

Barker's 24th Annual Adoption and Foster Care Conference Educates, Energizes, and Inspires

n March 17, more than 300 people joined us at the Universities at Shady Grove in Rockville, Maryland, for the opportunity to hear from some of the nation's leading adoption experts at Barker's Annual Adoption and Foster Care Conference. Angela Tucker, whose story was featured in the documentary CLOSURE, opened the conference with a thought-provoking and inspiring keynote address followed by a Q&A session. Panels of adoptees, birth parents, and adoptive parents spoke on the conference theme, Adoption: Navigating the Challenges and Growing Stronger, about the challenges they have faced and the internal and external resources they relied on to persevere. Debbie Schugg, back by popular demand, offered two workshops that were particularly helpful to those adopting and parenting teenagers, and Maureen McCauley and Aselefech Evans offered their perspective on


While my image and words appear in this article, behind them are the faces of a dedicated,

Teens Explore Common Bonds Through Barker's Teen Connections Program

B arker welcomed a great group of teens to the National 4-H Conference Center in Chevy Chase for its annual Teen Connections program. The program provided high school students who are adopted the opportunity to connect with other adopted teens, participate in a service project related to adoption, attend engaging workshops exploring adoptive identity, and have fun participating in indoor and outdoor activities.

The program was facilitated by two experienced school counselors: Kristen Reighard (who was herself adopted as a baby from Korea) and Seth Solondz, MSW, and received rave reviews from participants and adoptive parents.

A special highlight of this year's program was that the teens wrote and created an impressive short video entitled "Adoption Is Not a Punch Line," which explored their feelings about adoption, some commonly held misperceptions, and questions they often receive. The Barker staff was so impressed with the video that it was featured (and very well received!) on Barker's Facebook page. At the close of the weekend, the teens who participated gave a thumbs-up to the program:

"It was great to connect to other adopted kids."

"To be honest, I wasn't sure about going at first – but I am really glad I did! I made a lot of new friends."

"I feel much more proud about my adoption and heritage!"

On February 12, Barker families gathered outside the gates of the beautiful Chinese Embassy in Washington, DC, awaiting a celebration of the Chinese Lunar New Year and welcoming in the Year of the Dog.

Thanks to the work of Barker's Director of International Programs, Tina Ji, and the generosity of Ambassador Cui Tiankai and Minister Li Kexin, Barker's Chinese adoptive families were the honored guests at a spectacular Chinese Lunar New Year celebration in the halls of the gorgeous embassy designed by the world-famous Chinese American architect I.M. Pei.

Minister Li Kexin opened the celebration on behalf of the Chinese diplomats and their families, welcoming us to the embassy and remarking on the adoptions that brought our families together: "I think you would all agree that your children have brought much joy and love to your families and opened a window to China for you."

The Minister's warm welcome was followed by the engaging comments of guest speaker and Barker adoptive father Steve Innskeep, NPR's Morning Edition host. He was surrounded by a gathering of children, many of whom were dressed in traditional Chinese attire and responded to him in Chinese. "I am grateful and proud that my family includes an immigrant," Steve said in sharing his family's experience. "I am grateful that the immigrant in my family comes from China and connects our family to the great story of China."

These remarks were followed by performances of authentic Chinese puppetry, dance, and acrobatic umbrella juggling. There were traditional craft activities and a wonderful feast of Chinese delights to round out the evening. Our families enjoyed being welcomed to the Embassy and the opportunity for their families to connect with their children's Chinese heritage.


Forging New Connections Among Adoptive Families at "Sundays at Barker"


B arker's Department of Family and Post-Adoption Services is experimenting with new ways to help foster connections and build community among new adoptive families. On Sunday, March 4, we were excited to host our first "Sundays at Barker" event for adoptive families with young children.

Unlike Barker's "New Parent Groups," which are held during the week and involve structured discussion, these events are on weekends and are designed as an outing for the entire family. What a wonderful scene it was at Barker! While the children played, the adults had the chance to relax, enjoy bagels and coffee, and talk about issues of common concern to new adoptive families. Those included sleep (or lack of it!), day care, dealing with questions from others, and maintaining connections with birth parents. Families also enjoyed the opportunity to meet and interact with two teen volunteers, who themselves were adopted through Barker. The teens openly shared information about their adoption experience and the connection they felt with Barker.
