

The Local Sales and Use Tax is one of the revenue sources for the town and is utilized for projects and services throughout the town. This includes police and fire public safety services, infrastructure projects, environment and development services, and general administration.

Hickory Creek residents will have the opportunity to vote in the Special Election regarding the Proposition

Reallocation of Sales & Use Taxes and the Lake Dallas ISD School Board.

Residents will not vote to appoint Town Council due to the candidates being unopposed.

### SPRING TREE CARE CHECKLIST: PREPARE IN 3 PHASES

We'll bet you're ready for spring. We know we are!

Now is the time to make sure your trees are just as prepared. Follow the phases of spring care below to boost tree nutrients and strength for a healthy growing season.

#### PHASE 1: BEFORE WAVING WINTER GOODBYE

Inspect your trees for signs of winter damage or disease while they are still bare.

Prune dead, diseased or unsafe branches before spring growth. Waiting to prune in warmer weather may lead to an unwelcome spread of pests and diseases.

#### PHASE II: A PRE-BLOOM PREP

Remove fallen leaves, branches and waste from your landscape to set the stage for healthy growth.

Feed your trees the nutrients they crave after winter. A slow release fertilizer helps trees defend against pests and diseases.

#### PHASE III: DURING SPRINGTIME SPROUTS

Plant new trees to maximize energy saving and property enhancing benefits. Before planting, make sure to secure an ideal growing spot.

Add 2 to 4 inches of mulch around your trees to improve soil moisture and control weeds.

## **Emergency Preparedness: Basic Disaster Supply Kit**

After an emergency, you may need to survive on your own for several days. Being prepared means having your own food, water, and other supplies to last for several days. A disaster supplies kit is a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency. Make sure your emergency kit is stocked with the items on the checklist below.

- Water
- Food (at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radop and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra Batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- Manual can opener (for food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery

Once you take a look at the basic items consider what unique needs your family might have, such as supplies for pets or seniors.



#### **DENTON COUNTY ALERT-GET SIGNED**

Spring in Texas means unpredictable weather and we want our residents to be prepared! SMART Weather messages from Everbridge are automatically sent when the National Weather Service issues a severe weather warning message. To get signed up go to www.dentoncounty.com. You will need to set up a new account even if you have been previously signed up with CODERED.



# ANIMAL REGISTRATION

Residents are required to register all cats and dogs with Animal Services. There is no charge to register but you must have a valid copy of their rabies vaccination certificate. Residents may register animals at the animal shelter, town hall or online.

# ALARM PERMITS

All commercial and residential alarm systems are required to register every January. First time residential alarm systems require a \$50 application fee. Renewals are free. Applications may be found online or at Town Hall.

# BOAT RAMP & DAY USE PASSES

Boat ramp and day use passes for 2021 can now be purchased or picked up at Town Hall, online or at pay stations located in Arrowhead. Point Vista, and Sycamore Bend. If you purchase the pass at the park pay station you will receive a receipt that requires you to stop by Town Hall during business hours to pick up a permanent sticker. If you purchase passes online, we send the pass to you in the mail. Hickory Creek residents receive a FREE day use pass but you must come by Town Hall to pick up the pass. Boat ramp passes for Hickory Creek residents are \$25. Please place all passes in the front windshield by the inspection sticker so they may easily be seen by officers.
