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Even the wildest kids can be tamed. The tips below will help keep children safe—and their parents sane—on the longest summer trip. Don't pack a toothbrush till you've read them.

**How to keep smiling when traveling with kids**

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**Babies without tears**

Don't carry a baby passenger in your arms for long periods. He'll be more comfortable—and so will you—if he's in a car bed, sitting in a baby chair, or fastened to a safety harness on the back seat.

**Protect a sleeping baby from sunlight and flashing lights.** Two of the most disturbing things to a sleeping baby are bright sunlight and flashing lights of other cars. Solution: Hang a canopy, with tape, from the back of the front seat to the back of the rear seat.

**IMPORTANT:** Be sure to include baby's favorite stuffed toy on your passenger list. The Grand Canyon outside the window is no substitute for a familiar teddy bear to cuddle.

**Keep baby paraphernalia handy in extra junior-size glove compartments.** Hang a shoe bag on the back of the front seat, and suddenly you've got a dozen or more extra glove compartments. Use them to store diapers, tissues, toys, a wet washrag in a plastic bag for wiping sticky fingers, and so on.

**Taming the toddler**

Get him interested in the trip before you start. If he's old enough to understand, tell toddlers in advance about all the exciting things they're going to see

and do. Show them maps and pictures. Let them choose favorite toys to take along. (It's a good idea, too, to lay in a small supply of inexpensive new toys, to surprise the kids during the trip.)

**Transform the back of the car into a playroom.** Put two suitcases on the floor of the car (choose cases that have to come out at night anyway), and cover with a blanket. This arrangement also works well for midday naps.

**Remember these mealtime tips.**

- Picnics along the way are fun for all the family, and they give the kids a good chance to work off steam in a game of tag.
- If you do eat in a restaurant, it's a good idea for one parent to take the kids off for a walk or game while the other orders. Be sure that something is ready for them to eat as soon as they sit down. Crackers will do.
- Keep meals light. You'll stay more alert, be more comfortable. When you can, it's a good idea to order one adult portion for two small children to share.
