Dear Parents and Carers.

Welcome back to school for the start of Term Three. I hope both students and families had time to enjoy the recent term break. In the two weeks leading up to the school holidays Mrs Smart was acting in a relieving capacity as Principal while I was on leave. I'd like to congratulate and thank Mrs Smart for the exceptional and professional way in which she led and managed the school during this time. In Mrs Smart's absence, Mrs Adam filled the position of Assistant Principal for K-2 and did so capably. Thank you Mrs Adam.

While on the topic of school staff, I'd like to welcome two new staff to our school who commenced last week. Mrs Neill and Mrs Skapetis have commenced in a teaching and support role for class 6A, which will be located in the old building adjacent to 4-6W. We look forward to their involvement in our school for the remainder for the year.

At the end of last term student reports were sent home and we are now currently in the week of parent teacher interviews. As part of our assessment and reporting process the Semester One report is an assessment of the curriculum outcomes accessed by students during the first half of the year. Parent teacher interviews have again been well supported by our community this year and I thank all that have engaged in the online

booking system as an easier means of organising this process. As with any report process parents always have the opportunity to discuss achievement levels with their child's teacher. Twelve months ago in collaboration with Mrs Menne, we decided to pilot the development of a student parliament to strengthen the student voice within the school. A year on and we have continued to develop this model with this year's Stage Three students and teachers. It was great to see the success of the "Blue day" fundraiser for Autism Awareness last week. This was a student led initiative, primarily coordinated by the Minister for Fundraising, Emma Ramsay who did a brilliant job organisina and advertising the event under the guidance of staff. Congratulations to all for your participation and support and for raising \$535 through the cake stall that will go towards raising awareness of Autism.

#### 150th Anniversary

As we get closer to the date of Saturday October 26th for the 150th celebration and car show, we will be communicating with the community on a regular basis about the organisation of this event. Classes and year groups will be encouraged to hold stalls and this may require donations from the community to help support these stalls (perishable foods, jars, cans, etc). Further information will be forthcoming in the next few weeks.

As we are an inclusive school all students will be involved in the celebration of the 150th anniversary of Bargo PS. The first part of this will be that each class will learn a themed dance to perform on the stage on Saturday 26th October. We will be having an external company come in to deliver the choreography and class teachers will continue with rehearsals and costuming prior to the event. To ensure that this initiative involves all students the school will cover the cost (approx. \$30 per student) of the dance program so all have an opportunity to be involved. This program will commence Friday of week 3 and continue for the remainder of the term.

Lastly, our Frog pond is having a makeover in anticipation of our 150th celebration. This initiative has been largely driven by a community member, Sonya Reyes together with our General Assistant, Mr Little. We were also able to obtain a Woolworths Junior Landcare Grant to assist in the regeneration and have been gratefully supported by Bunnings Mittagong also. First steps have been weed removal and general clean-up of the area and with the assistance of students, a replanting process will occur in the coming weeks. We look forward to seeing what the finished product will look like, but for now here are some progress photos.



### School Athletics Carnival Monday 5 August

Parents are reminded that the Athletics Carnival is being held next week at the Tahmoor Sports Oval and all families are invited to attend. There will be five events on the day: 100, 200 and 800 metre races, long jump and team games. Highjump, shot put and discus events are being held at school and finals for these events will be on Friday 9 August. All ribbons for the events will be handed out at school and not on the day.

The first event will start at 10.00am, there will be a lunch break between 12:15 and 12:35pm and the final event is due to finish at 2.00pm. A schedule of events will be available on the day.

Parents are welcome to travel around the events with their children, but all students are to remain with their age group for the day. Students can be signed out with the supervising teacher (not the class teacher), to travel home with parents after their last event. If students are traveling home with a friend, written permission must be given to the supervising teacher.

Mrs Azzopardi will be operating a canteen with food and drinks available from 50c - \$4.00. Pre orders for lunch should be completed and returned to the canteen by this Friday. Whilst parents will be able to use the canteen at any time, students will only be allowed to visit the canteen during allocated times. There will also be a coffee van at the venue.

Students are encouraged to bring a hat and wear sports uniform under a tracksuit. They should have suitable footwear and may bring spikes to be worn during running events, spikes are not to be worn to school.

As some events may require parental assistance with timing, please don't be shy in volunteering if help is needed!

#### **Police Visit**

Today Senior Constable Greg Louden and Senior Constable Doug Brennan talked to stage 3 about respect. They said everyone is different and we need to respect them for who they are.

First they told us what Doug does, which is going around to pubs and clubs to make sure everything okay and everyone is happy. Greg sometimes helps Doug but he also interviews people who want to be a policeman\ woman. Greg told us about a time when he was interviewing a man who had all the skills required. However, Greg asked him for a criminal record and all of a sudden his attitude changed. Turns out, he did have a criminal record and he couldn't get in.

Doug then told us that if there was a fight at a pub or club, he would have to hold back the person throwing punches and arrest them. He takes them to a station and puts them in a cell. That started our conversation about consequences. They said that a consequence can be a punishment but also something for doing a good thing. So a result would be another word for it. Greg said that in the future, if we have a criminal record there will be consequences. We wouldn't be able to travel overseas and we wouldn't be able to get a good job because no one would want us.

Then we started to talk about respect and self – esteem. Greg said most bullies don't have great self - esteem and bully other people to feel better about themselves. They also explained that we need to respect others and teacher's decisions considering that everyone will help us in some way. To finish it off they said that before we can respect each other we have to learn to respect our self.

I thought that this long talk was very helpful and useful to all stage 3 students.

























## KA

things they plan to do.


