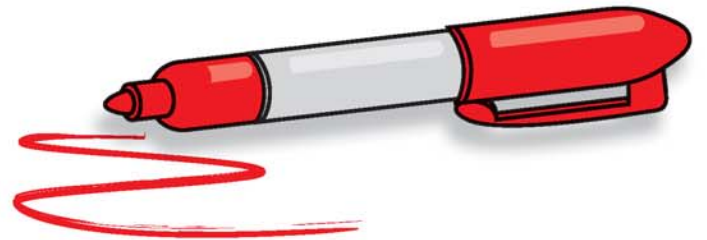

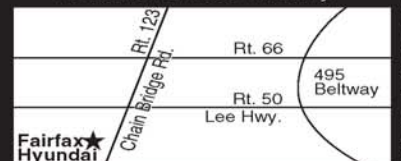

## Hidden Poverty

Arlington's high cost of living obscures amount of need in county.

Anyone who has ever paid a monthly rent in Arlington knows that the cost of living here is much higher than other parts of Virginia. Yet the federal government uses a one-size fits all formula for determining poverty. That means that an Arlington family of four making \$22,000 or more would not be counted in poverty statistics even though the median household income in Arlington is \$102,000.

"We are currently under-counting the number of poor people in Arlington," said Robert Ruiz, an urban planner for the county government. "The way we do it now, we are only picking up the desperately poor."

That may change in the coming year, as Del. David Englin (D-45) works with a newly created task force appointed earlier this month to reduce poverty in Virginia. Democratic Gov. Tim Kaine appointed Englin to the task force during a May 7 summit on the issue of poverty. Englin will chair a subcommittee of the task force focused on methods to define and measure poverty, and he will serve on the task force's workforce training and education work group.

"Rethinking how we define and measure poverty is a critical overarching issue that will affect

how we focus resources and whether we are actually making a difference in people's lives," said Englin. "So I'm particularly excited for the opportunity to chair that part of the effort."

**KAINE'S TASK FORCE** was announced during a summit in Richmond earlier this month, with Secretary of Health and Human Resources Marilyn Tavenner and Richmond attorney Robert Grey named as co-chairs. The governor asked task force members to identify challenges and opportunities to lift children and families out of poverty — everything from asset development to workforce training. At the conclusion of its research, the panel will make short-term and long-term policy recommendations.

"Helping Virginians lift themselves out of poverty will not be easy or quick, but it is imperative that we find ways to protect children in poverty and provide economic opportunity for all Virginians," Kaine said in a written statement. "With the current economic challenges we face, the work of the taskforce is even more urgent, and I eagerly anticipate positive results."

Although current data shows that about 6 percent of Arlington residents live in poverty, county officials say that statistic does not

## Reconstructing Yorktown

A war zone in North Arlington? Think again. That's actually the north side of Yorktown High School, where classes won't end until the middle of June.

However, demolition work by Hess Construction on the long-awaited reconstruction of the school has been underway since the beginning of March. What was once the bus loop and student drop-off area is now a pile of rubble.

The 1,600-student school is in the midst of construction that will replace all of the existing school except for a 58,000 square foot addition that was completed in 2004. The 12-acre site is set to receive approximately 300,000 gross square feet of new construction as part of the accepted \$92 million project, which includes a new pool. Students will continue to attend class at the facility during construction.

Work on this particular demolished section is scheduled to be done by the summer of 2010, at which point faculty and students will move into the newly constructed area and a second chunk of the school will then be demolished and reconstructed by January 2012. The whole project will be complete by fall 2013 according to this phased plan.

On Tuesday night, after the Connection's deadline, the Arlington County Board is expected to approve a permit that would allow Hess Construction workers to use the parking lot at the nearby Knights of Columbus facility on Little Falls Road, according to Arlington Public Schools Director of Design and Construction Bill O'Connor. He said a full building permit for the project would be approved "in a matter of days" as a result of that expected decision.

reflect the true amount of need. If the higher standard of living were taken into account, they say, more people would be eligible for assistance through community development block grants. That means that Englin's work with the task force could eventually steer more federal money to Arlington by changing the funding formulas used by the Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources.

"More people would qualify for programs if the cost of living was taken into account," said Jane Eboch, community development coordinator for the county's housing division. "It costs so much to live here that people are stretched much further than in other jurisdictions."

IN THE COUNTY'S school system, administrators have created a number of sliding scales that have been designed to adapt to the cost of living in the county. That way, they can raise the income thresholds for programs like free-

and-reduced lunch, summer school and preschool in a way that will allow more participation than merely using the federal poverty standard. But even then, school officials say, poverty is more widespread than the statistics indicate.

"Some students don't report that they are in need," said School Board chairwoman Libby Garvey. "Especially at the high school level."

In announcing the task force, Kaine expressed a concern that living in poverty can lead to poor nutrition during infancy, increased risk for academic failure in school age children, poor overall health in adults and decreased access to prescription medication for seniors. The governor said he intends to hold regional community meetings — including one being planned for Northern Virginia — in partnership with the Family and Children's Trust Fund of Virginia. At the conclusion of its research, the task force will make short-term and long-term policy recommendations in its assigned areas.

## Racing for the Cure, a Personal Note

In January, a biopsy of a lump I discovered in my breast revealed that I had an early but aggressive breast cancer. In February, I had surgery to remove the tumor, and in March, I began chemotherapy.

Saturday, May 15, I opened my envelope from the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure, pulling out a pink T-shirt that reads, "I believe ... I hope ... I am a survivor." Unfolding that message — about me for the first time — was jolting and emotional.

**EDITORIAL** I'm now more than halfway through my chemotherapy treatments (and bald). In July, I'll begin radiation for six weeks plus a little.

I have long defined myself as a pathological optimist (note, still in the newspaper business). I've been upbeat through my treatment so far, able to work and walk, if a bit more slowly. It might seem like a lot at once — breast cancer, local recession, downturn in newspaper revenues — but I remain firmly optimistic on all fronts.

Because of the paths of millions of women before me, because of efforts for early detection, because of the research funded by Komen for the Cure and others, because of the efforts of thousands of scientists, by Labor Day my cancer could be behind me for good.

There is no good news when you are diagnosed with cancer. But there are successful, targeted treatments for many kinds of breast

cancer; if detected early, it is among the most treatable cancers.

It takes more than money to ensure that women are in the best possible position to discover any breast cancer early on — it takes the kind of awareness that comes with 50,000 people coming together to run a 5K race, it takes education, it takes energy, time and effort.

On June 6, I plan, along with friends and family, to walk on the National Mall with 50,000 or so others in the Race for the Cure.

I encourage you to join the Race for the Cure; there is still time to register and take part in the 5K itself. There are many ways to participate, including walking, running, and even a

But most of all, I urge the women reading this to be sure that they are taking care of themselves, for everyone reading this to be sure the women in their lives are as well.

Early detection is the key, and I offer you no excuses. There is no history of breast cancer in my family. My mammogram five months before I found this lump was clear. Breast cancer is detected early by self-exams, by doctor exams and by mammograms. Be sure you show up for all of the above on your own behalf.

## No Need To Limit Contributions

To the Editor:

In the May 13-19 issue, your publisher, Mary Kimm, argued in favor of limitations on contributions to candidates for elective office in Virginia, like the limits imposed by the Federal Election Campaign Act and many other states. However, she never explains why such limits are needed, saying only that it would be "sensible" to do so.

Why?

The most frequent rationale for limits on campaign contributions is to prevent corruption. However, corruption thrives only in the dark. Because, according to Ms. Kimm, "Virginia ranks among the best states in disclosure," corruption has not been, and will not be, a significant problem in Virginia.

Nor have the federal campaign contribution limits, in effect since 1975, prevented the corruption of numerous congressmen and senators during the past 34 years.

The Supreme Court notwithstanding, with full public disclosure, limits on contributions to candidates are unconstitutional restrictions on our First Amendment right to freedom of speech. Let the contributions be made, let the disclosures be published, and let the voters decide whether the candidates are likely to be unduly influenced by those who contribute to their campaigns. Most people contribute to candidates whose positions they already support, not to persuade the candidate to change positions.

# Yorktown Walks Off with Titles

Game winners less than 10 minutes apart give baseball and softball teams district title.

Yorktown senior Tom Brady was approaching the batter's box for the Patriots' final at-bat of Monday night's National District baseball final against Mount Vernon when his coach, Mike Allen, pulled him aside to whisper a question into his ear.

Yorktown had a man on first base and Allen wanted to know whether Brady wanted to bunt him over to second base or take his chances on a possible game-winning hit. Even though he was 0-for-2 prior to that, Brady chose the glory.

With one swing of the bat, the Patriots had rushed the field in celebration after Brady's walkoff run-scoring double secured a 2-1 victory over Mount Vernon, a No. 1 seed in this week's Northern Region tournament, and the most wins in Yorktown baseball history.

"The hit felt good, especially afterwards," said Brady of his emotions following Yorktown's 19th win of the season, a new school record.

It was all part of a magical night on the campus of the North Arlington school. Less than 10 minutes before Brady's heroics, the

Patriot softball team had its own walkoff madness in the district finals, coming from behind to defeat Edison, 4-3, in extra innings after Kimmi Oldham's game-winning single drove home Kelly John. "It was nerve wracking, it was exciting, it was heart attack city," said Yorktown softball coach Julie Fetter after her team was four outs away from losing the district finals to an Edison

team it had defeated twice during the regular season. "I'm very happy, you never know what you're going to get. During the regular season we beat them twice but this is a playoff and anything can happen."

**THE BASEBALL GAME** was a rematch of a 10-inning classic pitcher's duel between Yorktown's Kyle Toulouse and Mount

Vernon's Wyatt Carpenter. When the two teams met back on April 30, Toulouse pitched a 10 inning shutout, while Carpenter teamed with fellow pitcher Mike Murdock to hold the Patriots scoreless for nine-plus innings, but lost when Yorktown scored late to grab a dramatic 1-0 victory.

## Hobbled Herrera Keeps Kickin'

Heroics of reigning Northern Region Player of the Year help salvage injury-riddled season.

There were 27 minutes remaining in the first half of last Friday night's National District boys' soccer final between Yorktown and Edison when the new role of last year's Northern Region Player of the Year, the Patriots' Alex Herrera, began to take shape.

Edison had just scored the game's first goal and in a matter of moments, Yorktown coach Dave Wood looked down his bench and Herrera began warming up. Not a word was spoken.

That Herrera was even attempting to play was a minor miracle. Coming off a junior campaign in which he was named first team all-state and all-Met, the finals Friday were just Herrera's fourth game during his senior season thanks to high ankle sprains on both legs.

Herrera first injured his left ankle in a

preseason scrimmage in the beginning of March. He returned to the lineup for a March 31 regular-season meeting against Edison, but drew a red card early on, which left him on the sidelines for the remainder of that eventual 4-0 loss and the following game, an even more lopsided 5-0 defeat to Wakefield. Then, the George Mason-bound midfielder sprained his right ankle against rival Washington-Lee the game after that, on April 15. It was his last appearance until tournament time.

But it was news to those in attendance Friday as Herrera — after 10 minutes of warm up — entered the contest and promptly gave Yorktown a momentum-swinging goal with less than two minutes remaining before halftime that ultimately catapulted the Patriots to a 2-1 victory over the Eagles, their third-straight National District title.

"I'm still hurting but it's physical therapy, physical therapy, keep playing," said

Herrera afterwards, on his way to get some ice for those aching ankles. "It has just been a roller coaster, up and down, but at the end of the day, we got it done."

**HEADING INTO** the final week of the regular season, though, the only thing that looked finished was Yorktown's dominance over the rest of the National District. Wood went an unblemished 17-0 against district opponents in 2007 and 2008, but with two games remaining in the 2009 regular season, his team was a mediocre 4-6-3.

A lot of that inconsistency had to do with the volatile nature of the Yorktown lineup. On top of Herrera, the Patriots had a slew of injuries, noticeable even to the naked eye with players like senior CJ Bartholemew playing games with a cast on.

But two late-season victories over West Springfield and Lake Braddock "catapulted" the Patriots into the postseason, according to Wood, and the luxury of having a player as talented as Herrera took the momentum to another height.

# Giant 'Giant' at Signature

The first fruits of the Shen Family Foundation's grant of a million dollars to Arlington's Signature Theatre to support and stimulate the work of the new generation of composers of American musicals is now on view. It is the world premiere of a musical based on Edna Ferber's "Giant" by Michael John LaChiusa and Sybille Pearson.

By any standard, "Giant" is a giant effort. Performed in the larger of Signature's two theaters in its Shirlington Village home, The MAX Theatre which can seat 398, the show requires a cast of 21 supported by an orchestra of 14. It runs a full four hours over three acts with two intermissions to let the audience (and the performers) catch their breath.

The major roles are played with a combination of solidly satisfying consistency and occasional standout moments. Betsy Morgan makes the transition from youngster to senior in completely convincing style as the Virginia horse-country belle who comes to the dry cow country of Texas. Ashley Robinson, as the ranch hand whose sexuality is his brand, and whose audacity takes him from the dust of the corral to oil-based riches, scores a series of standout scenes including a tremendous early song, "Private Property," and the third act's stunning final burst of drunken bombast titled "The Dog is Gonna Bark."

Surely, if theater ticket buyers gave grades for effort, the work would get a solid A+. Its sprawling story is told clearly with very few moments of narrative confusion. Its 18 scenes with their over 30 songs are structured elegantly and the songs themselves provide both melodic and rhythmic riches.

Its cast is uniformly effective under the direction of Signature first-timer Jonathan Butterell, a Broadway veteran who handled the musical staging functions for the lovely "The Light in the Piazza" at Lincoln Center.

Still Edna Ferber's novel proves to be just too much to condense even into a full four hours. In Pearson and LaChiusa's hands, the first act feels like the beginning of a masterpiece, but a rather inert second act breaks the momentum before the pair seem to regain their footing for a final, lengthy assault on their topic. As efficient at delivering the key plot points as Pearson's script is, and as effective as LaChiusa's songs are at revealing specific character elements, the scope of the project defeats the effort to focus on any one aspect long enough to look below the surface. Love, lust, jealousy, ambition, insecurity, tradition and bigotry are each hit by dramatic and musical spotlights, but none are examined very deeply.

The central story, which some will remember from an equally sprawling screen adaptation from the 1950s starring Elizabeth

Taylor, Rock Hudson and James Dean, is the marriage of Morgan's Virginia belle to the head of a Texas dynasty, played with a swagger that seems borrowed from John Wayne by Lewis Cleale. Adding both heft and complexity are the tales of Robinson's swaggering sex object (the role James Dean made central to the movie even if it was a secondary one), the Texas cattle tycoon's sister and brother, the members of their social circle and the "vaqueros" who work the spread. Generations are spanned with the stories of the children of the marriage and of the Mexican Americans who work the land.

This is the second of two LaChiusa musicals in what is a sort of mini-festival staged by Signature. Playing at the same time in the smaller of Signatures' houses, the 99-seat ARK, is his more avant-garde musical "See What I Wanna See." Both continue through the end of the month.

# Marketing 101

Perhaps you've noticed, as I have, that over time, certain familiar consumer products generally available at the supermarket (if all else fails, people at the very least, have to eat and clean and "hygiene" themselves) rework their appearance/packaging. I don't mean what's inside, I mean what's outside. And even though the old adage of not judging a book by its cover has to be as familiar to food/household product manufacturers as it is to the rest of us, the packaging/presentation of products does seem to change, for good reason, I'm sure. Perhaps there's a marketing cycle manufacturers follow that relates to a consumer's buying habits. (Yeah, it changes to retain the old customers and entice some new customers.)

Recently I've noticed changes in the packaging for a brand of orange juice I no longer buy (acid reflux issues) and for a brand of deodorant I most certainly still buy. And, though the packaging is definitely more attractive and eye-catching than previously (or maybe it's simply that change, any change in a familiar product is noticeable, style over substance you might say), I cannot say — so far as the deodorant is concerned — that the change in the packaging has provided me any noticeable benefit. So far as I can tell, I still stink when I'm supposed to and still smell fresh as a daisy when, after a shower, I apply my unscented gel.

All things considered, am I continuing to buy — or not buy — these products in spite of their packaging, because of their "new" packaging or does the packaging have zero effect on my decision-making other than as an aid in helping me locate the item on an increasingly crowded grocer's shelf?

If it is, indeed, not about the quality of the product (the inside), and more about the presentation (the outside) — then not only am I judging a book by its cover, I am judging that book by how it looks in comparison to its neighbor's covers (adjacent products on the shelf). And, when it comes to what I eat or how I personally "hygiene" myself, I would hate to think that all the studies that have been completed, focus groups paid and opinions solicited, to determine, from a distance exactly what would get me — the consumer — to buy a particular product (at least once to try) have no bearing on the real marketing reason behind the product's unique appearance. Moreover, is what I see on the grocer's shelves actually less about quality and more about quantity (the space allocated to a particular manufacturer/product on that extremely crowded shelf)?

If so, this attempt at market/consumer manipulation apparently is what makes the consumer's world go 'round. Still, when it comes to the food I eat and the household/manufacture's products I buy and the manner in which I try to keep myself healthy and fit, I resent that outside interests are attempting to manage what goes on inside my house and inside my body.

I imagine one could say that this is simply the free-market system at work, and having the freedom to choose enables/empowers the consumer to buy or not to buy for their own personal reasons and not be effected by any of these psychological ploys. Still, I can't help wondering where all this theorizing starts and strategizing stops.

After a 4-2 victory over Mount Vernon in the first round last Monday, Yorktown pulled off the upset of the tournament, defeating No. 1 seed Wakefield, 2-1. Herrera only played the last 12 minutes of that contest, but that was more than enough time to come off the bench and score the winning goal.

Throw in the game-tying tally against Edison, which was later augmented by a second-half score from senior Sergio Mejia, and it's clear Arlington soccer's version of Willis Reed was sorely missed this season.

"He's just a leader," Mejia said of Herrera. "He gives us a little bit more confidence and we work harder. I guess that's why we play faster, better, stronger with him. It's his confidence."

"It's good for him sometimes to sit on the bench, see how the game's playing out, and then he can change it," said Wood.

Herrera's exploits on the soccer field are

not reserved for just Yorktown (9-6-3 overall). He's also a starter for one of the area's best club teams, the DC United U-18 team, which features several future Division-I players.

That commitment could force Herrera to miss more action. Between May 21 and May 25, he's scheduled to take part in a showcase tournament for professional scouts, right in time to conflict with the Northern Region quarterfinals should Yorktown advance past Lee in first-round action Tuesday, after the Connection's deadline.
