Nicholas "Nick" Thomas Imperial Potentate 2006-2007

During the 2006 Imperial Council Session, held in Tampa, July 2-6, Nicholas "Nick" Thomas of Fontana, California, was elected Imperial Potentate of Shriners of North America, making him the highest-ranking Shriner in the world. As Imperial Potentate, he is serving his eleventh term as a member of the Boards of Directors for both Shriners of North America and Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Thomas was the owner of Thomas Furniture Mart for 20 years before retiring in 1992. He was a teacher for 10 years at Fontana High School, where he coached football, basketball and baseball. Thomas was a founding director of Secure Savings Bank and a six-year member of the San Bernardino County Assessment Appeals Board. Thomas also served as a 10-year member of the U.S. Air Force Reserve. He holds a master's degree from Azusa Pacific College and a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from the University of Redlands.

Thomas was raised a Master Mason at Fontana Lodge No. 653 in 1964. He joined Al Malaikah Shriners, the Los Angeles Chapter of Shriners of North America, in 1966 and served as Potentate in 1993. He was chairman for the Imperial Membership Committee from 2001-2006, and he also served as chairman for the Imperial Athletic Committee from 1996-2006.

Thomas is a member of the Royal Order of Jesters, Royal Order of Scotland, Red Cross of Constantine, National Sojourners and Order of Quetzalcoatl. He is a Past Master of Fontana Lodge, having served in the position in 1971, and is a 2000 Hiram Award winner. He is a member of the Scottish Rite and York Rite bodies and holds the honorary 33rd Degree from the Scottish Rite. Thomas is Past Master Councilor of the Fontana Chapter of the Order of DeMolay, and he was awarded the Legion of Honor and Chevalier Degree from DeMolay.

Thomas is a member of St. Nicholas Orthodox Christian Church. He is a skier, golfer and has been an avid boater for 27 years. a

Now they are trying to figure out if they should sell the existing temple and move to another location, or stay and raise their dues, which I understand they did. I think it was around \$50.

Nobles, this is why it is important to get out and bring in new members. I know we have been saying a lot about this, but as you can see from reading that report, it is necessary. We have to support our temple in every possible way we can, because if we don't, it can happen to us. If anyone thinks it can't, read that article. I am pretty sure that Gary maintains a copy for future references.

Just a few notes on the Imperial Session, our Recorder will be covering most of it in his notes. I want to thank you for the honor in representing you at the Imperial as a Representative. The Call wasn't that great, but it did have some important information.

Article 23, 323.3 Prerequisite for Membership: Alcazar Shriners wanted to change this so they could permit Non-Master Masons into their temple. This, of course, went down in defeat. The nobles are not ready for that. There were some other articles of interest, but as I said before, our Recorder will have that in his notes. Our Imperial Potentate did a wonderful job conducting the Imperial Session. He put some life into it and really challenged us to do our part in turning our membership around.

The public opening ceremony held at the Tampa Convention Center followed the church service. A large crowd of Shriners and guests were in attendance as Imperial Potentate Gary Dunwoody gaveled the meeting to order. The opening session was impressive as colors were presented and the national anthems of the four countries were sung. Welcoming acknowledgements were received and best wishes for a successful session were given.

The Shrine Market Place was opened for business and browsing. Visiting nobles and guests were able to walk up and down aisles where all types of Masonic memorabilia, clothing, jewelry, fundraising idea booths and much, much more. This exhibit hall remained open throughout all the sessions.

Daily Imperial work sessions were the order of business for the attending Imperial Representatives and attending nobles. The "Call" for this 132nd Session had a total of 16 items to be brought before the Representatives for consideration. Many of the "Call" items were territorial or jurisdictional in nature. Very little discussion from the floor arose from these items and they were easily resolved and passed.

Some of the "Call" items that might be of interest to our nobility are as follows:

Item #1 on the "Call" would grant Representative ad Vitam status to any Executive Vice-President of the Iowa or Colorado Corporation if they served as an employee of said corporation for a minimum of 40 years. This was passed unanimously, and said status was granted to retiring Executive Vice-Presidents Charles G. Cumpstone and Lewis K. Molnar.

Items #2, #4 and #5 on the "Call" pertained to blank, void or market ballots in anyway, including writing in a name for a position for a noble who was not nominated. This was an attempt to clarify the wording in the sections pertaining to elections and balloting. This item was passed, and ballots marked in any way for un-nominated persons or blank ballots were voided and would not be considered for any purpose.

Item #3 on the "Call", if approved, would allow Alcazar Shriners to accept candidates who were not Master Masons. This failed to pass again this year.

Item #6 on the "Call" pertaining to Election Regulations was tabled for further study.

Items #7, #8 and #9 pertained to Life and Perpetual Membership requirements. Two items, #7 and #9 were withdrawn, and item #8 was defeated. It was announced that Imperial was working to create a revised standardized formula for the Life and Perpetual Membership requirements.

Item #10, if passed, would have permitted "immediate" family members to participate in civic and public parades. This failed to pass.

The remaining items on the "Call" were pertaining to permissive and territorial matters between individual Shrine temples and territorial associations. These all passed.

The election of the 2006-2007 Imperial Officers was routine, and all current moving divan members advanced one position. Noble Chris Smith was elected as the new Imperial Outer Guard, and started on his 14-year journey to becoming a future Imperial Potentate.

Reports were read to the assembled representatives and nobles from various Imperial Committees and Departments. The membership report was very good, and did once more emphasize, the importance of member retention. More nobles continue to "go out the back door," than are created. The results of an extensive survey from newly created nobles indicated that the main reason given for new nobles to not become involved is "we are just not friendly." We must adjust to the needs of our new nobles and their families. To assist temples in retention of current members, Imperial has come up with a new program. This new program will consist of a series of three informative letters that will be sent to nobles who are delinquent in their current year's dues. These will be sent on a regular basis, hopefully starting about November of this year.

Shriners Hospitals and FBI helping kids get "Fit for the Future"

o address two very important issues facing children with disabilities - health and future employment - Shriners Hospitals for Children and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) created a DVD called "Fit for the Future."

The program includes three 20- to 30- minute, upbeat, kid-friendly exercise routines for stretching, strengthening and stamina. The exercises can be done seated or standing, and they are general and basic enough to offer a starting point for anyone wanting to begin a fitness regimen.

The exercise segments feature patients and therapists from Shriners Hospitals for Children — Tampa, as well as FBI personnel from Tampa, Fla., Washington, D.C., and Quantico, Va., all having fun and working out together.

"We believe that a program featuring children with disabilities, as well as the strong presence of FBI agents as partners and role models, may help motivate children with disabilities to exercise," said Peter Armstrong, M.D., medical affairs director for Shriners Hospitals for Children. "If children with disabilities learn early about the importance of incorporating exercise into their lives, they may have fewer health problems as adults."

The second message of the DVD concerns future employment opportunities for children with disabilities. Statistically, people with disabilities have the highest unemployment rate - approximately 70 percent. "Fit for the Future" includes interviews with FBI personnel who



have disabilities, and it is hoped that learning about job opportunities in the FBI will be a tremendous source of encouragement.

FBI Special Agent James Knights conceptualized the "Fit for the Future" program. Knights, a Noble of Syria Shriners and a member of the Imperial Public Relations Committee, wanted to help children with disabilities know that if they worked hard and stayed as healthy as possible, their future could hold a career in

the FBI. "Fit for the Future" accomplishes this goal and also showcases the work of the Shriners fraternity, Shriners Hospitals for Children and the FBI.

The "Fit for the Future" DVD was sent to Shriners Hospitals, as well as to adaptive sports organizations, Boy Scout and Girl Scout Troops, school guidance counselors and teachers, recreational therapists, police athletic leagues and several other groups.



lethal fire and substantial risk of capture. To date, in Iraq alone 52 have died from hostile fire, and 378 have been wounded in action. Want more facts? At least 11 have had amputations. Need some specifics? Major Tammy Duckworth, an Illinois ARNG Black Hawk Helicopter Pilot, was flying north of Baghdad in November 2004. A rocket propelled grenade struck the cockpit and she lost BOTH LEGS but still managed to safely land her helicopter. Passing out on landing from loss of blood the next thing she knew was 10 days later when she woke up at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. Oh yes, the 38 year old double amputee (medically retired) veteran is running for election to the U.S. House. Women soldiers make up about 15 percent of the active-duty force, 12 percent of the Guard and reserves, and 8 to 10 percent of the force in Iraq. Welldone ladies. We salute you as an equal partner in combat.

LOH USAF personnel will love this. It seems the new F-22 Raptor airplane, which I previously wrote about in this column now has a small problem. It seems that the Raptor has two million lines of codes in its many onboard computers. Compare this to Windows XP, which has 45 million lines of code. USAF Captain Brad Spears got locked into his Raptor for five hours at Langley AFB. Seems the canopy would not open. First Lady Elaine's program will benefit research efforts

First Lady Elaine is pleased to announce her fundraising program, "Reaching out for Medical Miracles," benefiting the research program of Shriners Hospitals for Children. An angel holding a heart symbolizes her program.

The quiet, methodical work of Shriners Hospitals' researchers impacts and improves the lives of countless children every year and is, in a sense, miraculous, as is the generosity of Shriners and their Ladies.

In 2006, Shriners Hospitals will spend \$33 million on research, funding 140 projects that have the potential to improve the lives of children everywhere. For example, Shriners' researchers have created new medications for osteogenesis imperfecta (also known as "brittle bone disease"); dramatically improved the life expectancy of children with severe burns; and provided greater understanding of causes of skeletal birth defects.

Research in spinal cord injury (SCI) is of particular interest to First Lady Elaine. Some projects underway in this field include a study at the Northern California Shriners Hospital to better understand the relation-



ship between SCI and normal development of the central nervous system. In other SCI research, the Chicago hospital is studying the long-term social, psychological and occupational outcomes of pediatric SCI patients. And, the Philadelphia hospital continues to study ways functional electrical stimulation can improve the fitness and mobility of SCI patients.

While eight Shriners Hospitals are specifically designated as research centers, all 22 Shriners Hospitals for Children are involved in some form of research. Generally these investigations focus on improving and expanding treatments for severe burns, understanding complex musculoskeletal disorders, and improving techniques used to treat both mobility problems and spinal cord injuries. All of these efforts have one single purpose: to improve the lives of children.

"We are extremely grateful to Lady Elaine for selecting the research program as beneficiary of her program, and to all of our friends who have been so faithful and generous with their support," said Zakir H. Bengali, Ph.D., corporate director of research programs.

As Imperial Sir Nick and Lady Elaine make their visits throughout this Imperial Year, they ask that in lieu of personal gifts, Nobles and Ladies purchase a "Reaching out for Medical Miracles" certificate. A specially designed pin or tie will be given for each \$25 certificate purchased.

The eagle with its wings extended has generally L been considered an emblem of imperial dignity and power. About 8 B. C., it was adopted as the standard for all Roman legions and later became the standard for the Roman Empire itself. As the single eagle represented the power of a single empire the double headed eagle came to represent a double empire. When Roman authority was divided into the eastern and western empires the double-headed eagle became their symbol, one head looking east, the other west. When the empires were later combined into what was called the Holy Roman Empire, the doubleheaded eagle became its symbol, one head looking west toward Rome and one head looking east toward Constantinople. Following the fall of the Roman Empire, the emperors of Germany, who felt their

empire to be in the image of ancient Rome, took the double-headed eagle as their symbol. Russia also claimed the double-headed eagle as it symbol when Poland was added to Russia, denoting a double empire. Many scholars, however, believe the Russian double eagle can be traced back to the Eastern Roman Empire and the Byzantine rulers who controlled that portion of the old Roman Empire.

The double-headed eagle was first introduced as a symbol in Masonry about 1758 when a group calling itself the Council of Emperors of the East and West met in Paris, France. The double-headed eagle was probably adopted by this council because of the jurisdiction it claimed, as well as, because of its title. This Council's ritual consisted of 25 degrees, which became part of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. \mathbb{Z}

that was dealing with the yearly change of address for Memorial Lodge charters as long as they remain in the same district.

Grand Lodge administrative budget for 2006-2007 totals \$1,472,147, which is an increase of \$93,715 over 2005-2006. \$54,500 of this increase is for computer upgrades, computer consultants, facility maintenance and repairs. \$22,000 is for increased insurance premiums.

The Masonic Home budget for 2006-2007 was passed and totals \$7,171,023, which is \$440,527 less than last year, about a 6.3% decrease. Mrs. Lisa Totos, Administrator of the Florida Masonic Home, reported that the Home had just completed an inspection by the Florida Agency of Health Care Administration and both the nursing home and the assisted living facility were deficiency free for the second year in a row.

Membership in Florida showed a net increase of 1,000 members in 2005. The total number of Florida Masons is 54,481. During 2005 we lost 1,404 to death,

1,338 were suspended for nonpayment of dues, 616 were lost for other reasons for a total of 3,358.

In many places, the approach of spring means more than melting snow and budding flowers. It means that families everywhere will begin beautifying their yards and mowing their lawns.

Shriners Hospitals for Children, which treats many kids each year who have been seriously injured in power lawnmower accidents, is alerting parents to necessary safety precautions. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), in one year, more than 84,000 injuries result from lawnmower accidents in the United States, and 8,800 of those injuries are to children under the age of 18.

A report published on the Annals of Emergency Medicine Web site in April 2006 indicates that children between the ages of 15 and 19 have the highest rate of hospitalization due to lawnmower accidents. Fracture of one or more toes was the most common diagnosis among lawnmower injury hospitalizations. The second-mostcommon diagnosis was toe amputation.

One in every five lawnmower deaths involves a child, according to the CPSC. The CPSC also estimates that most of these deaths occur when a child falls off a riding mower and is run over, or when a child is in a moving mower's path. These injuries and deaths from lawnmower accidents can be reduced dramatically by following a few simple precautions:

- ♦ Do not allow passengers on a riding mower.
- ♦ Keep children out of the yard and indoors while mowing the lawn.
- ♦ It is recommended that children under 14 not be allowed to operate a lawnmower.
- ♦ Always prepare your lawn for mowing. Check your lawn for sticks, rocks, toys, etc. Make sure nothing is hidden in the grass.
 - \Rightarrow Handle fuel with care. Wipe up spills. Never fill the tank on a mower that is hot. Never smoke or use any kind of flame around gasoline.

♦ Wear appropriate clothing and shoes. Wear long pants, long-sleeved shirts, eye protection and heavy gloves. Wear sturdy, close-toed shoes with slip-resistant rubber soles.

♦ Check guards and shields. Be sure to read the owner's manual and know how to operate the equipment. Don't remove or disable guards or other safety devices.

 \diamond Use a mower with an automatic blade cut-off. Stav behind the handle until the blade stops. Never reach under a mower while it is still operating. If you need to remove debris or check the blade, disconnect the wire from the spark plug.

♦ Don't cut grass when it's wet.





Improved survival rates for burn-injured kids

ince the Shrine first made a commitment to advancing burn treatment by opening three pediatric burn hospitals in the 1960s (Boston, Galveston and Cincinnati), the chance of a burned child's survival has more than doubled.
