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Student awards & honors

FCS students were recognized for their outstanding accomplishments during 2008. Listed below are students recognized in Child and Family Studies, Fashion Design, Nutrition Science, and Interior Design programs. Page two of this newsletter highlights additional awards gleaned by our Interior Design program.

Two **Nutrition Science** students, **Kayla Barr** and **Kelley Ross** were awarded the prestigious Texas Dietetic Association Foundation Scholarships for the 2008-2009 academic year.

Emily Edwards, Child & Family Studies presented her paper on "The Effects of Nutrition on Child Growth in Underdeveloped Countries" at the annual meeting of American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences in Milwaukee, WI in June. This was a reviewed competition and she received an honorarium award at her presentation.

Emily McNeely, Fashion Design was the third place



winner in the highly competitive Dallas Fashion Group Career Day Competition. Dallas Career Day is the largest and longest-running event of its kind in the country, with over 1,100 students and faculty members from 40 colleges and universities across 14 states. Emily also won Best Senior Collection in the annual 2008 Baylor Fashion show.

The **Interior Design** faculty proudly acknowledges five graduates furthering their education in graduate school. **Kristin Rose** will be attending Washington University in St. Louis working toward a Masters in Architecture. **Elise Wasser** was one of two grads accepted into the masters program in Architectural History at the University of

Texas in Austin. **Teri Bowman** will be attending Arizona State University in Tempe, AZ pursuing a master's degree in interior design with a focus on educational interiors. Savannah School of Art and Design will be the destination of **Laura Paulus** as she pursues her MFA. **Lauren Darr** will remain at Baylor pursuing a double masters in Divinity and Social Work.

Interior design (ID) news

The 2007-2008 academic year was busy and successful for faculty and students. The year began with the Design Showcase on Parents Weekend, showcasing student work from the past academic year. In October, the ID faculty hosted the Southwest Regional IDEC Annual Conference. Dr. Bowen and Mrs. Brown co-chaired this event. Thirty-five educators from the region were in attendance. The event proved to be a wonderful venue for sharing research and creative scholarship, networking with peers, and addressing pertinent issues related to the future of design education. The event began with an opening reception at the Harrington House followed by two days of at the North Village Community Center. The group also traveled to Temple to tour the Wilsonart Laminat plant.

Once again, interior design students placed in student competitions. In the fall, senior **Kristin Rose** took first place in the ASID Student Day Design Competitions for residential design of a Rocky Mountain Retreat. Placing second in the residential competition was the senior design team of **Rebecca Taddia, Rose Lugo, and Jamie Mulder** for their loft design. In the commercial arena, seniors **Kristin Rose, Sara Roskam, and Rose Lugo** took second



place for the design of a Center for Popular Culture. In February, seniors, **Kristin Rose, Sara Roskam, Sylvia Hernandez, and Rebecca Taddia** participated in the

IIDA Student Design Charette in Houston. The design charette is a team-based, time intensive, problem-solving design experience. Each student was placed on a team with interior design students from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana. **Sara Roskam** was on the winning team. **Rebecca Taddia** was on the team receiving runner-up recognition. The design project was an indoor-outdoor environment with a focus on sustainability.

In preparation for her leadership role as incoming ASID Student Chapter President in 2008-09, **Melissa Bell**, along with **Emily King**, attended the ASID National Conference in New Orleans in March.

Ms. Nikki Feilner, full-time lecturer in interior design, attended the IDEC International Conference in Montreal in March. She also sponsored a Chicago Study Tour this summer (see related article).

The year ended on a sad note with the untimely death of Terry Brown, adjunct lecturer in interior design, in a car accident. Mr. Brown was a unique and creative individual and passionate about design education. He will be missed. Our prayers go out to his family.

ID study tour in Chicago

Twelve students in the Interior Design program completed a summer course, "An Architectural Study Tour of Chicago", taught by Nikki Feilner, Interior Design faculty.

The class and architectural tours included Frank Lloyd Wright's studio and home in Oak Park, the



Sears Tower, the John Hancock building, The Art Institute of Chicago, The Field Museum, and the Shedd Aquarium.

They also toured over 40 architectural landmarks on a River Boat Tour and visited the offices of HOK and SOM, two of the world's leaders in Architecture and Interior Design. SOM is currently supervising the design and construction of the tallest building in the world located in Dubai.

The class spent two days at NeoCon, the world's largest trade show in the world, with attendance by over 25,000 architects and interior designers annually. The students visited showrooms, met manufacturers' representatives, and enjoyed the professional opportunity to interact with several manufacturers.

In the evenings, students attended two Broadway musicals, and enjoyed fine dining on the 96th floor of the John Hancock building and the Ralph Lauren Restaurant.

Fashion design show

Baylor's FCS department presented the annual fashion show in 2008 to a sold-out audience of 300. Dr. Jaylie Beckenhauer and 32 visual merchandising students coordinated the event with Dr. Judith Lusk, Mary Simpson, Jaynie Fader, Patricia Hassell and 32 design students.

Cover Story showcased 94 garments created in eight fashion design courses. Visual merchandising students managed all aspects of the show, including planning, publicity, set design, and production.

Eight seniors presented collections, which included five to six garments created as a cohesive line

targeted to the 35 to 55 year-old woman. Each senior had a theme based on the cohesive element of the line: **Jessie Hill** (*Pretty in Pleats*); **Emily McNeely** (*Duratura Amare*); **Ashley Dunn** (*Naturally Bright*); **Miriam Farish** (*The Collection*); **Ashlee Patton** (*Smitten*); **Caitlyn Gorny** (*Juxtaposition*); **Catherine Dreiss**



(*Behind Blue Eyes*); and **Kelly Crook** (*The London Walk*).

Fashion students are already planning next year's fashion event, which is scheduled for **Saturday night May 02, 2009**. Alumni are encouraged to attend!

Family & Child Studies grant

Dr. Joyce Nuner received a University Research Council Grant in the amount of \$3,000 in Spring 2008 to conduct a research study entitled, *Children with Special Needs in Early Care and Education Settings: Parents' Perceptions of Availability, Accessibility, and Appropriate Practice*.

Piper Center 2008

Piper completed another very successful year. We had over 100 child and family studies students completing lab hours. In addition, over 150 Baylor students from multiple departments visited the center for various observation opportunities and learning experiences.

During the fall semester, eight students completed their practicum at Piper. During the spring we had five practicum students and this summer we had two, for a total of 15 for the year.

Erin Holmes Jacobus, has been promoted to assistant director. Erin has both her Bachelors and Masters from Baylor and has been at Piper for six years. She has served as the infant and toddler lead teachers and this past year mentored new infant/toddler lead teachers. Ms. Erin also worked closely with practicum and lab students. **Frances Koen**, pre-k teacher has also served as a mentor and will continue in that role.

Anna Barton, Baylor University 2008 graduate in Child and Family Studies, has been hired as two-year-old lead teacher. The infant, toddler and two-year-old classes will begin a looping program this year. The infant teacher, **Candice Coulter** will move up with her infants, and **Anna Burton** will take the two-year-old classroom and **Stephanie Allen Adams**, 2008, will move to the infant class. Stephanie joined Piper in January of this year to teach the two-year-olds.

Beginning in January of 2009 Piper will begin the NAEYC accreditation process with an intensive self study. We have worked very hard to continue to strengthen our program and we feel confident that we will have success in the accreditation process.



We continue to use the Reggio and High Scope curriculums at Piper. We feel that this best meets the needs of our students and the children we serve.

Fashion Program receives \$46K in grants

The disciplines of Fashion Merchandising and Fashion Design are the beneficiaries of two grants as a part of Cotton, Incorporated's 2008 Educational Program. The two grants total \$46,000. The 2008 grant is for \$24,000 to educate on the concept of sustainability and the environment. The 2009 grant for \$22,000 is to promote cotton as a fashionable fiber through creative projects and a trend forecasting presentation that will be held in April 2009. The theme for the research program was "sustainability", and



applicants had to demonstrate how they would educate students about cotton's ecological benefits, which includes using less water and fewer pesticides and herbicides than ever before as a result of new technology. Funding from the grant provided faculty release time and travel over the summer to work on lesson plans and activities for students in Fall 2008, student workers, guest speakers and purchase of supplies related to the topic. Students in multiple courses will be learning about cotton and its reduced impact on the environment through a series of in-class lectures and assignments. Guest speakers such as Roger Haldenby, Vice President, Operations from the Plains Cotton Growers' Inc. will be in the fall. Professors and students in Fashion are extremely grateful to Cotton Incorporated for the organization's generosity, which has enabled us to provide the students with a focused and unified learning experience.

Fashion program visits Europe

Sixteen fashion students spent two weeks studying the trends in the Paris and London market centers so that they might have a better understanding of how couture fashions trickle down to the mid-market. In addition, a day trip to Glasgow, Scotland helped the students have a better understanding of the textile industry and how textiles progress from fiber to fabrics. Appointments on the Paris trip included a visit to a couture bridal designer, Alan Lalou and a draping demonstration by a former employee of Nina Ricci. Visits to department stores and a fashion show added to the students' collection of trend information.

In London a visit to Howies, a specialty retailer that sells sustainable garments, gave students a better understanding of the green movement which is influencing not only the U.S. but Europe. While visiting Liberty of London Department Store, students were able to experience the designer collections.

Prudence, a couture milliner, discussed the

process of developing a hat collection for a couture runway show.

Students returned exhausted, but had many great memories from their trip that will forever be a part of their Baylor University experience.

Child & Family '08

Baylor Child and Family Studies students enrolled in the Parenting course conducted parent education workshops for Waco ISD students who are pregnant and/or already parenting. Students in FCS 1315 were recognized by the Methodist Children's Home for volunteering in a Sunday night coffee shop designed to build relationships with and mentor Methodist Home high school seniors.

Baylor CFS students again participated in Waco Week of the Young Child last April at South Waco Park and Recreation Center. Students, Piper Staff, and faculty set up, worked registration, handed out refreshments, and implemented activities with children and families.

The CFS Professional organization took on two major service projects this year. Students collected and made educational materials to send to preschool teachers in the Toledo District of Belize. Both the fall and the spring students participated in activities to assist the Waco Family Abuse Shelter.



100 year celebration
