The School Yard Shenanigans

Primary school playgrounds are without exception quite amazing places. At Belle Vue we have around 200 children between the ages of five and twelve who happily share the schoolyard whilst participating in quite an incredible range of games and social activities. Our grounds are supervised between 8.45am and 3.35pm, but the children largely take responsibility for the negotiation of their social and recreational play environments. The main role of the yard duty teacher is to ensure that the safety and security of the children is maintained, however this is virtually impossible to achieve without the support of the children themselves.

Helping children deal with the many and varied situations that arise in the playground is a very important aspect of your child's development, with the teachers consistently demonstrating strategies for dealing effectively with conflict. In addition, many of our school programs strive to develop

children's skills in working cooperatively, making considered opinions, respecting the rights of others, and most importantly taking responsibility for their actions.

Once a child can accept responsibility for their actions or behaviour, working through strategies to deal with situations, and appropriate next steps becomes so much easier. We do require the support of our parents in getting our students to understand that no matter what the situation - they can always choose a less reactive/ explosive response - but again, whatever the situation, they need to accept responsibility for their own behaviours. Too often we hear "Yeah but s/he did this so I did that!" Under no circumstances is a physical response an appropriate response - and 'rough play' is never ok. Teachers do an excellent job in modelling appropriate strategies whilst dealing with children's concerns ranging from incredibly minor right through to quite serious.

Some questions we ask when presented with playground concerns are:

What happened?

What did you do? How did you respond? Was that appropriate?

What she/he/they did was not ok... (but neither was your response - if this is the case)

What could you do differently next time?

(*Then we would talk to all parties involved.)

Whilst as teachers we do not encourage the "telling of a thousand tales", there are definitely instances where we need to be alerted to specific problems. If your child is reticent to approach the teacher, then it is important that you as a parent let us know of such situations as soon as possible – with open and honest communication between the home and the school being absolutely critical to the effective management of such issues.

It is equally important that parents do not become actively involved in children's school based disputes – basically because as parents we generally only hear our own children's version of the events, and are therefore not always neutral. Similarly, it is also inappropriate for parents to admonish other children, especially on the school grounds, where safety and sense of wellbeing of students is very much a school responsibility. Personal contact between the parents of affected students, especially when they don't otherwise know each other, is also fraught with danger – with the participating adults often staying in conflict, long after the children themselves have re-established their friendships.

I would reiterate that we value the combined effort of a professional and caring teaching staff, effective and proactive school programs, and an extremely supportive and caring parent community, and that this combined effort has provided the framework for a Belle Vue school community in which children are able to display extremely mature social skills – most of the time!




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Watch It Grow!













SAME-DAY NOTIFICATION OF UNEXPLAINED STUDENT ABSENCES

Fact sheet for parents/carers

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. **Online:** log the absence directly using your school's IT platform Team App.
- 2. **Telephone:** the school office 9859 6123 and let the staff know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- 3. **Email:** the school <u>belle.vue.ps@edumail.vic.gov.au</u> and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.


What is the school's responsibility?


The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day.

Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.


