

Ruth A. Gray, pioneer community leader, retired home maintenance professional and faithful and devoted church worker, has been a member of Bethel A.M.E. Church for more than 48 years. Mrs. Gray was born December 13, 1913 in Elkville, Illinois. She is the second of seven children born to Christopher and Bessie (Ferrel) Stratton. Mrs. Gray joined Bethel A.M.E. Church in 1945. She serves as a class leader, is sick chairperson for the Willing Workers Club and Bethel Church, and is a member of the Lou Anna Riley Missionary Society. Mrs. Gray is responsible for distributing The Upper Room to the entire membership, including the sick and shut-in. She is a former member of the Choir, Helping Hand Club, Calendar Club and the Trustee Board. Mrs. Gray earned the distinction of serving as the first black precinct committee woman in Urbana. She worked as a patron of Gamma Chapter (undergraduate chapter at the University of Illinois), of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, purchasing needed items for Gamma House.

Mrs. Ruth A. Gray's experience in the work force includes working as a WPA kindergarten assistant, culinary artist and home maintenance professional.

She is married to Millard Gray and is the mother of Shirley.

Wilda Quincy Herndon

Wilda Quincy Herndon, retired health professional, community service volunteer, pioneer club member, and faithful and steadfast worker in Bethel A.M.E. Church for more than 43 years, was born on May 31, 1913 in Okolona, Mississippi. She is the fourth of five children born to Joe and Susie Hursey White Herndon. Ms. Herndon joined Bethel A.M.E. Church in 1950 under the charge of Reverend Elsie Taborn and has been steadfast and loyal in her service to the church. She served as Founder's Day and Women's Day chairperson, and she has been a narrator for several church functions. She was a steward for many years and is now a steward-emeritus. She was also a member of the Calendar Club and the Fleur de Lis. In 1953 Ms. Herndon was named Church Woman of the Year. She was also crowned queen of the 4th district of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Ms. Herndon's work experience includes being a vocalist with a local orchestra broad-casting from WDZ radio in Tuscola, singing for "coke hours" at Prehn's (now Thunderbird Restaurant), and working as an elevator operator in the Champaign City Building. She later trained as a medical technologist at Burnham City Hospital. This training led to Mrs. Herndon's 25 year career as a lab technician at McKinley Hospital, University of Illinois. She was the first lab technician hired at the Frances Nelson Health Center. To her credit, the first drapes and examination table for the Frances Nelson Health Center were donated by Ms. Herndon. She also volunteered at Carle Hospital for ten years.

Ms. Herndon's community activities include organizing the Royalettes, a club of civic minded women dedicated to serving both the black and white communities. She also served as vice president of the local chapter of the NAACP, board member of the Champaign Urbana Kindergarten, and a Red Cross Gray Lady. She also works with the League of Women Voters.

Davie Jane Roberts Hill

Davie Jane Roberts Hill, early childhood educator, church deaconess, faithful member of Bethel A.M.E. Church for more than 60 years, was born September 15, 1914 in Monticello, Georgia. She is the second born of six children to Jimmie Ned and Sarah (Clements) Roberts. Mrs. Hill joined Bethel A.M.E. Church in 1929 and has served the church in many capacities. She is currently president of the Stewardess Board.

Mrs. Hill has served Bethel as both superintendent and teacher of the Sunday School, treasurer of the Missionary Society, Senior Choir member, and assistant class leader. She has also chaired several Sunday School programs. With the help of others, Mrs. Hill has supplied flowers for the church, prepared food for funerals, and fed many homeless people in Champaign.

Mrs. Hill's commitment and service to the African Methodist Episcopal Church was recognized over 15 years ago when she was consecrated as Deaconess at the Illinois Annual Conference by Bishop Samuel Solomon Morris. In this capacity, Mrs. Hill encourages, fosters and improves the general interests of the church; promotes the comfort and solicits the friendship and sympathy of the general public; cheers the fallen; feeds the hungry; clothes the naked; seeks out the homeless; encourages thrift; and saves the lost.

Mrs. Hill's experience in the work force includes: assistant dressmaker, worker in the N.Y.A. program at the University of Illinois, supervisor for Champaign County Headstart, and director of Community Home for Children from 1957 to 1963.

Mrs. Hill is the mother of Diane and Jimmie.

Lizzie Almira Davis Johnson

Lizzie Almira Davis Johnson, educator, church deaconess, faithful and steadfast member of the A.M.E. Church for more than 70 years, was born on August 9,1909 in Springfield, Illinois. She is the sixth of ten children born to Reverend John Hamilton and Lizzie (Harris) Davis. Mrs. Johnson joined St. Paul A.M.E. Church in Springfield, Illinois at a very early age. In 1927 she joined Bethel A.M.E. Church and has served Bethel as Sunday School teacher and stewardess. Mrs. Johnson's commitment and service to the African Methodist Episcopal Church was recognized years ago when she was consecrated as deaconess at the Illinois Annual Conference by Bishop Joseph Gomez. Of her responsibilities as deaconess, Mrs. Johnson states, "The one thing I did want for Bethel A.M.E. Church, was to have a Deaconess Board." Through Mrs. Johnson's encouragement Mrs. Evola Jordon (deceased) and Mrs. Davie Hill were consecrated as deaconess' in the A.M.E. church. Her dedication is further evidenced by her frequent attendance at Annual Conferences and other A.M.E. meetings.

Mrs. Johnson was truly a pioneer in education. She graduated from the University of Illinois in 1931 where she worked for room and board all four years. Her first teaching assignment was in Vandalia, Missouri where she earned \$50 a month. She later became principal of Lawhead School, Champaign, earning \$90 a month. Mrs. Lizzie Johnson was the first principal of Booker T. Washington School in Champaign. She also opened a Johnny's Play School in Gibson City and kept the children of working parents. She moved to Decatur, Illinois and became the first black teacher and principal of Mary W. French School.

Memberships in organizations include: charter member of Epsilon Epsilon Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., life member of NAACP, National Association of Education, Illinois Education Association, and the University of Illinois Alumni Association.

Mrs. Johnson was married to Wilbur Johnson and is the mother of Nancy (deceased) and John.

Esther Mae Phillips Kemp

Esther Mae Phillips Kemp, an administrative assistant at Bethel A.M.E. Church since 1984, pioneer woman in the A.M.E. Church, faithful and steadfast worker in Bethel, was born November 25, 1913 in Monticello, Illinois. She is the second of five children born to Charles Everett and Juanita (Goodloe) Phillips. Mrs. Kemp came to Bethel in 1952 from Coppin A.M.E. Church in Chicago and brought 20 years of experience in denominational, interdenominational and international Christian service and activity. Mrs. Kemp has served as secretary to two A.M.E. bishops, John Andrew Gregg and George Wilbur Baber. She was elected first state secretary and later president of the Illinois Christian Youth Council (Youth Movements Department of the newly formed Illinois Church Council), the first interdenominational agency for Illinois. Mrs. Kemp also served as delegate from Illinois (Lincoln Land) to the First World Conference of Christian Youth held in Amsterdam, Holland in 1939 where 76 countries were represented.

Mrs. Kemp has been a faithful worker in Bethel A.M.E. Church, generously donating her time, talent and financial resources. She serves as a steward, lay reader, and a member of the Lou Anna Riley Missionary Society. Mrs. Kemp instituted the "Prayer Project" coin box that encourages family worship at meal time. She also served as an advisor to the Bethel Biblical Art Group, and she was responsible for compiling the quarterly conference and annual conference reports. She has served as administrative assistant to four Pastors, John Q. Owens, Alfred A. Johnson, Hiram H. Walker and Steven A. Jackson. For several years, Mrs. Kemp edited Bethel's newsletters, *GO YE JOURNAL* and *AMEN CORNER*. She has also served on the Women's Day committee, and assisted the Founder's Day committee.

Mrs. Kemp's work experience includes working in two financial institutions founded by her father. She worked in her father's office in Springfield, Illinois as a clerk cashier for the Frederick Douglass Savings and Loan Association. This was the first black institution south of Chicago. She also worked for the Estate Benefit Insurance Company from 1930-35.

Mrs. Kemp is dedicated to serving others. Her dedication to service is seen in her previous four year term as president of Church Women United and her current membership in the National Council of Negro Women (NCNW).

Mrs. Kemp was married to Attorney John M. Kemp

Lena Lindsay

Lena Lindsay is the second oldest member of Bethel A.M.E. Church. She is a generous donor, devoted community volunteer worker, and has been a faithful member of Bethel A.M.E. Church for more than 20 years. Mrs. Lindsay was born April 19, 1897 in Indianapolis, Indiana. She joined Bethel approximately 25 years ago under the charge of Reverend Hiram Walker. Mrs. Lindsay is a member of the Lou Anna Riley Missionary Society and the Willing Workers Club.

Bethel A.M.E. Church has benefitted immensely from Mrs. Lindsay's generosity. Her gifts to Bethel include \$1,000 toward the covering of the pews, \$1,000 toward Bethel's first Church van, the purchase of a kitchen sink, and the purchase of a sofa for the lounge. For several years, Mrs. Lindsay also rewarded each Bethel high school graduate with a \$50 donation. She has given freely of her time, talent and finances to help humanity.

Her community service includes a membership in the Retired Senior Volunteer Program of Champaign (RSVP), Douglass Seniors. She received special recognition from the Senior Citizen Volunteer Program of Champaign and played an instrument in the Senior Citizen Band.

Mrs. Lindsay was married to Loyal J. Lindsay.

Madeline Hicks McMullen

Madeline Hicks McMullen was born June 11, 1914 to Shelly Hicks and Mary Katherine Hughes. She is a nursery school teacher, retired culinary artist, and served as a faithful and steadfast director of Bethel's Young People's Department (YPD) for more than 25 years. She continues to work diligently with the children of Bethel, serving as an advisor in the YPD program. Her dedication to the children is also admirably displayed as she serves in her capacity as teacher in the Sunday School program, a position she has held since 1964. Mrs. McMullen joined Bethel A.M.E. Church in 1961 under the charge of Reverend Blaine Ramsey. She is a class leader, Women's Missionary Society member, Steward Board member and Helping Hand Club president. Over the years, Mrs. McMullen's pizza has been a vital source of funds for the YPD. In 1991, Mrs. McMullen was crowned the queen of Champaign Churches, gaining city wide recognition for Bethel. She has received many awards from several local organizations and the Missionary Conference Branch.

Mrs. McMullen's work experience includes a 50 year career as a cook at the University of Illinois, serving as a teacher's aide in Brookens Junior High School's Headstart program, and working as a nursery teacher at the Bradley Day Care Center. Her community service includes having been elected vice president of the Champaign chapter of the NAACP in 1961.

She was married to Charles McMullen and is the mother of Rudolph and Charles.

Claudia Mae Glover Suggs Pickens

Claudia Mae Glover Suggs Pickens is a loving mother, devoted club member, fund raiser, community worker, and faithful member of Bethel A.M.E. Church. She is the daughter of Samuel and Emma (Peacock) Glover and was born May 11, 1906 in Monticello, Georgia. She is the second of five children. Mrs. Pickens came to Bethel in February, 1921 from an African Methodist Episcopal Church in Monticello, Georgia.

She has served the church in many capacities. She has been both a long term member and past president and of the Usher Board, where she ushered for sixteen years; past president and member of the Helping Hand Club; and member of the Calendar Club. For several years she served food to bereaved families at the church. Mrs. Pickens was a great fund raiser, accepting the crown on behalf of the Usher Board for raising the most money at the Church's program; served as co-host of the Teenage Show; and assisted with style shows for Bethel.

Her community work includes working as a patron for Gamma Chapter (undergraduate chapter at the University of Illinois), of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, purchasing needed items for the AKA's house; and providing housing for University of Illinois black students several decades ago. Mrs. Pickens was elected and served as Worthy Matron of Deborah Chapter #27, Order of the Eastern Star, (Prince Hall Affiliation) in 1938. She received an award in recognition of her dedicated service to Deborah Chapter #27.

Mrs. Pickens is the mother of Eugene.

Alyce Lee Dungy Scott

Alyce Lee Dungy Scott, community volunteer worker, generous donor, and faithful worker at Bethel A.M.E. Church, was born March 12 in Carmi, Illinois. The fourth of eight children, she is the daughter of Charlie William and Ida Mae (Collins) Dungy. Joining the church in 1949 under the charge of Reverend Elsie Taborn, Mrs. Scott has been a member of Bethel for more than forty years. From 1952 to 1992, Mrs. Scott was appointed and served as steward. She was church treasurer for many years, and she was a member of Bethel's financial committee for several decades. Mrs. Scott's other activities include: member and past secretary of the Willing Workers Club, former member of the Usher Board, member of the Women's Day Committee, and former member of the Choir.

Bethel has benefited immensely from Mrs. Scott's generous donations to the Church. She has provided a water fountain and the baptismal fountain that were given in memory of her late husband, Raymond Scott. She also donated a historical plaque that included the names of the trustees when the new church was built. Among the trustee's names included on the plaque is Mrs. Scott's sister, the late Mary Ellen Dungy McMurray. Mrs. Scott regularly donates to the Women's Missionary scholarship fund.

Her community volunteer work includes serving the Red Cross for 17 years as a volunteer bus driver and working with the Blood Bank. She received a special citation for exceptional volunteer service from the Red Cross at the 70th annual meeting of the Champaign County Chapter in 1987. She has also volunteered with the Meals on Wheels program. Mrs. Scott was elected and served as Worthy Matron of De Chapter #27, Order of the Eastern Star (Prince Hall Affiliation) in 1958.

Mattie Elsie Murray Tinsley

Mattie Elsie Murray Tinsley is a retired educator. She has the honored distination being the oldest member of Bethel A.M.E. Church. Mrs. Tinsley was born O 1895 in Fulton, Kentucky and is the daughter of Spencer James and Laura E She joined Bethel at a very early age and has been a faithful and steadfast the church for several decades. Mrs. Tinsley served as a stewardess for many years and is now a stewardess-emeritus. She was also a teacher and superintendent of the Sunday School, Helping Hand Club member, Lou Anna Riley Women's Missionary Society past secretary, and a class leader.
