

There are a few people in each person's life who truly make a difference, leave a legacy and change lives forever. For thousands of students and the members of 49 area churches, this person is Dr. J.W. Lee.



e has walked the halls of The Baptist College (BCF) for over 35 years, bringing with him each day a zeal for both the Word of God and his students

Even today with wavering health as he fights a personal battle with cancer, he can always be found with a smile on his face encouraging students in their faith and work

So, when it was time for BCF's fall senior class to choose a class project, they could think of none more appropriate than to honor this man who has touched their lives so profoundly with the establishment of a scholarship in his honor to continue his legacy at BCF well into the future.

Dr. Lee's journey at BCF began in 1969, just 16 years after the campus made the move from Lakeland to the rural community of Graceville in the Florida panhandle as Baptist Bible Institute. He has seen the college through two name changes, three presidents, and over 100 semesters.

While working at the college he has continued to serve the local church as interim pastor for 42 churches in Georgia, Alabama and Florida from 1969 to 2004. He has also written numerous publications.

As Senior Professor of Old Testament he is known for his tough classes including lectures that tediously expound verse by verse eyes. through each book of the Bible.

"Dr. Lee's classes were very demanding and challenging but the rewards far outweighed the demand because he makes the Old Testament come to life," recalls now BCF assistant professor leadership Dr. David Coggins of his days of study under Dr. Lee.

"He helped to lay a foundation of study in the Old Testament that is still a benefit to me in ministry."

Despite his all business attitude in lecture, his love for the students is obvious and they respond in kind.

In the fall of 2003 after being diagnosed with sarcoma cancer early in the year, one

of Dr. Lee's students traveled around campus with a video camera recording greetings and well-wishes from students, faculty and staff which she then sent to Dr. Lee at his treatment center in Texas to lift his spirits.

Now nearly two years into his battle with cancer, he continues to make it to campus as often as possible although he was unable to teach his classes this fall.

campus is still helping to mold the ministers of tomorrow.

"Dr. Lee has a passion for the word of God . . . and a passion for teaching . . . and a passion for students . . . and for the Lord," explains the Dec. 1 ceremony.

"We figured the best thing we could do is to help the students he loves so much," said Rathel.

As the couple walked to the stage to receive the plaque of recognition, the congregation stood in ovation with tears in their

True to form, Dr. Lee was not short of words for the occasion congratulating and encouraging the graduates.

"You have not gotten here coasting or easily. It has been difficult work and endurance, but . . . you're life is going to make a great difference in our world for

Little girls watched enthralled as Pam helped them make dolls out of corn shucks while keeping a watchful eye on her nearby wash pot where her brew of homemade lye soap simmered over a propane cooker.

The event is a long-standing tradition at the college previously held the first weekend of December as "Village Christmas." This year organizers moved the event to November and changed the name to "Holiday Homecoming" to kick off the holiday season.
