## ST. MARGARET OF CORTONA

St Margaret of Cortona, T.O.S.F. (1247 –Feb 22, 1297) was born at Laviano, in Tuscany, and died in Cortona, Italy. She was canonized in 1728. St. Margaret was an Italian penitent of the Third Order of St. Francis. Feast Days (Feb 22 and May 16). St. Margaret is the patron saint of the falsely accused; single mothers; temptations; hoboos; homeless; insane; mentally ill; orphaned; midwives; penitent women; reformed prostitutes; stepchildren; those ridiculed for their piety and companionship of dogs. She enjoyed canine companionship. A dog is even expressed in the church where she is buried.

At age seven, St. Margaret's mother died and her father remarried. At the age of 17 she ran away with a young man, the son of the Lord of Valiano. For ten years she lived with him in his castle and bore him a son. Margaret wanted to marry him as he had promised, but he refused. She had compassion towards the poor and would seek out quiet places for prayer. Neighbors requested her to look into her soul before it was too late. Margaret responded for them not to fear, for she would die a saint and critics would come as pilgrims to her shrine. St. Margaret became worried when the young man's favorite hound return without his master, who failed to return from a journey. The hound led Margaret to his murdered body in the forest. Margaret returned all her jewelry and gifts to his family and left his castle. She returned to her father's house with her son, but her step-mother refused to take them in. Margaret went to the Franciscan Friars at Cortona, where her son eventually became a friar, and she placed herself in their care, of the church on San Francesco, in the city. For three years she struggled with temptations, recognizing the necessity of self-discipline and an entire consecration of herself to religion. After three years, St. Margaret joined the Third Order of St. Francis. She followed the example of St. Francis of Assisi, fasting as she begged for sustenance and bread, living in strict poverty and conversion.

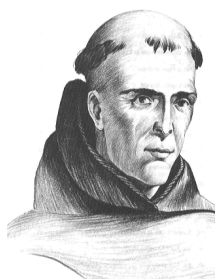
In 1277, as St. Margaret was praying the church of the Franciscan Friars, she heard the words, "What is your wish, poverella (little poor one)? She replied, "I neither seek nor wish for anything but you, my Lord Jesus." She then lived in regular communications with God. After a time of probation and purification He called her "My child." She asked the city of Cortona to found a hospital for sick, homeless and impoverished. She instituted a congregation of Tertiary Sisters, known as "Le Poverelle" (French for "the little poor"), to secure nurses for the hospital. She established a confraternity of Our Lady of Mercy; the members bound themselves to support the hospital, to help the needy and particularly the poor.

On several occasions St. Margaret participated in public affairs, to help end civic feuds. Twice, following a Divine command, she challenged the Bishop of Arezzo, Guglielmo Ubertini Pazzi of the Diocese of Cortona, because he lived like a secular prince and soldier rather than like a pastor. She moved to the ruined church of St. Basil where she spent her last years and is now buried. After her death the church of St. Basil was rebuilt in her honor and dedicated in her name. St. Margaret of Cortona was canonized by Pope Benedict XIII on May 16, 1728.

*Note: a dog played an important role in St. Margaret's life. Dogs can play an important part in our lives by presenting examples of unconditional love and undivided loyalty. Following St. Francis and St. Margaret, we should have an appreciation for all animals, especially our dear pets.*

## BLESSED FATHER JUNIPERO SERRA

Born Miguel Jose Serra on the Island of Mallorca, Spain on November 24, 1713. Fr. Serra took the name Junipero in 1730 when he entered the Franciscan Order. Ordained in 1737 Fr. Serra taught philosophy and theology at the University of Padua until 1749. At the age of thirty-seven he landed in Mexico City on January 1, 1750 to serve the Franciscan missions in the new world. He walked thousands of miles between San Diego and Monterey and even Mexico City. During one of his travels he was bitten by an insect that caused a sore on his leg that created great pain for the rest of his life.

With the aid of the Spanish military, to prevent the Russian America (Alaska) from colonizing in the Upper and Lower California (now modern day California), Fr. Serra set up the first of nine missions in Alta, California. July 16, 1769 marked the beginning of European settlements in California. They have spread to 21 missions today.

Fr. Serra introduced agriculture, irrigation techniques, the Spanish language and the Roman Catholic religion to the area. He battled governments and the military to secure a system of laws to protect California Indians from injustices.

When he died at the age of 70 he had traveled more than 24,000 miles, founded nine missions, which expanded into 21 missions, baptized 6,000 Indians (Fr. Junipero Serra was beatified by Pope John Paul II on September 25, 1988. His feast day is July 1st.

## Food Pantry Donations

Donations for a Food Pantry in August will be taken to St. Francis de Sales Parish. As with most food pantries non-perishable items are always needed, such as canned good, pastas, sauces, soups and easy to prepare items.

In the summer time the need for donations is even greater than the rest of the year. Many children were able to receive breakfast, lunch and a snack after school during the academic year. In the summer time that safety net is absent, putting a greater strain of food pantries. If you ever volunteered at a food pantry you heard some very sad stories, and seen tears shed as people had to come for help, those who never needed help before, and even those who had volunteered at food pantries themselves in the past.

Most pantries will also take personal hygiene products and cleaning products. Even if people receive food stamps (which usually are not enough to feed the family for an entire month), taxable items may not be purchased with food stamps. If you shop carefully, watch for sales and use coupons, it may allow you enough in your budget to give a little extra to those who have very little, but need a lot.
